To the Families and Friends of the St Paul's Community.....

On Friday this week, we celebrate St Paul's Day. As a community, we gather to thank our God for the many blessings he has given us over the past year and celebrate together with prayer, a concert and a fair ground!

St Paul is our patron. It has been said that he is one of the most significant figures in the early church. Thirteen of the twenty-seven books in the Bible were written by St Paul and in The Acts of the Apostles, it would be a reasonable claim to say he was the hero of this passage in time. It is no accident that our school crest has the book as its centrepiece.

After his conversion on the Road to Damascus (the reason behind the name of our new library block), St Paul travelled tens of thousands of kilometres in his mission to spread the good news of Jesus' resurrection and promise of life everlasting. He was a devout Jew, a tent maker and was fluent in Greek as well as the Jewish language. He was born in Tarsus in Eastern Turkey. After his conversion, he spent time with Peter, learning about Jesus and the resurrection. He became firm friends with Peter and at times, they had heated discussions. On one occasion, he called Peter, the best friend of Jesus, a hypocrite. It must have been an interesting discussion!

Paul was a very strong man. In saying that, scholars are referring to his inner strength. It would seem that he was not particularly strong physically, but had an inner resolve that was the envy of many. In his writing, he talks about the physical torment and torture that he received from time to time and that it was God that gave him the strength to carry on. He was shipwrecked on more than one occasion, ended up in jail and was tortured and beaten because of his faith and at the same time, always tried to remain loyal to the young churches that he was mentoring in their early years of establishment.

St Paul was martyred sometime between 66 and 68 AD. He had been tried under Roman Law for bringing non-Jews (Gentiles) into the Jewish Temple. He was beheaded (rather than crucified which was the usual punishment) and legend says that his head bounced three times and three fountains sprang from the earth. To this day, the place is called Tre Fontane, or Three Fountains. His body was taken about three kilometres away to be buried in land owned by a friend, where the Basilica of St Paul Outside the Walls was later built.

St Paul is the perfect patron for our school. He was resilient, passionate and driven. He had great faith and was loyal to the people he worked with. He would question and challenge when needed and he believed in the ultimate love and power of our God. I look forward to celebrating St Paul's Day with our school community on Friday.

Last Friday I had cause to speak to the junior school about some things that were less than positive. I was in a class doing some observations as part of our PP&D initiatives and a young man walked in and made some silly bird call or noise with a view to disrupt the beginning of the lesson. I obviously had a serious conversation with the young man in question and I hope that he got the message I was trying to convey. I was chatting to some colleagues who said that these sorts of childish behaviours were becoming more and more commonplace in our classrooms, disrupting the learning of the majority of students and taking up valuable time from the teaching staff.



I also received an email from a member of the public who had been on the morning train with a number of our young men and women. He was very measured in his letter but it was clear that our students were behaving in a way that was less than what we expect. I made contact with the person and gained his permission to publish some of what he said about our students.

"They sat immediately behind me and were clearly identified wearing your school uniform. They constantly yelled, swore, and generally "played up" for thirty minutes or so. One boy had a mini scooter he actually rode down the aisle. None had any interest in doing anything school related, unlike some other students also in the carriage.

The worst moment came when some of the boys huddled in a group in the seat behind me and began to brag about eating or swallowing some capsules (?) that tasted of "vomit" or "off cheese" etc and there was a cash prize for the boy who could eat these things and not vomit. There was teasing about vomiting and egging each other on to do so. I saw one boy on the verge of vomiting but thankfully none actually did; I would have known about it if it had occurred."



It is most disappointing when these things happen. I have often spoken about one of the most precious things that a school like St Paul's has, is its reputation. It is also the most fragile – years to build up and minutes to destroy. I made it clear to the student body that as a community, we will not abide by such poor and disrespectful behaviours and that there would be consequences. At this point we already have some information that might lead us to the boys involved.

As I spoke to the school, it was also clear that a number of students felt that our uniform was optional, particularly when it came to jumpers. I have made it clear that the practice of wearing non-school jumpers and/or hoodies was to stop and that uniform detentions will be the result on non-compliance with that expectation. Obviously if there is a need for a uniform variation, a note signed by the parent would be supplied explaining the reason for the variation. Out of the nine students I spoke to that afternoon, only one had a note.

The vast majority of our young men and women do the right thing. A small minority feel the need to act in ways that do not reflect our standards and values. As I said to the group on Friday, it is time for the silent majority to have their school experience and learning opportunities enhanced by being able to be part of this place without a small minority taking up an unfair share of time and resources.

Year 12 have almost completed their Trials. This exam block in the final two weeks of this term is a little different to a number of other high schools but in saying that, many schools are moving the Trials to a similar place as St Paul's. It allows students and staff time next term to focus on any weaknesses that the Trial might have highlighted as well as an opportunity to complete major works and performance pieces without the added stress of upcoming trial exams. Next term will go quick enough for our Year 12 students and they will now be able to focus on completing their courses and revising effectively for their HSC exams in October.



TERM 3 RESUMES ON TUESDAY 19th JULY

The teaching staff will be at the University of Newcastle on Monday at a conference sponsored by the Maitland Newcastle Catholic Schools Office called "Re-Framing Learning". The keynote speaker is Professor John Fischetti, Head of the Education Faculty of the University. Professor Fischetti has extensive senior leadership and senior faculty experience across several American universities. He served as Department Chair and Doctoral Program Coordinator at the University of North Carolina at Wilmington and as Professor and Program Coordinator at the University of Louisville, Kentucky, as well as at the University of Massachusetts at Amherst. Professor Fischetti received his doctorate in education in professional development, school reform and educational leadership for change in 1986 at the University of Massachusetts at Amherst.

From there, all our teaching staff will be working with other key professionals in a variety of workshops and seminars on Learning in the contemporary world. We will be joined by over 600 staff from schools all around NSW. This will be a wonderful professional development opportunity for all our teachers.

St Paul's Day, Friday 1 July



The last day of Term 2 each year is celebrated as St Paul's Day. St Paul's Day is a celebration of our school patron – St Paul.

The day begins with a liturgy which celebrates the story of St Paul and his willingness to live the gospel and create a gospel-centred community.

Following the liturgy Year 11 students run the annual "St Paul's Got Talent" Quest. This fun activity involves a wide range of students who showcase their talents to the whole school. A lot of clapping and cheering is usually involved.

After the formal part of the day is over, students will enjoy a series of food stalls and carnival rides for the rest of the day.

There will be no formal lessons or organised sport on this day.

This is an Out of Uniform Day and our policy on modest clothing will apply and appropriate attire for carnival rides is encouraged. Students will then be able to fully participate in the free sporting activities such as a netball competition between staff and students, competitions and games.

There will be a small charge for the carnival rides. The rides include: the mechanical bull, large jumping castle, twister, bungee run and surf's up.

The food stalls that will be available on the day include a sausage sizzle, pizza, soft drinks, donuts, milkshakes, cakes and lollies. The food and rides are heavily subsidised by the School, however there is a small cost of \$1 - \$2 for each food item and \$5 for 7 ride tickets. Students will need to bring some money if they choose to buy food or go on the rides.

Jacqueline is celebrated each year in the '**Sunshine Award**', which this year was given to **Erin Sutherland** from Year 12.

Welcome to the end of Term 2

This Term has held lots of events: Exams, Assessment Tasks, Brainstorm plays, Zoo excursions, St Pauls Day !!!

The students have finished their Semester 1 exams and their **Reports** will be going home early in the new Term, followed by Parent Teacher Interviews.

The Brainstorm Production, “**Verbal combat**”, was well received by the students. The play centred on one student, new to the school, being picked on by another student and all that was involved in that situation – the manipulation, the bystanders, the victim, the bully, etc.

St Pauls Day is coming up on Friday 1 July. It is a day when we celebrate being part of the St Pauls community. There will be a smoking ceremony, a liturgy, St Pauls Got Talent, lunch and food stalls, organised games, and a carnival in the teacher’s carpark!

Students return to School in Term 3 on **Tuesday 19 July** since the staff will be involved in a Diocesan In-service day in Newcastle.

I would like the students to review their Term 2 efforts and make a concerted effort to **improve** these efforts in Term 3. Parents, please assist your child to set up and adhere to a **steady home study routine** each weekday. Below is attached the information I have previously put into Newsletters to assist in this area:

⇒ *Homework can be the “bug bear” of a household if it is allowed to be. At this stage in a student’s educational career, homework should be part and parcel of the school day. As I spoke about at the Year 7 Study Skills evening last year, homework needs to part of a daily routine that fits into the family situation. I would suggest something like the following.....*




⇒ *An hour or so free time when the child arrives home from school for eating, relaxing, walking the dog, hanging out with mates, etc. Then a set homework time eg 5 - 6pm. During this time, no TV/ipods/music/etc. Ideally the child would have their own homework space to work at which they helped in setting up.*



⇒ *Now, what to do in this time? Hopefully, the student is using their school homework diary properly and should have a list of what is required, but it is advisable that the student organise their hour or so of homework time – make a list of Assessment Tasks and when they are due, list daily homework eg Maths, list areas that could do with further reading ahead eg Science, English, Geography.*



⇒ *Homework includes such things as completing work due the next day, working on Assessment Tasks, summarising topics to get ready for Exams, reading ahead, gluing in sheets, completing missed or incomplete work, reading newspapers and listening to the News, discussing topics learnt with the family to get their opinion and experience, etc. The Year 8 Student Page lists all Assessment Tasks. <http://mnlive/schools/BRG/myClasses/Year%208%20Student%20Page/default.aspx>*



⇒ *An hour will fly by if the child approaches it as a task that needs to be practised since they still have many years of education ahead of them. At times, this hour may need to be extended by 30 minutes to allow for multiple Assessment Tasks to be worked on, or studying for Exams. It is not a time for battles or stress.*



The above hints are just a useful guide to assist your child to get into a routine to assist their own education and learning. Hopefully with a little guidance early in the year we may set up good routine for the future.

Enjoy your children over the break and encourage them to achieve something meaningful over this time.



Year 11 News

Parents have by now received **Year 11 Reports** and have had the opportunity to engage in purposeful discussions at the parent teacher interviews following the **Semester Awards** on Monday 27th June. **Parent-teacher interview bookings** were accessed online via the new '**Parent Portal**'. Instructions on how to access this via the web browser were posted home in Week 8.

I reminded Year 11 students at the recent Form meeting of their **responsibilities** - that there are four cornerstones to success in school:

- ◆ ***Wear your uniform well***
- ◆ ***Be punctual to class***
- ◆ ***Show a commitment to classwork and assignments***
- ◆ ***Establish a cooperative rapport with your peers and teachers***



Each Year 11 student chose to return to senior school, and each senior student chose the individual subjects that form their course of study. The teachers are here to guide and to assist, and sometimes try to inspire the students so that YOU can achieve your desired goal, whether it be university, TAFE, or apprenticeship. So this is why it is important for **each student to review the report and determine if the comments and grade truly reflect their ability**. If YES – congratulations, well done. If NO, why not? What needs to change? Find the answers to this question so that your third and last term of Year 11 becomes a productive and hopefully enjoyable learning experience.

I also reminded the Year 11 students of the opportunities that are made available to them. One of these was **Brainstorm's Production WIRED**, which was on Wednesday 29th June. This play is confronting in that it highlights the causes and effects of stress and depression associated with exams, relationships and everyday life. This is a very relevant play and all of Year 11 should have attended this production which is part of the St Paul's pastoral care program.

Other opportunities for Year 11 are the **Athletics carnival on Wednesday of Week 1** of Term 3 and their leadership role in assisting with the **St Paul's Day celebrations** on the last day of this term.



Perhaps the most significant opportunity for Year 11 students is the **election of School Leaders for 2017**. The first step in this process is student nomination during weeks 1 and 2 of Term 3. I encourage students who might think about nomination but who might be unsure, to talk to their Tutor Group teacher or a trusted teacher or peer and ask their advice. Sometimes the experience of nomination is worthwhile in itself. An outline of the process of election will be presented to students this week and will also be emailed to parents. Could you be a student leader of St Paul's in 2017? Please give it some thought ...it could be very rewarding.

St Paul's Vietnam Immersion September / October 2016



An information meeting was held during Week 9 of Term 2 for students who have signed up for the St Paul's Vietnam Immersion departing on 30th September 2016. Ms Adams, Mrs Pateman, and Mr Thomas are the three teachers who will assist me.

All of the initial paperwork and financial deposits have been forwarded to our travel company - Vietnam School Tours. **Final payment (the balance being \$3550) is required before the end of Week 2, Term 3.** Please be sure that the Finance Officer knows that the payment is for Vietnam rather than school fees. An **extra \$100** will be asked to be paid to Mr Wilson for gratuities, contribution towards social justice projects and bus travel to Sydney airport.

There will be a **parent-student-teacher meeting** early Term 3 to discuss questions concerning medical preparation, insurance, gear required, spending money and denomination, community projects, the Long Tan commemoration, travel to and from airport, gratuities expected etc. The Visa application for each student and a passport that has six months validity will be required by me around Term 3 Week 5 so that these can be forwarded by courier to our travel company. Securing Visas usually takes around four days.

Students have already decided **room allocations and partners**, confirmed **shirt sizes** for the travel shirt that has been designed by Ms Adams, Mrs Pateman and students, (and will be ordered before the end of term), and agreed to some minor fund raising for charity projects (such as cake stalls). Teachers and students also discussed gifts of sensory awareness toys for the orphanage we visit, and leather soccer balls for the kindergarten we are likely to visit. I stressed to students that they **should not purchase equipment** specifically for the Immersion, but rather borrow or make use of what they have. This will be discussed in detail at the parent meeting in Term 3 Week 3 (date/day to be decided). A detailed 'gear list' will be issued at this meeting or beforehand. Later in Term 3 I will request that students attend 'choir practise' (to have a few songs prepared) and 'soccer training' depending on the Immersion activities that we will undertake.

There is little required by way of preparation, but if parents or students have questions or concerns please direct them to myself or Mr Steven Thomas who has travelled throughout Vietnam before with a group of students. Those students who indicated that they are not strong cyclists, please practise until you are feeling very confident. It is generally flat terrain for cycling, but there is traffic so you'll need to have a confident control of your bicycle.


QKR UPDATE.....



Why students need qualifications



Of the 13 million jobs in Australia in 2020, 11 million (85%) will require a Certificate III or higher. Four million (30%) will require a Bachelor's Degree or higher. If students don't have a qualification the chances of getting a job in the future will be difficult.

Many of the careers and jobs that are around today will disappear by the time students get their first job and many new careers will be created. Most careers will still be needed as will trade jobs such as builders, plumbers, hairdressers and those services that look after people. There's no doubt that every future job will include technology.

In 2006, Facebook was in its infancy, Twitter was being launched, and nobody had iPhones. Ten years on, the world is a very different place, and so is the workplace.

Jobs exist now that we'd never heard of ten years ago. One estimate suggests that 65% of children entering primary school today will ultimately end up working in completely new job types that aren't on our radar yet.

This pace of change is only going to get faster thanks to rapid advances in the fields of robotics, driverless transport, artificial intelligence, biotechnology, advanced materials and genomics (all of which require STEM qualifications).

To fill the gap of disappearing jobs, business innovation will create new and diverse roles in areas that technology can't compete. Roles that require creative input, problem solving skills, people-focus, leadership skills or high-level communication talent can be futureproofed as they are not effectively replaceable by technology.

Romeo (Tom) met his match in the Bogan from Booragul (Jordan Elliott) as we saw him protest his love, "I luv ya, Julz..." Colleen and Radi ably competed as Juliets and no truer word was spoken, "If you liked it then you should've put a ring on it." Finally, parting really was a sweet sorrow as we moved on to The Winter's Tale and Brother Elim delivering his Sermon on the Mount. The final scene of this fantastical affair was held back in the Drama Room where the Head Witch (Zoe Hurtz) checked that all the doors were chained and bolted... and so began a frumptious wheeze of a story as the witches prepared to do away with all the children in Inkland!*

Yep.. it was fantastical and I commend Year 11 Drama for their amazing energy and commitment to producing such a wonderful show. I also want to thank the audience for coming out on such a cold but glorious evening. Also, a big thank you to our intern, **Luke Carroll**, who co-directed the show and gave so much of his time and energy for the production.

Year 8 Visual Arts: The Global Angel Wings Project

Teachers Miss Sarah Adams, Mrs Alison Pateman, Mrs Felicity Howard and Mr Edward Leonard have been busy working with their Year 8 students to create **Angel Wings**. A collaborative exercise, students have been challenged to design and create the wings with the installation of the wings taking place around St Paul's on Tuesday 29th June. The project was the idea of Miss Adams, based on the Global Wings Project as outlined below:

Colette Miller's "Global Angel Wings Project" represents the angel within all of us. "To me the wings represent our inner angel," she has said, "They represent that even though we all come from scarred lives; we're all human. We all have trauma and drama." Miller is hoping that this self-realisation can unite mankind. Ever since she began this labour of love in 2012, the world has responded wholeheartedly to her art and its message. From the infamously gritty streets of Skid Row in Downtown Los Angeles to the pristine streets of West Hollywood, to Australia, Mexico, and her first international installation in a destitute area of Kenya, her painted wings can be found projecting hope, spunk, magic—and of course, some irresistible photo ops. Miller positions her art on walls that are accessible to all; regardless of class, religion, race, or socioeconomic standing.

As she described in her TEDx Talk, when she was driving around Los Angeles in 2012 she started to imagine blank walls covered in large angel wings; partially as a response to the bombardment of advertisements we are inundated with on a daily basis. So, she began to paint the wings as she imagined them. Each a symbol of human spirit, using shades of indigo and violet to incorporate part of the seven chakras—the body’s way of balancing its positive energy.

Without instruction, everyday people began to take notice. Posing with her art and sharing the images on social media. In the midst of an election year, Los Angeles photographer Gary Leonard took photographs of all the mayoral candidates in front of Miller’s wings, which drew a fascinating juxtaposition between Los Angeles politicians and their embracing of street art.

With international installations her movement to enlighten humanity became a global, social phenomenon. With pictures not only being shared across Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter, but also with international press publications picking up photos of the art in areas of social unrest or conflict. But her wings transcend context, pictures of people standing in front of Miller’s wings—regardless of when or where—resonate with people on so many levels. Daring us to ask if we are in fact the angels of Earth.

“We are the custodians of this planet,” she said in discussing her efforts. “I think that the more meditation on what our choices are as humanity, what we really can do to bring the sky and the heavens down to the street, and do the hard work, and walk the gritty thing...that’s why it’s street art, because I want to bring that big sky and that big consciousness here. I think we can be the angels on this earth and that’s my challenge to us.”




Sport Update


