Year 11 End of Course Exams

Year 11 students have begun their End of Preliminary HSC Course Exams this week. These exams are an opportunity for the students to demonstrate their knowledge and skills in a formal exam setting. I would like to wish them all the best as they continue their journey towards the HSC next term and encourage them to use these exams as a real and tangible way to assess their own learning as well as an opportunity to continue to develop skills that will help them into the future.

NAPLAN Results

The recent release of the NAPLAN results has shown that our students have experienced sound growth in all aspects of the assessable areas shown by this snapshot. The staff of St Paul's will be looking closely at the results and this will continue to inform our practice over the next 12 months. The data that we are able to use from NAPLAN allows us to continually refine our programs and to develop processes and practices to support and extend the students in literacy and numeracy. Building Program

The building program has begun in earnest. Over the past week, we have had two, 28 tonne excavators driving in poles for the foundation of the new building. Clearly such an undertaking creates a degree of noise. We have been monitoring the impact on the school community using Data Loggers and have had contact with Work Cover to ensure that we are working well within appropriate guidelines. At this stage, noise from the pile driving in classrooms is well below the set standard. We have ensured that there is no pile driving when students are on breaks (recess and lunch) and there is no pile driving while the Year 11 exams are on. It is planned for a resumption to this work in Week 10 but we have requested that there will be no driving on Thursday 26th September while we are celebrating our Year 12 Graduation. In all likelihood, the majority of the piles will be driven in during the next holidays.

Canonisation of Mother Theresa

I have taken the liberty of quoting part of the Homily given by Pope Francis on Monday at the Canonisation of Mother Theresa of Calcutta. I hope you enjoy his beautiful words as much as I did.

"Mother Teresa, in all aspects of her life, was a generous dispenser of divine mercy, making herself available for everyone through her welcome and defence of human life, those unborn and those abandoned and discarded. She was committed to defending life, ceaselessly proclaiming that "the unborn are the weakest, the smallest, the most vulnerable". She bowed down before those who were spent, left to die on the side of the road, seeing in them their God-given dignity; she made her voice heard before the powers of this world, so that they might recognize their guilt for the crime -- the crimes! -- of poverty they created. For Mother Teresa, mercy was the "salt" which gave flavour to her work, it was the "light" which shone in the darkness of the many who no longer had tears to shed for their poverty and suffering.

Her mission to the urban and existential peripheries remains for us today an eloquent witness to God's closeness to the poorest of the poor. Today, I pass on this emblematic figure of womanhood and of consecrated life to the whole world of volunteers: may she be your model of holiness! I think, perhaps, we may have some difficult in calling her "Saint Teresa": her holiness is so near to us, so tender and so fruitful that we continual to spontaneously call her "Mother Teresa". May this tireless worker of mercy help us increasingly to understand that our only criterion for action is gratuitous love, free from every ideology and all obligations, offered freely to everyone without distinction of language, culture, race or religion. Mother Teresa loved to say, "Perhaps I don't speak their language, but I can smile". Let us carry her smile in our hearts and give it to those whom we meet along our journey, especially those who suffer. In this way, we will open up opportunities of joy and hope for our many brothers and sisters who are discouraged and who stand in need of understanding and tenderness."

Bullying Support

In the coming weeks St Paul's will guide students through an electronic bullying survey to collate results and act accordingly with both resilience programmes and consequences where needed.

Although this is not a response to any particular issue I am very aware of the need to have relevant information to best serve the students of St Pauls. This survey will be done by each Year Level as a regular point of information throughout the academic year.

In light of this I have included an article from <u>www.Essentiakids.com.au</u> which explores the notion of communicating at home any instances of bullying at school.

Can family dinners protect kids from cyberbullying?

The threat of cyberbullying is a very twenty-first century problem. Unlike 'traditional' playground bullying, cyberbullying is a relatively new phenomenon, and one that few parents have had personal experience of. It is therefore a threat that parents feel they have little control over.

It is thought that as many as one in five teenagers have experienced online abuse or cyberbullying. The effects are alarming; researchers say that cyberbullying can increase the risk of mental health problems as well as the misuse of drugs and alcohol.

But a new study suggests that simple everyday routines can play a big role in protecting teenagers from the dangers of the online world. Researchers from McGill University, Montreal, Canada found that family dinners in particular are a good way to support teenagers.

The researchers surveyed 18,834 students and measured internalising problems, such as

anxiety and depression, externalising problems such as fighting and vandalism and substance use problems such as frequent alcohol use and prescription drug misuse.

19% of the surveyed participants had experienced some form of cyberbullying during the last twelve months. When examining those who had been impacted by it, the researchers found a strong link between cyberbullying and all three of the measures; internalising, externalising and substance abuse measurers.

However, researchers also found that family dinners appeared to moderate the effects of cyberbullying and mental health

difficulties as Dr Frank Elgar, author of the study explains: "With four or more family dinners per week there was about a four-fold difference in the rates of total problems between no cyberbullying victimisation and frequent victimisation. When there were no dinners the difference was more than seven-fold."

While Dr Elgar warns that parents shouldn't over simplify the finding and that family dinners alone are not enough to prevent cyberbullying, it is good news for parents that want to find ways to reach out to their teens.

So what is it about family dinners that make them such a powerful tool in the fight against cyberbullying? Family councillor and cyber-safety expert Martine Oglethorpe says that family dinners along with other family rituals can help teenagers become more resilient.

"Family dinners provide an important bonding time for families but also an environment where family members can safely talk and connect with each other.

"Most importantly they provide that ritualistic experience where the environment is safe, they know what to expect and they usually have unconditional support. This reliability can be a real comfort to those experiencing challenges outside he family home," she explains.

While this news will be well received by parents who are already having family dinners, those who are not able to implement them due to work or other commitments may feel concerned. Martine says that there are other "rituals" you can weave into family life that will serve the same purpose.

"If parents cannot make it work to have regular evening meals together there are certainly other ways to get this regular bonding and connection between family members. A bowl of cereal together in the morning, a chat every night before bed, even trips in the car to sports practices can also provide for those moments of ritualistic connection," she explains.

According to Martine, the most important thing to focus on when building resilience is "being together."

"Make sure that there are regular and frequent opportunities for connection. This will help kids feel like they have a real sense of stability at home," she says.

During the month of August schools are asked to remind students, particularly girls in Years 7 & 9 to download a "Self-Detection Brochure for Scoliosis". Scoliosis (curvature of the spine) is an important health problem for adolescent girls with 25% at risk of developing a significant curve. Screening is a sound preventative measure. Please take the time with your child to access the brochure and partake in the self-detection.

Last week a note was sent home about our Year 9 Leadership Day, which is on Monday 17th October. This is a compulsory school day and attendance is expected. The leadership program is training for the Peer Support Program that Year 9 participate in as leaders at the end of this year and the beginning of 2017. Over the past few terms students in Year 9 have significantly improved their attention to detail with the wearing of the school uniform. Year 11 News

Year 11 are fast approaching the end of their Preliminary Year. This week they began their two week **examination block.** Given that students in Year 11 only need to be in attendance for each of their exams, it is the student's responsibility to make sure that they:

- accurately read the examination timetable
- arrive at least 15 minutes prior to the commencement of the exam
- have in their possession the correct equipment for undertaking the exam
- are in full school uniform (it can be cold in the hall, so the blazer is advised)
- contact the school if they cannot attend the exam, and provide a medical certificate

Most students will attend only for the duration of the exam but a few have indicated that they wish to remain at school to study in the library. There is no staff supervision provided for these students, so they do need to be focussed, self-motivated, and avoid any disturbance to classes that might be using the Damascus Library.

The exams and the preceding assessment tasks will give students a clear idea of whether they are working at the level necessary in Senior Secondary School and in the courses that they chose in 2015. Some already realise that they are out of their depth in certain subjects; others know that they need to invest more time, focus, and effort. There is the **option of reducing their subject selection from 12 to 10 Units (subject to BOS requirements) at the end of the Preliminary Year.** Some may wish to continue with the present structure into Term 1 of the HSC Year. Whatever option is chosen, please seek advice from subject teachers, Mr McLoughlin (Careers Advisor) and of course Mr Ptolemy (AP Curriculum).

On Friday of last week, Mr Selmes announced to the school assembly, the **Student Captains for 2017**: **Lara Duggan**, **Sophie Scanlon, Hugh Woollett, and Ethan Roach**. Congratulations to each of these students and also those who missed out in the final selection process with the interview panel. Your enthusiasm will no doubt have an impact upon students in Year 11 (Year 12 in 2017) as well as helping to shape the nature of community at St Paul's.

The **Year 11 Mass** and the **Year 11 Reflection Day** held on Wednesday 24 August was a great celebration for students and indeed thought provoking with guest speaker, singer songwriter Scott Darlow.

The two areas of concern in recent weeks have been the **late attendance** of a number of students (mainly those driving), and having to remind students that **winter uniform** (blazer, tie, and long pants for boys) remains in place until the end of Term 3. I have contacted the parents of a number of students in regard to accumulated late arrivals. All students who are presently driving to school have been issued with a school form requesting the **car registration number and the passengers** that have been transported. I have asked that these forms be returned to the school office ASAP. Students have also been reminded that they are to park only on the neighbouring streets – there is **NO provision for student parking within the school grounds.**

The Year 12 2017 **jersey design selection process** continues but will be finalised in week 10 of this term. An order will be placed around week 5 of next term so that students might have access to these jerseys late Term 1 2017. There will be only ONE order placed, so students have been asked to start saving the \$80 for this Canterbury jersey.

In its sixteenth year the St Paul's Art Show, encompassing The Archipaul Portrait Prize, was held on 30th August, with several hundred attendees viewing works from students in Years 7 – 12 Visual Arts, TAS and Visual Design classes. Together with the Archipaul Prize, with its focus on portraiture, the Art Show is held annually and is inclusive in its mission, providing an opportunity for every Visual Arts student in the school to be represented. Created within the classroom as part of the curriculum the works on exhibit include the mediums of painting, etching, printmaking, skateboard design, digital and wet photography, jewellery design, sculpture, mixed media, murals, drawing and ceramics. Each Year Group within the Visual Arts and Visual Design Courses also completes one unit in which there is a portraiture component ranging from Magazine Covers in the Year 10 Visual Design Program to Pop Art portraits in Year 7 Visual Arts. A number of major prizes are awarded each year, including the Art Show Winner (Junior & Senior); Encouragement Award (Junior and Senior); Visual Design Award and the Winner of the Archipaul Portrait Prize. The other major award, The People's Choice, goes to an entrant in the Archipaul Exhibition and is decided upon by visitors to the exhibition across the evening. In 2016 the Winner of the Archipaul Prize was Eleanor Gould of Year 11 Visual Arts for her portrait in the style of Renaissance. The People's Choice Award is to be announced at Week 10's assembly.

Finally, regardless of prizes and awards, it is the inclusivity and community dimensions of the exhibition that are a highlight of the "Archies". With students providing the Art, Music (Year 10 Elective Music) and Catering (Year 11 Hospitality students) those visiting the exhibition are given an opportunity to see our students' creativity, their problem solving, their hard work, their spirituality, their sense of playfulness, their skill, their imagining, their politics, their dreaming and their risk-taking... all coming to fruition in an evening such as this. Further, it is an opportunity for collegiality, where there is a chance to work with students in different contexts to our classroom, where the staff of St Paul's can support one another, working tirelessly to help make the evening a special community celebration. The exhibition was, once again, a wonderful testament to the talent and skills of both teachers and students at St Paul's and all are to be congratulated. We hope to see you all in 2017 where the Archipaul tradition will continue to grow.



St Paul's Vietnam Immersion September / October 2016



Excitement is growing amongst the 28 students and 4 staff who are travelling to Vietnam as part of the St Paul's Immersion program. Ms Adams, Mrs Pateman, and Mr Thomas are the three teachers who will be assisting me.

Passports have been returned to students with the **visa** insert completed, and a **final itinerary** was included in the folder given to students. The **flight tickets** <u>have not</u> been allocated to students as yet as we are waiting on Vietnam airlines. This should be sorted over the next week or so. The flight times to and from Vietnam were included on the information sheet that students collected recently, but the two internal flights were deliberately omitted. Parents might note that the hotel accommodation in Hanoi was changed at my request to place the group within the 'Old Quarter', which allows for the group to do more walking and less bussing.

The **community project** has now been determined as a school building project in the Nuoc Ngoc Parish 50 kms outside of Hue. This area is very flat and is criss-crossed with canals and irrigation channels. The students will be helping to construct the final two classrooms that will assist with the provision of English and Religion classes for children, and will act as a summer school for those in the local community. As the students will be carrying building materials to site, mixing mortar, and bricklaying (under the supervision of some local tradies), it would be a good idea for each student to have a pair of neat fitting gardening gloves that will protect 'delicate hands'. There will be no escape from the mud!

The final **\$100** should be paid to Mr Wilson for gratuities (significant for a large group such as ours), contribution towards social justice projects, and bus travel to Sydney airport. Remember that the time of **departure from St Paul's will be 4.30am on Friday 30th September**. We will be loading inside the school so as to minimise noise for neighbours. Please don't arrive too early! Upon our **return to Australia at 9.15am on 15th October** parents are asked to either collect their son /daughter from Sydney airport or to give them permission to catch the train with teachers alighting at the various train stations along the way. Remember please that we have no control over the time to get through customs, but as we are wearing the school travel shirt the officers are generally very good at giving us a quick transition.

Medical preparation and insurance cover should be finalised by now. Some students have asked about spending money, but this is something for parents to decide. Either use a Visa debit card or carry Vietnamese Dong or American dollars.

All that remains is a final meeting in week 10 that might be used as a choir practice (a few good national songs, and children's favourites).

- On-time UAC applications close on 30th September
 2016 avoid late fees! See <u>www.uac.edu.au/undergraduate</u> to apply
- 'Early Entry' course/s need to be listed in your UAC preferences by end of November.
- Your first preference should be the 'early entry' offer you most want to get. These are often regardless of ATAR. The offer will be made through UAC log in to UAC 'Check and Change' on 3rd December to see your formal 'early' offer. Exception to this is UNE 'direct entry'. UNE will send you and offer direct, probably mid-late November.
- Some 'early entries' will be a 'conditional offer' which will be made unconditional through UAC on 5th January if you meet the (usually reduced) ATAR requirement.
- Most offers will be made in the Main Round mid-January 2017.
- There are several offer rounds where you may be eligible for an offer

It is vitally important that you read and understand Pages 31-34 of the UAC Guide regarding offers.

- SRS (Schools Recommendation Scheme) applications are due on 30th September see <u>www.uac.edu.au/srs</u> to apply
