

To the Families and Friends of the St Paul's Community......

A wise man suggested to me late last year the two busiest terms for a school are terms 1 and 4. With 2 weeks to go until the Autumn break, I would suggest the wise man was absolutely correct! This term has been particularly busy for Paul's 2 everyone St and the next weeks will continue that This term we have had two major retreat experiences for Year 10 and Year 12. The Year 10 Challenge Camp is an opportunity for the young men and women in Year 10 to work outside their comfort zones. It allows them to reflect on the importance of working together as a team and to begin to form the sorts of relationships that will help them as they begin their senior studies next year. It is also an excellent opportunity to stop and reflect on who they are as young Christians in a Catholic School. On the Thursday night of the camp, students viewed an episode of Australian Story from the ABC which tells the story of a young woman who suffers terrible injuries in a farming accident. She survives and with the wonderful support of her husband, begins to rebuild her life. Our students reflect on the sort of commitment that is shown by these young people in the face of adversity and spend time thinking about their own lives and how they can support one another and their loved ones as they mature over the next few years.

Year 12 were also able to spend quality time together at Elanora Heights Retreat centre recently. This special three days is expertly facilitated by Mr Ptolemy and Mr Doyle. It is, without one of the highlights for the Year 12 students. It is a chance to escape from the everyday pressures of the HSC world and a real opportunity to reflect and to recharge the batteries for the final run towards the end of the year. I often hear comments from older people who unkindly judge young people especially when it comes to their sense of the sacred and the spiritual. I can honestly say that the beautiful ritual that is led by Mr Ptolemy and Mr Doyle on the Thursday night of the retreat is one of the most moving and spiritual

occasions that I have had the pleasure of being part of. I congratulate Year 12 for the beautiful way that they entered this retreat experience and I thank the wonderful staff who so generously gave up their time from their own families to be with the Year 12 students.

The school has been busy with assessments and feedback for all years. There have been a variety of tests, assignments and tasks that will be used to report on student progress as well as inform teachers as to the depth of learning that has been taking place. These tasks are vital pieces of the education puzzle and I have challenged our young men and women to do their best in all that they do. The most important part of such tasks is the learning that comes from them. By that, I am not talking about the mark or the grade. I am talking about the feedback that is vital if deep learning and understanding is to be had. Too often we get caught up in the final mark. I believe that it is the comments and the feedback given by the teacher that is critical to the assessment process. What can I do to improve? How might the next task that is similar be better attempted? Can I have another go at the part that wasn't so good and get some feedback on that? What strategies did I use that were

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successful and how might they be useful in the next assessment? What did others do that was successful? I know that these are the sort of questions that are being asked by successful students in all educational settings. They are the sort of questions that can make a real difference to learning and I commend them to all of the students at St Paul's.

While Year 12 were on their Retreat, we hosted our sister schools from Katori City in Japan. 35 students from a variety of schools visited St Paul's and were kindly billeted by a number of our families. While here, the Japanese students attended some classes, immersed themselves into a variety of Australian activities and attempted to enjoy vegemite! If the tears and sadness on the faces of both hosts and visitors were any indication, it was clear that wonderful friendships were established over the weeklong visit. I particularly would like to thank Cathy O'Gorman and Cate Thompson for the huge amount of work that was done in organising the exchange program. To the families who hosted this year (and over many years for some), thank you. Your kindness and generosity was beautiful. It is hoped that we are able to send an exchange to Japan in 2017. I imagine that we will have quite a few takers, keen to re-establish the friendships made this year.

We have begun the planning and preparations for next year already, beginning with the Year 6 Information Night held last week. It was a lovely night where we met lots of mums and dads (and excited students) where they learnt more about our great school. Enrolments are open for next year and will remain open for the next month. If you know of anyone who is considering sending their child to St Paul's next year, could I ask you to get them to contact the office for an enrolment package. Students from our Catholic feeder schools will have them as they are part of the Maitland Newcastle schools system.

Next week, Year 10 have the first of their information sessions about Year 11 studies. This will be hosted by Mr Ptolemy and Mr Furey. I encourage parents to come along with their child so that you are able to begin the enrolment into senior school with a good understanding of the intricacies of the HSC!

The Easter season is now over. St Paul's students attended a beautiful liturgical event on Easter Thursday. The ceremony took the students along the Stations of the Cross in the footsteps of Jesus as he walked to his death and resurrection. The images used were painted by a local Aboriginal Artist, Richard Campbell. These evocative images were a poignant reminder of the Passion of Jesus Christ and the real meaning of Easter. A prayer and reflection by Louise Campbell. As well, students presented their tutor group Caritas Appeal boxes that had money raised by the groups over the Lenten period. I would like to thank Mr Doyle and his team for leading us in this liturgy and congratulate the students on the wonderful way that they engaged in this special part of what makes us unique as a school.

As this is the final newsletter of the term, I wish all our community a wonderful holiday and look forward to being back with you all next term.

National Day of Action Against Bullying and Violence

Last week also saw the Junior SRC member host an assembly for Year 7 and 8 students to address issues with bullying. This event saw students hear presentations from NSW Police as to the legalities of repeated harassment especially using social media and representatives from the Newcastle Knights Rugby League Club. As I stated at this assembly, St Paul's is a school that does not tolerate bullying. Should any students experience continual negative behaviour from others, I would encourage them to speak to their parents and a staff member about this. Student

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Coordinators are well versed in dealing with such issues effectively but are only as good as the information they receive. An early intervention by a Student Coordinator may have a greater effect than a reactive measure when the damage has been done.

Events like this run by our SRC are an excellent way of encouraging discussion at home and communication with school regarding any instances of bullying at St Paul's.

Transport NSW Opal Cards

A reminder that students need to be presenting their Opal Cards on our School transport systems. Each student is expected to 'tap' their card as it is an essential measure of how many students actually use school buses. Transport NSW regularly review the services linked to St Paul's and this can determine any changes to routes or overcrowding issues. If students don't tap their Opal Cards it may affect our future transport services from Transport NSW.

Year 11 News

At the fortnightly timetabled Form Meeting last week students were reminded how quickly the Preliminary Year passes. They are close to the end of Term 1 and will have only four weeks until their half yearly exams. Parents will have received the posted Interim Reports for Year 11 and students will begin to receive feedback from the assessment tasks that have already been completed.

The grading used in the Interim report for each of the categories can provide an interesting insight into the way that the student has settled into senior school and the attitude and application evident. The grading is: Consistently, Usually, Sometimes, Rarely. While the majority of students will be happy that the report is mostly stating 'Consistently', if either of the last two rankings appear on the report then it is an indicator that something is wrong and that there needs to be an attitude adjustment or that the student is struggling to meet to expectations of the workload of senior school. It was interesting that on the Study Day a quick survey of students by the presenters showed that the average hours of part-time casual work being completed by students was 12 hours. Some students are doing far in excess of this, and although they might enjoy the money, the priority should be school commitments. Students need to achieve a balance between social life, part-time work, sport, family commitments and School. Failure to do so will most likely result in poorer grades than the student is capable of, and usually an increase in anxiety and frustration. The Study Day presenters gave students a considerable range of strategies to use in their study and ways to memorise knowledge needed, but it require a commitment - effort and time.

Year 11 students were recently presented with their senior school badges and were reminded of the need to be in full winter uniform from the start of Term 2 – ie blazer, tie, long pants for the boys, and blazer for the girls. Many students will eventually move into a professional or corporate world and as such the uniform requirements are a step in that direction. It has been necessary to mention to several girls about the shortness of their skirts. This is an issue of modesty and the simple response is to lengthen the hem length. Most girls understand this and are conscious when their peers are showing more than they should.

Year 11 will be having a community lunch on Thursday 31st March and will gather in the Hospitality area to socialise over pizza and drink. This comes at a cost of \$5 and will need to be paid before Thursday 24th March if they are interested. Student concerns over the microwave, jug and sandwich maker have been raised with the school executive and will be resolved over the next few weeks.

The best part of being the Year 11 student Coordinator is being able to engage with such a wonderful group of young adults during lunch breaks and in class, and seeing the gradual shift in their maturity, their focus and their passion.

Excursion Date: Tuesday, May, 10th

John Misto's award winning play is studied by our St. Paul's students. <u>The Shoe-Horn Sonata</u> tells the story of two women, Australian nurse, Bridie Cartwright and an English school girl, Sheila Richards. The play begins with the two women being brought together for the first time in fifty years whilst chronicling their stories of capture in 1942. Their reunion is filled with laughter and tears and a shoe-horn which holds a dark secret that has kept the pair apart. Using footage from the National Film and Sound Archive and his own past movie productions, director Stephen Wallace creates a visually evocative and sensitive production of this iconic Australian play.

Impulse Theatre Company: Stephen Wallace and Michael Gillett formed Impulse Theatre Company in 2002 whilst working on productions of Oedipus the King and Lysistrata. Prior to this, both Wallace and Gillett had worked in film, television and theatre. Since 2006 the Company has annually produced plays from the HSC text list including As You Like It, Romeo and Juliet, Cosi, Away and The Shoe-Horn Sonata. The continuing success of these productions has gained Impulse Theatre a devoted following of English and Drama teachers. The 2016 production of The Shoe-Horn Sonata is the company's eighth, having first produced the play in 2009.

For many of us here at St Paul's we know something of Japan ... perhaps we know from childhood school lessons, that Japan is the country with the red circle on its flag. 

Parents Role in the career development of young people?

Evidence indicates that parents are the single greatest influence on their child's education and career decisions. The *Face-to-Face* report produced in 2010 by the National Youth Agency in England identified parents and carers as the most common



first point of call for career development information, advice and guidance for young people. Other research similarly points to the important role of parents in the career development of their children, especially in the early stages rather than in the later stages of their education (Watson and McMahon, 2003).

Generally, parental engagement in career development occurs around subject and course selections and at crunch times in the later years of education, with a focus on information provision. Given the rapid changes in the world of work through globalisation and technology and the subsequent paradigm shift in career development, this is no longer sufficient. There is also mounting evidence that links improved student motivation, retention, achievement and career outcomes with parental involvement in young people's learning. Career development now needs to focus not on job acquisition, but on the acquisition of skills, knowledge, attitudes, behaviours and competencies for continuous learning and improvement. The role of parents cannot be underestimated and is vital in supporting the career development of young people.






