Why we care about being on time!

The other day I had an interesting conversation with one of our parents. It came from the recent reports that were sent out and it was noted that their child had been recorded as being late on a number of occasions that were not formally explained.

The mum in question was concerned that such an item recorded on a report would not look too good if the student was to use that document as evidence as to why an employer should consider them for a position.

Mum was right. It wouldn't look good.

So I suppose the question might be, why would such a thing be recorded in the first place?

Punctuality is about respect. In high school, it is clear that we are modelling an environment that will prepare our kids for the world beyond school. For many of the students, that world included further study at university or TAFE. For many more, it will involve climbing the ladder in the work force.

Being on time for school is the same as being on time for work. It is assumed that as an employee, we would endeavour

to be on time every day and if we couldn't do that for a particular reason, we would inform our employer and make a commitment to make up the time or some other arrangement.

School is the same. Students should endeavour to be here on time to begin the work of the day. I often hear comments like "It's only Tutor Group, it isn't like that's class." My response to that is that Tutor Group is the same as a staff briefing. Many organisations begin the day with a briefing to organise the rest of the day. Would a supervisor accept an employee being late for briefing every day? I suspect not.

So it goes back to the original enquiry about the reports. We do put the truth on the report because it is the right thing to do. If a student is continually late for school for no clear reason, it is only right and proper that we report that "truth". Yes, there is an impact. It might tell a prospective employer something about the student that they really need to know. And imagine if it was your child competing for that lucrative position and the competition won out because of an untruth.

After I spoke with mum, I said that I would have a chat to the student about their report in general and about the situation he was finding himself in. An interesting conversation occurred with the young man firstly being a little aggressive and then finally seeing that the whole issue was about him, not the school. I said to him that he had three options.

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- 1. Get to school on time i.e get up earlier!
- 2. If he was delayed for any reason, get mum to write a note explaining the lateness so that it would not be recorded as unexplained.
- Continue to be tardy and accept that it could impact on his ability to seek employment.

The best solution would be number one. I suspect if the second option was employed too many times that mum and dad would soon accept option 3 as the reality!

Being on time for school is important. Getting the most from every day is what life here at St Paul's is all about. Successful people have good habits and make the most of the opportunities afforded to them.



Joseph Caruso Foundation

On Tuesday 17 May, two members of the Joshua Caruso Foundation, **Joe Caruso** and **Mark Bowen** addressed the school assembly about the invaluable work they are undertaking in the local community. Established by Joe and Belinda Caruso in memory of their son Joshua, who died on his way to school when his heart suddenly stopped, the Joshua Caruso Foundation aims to raise money and awareness to combat hypertrophic cardiomyopathy (HCM). Josh and his family were completely unaware that he had this condition until it was too late. Joe and Belinda hope that through the Foundation's work they can prevent other parents from suffering the same tragedy that they did.

Their presentation to the school of a defibrillator means that over the last two years this foundation has provided such devices to 30 local community schools and groups. Their efforts to raise awareness and support in the region is both inspiring and timely. As a school, we would like to thank the members of the foundation for their generous donation and encourage them in their ongoing endeavours.

Year 9 News

Welcome back to another jam packed term. We trust that everyone had a safe and enjoyable break.

Last term saw our Brainstorm Production - Cyberia which brought to the attention the current issues associated with not only the issue of social media but also the impact of technology on relationships and the wellbeing of the individual. Please take this opportunity to discuss this with your child and reflect on your child's current practises in relation to time spent on devices and the issues surrounding their usage ie reliance on them, bullying, and appropriateness of images.

A few suggestions surrounding children's use of screens around the home:......

- It is recommended that limits are set around the use of devices in the home. Allow your child to be "device free" and "offline" so to speak to give them that down time. You can set limits especially around length of time allowed on their devices, around the dinner table, devices to be handed in to parents at a negotiated time each night etc.
- It is recommended screens should be turned off 30 minutes before lights are out, this includes TV, video games, phones, devices. Limiting screens at night, and giving your child time to soothe and wind down prior to bedtime, will likely result in better quality sleep. Screens have been proven to wake up our brain and therefore reduce quality of sleep, which in turn can affect the overall well-being and focus of your child. This could be of benefit with the upcoming exams in week 6 approaching.

We also had our **Year 9 Reflection Day** which was a wonderful opportunity for students and tutor group teachers to come together as a small community. Chris, our Guest Speaker spoke about the importance of being a good person and challenged the students on how they could go about this. It was a successful and enjoyable day at Redhead Beach and was largely supported by the year group which was great to see. We would like to thank the Year 9 Tutor Group teachers for their help on the day.

As we come into the cooler months uniform is becoming an issue with students wearing incorrect layers, ie incorrect jumpers. We understand that students may have had a growth spurt over the summer break however your support in ensuring your child is in the correct uniform would be greatly appreciated. Both sport jackets and woollen navy jumpers are available at Lowes, however, both can be purchased at a reduced cost from the clothing pool. 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Creative Arts and LOTE News



But instead,


It was nobody.

- 1. Keep things in perspective; don't limit yourself to one idea or what Uncle Fred thinks of Arts degrees. Visit open days, websites and talk to everyone.
- 2. Pick a degree based on your interests and passions rather than maximising the use of your ATAR. Follow your aspirations, not the crowd.
- **3.** University is 50 percent study and 50 percent life experience. When choosing a university, consider the experiences on offer, not just the courses.
- **4.** University is NOT just a job training area. Your future career may not reflect the degree you study, so stay openminded.
- 5. Treat university as a chance to push yourself intellectually and socially. It will help with your career, but the value is beyond just the money you will make.

Police Force Recruitment 2016

- 1. You will require a University Certificate in Workforce Essentials –UCWE-
 - * The cost is \$1.500
 - * Through CSU
 - * There are 5 starting dates throughout the calendar year.
 - You have the choice of doing this as a 12 week on line course or a 5 week face to face full time course.
 - * At the end of the course you sit a final Exam- this must be sat either in Sydney, Bathurst or Port Macquarie.
 - * There are 13 Modules to complete
- 2. Your driver's licence must be free of "incident" for 12 months
- 3. Sit the Police Entrance Exam
 - * You must register to sit the exam.
 - * These are held every 6-8 weeks
 - * There is a testing centre in Newcastle
 - * The test takes 2 ½ hours approx.
 - * Cost is \$155
 - Must have your admissions ticket and ID on the day otherwise no admittance
 - * Results must be <u>greater than</u> (Literacy skills Reading section 111 -Extended written questions 14/20 -Verbal Reasoning 15/34 Summary Writing 14/20 Abstract reasoning 32/45)
- 4. Medically Fit (checking for asthma / eye sight / seizures) You must receive a health clearance from your GP-There will be a list provided to the GP for signing off.
- 5. Physically fit- the test will include:

Panadol is **not available** from the Office. If you think your child may need any - students may bring their own and keep in their bag.


