

To the Families and Friends of the St Paul's Community.......

On Thursday, I will be talking to the Year 12 group about the *End of Days*. By this, I mean the last weeks of schooling for them as a year group. It is a wonderful time for our young men and women and a time of celebration for the staff as they finish courses, complete revision and enjoy the last formal lessons that will mark the end of each course.



For our students, it is also a time of reflection and for some, a time of trepidation. Thirteen years of formal, school based education is a significant time in their young lives. As they finish the year, they will reflect on the good times and the not so good times that schooling has brought. Some might be able to remember their first day at school. The tears from mum as they donned that little uniform and marched into kinder, no longer completely joined to the family unit but now exploring the big world. Others will remember significant events such as successes in sports carnivals, debating competitions, eisteddfods and concerts. Still others

will remember fondly friends who have gone to other places.

For staff, it is also a time of reflection. It is a time where we remember the fun events, the retreats, the amazing lessons, the "light-bulb" moments in class, the surprising essay answer and the great relationships that have been formed in the years that Year 12 have been at St Paul's.

When I talk to the group, I will be discussing some of the areas where our young men and women will need to be mindful, particularly as they finish their time at the campus. We want all of them to finish well, to celebrate their time openly, honestly and with dignity. However, it would be neglectful of me if I didn't point out some of the pitfalls that can happen when young people get together and make foolish choices.

A letter will be sent to all Year 12 families outlining expectations we have at the end of the term. It will also list the events that will mark the successful end to Year 12, beautiful events that will showcase our students.

In that letter, it makes clear **that we do not have 'Muck-Up Days"** I will be explaining to the students exactly what we mean by that statement. As well, I will be talking about such matters as parties, police, drugs and alcohol, uniform, school attendance, work ethic and study vacation.



At this time of the year, it is obvious to us adults that there will be more than the usual number of young people on the roads going to and from social events. This is certainly known to the Police. I will be saying to our students to be very mindful of that reality. At this time of the year, there is always a heightened police presence on the roads, particularly around schools. They

will be there to protect other road users and our young drivers from making foolish decisions. In my experience, there will be one or two students booked near the school in the mornings or afternoons particularly around this time. I will ask our students to be mindful of this and to make sure that they make good decisions as they drive to and from school.

Last Friday night, my wife and I were lucky enough to see the 2016 Aspire Production – *There's Something Strange About Marvin McRae*. It was a truly remarkable production that would be the envy of any production company. The music, choreography, sound and lighting along with outstanding special effects showcased the wonderful musical and drama talents of students from around our diocese. We had a number of students involved in all aspects of the production and the feedback we had from the musical director was that our young men and women were to be congratulated on the wonderful way they worked with everyone to make the production such a success.

At the end of last term, I wrote an article outlining an event on the trains that did little to enhance our reputation.



Yesterday we received a phone call from an older lady who, with her daughter was alighting from the train at Booragul station with luggage as they were returning from a trip. They were obviously going to struggle with the bags on the steps of the overpass when some of our students came to the rescue. They helped the two ladies with their bags up and down the overpass with little fuss or fanfare. The lady said that these students were well dressed and very well spoken and most helpful and polite. Unfortunately, she didn't get their names. I would love to personally thank these students for what they did. It was a small gesture but a huge one in terms of what it says about St

Paul's. Well done.

In the media, there has been a good deal of coverage regarding proposed changes to the HSC for 2020. The following information is from the Board of Studies Teaching and Educational Standards (BOSTES) that gives a short overview of the changes.

The New South Wales Higher School Certificate (HSC) is a highly valued credential in Australia and internationally. BOSTES has identified key areas for reform through extensive consideration of issues relating to the HSC at board level and in consultation with major stakeholders over the past three years.

At the heart of the HSC reforms is the establishment of a minimum standard in literacy and numeracy for the award of the HSC. The minimum standard reform underpins the two other areas of reform — Curriculum and Assessment — through revised course structure and content, as well as streamlined assessment.

These changes will provide a flexible HSC that caters for the needs of all students, with options to extend students in their studies.

From the Assistant Principal - Curriculum



As mentioned in the previous newsletter, BOSTES has undertaken a complete review of the HSC for the first time in 17 years. The result is the 'Stronger HSC Standards' that will be rolled out over the next few years. Some of the key changes are outlined below:

- Changes will be effective from 2019 onwards.
- New Curriculums will be delivered for English, Maths, Science and History
- A new Science Extension course will feature for Year 12 students from 2019 onward.
- An increased focus on STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) subjects will be apparent. Emerging technologies will be a focus of all subjects.
- All subjects will have fewer formal assessments to reduce the workload and stress on HSC students. Year 12 students will undertake a maximum of four internal school assessments per course.
- Exams will be redesigned to focus on allowing students to display their depth of knowledge and application of skills.
- From 2020 HSC students will need to achieve minimum standards in literacy and numeracy in order to receive the HSC. These standards will be automatically achieved by many students, who in their Year 9 NAPLAN reading, writing and numeracy tasks achieve a Band 8 or higher. All students not reaching these standards in Year 9, will have many further opportunities to meet these minimum standards through online examinations. Life Skills students will not be required to fulfil this requirement.
- Common scales will be introduced for Mathematics to encourage students to study Mathematics courses that suit their abilities.

These are some of the core changes which have been published at this stage. There will be more details forthcoming as these ideas are explored further. It should be noted that students from the current Years 10-12 cohorts will not be affected by these changes.

Religious Studies News



Religious Literacy Assessment

The assessment of Catholic Religious Literacy takes place annually across all schools in the diocese.

It focuses on students' knowledge and understanding of key concepts that are addressed in the Religious Education program, the achievement of the outcomes set out in the Diocesan Religion syllabus, and the ability of students to communicate this knowledge and understanding about the Catholic tradition.

The program of assessment was trialled in 2010 and implemented from 2011 onwards. Years 4 and 6 in Primary schools and Years 8 and 10 in Secondary schools are assessed each year. Both Years 6 and 10 are given a comprehensive multiple choice test based on knowledge of the RE curriculum. Years 4 and 8 complete a task based on a particular unit being studied during the year.

All together the data produced from the various testing instruments is designed to give RE teachers meaningful feedback about the students' learning and to assist in developing the classroom teaching of Religion.

Our Year 8 students will be undertaking this task in **Week 6**, **Monday 22nd August**. This will be a 1-hour exam based on the **Sacraments** unit they are currently studying. The notification of this task is located on the school portal for your perusal and clearly outlines the structure and key areas of learning they will need to revise. I wish all students every success in their preparation and accomplishment of this task.




QKR UPDATE.....

The user design experts at MasterCard have come up with a new design and parent experience within the Qkr app that all users will see with the update from Apple's App Store or the Google Play store on or soon after the 16th of June, 2016. Your username and password will remain the same, as will any credit or debit cards already stored within Qkr, as well as your profile settings and those of your children. What will change significantly is the look and feel of the app, and the screens you will see in the process of using Qkr. Below are some of the current Qkr screens on left (as seen on an iPad today), and how they will appear with the app refresh.

Home screen: Our school will appear at the top of the home screen for currently registered users, but note some new terms like "Discover" and "Activity" as Qkr is being used increasing by non school merchants around the world, so the design has been modified to cater for users in a wide range of industry sectors.



Receipts will in future be stored under the "Activity" tab. Your old receipts will still be accessible from this area.



Product selection screen: This screen will now be more efficiently used to make scrolling through a large list of products easier.

Career Thought of the Week:

Things you need to consider when picking a degree

How do you choose the right university, or the right degree? What should you focus on? How do you weigh up all the different elements involved? Do you want to stay local, or move far away? Do you want a degree that gets you job ready, or do you need flexibility?

Scarily, students and their families often choose to focus overwhelmingly on only some of the crucial aspects of choosing the right university and course post school, and it means that they often miss the other equally important issues.

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Scarily, students and their families often choose to focus overwhelmingly on only **some** of the crucial aspects of choosing the right university and course post school, and it means that they often miss the other equally important issues.

What to remember when you are picking (or are advising) on a university course

Don't pick a university, pick a degree:

It is a risky move to pick a university before you choose a course, because you'll be inclined to settle for an obtainable course at a university of choice rather than really considering what is right for you.

In Australia we are lucky enough to have an extraordinary range of high-quality universities in just about every city. In fact, many are in the top 1% of universities worldwide. This means that you don't need to try and discriminate between universities based on their 'value' or 'prestige'. Instead of worrying about what a university will look like on your resume, consider the value of your degree. A business degree from most universities will hold the same value as each other, same for law or science, or just about any uniform degree. Though, if you choose to pick a course with a lesser entry mark (one that you can obtain) at a university that you perceive to be better on your resume, you are making a limiting mistake. You'll be weighed up by employers by your course type, not the university name.

Remember your final score isn't everything:

Maybe the biggest lesson to remember is that courses with higher entry requirements aren't necessarily better. Having a law degree doesn't mean that you'll make more money. Equally, just because media communications is worth 98.5, doesn't mean that you'll find it any easier to get your foot in the door in a media role post-university.

Often students are told by their parents or friends not to "waste their ATAR" but simply, there could not be worse advice. **Don't make the mistake of just trying to match your course to your ATAR.**

Performing well in your high school exams is something to be very proud of, but as universities continue to confirm, entry scores are a signal about the demand for a course, not its inherent quality. The entry requirement is a result of the number of places available and the number of students who are anticipated to apply for the degree.

This means that degrees with lower entry scores aren't necessarily less prestigious, less difficult, or require less time. For example, technology or science degrees often have lower entry scores than law degrees, popular media or arts degrees, but research shows us that those arts and science faculties are ranked just as highly as those with higher ATAR ranks, and sometimes even higher.

Understand your course:

This means you'll need to research and make no assumptions. For most students the bottom line is to find a course, subject or combination of subjects that you will enjoy and be successful at. So rather than choosing a course you think you ought to do, choose a course you want to do!

The Footnotes Course Finder is the perfect place to start. Using the search process you will be able to view various

course options available within your mark range and will be able to read relevant industry and study articles beneath. **Don't make the mistake of assuming what the course will involve, or where it will lead you.** Equally, courses with the same title can vary considerably in terms of subjects from one university to another, so it's really important to check out the course content. This information is available on their websites.

This is a valuable opportunity to visit the campus, talk to current student, prospective student advisers and lecturers about courses, scholarships and other opportunities. You can look around facilities such as the library and other student areas, sports facilities and also inspect on campus accommodation/colleges.

It is really important you visit institutions and get a feel for the environment. You don't want to end up somewhere you have never seen and when you arrive to commence your study you don't like it or it doesn't meet your expectations!! You wouldn't buy a car without looking at it first. The same applies when choosing your education provider!



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


