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From the Assistant Principal - Teaching & Learning

Welcome to the NAPLAN season again!

Over the past couple of years there has been a shift away from the panic and cynicism that was synonymous with the NAPLAN test and I have to admit, I am thankful that it is being viewed in a much better light. NAPLAN is one form of testing and like the rest, provides the teacher, the parent and the child with a snapshot of their literacy and numeracy levels. It is a diagnostic tool used by parents and schools to build on each student's area of strengths and development. Unlike other forms of testing, it does not assess subject specific content; does not test for signs of gifted or talented, nor critical thinking or complex problem solving. What it does test for is the basic literacy and numeracy skills of students in Year 3, 5, 7 and 9.

Earlier this term, the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) released the new HSC minimum standards policy and the role that NAPLAN will play in this. In 2020 (this year's Year 9) each child will need to meet a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy to qualify for the HSC. The new standards will ensure that each student is prepared for further education and training, employment and life post-secondary school.

School Uniform and Dress Code:

St Paul's has a long history of using school uniform to create an atmosphere of community, pride, loyalty, and equality among the student body.

There has always been an image of professionalism associated with having students wear a school uniform. It provides for a more formal approach to learning, removing some of the distractions normally confronted when young people face the dilemma of possessing the latest designer fashions, or the latest fad sweeping across Sydney.

School uniforms also tend to involve students more, to make them a part of the "community" at school. This is not so much as to erase their individuality, but to include everyone on the same level as far as image and dress is concerned.

The use of uniforms at school, as opposed to the latest fashions, also may help the child avoid ridicule, embarrassment, or abuse from others over the 'have and have-not' stigma. Uniforms assist in avoiding such conflicts by removing the chance for confrontation over clothing, at least during the child's at-school time. We expect that all students will adhere to the uniform requirements of St Paul's as set out in the student diary, website and regular uniform letters.

I appreciate your support in ensuring students adhere to the current uniform standards.


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Year 8 News

Year 7 News

As Term1 comes to a close we would like to take the opportunity to congratulate the students in the Year 7 cohort, for a fantastic start to their high school career. We have delighted in the number of students who have taken up the challenge of a new start, and seeking out opportunities to become involved



in our community here at St Paul's. We have elected leaders, seen some excellent work from artists, had students engage in public speaking, represent the school in a myriad of sports and some complete their Surf Survival Certificate. Well done! We hope that this positive start is carried on throughout the coming term.

Often, as students settle into high school and begin to meet a larger group of peers, changes in friendships can occur. This is a normal part of adolescence, however, can sometimes cause a large amount of angst among the cohort of students. Early friendships

Up until around age 12 (give or take a year or two, depending on the development of your child), friendships are most often built around two or more children who play together because they live nearby, their parents are friends, or it's convenient in some other way. Young children are usually fairly satisfied to have a playmate, as long as they can agree on their mutually enjoyable activities. At this early stage, understanding one another's needs and being emotionally invested in relationships is not typically a primary motivating factor in the friendship.

Adolescent friendships

From around the age of 12, friendships change in purpose, focus, and function. Our children begin to seek greater intimacy and trust in their friendships. This social development accompanies their cognitive, physical, and personality maturation. Our children want to share the changes they are experiencing with peers who are experiencing the same things, and they want to do it in healthy and positive ways. And they begin to seek, in their peer group, the security and safety that they have previously experienced with their parents.

Friendships during the teenage years become more similar to those we hold as adults. Teens begin to seek a friend who they can have an emotional connection with that goes deeper than wanting to play with the same toys, dolls, or sports equipment (although mutual interests remain important). However, because of the developmental changes occurring in their lives, relationships during these years are often fluid. This means that our children are likely to have several friendship issues as they work out their own identity, and as they mature emotionally, psychologically, physically, and socially.

How we can help

The following six ideas can be helpful in dealing with teenage friendship troubles:

1. Take time to listen

More than anything, children who are in emotional pain or distress need someone who will listen. Unfortunately our teens are more likely to push us away than confide in us, so we need to make it easy for them to talk. One-on-one time, long walks, texting, or even Facebook messaging can be useful tools to encourage them to open up.

2. Ask questions

It is tempting to flood your child with your decades of wisdom. Telling them how to solve all of their problems would be so easy! Your own autobiography may be overflowing with examples of how you dealt with similar problems as a teen. But our children resist this approach. Instead, we can recognise that they have the answers inside them, and ask them questions (the right way – no inquisitions please) to help them determine how to act, questions such as:

- How has this affected you?
- How has it affected the other person? And the friendship?
- How does this fit with your idea of what a friendship is all about?
- Should all friendships last forever?
- What do you see as your alternatives?

Only after you have listened to your child's responses should you offer to share your ideas if your child is interested.

3. Be a model

Show your children how friendships should function by having good friends around you who are trustworthy, loyal, fun, and who share your values and goals.

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4. Invite your child's friends over

To encourage friendships, get your teenagers to spend time with their friends at your home. You can be sure they're safe. You can help your child build relationships in an environment you feel good about. Plus, you can supervise and observe (from a distance), and then ask questions about the relationships you see.

5. Get out more!

Encourage your adolescent to participate in extra-curricular activities like sports, music, a part-time job, a local club or society, or something where they can develop new relationships with like-minded people.

6. Monitor technology

Mobile phones, Facebook, instant messaging, and technology can be good and bad for teenage friendships. By keeping an eye on what your child is sending and receiving (non-intrusively), you can help your child make good decisions. Plus, if managed the right way, it can give you plenty to talk about together.

Our teens need positive friendships for healthy development. As role models, we can offer support and guidance as we encourage increasing independence in our adolescents, and help them navigate their changing, developing social world.

At St Paul's we have a number of supportive measures in place for students who are having difficulty with these issues. Please don't hesitate to contact Mrs Evans or Mrs Furey at any stage for assistance or for more information.

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Learning Technology News

Over the last 12 months, the Catholic School's Office has been reviewing the information technology platforms and infrastructure used in schools across the diocese with a view to redesigning and renewing our technology. As part of this process we have seen the introduction MNConnect, a new portal that replaces our previous intranet portal, MNLive.

MNConnect integrates Windows 10 and Microsoft Office 365 to provide students with a range of tools to enhance their learning. Below is an explanation of the main features of MNConnect.



What is Mail?

Mail is the link that students will use when they require access to their school emails. This icon links the user to the webmail (or online) version of their school mail.



What is Calendar?

The Calendar icon on MNConnect will take you to the online version of your personal calendar. This calendar can also be viewed in the Outlook desktop application (Outlook 2016). Using the Calendar icon on MNConnect, you can view and add to your calendar, as well as view or add to any shared calendars that you may have permissions for. Calendar is a great tool for students to keep track of when homework and assessment tasks are due as they can set a reminder to notify them in the lead up to task.



What is OneDrive?

The OneDrive link on MNConnect will take you to your OneDrive storage space. OneDrive is your personal cloud storage space for your work related files. Cloud storage means that any files saved in that space can be accessed from any device that has a connection to the internet and a web browser (for example Internet Explorer or Chrome). That means your files can be accessed from outside of the school. The other advantage of OneDrive as a cloud storage space is the ability to share files straight from your OneDrive, which allows multiple users to be collaborating on the same document, at the same time, with only one copy of the file being required, instead of having to merge changes from multiple files back into one combined version of all ideas and contributions. You can create Word, Excel, PowerPoint, OneNote, Excel Survey or link straight into your OneDrive space and you can upload all file types to your OneDrive.



What is OneNote?

The OneNote link on MNConnect will take you to your OneNote Online space. This is where you can open any OneNote notebook files that you have created, or the OneNote notebook files that someone else has shared with you. Your Class Notebook files can also be opened from here. Students should choose to edit your Online OneNote notebook in the desktop version, as this will give you full functionality and features.



What is WiFi Support?

The WiFi support icon on MNConnect will allow students and staff in our schools to access PDF files of procedures for getting different devices to connect to the WiFi in our schools. This icon should be used if you are attempting to get a Windows 10, Windows 7, Apple iOS, Apple Mac OS, Chromebook or Android device connected to our system's WiFi.



What is the School Portal?

The School Portal icon on MNConnect will take you to the St Paul's online space. This portal includes links to important websites and the Student Documents folder. In this folder, students can find copies of assessment task notifications and documents and files uploaded by their class teachers.



App launcher button

If you click on the app launcher button (looks like nine tiles in the top left corner of the MNConnect window) will allow you to open any of the Office365 apps that you have permission to use.



Office365 link

If you click on this Office365 link, it will take you to your Office365 site for our Diocese. This site will allow you to see all Office365 tools, including the link for installing and managing the free version of Office365 ProPlus with the 2016 apps.

The Future of jobs

There is concern among students and parents that job losses through robotics, artificial intelligence and technology is creating uncertainty about future employment.

There's no question that technology will impact on future jobs and employment. Some jobs will disappear and new ones will be created. In fact, there is evidence to suggest that there will be a net gain of jobs with 82% of companies saying they are likely to hire more people in the future. We can substantiate this by the fact that the top three countries with the highest number of robots and automation - Japan, South Korea and Germany - have the lowest unemployment.



The technology revolution is here!

While most jobs will be impacted by technology it doesn't mean they will disappear. They won't go ... they'll change. The choice is not Man or Machine but rather Man plus Machine. New technologies will make us smarter, more productive and faster at achieving outcomes. We are in a 'technology revolution'.

The difference today compared to previous revolutions, is the speed at which things are occurring. This makes it difficult for employers to predict beyond the next few years exactly what they'll need and who to employ.

So where does this leave students and job seekers.

There is going to be a skills gap and a transition period for a number of years as we figure out how best to use new technologies and the skills required. We don't really know exactly what these new skills will be but what we do know is that STEM and technology subjects will form an integral part of almost everything we do.

Being digitally smart is going to be a big advantage for future jobs seekers. Because of rapid change, everyone will be on a continuing learning curve as they transition through their working life. Those that don't want to learn new technologies will be left behind and a person's 'learnability' will determine their success.

The best advice?

Without knowing the future of every career or occupation is for students, in addition to their chosen career and study options, add a technology subject or skill. Look at it this way. If you're planning to live and work in France, then learning French is sensible. When planning your career, including a technology or STEM skill is shrewd.

*	Understand that work Experience may only occur for a maximum of 5 days . Students may choose to attend for a whole week, a few days or for one day a week over 5 weeks
STEP 1	Student, not parents are to ring or visit an employer they wish to go with. Be mindful of transport accessibility and arrange a later appointment time. If they say yes, the student must then meet with the Career Advisor and pick up a Work Experience Pack
STEP 2	Student and Parents are to read all information including handbook and insurance documentation. The Whitecard Qualification is <u>mandatory</u> for students choosing to take on a construction work -eg Builder, Carpenter, Electrician, Plumber, Painter, Plasterer, Landscape Gardener
STEP 3	Student phones to make a time to meet with the employer to sign the WE contract.
STEP 4	Student must complete a safety test online which <u>relates</u> to their selected industry of work experience at the "Go2Workplacement" website. Students need to register their details on the website as a student of SPB. Select a module that relates to the chosen work experience field and answer all sections. Students must give evidence to Mr Mc Loughlin on completion of the module by emailing the certificate or printing it off and handing it in. Yr. 10 will complete this component in Careers Classes.
*	A Student cannot attend Work Experience during exam blocks or assessment periods. It is the Students responsibility to catch up on any work that is missed.
STEP 5	Student must pay \$20 to the Finance Office to cover insurance for accident or injury whilst in a workplace. If you currently do VET course here at SPB this is not required.
STEP 6	Student meets with employer to provide them with the handbook, insurance documentation and WE contract to be signed. Paperwork must be returned to Mr McLouglin at least 1 week prior to the date you are doing the work experience. This will allow time for risk assessments to be conducted if necessary. Failure to follow the above guidelines may result in you not being allowed to participate in work experience regardless of any arrangements you have made.
*	The school will have discretion at all times as to whether it is appropriate for a student to engage in any Work Experience.
STEP 7	On completion of Work Experience student returns all required paper work to the Career's Coordinator.
