It was interesting that as soon as December came about, the TV was full of Christmas advertisements imploring all of us to spend up big in the coming weeks on a multitude of gifts, food and drinks. I have noticed that the latest strategy is to talk about "stocking fillers." When I was young, it was one present under the tree from Santa and possibly a couple of small gifts purchased with very limited pocket money from brothers and sisters. The odd aunt might have sent a family gift – in our case it was the annual subscription to Readers Digest! The advertisement for a stocking filler I

heard the other day was some sort of electronic device that cost in excess of \$100.00! I can only imagine the expectation for what Santa should bring.

Thankfully in Australia, we still use the term "Christmas." When I took my family to New York a number of years ago, I was rather shocked that the concept of Christmas was almost an afterthought in the language that was being used in the media, ads on TV and in store windows. The term that had replaced it was "Holiday." People said to each other "Happy

Holidays!" The stores and shops advertised "Holiday Sales." The media referred to the time as the "Holiday Season". The irony was that the only reason for the holiday was Christmas!

The root of the word "holiday" comes from the thirteenth century. *Haliday* (c. 1200), from Old English *haligdæg* or "holy day, consecrated day, religious anniversary; Sabbath," from *halig* "holy" + *dæg* "day"; in 14century, meaning both "religious festival" and "day of exemption from labor and recreation". The entire purpose of the "Holy" day on the 25th of December is to celebrate the coming of our Lord. Perhaps the New Yorkers have missed the fact that "Christ" is in the name "Christmas".



So as we head towards this sacred time in our Christian calendar, it is timely that we remember what the true meaning of Christmas should continue to be. We welcome our savior, The Christ Child.

We pray for peace in our world. We cannot find peace by excluding those who challenge us or disagree with us. We cannot find joy and abundance by getting more and more stuff. We cannot find love by turning inward and giving a high importance to our personal needs, potential and purpose than

relationships or service or others. To know peace, we need to change how we do things. We need to allow ourselves to carry out the risky acts of listening, dialogue, hospitality, service, justice and compassion. As we give ourselves to create peace for others, we discover that peace finds us, and God's reign is truly within us.

From the Assistant Principal - Welfare

The following is an extract from the history of Christmas website that portrays a popular history of the "Silent Night" carol. This carol has significant reference for Austrian Catholics as it details the history of the lyrics and music in the 1800s and then it's use in the trenches of the Great War of 1914-18.

The story is as follows:

The words of Silent Night were written by Catholic Priest, Fr. Joseph Mohr whist in Austria, in 1816 and the music was added in 1818, by his school teacher friend Franz Xaver Gruber, for the Christmas service at St. Nicholas church in Oberndorf, Austria – a snow filled town in December.

Fr. Mohr asked Franz Gruber to compose the melody with a guitar arrangement. It was several years later that Franz Gruber wrote an arrangement for the organ.

There is a legend associated with the carol that says, Fr. Mohr wanted the carol to be sung by the children of the village at the midnight Christmas Eve service, as a surprise for their parents.

At Midnight Mass in 1818, Fr. Mohr and Franz Gruber sang each of the six verses with the church choir repeating the last two lines of each verse. Mohr set down the guitar arrangement on paper around 1820 and that is the earliest manuscript that still exists. It is displayed in the Carolino Augusteum Museum in Salzburg. There are a number of manuscripts of various 'Stille Nacht' arrangement that were written by Franz Gruber in later years.

The original words of the song were in German (and it was called 'Stille Nacht! Heilige Nacht') and translated in to English went like this:.....

Silent night, holy night, Bethlehem sleeps, yet what light, Floats around the heavenly pair; Songs of angels fills the air. Strains of heavenly peace.

It's thought that the song might have travelled around the area with an organ repairman, Karl Mauracher, who could have taken an early arrangement with him in about 1820. Then two singing families (like the 'Von Trappes' in The Sound of Music) seem to have discovered the song and performed it as part of their concerts.

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It was translated into English in 1863 by John Freeman Young. The carol was sung during the Christmas Truce in the First World War in December 1914 as it was a song that soldiers on both sides knew.

By the time that the carol was famous, Fr Mohr had died. Franz Gruber wrote to music authorities in Berlin saying that he had composed the tune, but no one believed him and it was thought that Haydn, Mozart or Beethoven had written it. However, the 1820 manuscript was found and in the top right corner Fr Mohr had written: 'Melodie von Fr. Xav. Gruber.'.





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From the Careers Desk



Career Thought of the Week:

If you are considering university studies but think that you won't qualify for entry, there are a range of support programs and different pathways available to you.

University entry has historically been achievable by successful completion of Year 12 and gaining an ATAR score (or OP in QLD) at the minimum level or above for a particular course. While this pathway continues to be an effective one for many, it is not the only way to access further education at university.

You may have:

- not studied the prerequisite subjects for your chosen course
- not achieved an adequate ATAR score for entry
- left education early and want to return to studies
- not studied for a long time (eg due to family duties) and want to return to studies.

New alternative entry points have recently been developed and are available to assist a broader field of applicants such as you to access university level education. Most universities within Australia are developing and offering a range of 'alternative entry pathways'.

8 Alternative Entry Points to Higher Education

1. Enabling courses

Enabling courses can be used to develop entry level skills for university studies. These courses can provide foundational skills for successful university careers.

Enabling courses are often offered over one or two and are administered in smaller, highly supported groups that help you to acclimatise to the university environment and develop skills in academic studying and writing. Successful completion may offer entry to your course of choice. Eg. Newstep at UON.

2. Enabling outreach courses

Some larger universities are now offering outreach services, similar to the enabling courses above, but with more assisted learning and smaller groups. You may be interested in these courses if you want to enter tertiary education using a highly supported entry point. Some universities work with community organisations and job search agencies to deliver the courses in more accessible locations.

3. Bridging courses

Similar to enabling courses, bridging courses give you an opportunity to further develop skills in prerequisite areas (eg science) before you enter your chosen course of study.

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4. Special Tertiary Admissions Test

If you are 'mature age' (in many states, over 19 in the year of application) there are further options. You can sit a Special Tertiary Admissions Test, which is usually done in one day and which includes a general intelligence element and an essay. You will get a score that can be used instead of an ATAR in applying for a university course.

Local colleges often offer preparation courses to assist you to understand the test format and reduce anxiety in sitting the test.

5. Vocational education and training (VET) and TAFE pathways

Many universities and TAFEs have an agreed pathway arrangement where you can start a course at Certificate III or IV, continue to diploma level and transition into a specified university level course.

For many learners, this is a preferable process, as it offers short-term goals, an opportunity to re-enter study for a shorter period and an opportunity to gain confidence, while building skills and benefiting from clear progress points along the way. Sometimes a university will give credit for work (usually at diploma/advanced diploma) level and advanced standing into your course of choice, reducing your overall time in study.

6. Credit for recognised learning (CRL)

CRL (previously RPL or recognition of prior learning) is another approach if you have previous study or work experience (paid or voluntary), and can demonstrate certain skills in an area. Each institution has its own preferred method of applying CRL and should be contacted directly.

7. Portfolio entry

Whether you are a school leaver or mature entry candidate, portfolio entry allows you to apply for a place using a combination of WACE courses, vocational education course results, training, endorsed programs, an introductory letter, resume and letters of support.

8. VET in schools

In high school, you may choose not to work towards university entry through an ATAR. Some students' learning styles are better supported in the Vocational Education & Training (VET) system. VET programs offered through your school may help you gain entry to your chosen field of study. For example, you may choose a VET course in Certificate III Health Services. After years 11–12, that could be followed by a Certificate IV in Preparation for Nursing, then a Diploma of Nursing. That could then create a pathway to university and there may be an opportunity to apply credits to a nursing course.

If you are interested in any of the above options, it is important to talk to someone who can help you.

Contact your local TAFE, Registered Training Organisation or university directly, or discuss your needs with the School Careers Advisor, who can assist you to identify your best pathway to success.


The Uniform Shop currently has a large number of uniforms on consignment and these items in some cases, have been in the shop for some time.

Dear Parent/Carer,

Each school year the Catholic Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle, through its agency the Catholic Schools Office, reviews the fees for students in our diocesan schools for the coming year. By far the greater part of our schools' funding now comes from State and Commonwealth government grants, but the commitment and continuing financial contribution of parents and parish communities is still essential to fill the gap between the funds provided by government and the actual cost of running our schools.

This letter is to inform you of the fee arrangements for 2017. The following rates and discounts have been reviewed by the Diocesan Finance Council (DFC) and upon the advice of the DFC and the Diocesan Executive, they have been approved by Bishop Bill Wright.

The school fees are comprised of three components:

- Diocesan tuition fees
- 2. Individual school resource and service fees
- 3. Diocesan Family School Building Levy (DFSBL)

1. Diocesan tuition fees 2017

In 2017 the full rate diocesan tuition fees will be:

Kinder to Year 6 \$ 1,206 (increase of \$54 p.a. or \$1.04 per calendar week from 2016)

Years 7 to 10 \$ 1,662 (increase of \$75 p.a. or \$1.44 per calendar week from 2016)

Years 11 to 12 \$ 2,502 (increase of \$75 p.a. or \$1.44 per calendar week from 2015)

In 2017, the family discount on full rate diocesan tuition fees will be:

1 child family 0% - full rate to be applied

2 child family 10% - each child 3 child family 20% - each child

4 child family 40% - each child

5+ child family 50% - each child

Individual school resource and service fees

These are fees set by individual schools and can cover a range of costs including the supply of resources such as texts, school supplies, exercise books, subject levies, technology, excursion costs etc. The cost and nature of the fees can vary between schools and they will be set out in the parent handbook provided by the school and itemised in the school fee account from the school.

Diocesan Family School Building Levy (DFSBL)

The DFSBL is charged to the oldest child for each family. The levy is pooled to contribute towards past, present and future costs for building projects across all existing and for new catholic schools, and the acquisition of land for school purposes.

The DFSBL rate for 2017 will be \$600 per family. The DFSBL rate is reviewed, recommended and approved in the same manner as mentioned earlier for the tuition fees and discounts.

Diocesan pastoral contribution

From 2017 a voluntary contribution of \$150 per family (\$50 per term) is being sought as a diocesan pastoral contribution. Funds support the ongoing pastoral works of the diocese which include, amongst many initiatives:

- The diocesan pastoral ministries office and the activities of its many advisory councils the Diocesan Pastoral Council, the Adult Faith Formation Council, the Liturgy Council, the Ecumenical and Interfaith Council, the Social Justice Council and the Diocesan Council of Ministry with Young People.
- The provision of chaptains ministering in the following areas Newcastle University, Newcastle Port, Prisons, Hospitals and CatholicCare Social Services.
- Family Community Faith Co-ordinators who work to reach out to and connect families with their local parish and school.
- Pastoral Co-ordinators who work in those parishes without a resident Parish Priest.

Special fee reductions

To assist families with limited financial resources, Catholic schools in the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle offer a lower tuition fee to means tested low income families such as Health Care and Pension Card holders. This rate is 50% of the diocesan tuition fee full rate for each child. This discount applies only to the diocesan tuition fee, not to the DFSBL or other resource and service fees charged by each individual school.

It is the policy of the Catholic Schools Office and the Diocese that financial hardship should not prevent any child from attending a Catholic school and no child will be denied a Catholic education because of a family's genuine inability to pay the required school fees. Any family experiencing financial difficulties is entitled to fee assistance, your local school Principal will be able to discuss this with you.

Together with parents, clergy and school staff, we are committed to offering the children in this diocese access to schools in which their faith can be nurtured in outstanding learning environments. We seek to assist young people to realise their full human potential, taking into account their unique spiritual, intellectual, physical and social needs. We value the opportunity to work in partnership with you, and thank you for your continuing support of Catholic education in this Diocese.
