What's in a Name?

In 2012, I was the Assistant Principal in a Catholic School looking at a sea change. (Or at least a weather change – Bowral's cold climate was starting to make the old bones ache!). I was looking for new challenges and applied for a couple of positions in the Maitland-Newcastle Diocese.

When you apply for positions in new schools and new areas, one of the first things you do is some research. Google gave me a real insight to the schools that had caught my attention. One of the schools was *All Saints College – St Mary's Campus* at Maitland. The other was *St Paul's High School, Booragul*.

St Paul's google search was interesting. I remember typing it into the search engine and the suggestions were wide ranging. It included St Paul's School in London, one in Manly, a couple in Victoria and South Australia and in other places around the world. I found the correct site and was taken aback when I realised that the school had no reference to it being a Catholic school. The Google search, when I included *Catholic*, gave me two sites for Catholic schools in England and one in Greystanes in the western suburbs of Sydney. When I finally got to the correct site, it wasn't until I read the fine print that suggested that St Paul's High School in Booragul was "proudly a Catholic school." As well, this is the only reference to St Paul's being Catholic that appears on the first page of our website.

I remember driving to the school to have a look. I got to the main gate and noticed that there was no reference to Catholic at all. There is a big sign referring to the Maitland-Newcastle Diocese. That could also refer to other Christian traditions.

After I was fortunate enough to be given the opportunity to lead this wonderful school and in a very short time, it was clear that what the website says is true – we ARE proudly Catholic. In saying that, I believe that we need to be more explicit in

saying just that. St Paul's is a Catholic High School.

The review of Secondary Education in the Diocese recommended that two current schools become Year 7 to 12 schools. As well, two new secondary schools are being built. It is no accident that these schools have either had name changes reflecting their unique Catholic Identity or, in the case of the new schools, they have been named St Bede's Catholic College and Catherine McCauley Catholic College. St Mary's at Gateshead is now St Mary's Catholic College and St Joseph's at Lochinvar will be known as St Joseph's College (its historical name that it began with when it was run by the beautiful Sisters of St Joseph.)

About 15 years ago, every high school in the Sydney Catholic Diocese took on the name "Catholic College." The purpose of this change was to identify clearly the uniqueness of Catholic Education and its foundation, the teachings of Christ. Last year, our Diocese released a new vision statement for Catholic Schools. It says "At the heart of everything there is always Jesus Christ."

I believe that it is time to change our name. I feel that the time is right to proudly profess our Catholic identity. I have had discussions with the previous Director of Catholic Schools, Mr Collins, last year and he has advised me to ask the St Paul's community about a possible name change. To that end, I have constructed a survey that asks the

Year 12 students are 'up and running' and have shown a good commitment to their studies. It is important for them to understand that they don't enjoy the easy introduction to the new year that students in other year groups have. The Year 12 return to school was greeted with the return of exam papers from the Term 1 exams held in December 2016.





Year 12 Assessment calendars for Terms 2 - 4 were issued last week. Students should review these carefully and plan all other activities around these dates.

Deposits should be finalised for the Year 12 Retreat at Elanora Heights on March 22-24. Final payment is needed before 24th February. I encourage each Year 12 student to make the effort to attend this significant event. It provides an opportunity for 'time out' from studies, reflection on life direction, and consideration of all those who have a special place in our lives. This is also the last overnight gathering of the year group. I will also remind students that attendance at the Retreat was part of the contract you signed when you



enrolled in the senior school. No lessons will be provided at school during the time that Year 12 are on Retreat.



At our last Year meeting students were given a parent invitation to the HSC and ATAR Presentation evening to be held on Monday 20 February commencing at 7.00pm in the school hall. This evening is designed to assist parents with an understanding of the complexities of ATAR and how the HSC year will unfold.

Quite a few students have begun to make changes to their study program by **dropping subjects or dropping the level of study within a subject** eg 2U English Standard to English Studies. The process here is to complete the paperwork (available from Student Services), obtain Studies Coordinator, teacher and parent signatures, and discuss implications of the move with Mr Wilson. The main area of concern is whether the subject change impacts on eligibility for ATAR, and how it might affect career options eg the dropping of Maths.

A significant number of Year 12 students have a Study period in periods 5 or 6 on one or more occasions in the 10 day teaching timetable. Permission forms are available for Student Early departure once they have finished their course of studies for the day. Parent permission is required for this early departure to be registered as an on-going approval. All students are expected to be in attendance each day for Tutor Group and school assembly. No consideration will be given to late arrivals.



All students travelling to and from school by car should complete student Driver Forms (car registration and parent permission required). Again I remind students that they are not to park within school grounds – this area is reserved for teacher, visitor and parent parking.

Congratulations to those students who were elected Sports House Captains. Your efforts at the recent swimming carnival in encouraging participation were wonderful, especially given that it was a very hot day.

Whatever your field of endeavour, aim high this term, put the effort in, and reap the satisfaction of knowing you tried your best.

Year 12 Senior Academic Support Program

Due to the positive feedback from students, mentors & parents about our Senior Academic Support Program for Year 12 students, we will again be offering the program to our current Year 12 group for Terms 1, 2 and 3. Interested students will be given application forms at their form meeting in Week 4.

The program aims to promote a culture of aiming for personal academic excellence by providing:

- academic skill development sessions.
- supervised after-school study sessions before the Trial exams and towards the end of Term 3.
- after-school subject specific tutoring towards the end of Term 3.
- a designated staff mentor for individual students who feel that such support would aid their preparation for the HSC.

The role of the mentor is to:

- Provide support for allocated student/s as a "critical adult friend".
- Provide support to focus & "keep an eye on" aspects such as:
 - ♦ Stress management
 - ♦ Motivation
 - ♦ Organisational skills
 - ♦ Time management
 - ♦ Goal setting
 - Study habits

Note: Mentor support for individual students does NOT involve specific subject or assessment task tutoring.

A couple of comments about the mentoring part of the program from last year's students:.....

- ⇒ "The mentoring was successful for me because it helped me pick up study habits and actually develop a system for organisation and revision for tests, significantly boosting my marks from semester 1 to semester 2"
- ⇒ "I always knew they were there for me along the way, and I wish I had taken advantage of it more while I had the chance."
- ⇒ "I believe that the mentoring was the most successful part of the SASP. To have a one-on-one chat with the mentor and learn some key strategies on how to attack my studies benefited the way I performed in exams and assessments"
- ⇒ "The purpose of me accessing the mentor program was purely due to just wanting a person that could help me not get overly stressed about the process of the HSC. For me, mentoring was very successful and helped to achieve this for me"

Career research can help you learn about the world of work and begin your own career journey. While the direction of your career will change over time, research is a starting point which is hard to do without. It should suit your needs, but also include the personal career stories of other people.



Online and offline research using MYFUTURE.

It's common to be unclear about the career direction you wish to take. Finding out what you want out of a career and where your interests lie is a process that depends on many factors.

You can start to develop ideas by completing <u>My career profile</u>. My career profile generates a personalised list of suggested occupations based on your quiz inputs. You can explore your suggested occupations further in myfuture's <u>Occupations</u> section.

Reading job guides and classifieds both online and in print can help spark your interest in a particular area. You will develop knowledge of qualification and skills requirements, while also learning about job opportunities in relevant occupations.

What's that job really like?

Relevant industry, trade and professional associations are also valuable sources as they can refer you to people who would be willing to give you an <u>information interview</u>.

Information interviews give you ideas and help you decide if you want to research into an industry or occupation further.

If you're interested in a particular occupation or industry, an information interview can provide a personal account of your area of interest.

When seeking information interviews, make it clear you're not looking for a job, but requesting information to help you explore careers and make decisions.

Explain to the interviewer the position you're in, where you're from, and why you're contacting them.

If the contacted person is interested, explain your goals and organise a time for the interview. Outline the length of time required and whether it's an in person or phone interview.

Creating a list of contacts

Through your research and interviews you can also develop a list of contacts relevant to particular occupations or industries. These contacts can be valuable for your career search and for getting further information about career pathways. This list can include:

- ⇒ Recruitment officers
- ⇒ Human resource managers
- \Rightarrow Friends and family

Did you know ?????.....that it is also possible for young people to further their interest in music professionally as a musician in the defence forces - and travel all around the world playing in bands.

Career pathways

There are two different career paths in the defence forces, which you can look towards after finishing school:

General entry, which leads to trade-related, team oriented work. You will be paid while you train and earn industryrecognised qualifications. For most of this work, you need to have completed and passed Year 10 English and Mathematics, and be 16 years old.

Officer entry, which leads to management focused work, where you need to demonstrate your potential for leadership and decision-making. You train at the Australian Defence Force Academy, and study a degree at the University of NSW. You are paid throughout your study, and do not have to pay university fees.

When you make a commitment to joining the defence force, you commit to remaining in the service for a set period of time (called an Initial Minimum Period of Service), which can vary from 5 to 14.5 years.

You can also apply for a **Defence Gap Year** directly after Year 12 - this is a year's paid experience in the Force, without a longer commitment.

How do I apply?

There is a set series of steps for application. The recruiting takes some time (so start in Year 11):

Step 1 – attend a YOU session at a defence office – Your Opportunities Unlimited

Step 2 – attend an assessment day, with interviews including a psychology interview and medical assessment

Step 3 – for officer entry, there will be other interviews, and application to the University of NSW via UAC.



School Uniform

Junior School Uniform - Years 7-10

All Students Need To Wear Their Uniform in an Acceptable Manner

Girls

Skirt Check blue 91876 and of a modest length – as a guide 5cm above the knee.

Blouse Sky blue (04) Peter Pan collar as Midford style 5045. Top button only to be

undone. An all-white or pale blue short sleeved plain T-shirt may be worn under

a school blouse as long as it is not seen except for a little at the neck.

Cardigan Navy school cardigan with school crest.

Socks White ankle height. Navy stockings may be worn in winter. Socks and stockings

should not be worn together.

Shoes Totally black leather, polishable lace-up school style. Instep must be totally

covered.

Boots and high tops are not acceptable.

Slacks Navy tailored slacks.

Sport Uniform Navy knit shorts with sky piping and embroidery. Must be of an acceptable

length. School sports polo shirt with crest. St Paul's tracksuit (optional).

Boys

Shirt Sky blue (04) as Midford style 1010. An all-white or pale blue short sleeved

plain

T-shirt may be worn under a school shirt as long as it is not seen except for a

little at the neck.

Shorts/Trousers Conventional grey serge shorts or trousers only.

Socks Grey with trousers. Blue marle long socks with shorts.

Belt Black belt only - not worn low.

Shoes Totally black, leather, polishable lace-up school style. Instep must be totally

covered.

Boots and high tops are not acceptable.

Sport Uniform Navy microfibre shorts with piping, zips and embroidery. Must be of an

acceptable length. School sports polo shirt with crest. St Paul's tracksuit

(optional).

Boys/Girls

Jacket Tracksuit jacket. In cold weather students may choose to wear the school

jumper and jacket.

Jumper Navy V-necked with school crest.

Hat In line with our Sun Smart policy, students are expected to wear a hat when

participating in outdoor activities. Hats can either be the school hat or hats that

contain the school colours.

Scarf in school colour or navy school woollen scarf is available from Lowes.

Sport Shoes Conventional lace-up sport shoe/jogger offering adequate support in the arch

(not canvas shoes) and white sport socks.

Sport Uniform It is acceptable for students to wear full sports uniform to school on Friday

(Sport Day) and on days when they have a designated practical PE lesson (as determined by the PE Department). NSWCCC 'Hoodies' may be worn **only** on

Fridays - sport days.

Jewellery The wearing of jewellery is not encouraged but the following items are

allowable: a watch, one ring, one bracelet, a simple metal chain, sleepers or studs (no more than two pair). Incorrect or excessive jewellery will be

confiscated.

Facial piercings (eyebrows, noses, lips etc) are **not permitted**. However for Year 11/12 only one small nasal stud – not nasal ring, is permitted. Visible

tattoos are not permitted. If nail polish is worn it must be clear.

Makeup Must be kept to an absolute minimum.

Hair for both boys and girls is to be neat and tidy and within reasonable social

standards. Multi-coloured hair styles, extremes of unnatural colour and style will not be permitted. Long hair should be off the face and kept in check in some

way.

Facial Hair Facial hair is not permitted in the Junior School. Students should be clean

shaven.

Senior School Uniform – Years 11 and 12

Girls Summer Navy pleated skirt, white blouse with red piping on the collar and crest on

pocket of the blouse (smaller than junior size), white socks. The skirt must be of

a modest length - as a guide 5cm above the knee.

Girls Winter Navy pleated skirt, white blouse, school jumper or school vest. Navy tie piece,

navy stockings, navy slacks and school woollen scarf are optional. Navy collarless school blazer must be worn during Terms 2 and 3. The school

jumper or vest may be worn under the blazer for added warmth.

Boys Summer White shirt (with crest on the pocket), conventional navy shorts, blue marle

socks, plain black belt.

Boys Winter White shirt, navy trousers (which can be worn all year if so desired), school

jumper or school vest, senior tie. Navy school blazer must be worn during Terms 2 and 3. The school jumper or vest may be worn under the blazer for

added warmth.

Shoes Girls & Boys Totally black, leather, polishable, lace-up school shoes. Toes and instep must

be totally covered. Boots and high tops are not acceptable.

Hats In line with our Sun Smart policy, students are expected to wear a hat when

participating in outdoor activities. Hats can either be the school hat or hats that

contain the school colours.

Jewellery The wearing of jewellery is not encouraged but the following items are

allowable: a watch, one ring, one bracelet, a simple metal chain, sleepers or studs (no more than two pair). Incorrect or excessive jewellery will be confiscated. However, for Year 11/12 only one small nasal stud – not nasal ring is permitted. Visible tattoos are not permitted. If nail polish is worn it must be

clear.

Makeup Must be kept to an absolute minimum.

Hair for both boys and girls is to be neat and tidy and within reasonable social

standards. Multi-coloured hair styles, extremes of unnatural colour and style will not be permitted. Long hair should be off the face and kept in check in some

way.

Facial Hair Facial hair is should be neatly trimmed in line with acceptable professional

presentation.

Please Note: Correct uniform is to be worn appropriately at all times. If a student is

unable to wear correct uniform on any day they must bring a note of explanation from their parent or guardian. This note needs to be signed by the Tutor Group Teacher. This must only be temporary (a day or two.)

Out of Uniform Day Dress Requirements — All Years

The Dress Code on Out of Uniform Days requires an appropriate sense of modesty:

- Garments should **not** be revealing therefore no thin strapped singlet tops, strapless tops, low-cut tops, mid-riff tops or see-through material.
- No offensive slogans or inappropriate language to be printed on any garment.
- Skirts and shorts should be of a modest length.
- For safety reasons, footwear needs to be enclosed and as such, thongs are inappropriate.

Other items of clothing and footwear should be appropriate to the day. Students will not undertake practical classes (including PE) if they have inappropriate footwear.

Students who attend school in appropriate clothing will be placed on an Afternoon Detention.
