

To the Families and Friends of the St Paul's Community......

It was a beautiful evening where our community was able to celebrate the achievements of our Year 12 students and wish them well for the next phase of their lives. Congratulations to Colin Mulhearn, Libby Lucas and all their team for the outstanding organisation of this beautiful event.

We also used this event to celebrate the contribution that Mr Greg Ptolemy has made, particularly to the student body of St Paul's over the past 10 years. As you are aware, Greg is leaving us at the end of the year to go to St Mary's at Gateshead as they prepare for Stage 6 beginning in 2018. Greg was presented with a small memento from the students, both past and present because of the amazing work he has done for them during his time at St Paul's. We thank Greg for his contribution to the wellbeing and the studies of over 2500 students in that time.

Over the last week, the Studies and Student teams have been planning for 2017. This vital work informs us about the directions that we will be taking in the studies and welfare areas for the next 12 months. We were fortunate that Miss Roisin McVeigh, our new Assistant Principal – Teaching and Learning was available to be with the studies team for their planning day and then was able to spend another day meeting the staff and some of the students. She is very excited about joining the St Paul's community. The welcome from our students was wonderful. I walked with Roisin around the school and visited a number of classes and it was lovely to see our kids welcome her so warmly.

Students have been busy with exams over the past week. The fruits of their labours will be evident in their responses to a variety of tasks that will be assessed over the next week and feedback will be provided on their return. There is sometimes a danger that students can fall into a trap of believing that now the exams have been completed, that work has finished for the year. That is certainly not the case. All areas of study will continue. Courses are not completed. The assessments that have been done are just part of the learning process, not the end point. (This is different to the HSC final exams.) I encourage all students to continue to work effectively in all areas of their studies. We work up to the final day of formal classes.

I will be on leave for the next 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ weeks. In that time, Mr Greg Ptolemy will be Acting Principal and Mr Colin Mulhearn will be Acting Assistant Principal – Curriculum. I am ticking another "bucket list" item that was presented to me by my high school Modern History teacher, Fr Stan Barry cm. I have the opportunity to visit the Arizona Memorial at Pearl Harbour where over 1200 men were entombed when the battleship was sunk on the 7^{th} of December 1941. I look forward to this possibility as I understand that it is a most moving and spiritual place.

I hope to be able to tell you a little more on my return.

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From the Assistant Principal - Welfare

This year as part of our Remembrance Day ceremony the school took a few minutes from lessons and exams to consider the importance and significance of those who had fallen in the Great War and conflicts in our world.

At 11am on the 11th November 1918, the guns of the Western Front fell silent after more than four years of continuous warfare. The allied armies had driven the German invaders back, having inflicted heavy defeats upon them over the preceding four months. In November the Germans called for a suspension of fighting - in order to secure a peace settlement. They accepted the allied terms of unconditional surrender.

The 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month attained a special significance in the post-war years. The moment when hostilities ceased on the Western Front became universally associated with the remembrance of those who had died in the war. This first modern world conflict had brought about the mobilisation of over 70 million people and left between 9 and 13 million dead, perhaps as many as one-third of them with no known grave. The allied nations chose this day and time for the commemoration of their war dead.

Four years later, in 1997, the then Governor-General Sir William Deane, issued a proclamation formally declaring the 11th of November to be Remembrance Day, urging all Australians to observe one minute's silence at 11am on the 11th of November each year to remember those who died or suffered for Australia's cause in all wars and armed conflicts.

Student Asthma Details Update

St Paul's requires each student who has Asthma to complete a 'Child Asthma Record' to instruct staff on how best to manage individual Asthma plan and appropriate first aid. At the end of this newsletter I have included an Asthma Plan form for students with Asthma to complete and return to School, where they can be collated and update our records. Could I ask for this form to be returned in readiness for the 2017 academic year.

Congratulations is extended to *Hannah Fletcher* and her family who received their Australian Citizenship in a ceremony at Town Hall on October 26th.

Congratulations also goes to **Thomas Curran** who was a Finalist in the Nike Most Wanted Football Challenge in Sydney a couple of weeks ago. Thomas was one of only 30 people from across Australia and New Zealand selected to attend this challenge. He was also one of the youngest to participate.

A number of parents have received a letter notifying them that their sons/daughters have accumulated 10 or more days absent, without a written explanation being provided to the school. Notification of unexplained/unjustified absences must be given as per the CSO Attendance Guidelines and Procedures. If "A parent has not provided an explanation of the student's absence within seven days of the occurrence of the absence" it is recorded as unexplained/unjustified. Once these type of absences reach 10 the school must provide parents with this notification.

Many students were recognised in the last newsletter for receiving Merit Awards, School Commendations and Award of Honours during last term. Further to these, *Lucy Lantz* has received 9 School Commendations which sees her on the verge of receiving the prestigious Principal's Medal.

A fabulous collection of photos capturing the wonderful memories of the Year 10 and 11 students who recently went to Vietnam was shown at the school assembly last week. 

Duke of Edinburgh

Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Journey

On Friday 28th October and Saturday 29th October, 10 participants undertook a journey as part of their Bronze Award for the Duke of Edinburgh program. This entailed walking 6 hours each day over unfamiliar terrain, navigating using map and compass, carrying all the food and water required for the two days, together with tents and all other camping equipment required for an overnight hike. There was only one way in and one way out.

The hike took place from Bucketty, near Mangrove Mountain on the Central Coast, to Upper Mangrove. The days would be long but the terrain was easy going.

The track followed the Old Great North Road. This was built by convicts in the early 1830's to join the settlements of Windsor and Wisemans Ferry to Singleton. The road was not popular as it had no constant supply of water and so was underutilised as more favoured routes were developed. Along the hike there were remnants of old stone bridge buttresses, quarried stone retaining walls and discarded piles of unused sandstone. It was not hard to imagine horses pulling carts or bullocks pulling drays along the road.

Overall, the group achieved very well. Navigation was sound, teamwork was evident and all had personal challenges to overcome – whether these were carrying a pack, the distance to be walked or dealing with blisters.

The biggest challenge for all was the final 3km. We were to finish in a valley, next to a bridge crossing a babbling steam. Unfortunately, a gate that was unlocked when planning the hike was locked on the day. This meant a 3km walk up a hill out of the valley to meet the cars. The group was not mentally or physically ready for this, but everyone made the distance and felt that sense of satisfaction when a task is finished and finished well.

Congratulations to the 5 practising and 5 qualifying hikers together with Mrs Grant who also undertook the journey. Thank you also to the parents for transport to and from the hike and for their patience when we were unavoidably delayed by the gate - we would have been on time otherwise!
