Earlier in the term, I spoke to the Year 12 group about the End of Days. This is the term I use to describe the last days of formal education for our students in Year 12. For our students, it is also a time of reflection and for some, a time of trepidation. Thirteen years of formal, school based education is a significant time in their young lives. As they finish the year, they will reflect on the good times and the not so good times that schooling has brought. Some might be able to remember their first day at school. The tears from mum as they donned that little uniform and marched into kinder, no longer completely joined to the family unit but now exploring the big world. Others will remember significant events such as achievements in sports carnivals, debating competitions, eisteddfods and concerts. Still others will remember fondly friends who have gone to other places.

For staff, it is also a time of reflection. It is a time where we remember the fun events, the retreats, the amazing lessons, the "light-bulb" moments in class, the surprising essay answer and the great relationships that have been formed in the years that Year 12 have been at St Paul's.

I discussed some of the areas where our young men and women will need to be mindful, particularly as they finish their time at the campus. when young people get together and make foolish choices.

Earlier in the term, we sent out a letter to all Year 12 families outlining expectations we have at the end of the term. As well it listed the events that will mark the successful end to Year 12, beautiful events that will showcase our students.

In that letter, it was made clear that we do not have "Muck-Up Days" I explained to the students exactly what we mean by that statement. As well, I spoke about such matters as parties, police, drugs and alcohol, uniform, school attendance, work ethic and study vacation.

At this time of the year, it is obvious to us adults that there will be more than the usual number of young people on the roads going to and from social events. This is certainly known to the Police. I said to our students to be very mindful of that reality. At this time of the year, there is always a heightened police presence on the roads, particularly around schools. They will be there to protect other road users and our young drivers from making foolish decisions. In my experience, there will be one or two students booked near the school in the mornings or afternoons particularly around this time. I ask our students to be mindful of this and to make sure that they make good decisions as they drive to and from school.

End of year parties are a real issue for mums and dads as well as the Police. 
One of the main things that I expressed to Year 12 is the hope that they are all able to finish their time at St Paul's with dignity. The work being done by staff to help prepare them for their HSC as well as the massive work done to prepare and host the beautiful Graduation Ceremonies and events should give the students a real indication of the esteem that they are held in by the staff. In saying that, it is possible that some of our young people for whatever reason might think it a good idea to do something that will, in the short term, make a "mark" in their name. I have, in the past had a situation where a young person, who had been a model student throughout the time he was at school, decided to do something very foolish on the last day. As a result, he was unable to attend Graduation and the Final Dinner. As well, the significant award that he was to receive was not presented to him publically. I will never forget the tears from mum and the boy as we sat in the Principal's office.

We want all our students to end the year well, to celebrate appropriately and to leave this wonderful place with dignity and pride. We want them to stay safe, to look after each other and to celebrate with family and friends in a gentle, special way. My final message to the students is to look after one another; making sure that each and every one of them help with good decision making and guide one another through the last few weeks of formal schooling and continue to work hard up to the final exam period.

We look forward to the *End of Days* where we will celebrate with you all in the St Paul's Hall with the final Mass on Wednesday 20th September and the Graduation Ceremony the following morning.

Uniform Issues:

My thanks to parents for adhering to not only the process for students being temporarily out of uniform but also in terms of correcting deficiencies. Students who are out of uniform without a note or valid reason will receive a uniform deficiency by classroom teachers. After 3 separate deficiencies, families will receive a warning letter and on the 4th deficiency, an Afternoon Detention will be issued.

Sun Protection Policy

As part of the School's Sun Protection Policy, we require students doing outdoor activities to wear hats for Terms 1 and 4 – where the UV radiation is at its strongest. The wearing of hats applies to students who use the courts/oval during breaks, for PDHPE practical lessons and also relevant Friday Sport activities. Students will need to bring a hat in any School colours, to wear at recess/lunch when using the oval and courts. These colours include hats that are predominantly/or a mix of the school red, white, light and dark blue.

Study Skills

The following is a feature from our subscription to Enhanced Learning's Study Skills Handbook. Considering the conclusion of formal classes for Year 12 this might be of interest for our seniors as well as some consideration for junior students to develop their study habits.

Learning Collaboratively

We are all different in the way we prefer to learn. Some students like to work in groups, and others prefer to work alone. Some students like to discuss things over Skype or messenger and some like to work together in person. There is a reason why we have the saying 'two heads are better than one', so let's see how this applies to different types of students.

If you think you always prefer to work alone:

- It is great that you are very self-sufficient. Students who prefer to work alone are often confident in their own abilities. However sometimes these students make it more difficult for themselves by not asking for help when they need it. So if you are this type of student, don't struggle on alone when you get into difficulties or don't understand something. Being able to ask for help when you need it is an important skill for academic success. Just become more aware that you don't always ask for help and instead try reaching out a little more when you need help.
- The other area to consider is that when you talk about things with other people it can often help you to see things from a different perspective. By discussing ideas with another person, you also may find you clarify your own thoughts. By not being open to collaboration, you might not develop your ideas as well as you could or you might not see potential issues that a fresh pair of eyes and ears might discover. If you haven't done much collaboration, give it a try and you might find yourself surprised at how valuable you find the experience.

If you already love working with other people:

- Make sure that you always contribute equally and don't expect other people to do all the work for you.
- Collaboration doesn't mean cheating. For example, it is ok to discuss an assignment and what you think it is about and how you might approach it, but it is not ok to write the assignment together and hand in similar pieces of work.
- Collaboration also doesn't mean wasting time. If you are working with other people make sure you are staying on task and not getting distracted.
- Every now and then you have to do things on your own. If you always do your Maths homework with your friends, you might not really know what you can and can't do on your own. The first time you find this out could be a test which could be a big issue. Always ask yourself if the work you are doing is going to be enhanced by collaboration or if it is more appropriate to try the work on your own.
- It is important each night to have a certain amount of homework time on your own. If you want to collaborate when you are working at home, make specific times to do this. Don't skype the entire night with your friends. Instead have set times for collaboration and set times for independent work.

Year 9 News

According to the Year 9 Assessment Booklet there are a few Assessment Tasks due before the end of Term:

Week 8: Visual Design, Music, German, Elective History and IST.

Week 9: Visual Arts, PDHPE, Science

Week 10: Geography

I hope that these Tasks are underway and nearing completion for submission.

In the last Newsletter, I discussed the **varying forms of homework** each school day. (Just a reminder that students should be engaging in home study each school night, thus a homework routine and time may be needed at home. Homework could take the form of work due the next day, reading ahead, summarising what was learnt that day for upcoming exams, working on Assessment Tasks, packing the bag for the next day, completing unfinished classwork, etc.)

A home study routine is important in getting on top of school work, for showing responsibility and for organising one's life around the varying things that impact upon it. Students are expected to be completing about 1-2 hours of study each school day. Thus, a routine might look like – home, eat, play, one hour's school work, dinner, one hours school work, bed. This will of course vary for each family but a routine means minimal disputes.

I have included a **Study Planner** that I use a lot, with thoughts on how to fill in the planner. *Its about working smarter, not harder*.https://mncatholic-my.sharepoint.com/personal/cayte_pryor_mn_catholic_edu_au/Documents/2017/Yr%209%202017/STUDY%20PLANNER.docx STEPS:

- Recommend that first hour is eat, relax and exercise so have a snack and take the dog for a walk
- Put in what you have to do work, training, make dinner, babysit, dinner time, bed time, etc
- Put in what you want to do watch a favourite TV show, go for a run
- Rank each subject for how much work you need to devote to it
- In one-hour blocks, insert subjects giving more time to those ranked higher
- Have a break in between each block have a cup of tea, say hi to the family, pat the dog

If you can't breathe without **social media**, then include it in your study planner but make sure that you only use it in those times - turn off access at other times.

I have had a brief look through our schools **NAPLAN** results and found that about 22% of our students have met the minimum standard at this stage. Other students will have opportunities in the future to resit the tests to achieve the standard as set by NESA. We will alert students of these dates as they become available.

I have sent all Year 9 an email with an attachment that talks about the **need for sleep and a healthy food intake** in their teenage years. This could provoke family discussion and give parents a back-up.






Book Week Celebrations

Some laughs with friends & a free pizza lunch. What better way to finish this year's Senior Academic Support Program for Year 12!

Most of the 30 student members of the Program & many of their 19 Staff Mentors gathered recently for a "Thank Your Mentor" lunch. Year 12 student *Isabella Lowe* thanked the Staff involved and spoke on behalf of the group about the invaluable support the Mentoring aspect of the Program had provided many of the participating students in their HSC year.

Since its inception in 2015, the Program has added an extra dimension of academic support for year 12 students in addition to the already great work of their class room & Tutor Group teachers.

All Year 12 students have been able to access a Staff Mentor; participate in group study skills sessions; challenge their minds & bodies with yoga; find a quiet after-school study space; receive free tutoring & tap into the experience, tips & wisdom of successful ex-students.

And judging by some of this feedback from current student members, the Program sure seems to be working:

- I found the after school study and tutoring sessions an amazing help for me before the Trials. Hearing the (exstudents) talk the other day was great as well as it gave some good insight and tips and tricks necessary for success.
- I found the mentoring to be invaluable during my HSC year. Having a teacher to step away from a teacher role to act as a support/guide for has been something I have valued greatly.
- Voga: Loved it! learnt some skills I still use today!
- The ex- student session was of most benefit, finding out what they did/ how they cope was really good.
- I really did find a lot of benefit in the after school study as I found that environment to be excellent for study. Taking away distractions really helped a lot of people, including myself and it allowed for really hard and positive work to occur.

And finally...

Mentoring has been life saving. It has been so helpful to have someone who isn't your friend to be able to vent to and have someone go through and find solutions with you. (My mentor) has been so helpful in my year 12 journey, she has continually made time and gone out of her for me and I couldn't be more thankful. She has allowed to verbalise any issues I was having and that has meant I have been able to deconstruct and process it better. She has been there for me through the stress when sometimes a parent or friend isn't enough and has provided different perspectives and solutions. Having a mentor and a mentor buddy has allowed me to really take better control of my mental health and form relationships better. Having a session once a week or fortnight really put my mind at ease because I was able to get continually feedback on what I was doing right and wrong. I truly know that if I didn't partake in the mentoring program I would have struggled throughout the last 6 months and would not have been able to reach my full potential.



Wellbeing and Balance – A Career Perspective

What contributes to wellbeing?

Much is written in the news, on social medial and in magazines about wellbeing and "work-life balance". In a recent article by Seek (<u>Defining Work-life balance</u>), it was claimed that 1 in 2 Australians are unhappy with their work-life balance. When you think about wellbeing in a simple sense, there are a number of things that we can plan to do every day, whether we are busy teenagers or parents:

- 1. doing things you enjoy;
- 2. getting enough sleep;
- 3. eating well;
- 4. having time for rejuvenation relaxing; and
- 5. connecting with others.



If there is not enough time for these things in daily living, it may be time to make choices to take some things out of your busy life! How does this relate to career decisions at school?

Follow your strengths

Career decisions are life decisions. When making choices about subject electives in the middle school, senior subjects in your career plan, or tertiary courses for your UAC application, consider how well school subjects, or tertiary courses will link to your strengths – the things you are good at and you enjoy doing. Career and job choices don't just link to subjects you do well at in school, but also to your interests, part-time jobs and extra-curricular and family activities. A passion for online shopping could lead to a career in marketing and business, an interest in reading and film to a Bachelor of Arts, a love of plants to marine biology or health science!

Consider your commitments

Over-commitment with sport and cultural activities, and long hours of part-time work will detract from your academic work. Your plan in Year 10, and your plan for tertiary study are not just about subjects and courses. If you plan to work substantial hours in a job after Year 12, consider studying part-time. If you are still at school and thinking about more than 8-10 hours per week - think again! Australian research indicates that working up to 5 hours per week can actually mean higher school results, but more than 10 hours, and school results will take a dive! (Anlezark and Lin 2011)

Yr. 12 -UAC 2017 Seminars

These seminars were held at St Paul's in Wk. 6 - 24th August. Students were issued with their 2016 UAC Guides and a presentation on how to use them followed the talks. A student ambassador from the University of Newcastle spoke to Yr. 12 on university life and the opportunities that lay ahead of them. Students were to be commended on their preparation and thought provoking questions within these sessions.

Duties: Unlike regular actors who require outstanding body gestures and facial expressions, voice actors visualise an animated character by their voice. One important thing to note is that they never appear on camera, so they can show up in whatever suits them. Pyjamas, Onesies, Suits, Night gowns. Anything we can think of as long as our vocal cords are functioning.

Salary: Voice actors earn around \$40,000 a year. The salary is dependent on experience which an entry level voice actor is expected to earn \$25,000 a year while an experienced one can earn over \$100,000.

Example: Tom Kenny. You might not know his name but you must have definitely heard his voice. Tom Kenny is the voice actor of the title character Spongebob in the Spongebob SquarePants TV series and films.

St Paul's Vietnam Immersion 2018

Are you up for a challenge? St Paul's will be organising another Vietnam Immersion program from 5th October to 20th October 2018 for students **presently** in Years 9 -10.

The Vietnam Immersion experience is intended to **challenge** students physically, and to expand student knowledge and cultural awareness - but it can also be emotionally challenging.

Students will need to commit to several days of a **social justice program** of assisting others less fortunate than themselves, and to **trek** with a backpack for three days into a hill-tribe ethnic community village. 


