

To the Families and Friends of the St Paul's Community......

I recently came across this article about teenagers and online security. It has some excellent advice to parents and young people about how to stay safe in the online world.

Teenagers spend a lot of time online and use the internet as part of their daily lives. You can help your teenage child take responsibility for identifying and managing internet safety risks. This is a skill your child needs for life.

Teenagers use digital technologies for everyday activities like keeping in touch with friends on social media, relaxing and doing schoolwork. They also go online to look for support for physical or mental health problems, and sometimes to experiment with different ways of expressing themselves.



Because they're online so much without your supervision, teenagers need to be able to identify acceptable and unacceptable online content independently. They also need to know how to behave respectfully online and avoid online risks.

There are three main kinds of internet risks for teenagers.

Content risks

For teenagers, these risks include coming across material that they might find upsetting, disgusting or otherwise uncomfortable, especially if they encounter it accidentally. This material might include:

- pornography
- real or simulated violence
- hate sites
- terrorist sites
- harmful user-generated content like sites about drug use, self-harm, suicide or negative body image.

Contact risks

These risks include coming into contact with adults posing as children online or with strangers who persuade teenagers to meet them in real life, or being the victim of an online scam.

Conduct risks

Conduct risks include behaving in inappropriate or hurtful ways, or being the victim of this kind of behaviour. Examples include:

- cyberbullying
- sexting
- misusing people's passwords and impersonating people online
- making unauthorised purchases using other people's financial details
- creating content that reveals information about other people

Another conduct risk for teenagers is having trouble regulating online time, which can develop into internet addiction disorder.

Protecting your child from internet safety risks

Although your child is probably an independent internet user now, you can still help him to keep building the skills and knowledge he needs to identify and

manage internet safety risks.

Here are some basic things you can do to protect your child from internet safety risks:

- Create a family media plan. It's best to negotiate your plan with your child. Your plan could cover things like screen-free areas in your house and what online behaviour is okay.
- Talk with your child about upsetting and inappropriate content. If you can talk with your child in an open and non-judgmental way, she's more likely to talk with you if she comes across something disturbing online or has a bad online experience.
- Stay in touch with what your child is doing online and how much time he's spending online. This will help you to spot when your child might be having problems online.
- Ask your child to 'friend' you on social media. Friending your child means you can follow what she's
 interested in and who she's connected to online. Younger teenagers might be OK with this, but older
 teenagers might prefer not to friend you.
- Encourage and remind your child to explore and use the internet safely for example, it's OK to remind him to check his privacy settings.
- Find out how to make complaints about offensive or illegal online content.

Technical internet safety tools like internet filters can actually increase risk for children over 14 years. If children are using filters at this age, they might not be developing the skills they need to avoid disturbing content. They might take risks either accidentally or on purpose when they use the internet in unfiltered environments.

Helping your child to identify and manage internet safety risks

It's important to help your teenage child manage internet safety risks for herself. This lets your child build digital resilience, which is the ability to respond positively and deal with risks she comes across online.

You can do this by:

- being a role model for healthy internet use
- talking with your child about online content and behaviour
- reminding your child about privacy and personal information
- teaching your child about online purchases

It's all about trusting your child to become a responsible digital citizen.

Being a role model for internet use

All children – including teenagers – do as you do, so being a role model for your child is a powerful and positive way to guide your child's behaviour when it comes to internet use.

You can be a role model for safe and healthy screen use by using the internet in the way you want your child to use it – for example, by not having internet-connected devices in bedrooms or bathrooms, or not using your phone during mealtimes.

It's also good to model positive technology use like sending supportive messages to friends.

Talking about online content

Talking openly about your own internet use and encouraging your child to do the same will help your child feel able to talk to you if he has a bad experience online. It's also good to talk about the kind of content that makes people feel good.

You can get your child talking by asking her to explain the apps, games and content she's interested in, so that you understand why she uses them. You might say, 'Snapchat posts disappear quickly, but a screenshot can capture what's been said. Is that right?'.

It's good to encourage your child to develop a sense of what he likes and doesn't like online and to defend his choices with friends. For example, you could say, 'It's great that you chose to block that content and didn't get involved in that online argument'.

Talking about online hoaxes and fake news with your child will help her develop the ability to tell whether a website has good-quality information.

And if your child isn't sure about a site's credibility, he can ask himself, 'Whose interest is this in?" The answer can help him work out what sites and offers are dodgy. This is all part of digital and media literacy.

Taking care with privacy, personal information and personal safety

You can help your teenage child look at and choose appropriate privacy, location and safety settings on any devices, programs or social media that she uses, and explain why it's important. For example, you might say, 'Employers often do online searches to find out about job applicants. Make sure that anything you make public

online is OK for future employers to see'.

It's also important for your child to be careful about sharing personal information. Remind your child not to give out his name, address, date of birth or other identifying information to people he doesn't know in person.

And it's a good idea to update 'stranger danger' advice with your teenage child as she moves towards adulthood and comes into contact with online dating. For example, you might say, 'There's always a risk if you meet someone you only know online. It can lead to dangerous situations – for example, the person might want to hurt you'.

Making online purchases

If your child is starting to shop online, it's important for him to use reputable shopping sites, check customer reviews, look into the transaction and security software the site uses and so on.

You could talk with your teenage child about shopping online, and explain the risks associated with online transactions. For example, you might say, 'Have you done a web search and checked the online ratings to make sure it's a reputable site?'

I hope that the article helps you navigate this world that our young people are so much a part of today.

2017 trial HSC minimum standard literacy and numeracy tests

Dear Year 9 students

Two significant changes to the NAPLAN test have occurred this year. As you know, the first change involves you! This year's Year 9 students are the first year group that need to demonstrate that they have a achieved a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy to receive their HSC in 2020. The second is that this is the last year it will be done on paper.

Students who have achieved Band 8's or above in the Year 9 NAPLAN tests have already met the minimum literacy and numeracy standards. Students who are still working towards achieving the minimum standards will have the opportunity to sit the tests on four separate occasions from 2018 onwards. (*Please refer to the HSC Minimum Standard Parent information on the trial online tests at the end of this newsletter*)

NESA, who oversees the test, tells us that "New, short, online tests are the key way that we will assess if students have reached the level of literacy and numeracy skills that are essential for life after school."

So, to help prepare you for the test next year, we are providing you with the opportunity to trial the online system. As it stands, the school wishes to test the capacity of our IT system and to support us in doing this, we are having all current Year 10's sitting the trial. However, in light of the results released in September, we would like to extend this invitation to any student in Year 9, who is currently working towards achieving a Band 8 across all, or some of these subjects.

I believe participation in the trial, will provide you with the opportunity to familiarise yourself with online testing. It will, not only prepare you for what the test will look like next year, but may help build your confidence and skills in achieving a Band 8. It will also give you an idea of what onscreen testing looks like in comparison to a paper copy, and will provide you with the opportunity to pre-test yourself before you sit the 'actual' test next year.

We have never been provided with this opportunity before but I personally feel, it is an experience that will benefit you significantly.

Last Newsletter, I talked about the requirement of a BYOD (computer) for all Year 10 in 2018 and directed parents where to find the school's specifications for the device. I also listed the due dates for Term 4's Assessment Tasks and the Exam period. I reminded parents about how to assist their child on how to be organised for the upcoming assessment period, and about the school's continuing uniform regulations.



On Wednesday 25 October, Year 9 were given the opportunity to participate in a 'Leadership and Wellbeing Day' with the Sydney company *Burn Bright* running the day. Personally, I was very impressed with what this group were able to share with the students and how they imparted skills, opportunities for confidence and self-reflection, and subtly imbedded leadership information in everything they presented. The shared information and experience was invaluable to all students in finding their place in this community. It gave those who are thinking of nominating to be Peer Support Leaders the opportunity to exercise the skills learnt. **Peer Support Nomination Forms** were emailed to every Year 9 student to give each student the opportunity to nominate if they wish. These nominations are due by November 4. Absent notes are expected from the larger than normal number of students who did not attend school on Wednesday, and thus missed an important part of their social education.



As mentioned previously, the **Exam period** is from 8-14 November. This is a major part of your child's assessment for the year. A note to the Student Coordinator is required as soon as possible, if there is a known absence during this Exam time. If time allows, the student may have the opportunity to sit the missed exam or an alternative on their return to school (if it is not outside the exam catch-up period) or the child may be given an estimate mark. Please contact the office by phone if your child is sick on the day of an exam.

As always, continue to talk to your child and hear what they are saying. Continue to assist them with school work and organisation, but also be there for them emotionally and support them in being the best person they can be.

Year 10 News

Students have received a note outlining the **end of year arrangements for Year 10** students once their formal assessments have finished in **Week 6** of this term. At St Paul's, we have created a program that includes preparation for senior years and other activities that will hopefully engage and inform the students. A calendar has been included as a simple reference, but some of these days require more specific explanation.

Year 10 Exams Weeks 5/6: Wednesday 8th November – Tuesday 14th November

All students will attend school on each of these days. When not in exams, students will be in lessons. **Students are expected to participate in sport as usual.** These exams are the final component of Grades that will be sent to the BOS and will be the first inclusion on the ROSA statement for students. These **grades will be available on-line** to students via the password that they have received from the BOS.

Year 10 Alternative Timetable: Wednesday 15th - Friday 17th November

Year 10 students will attend normal school days and experience a range of timetabled lessons which will expose them to Senior School subjects in line with their selected subjects. **ALL** students are expected to attend these days in **normal school uniform**. More information will follow.

HSC Minimum Literacy & Numeracy Standards Trial Online Test - Monday 20th November

Students will complete online tests as part of a trial. **ALL** students are expected to attend school in their **normal school uniform** and bring their laptop charged and ready for the day.

Road Safety Education (RYDA): Tuesday 21st November

This course will be held at the RTA Driving Range, Court Street, Adamstown. Students will need to be at school ready for an 8.45am departure, and the day will conclude at 2.15pm before students are again transported back to school for normal buses. There is a cost to participate in this program (see back page) but it is heavily subsided by Rotary Clubs and other corporate partners. The day is comprised of six presentations – five in a classroom environment with audio-visual presentations (one an emotional video showing the ripple effect of a fatal car crash) and one demonstration on the driving range. Some students will be given the opportunity to be a passenger in a vehicle driven by a licensed driving instructor. If students have a medical condition or injury that may be aggravated by sudden stopping of a car, they will not be permitted to participate in the practical demonstration.

Students are to bring their own lunch and drink as there is no food available for purchase on-site, and students will not be permitted to leave the site. **ALL** students are expected to attend and **School sports uniform** is to be worn on this day.

Career Pathways University Day: Wednesday 22nd November

Students will be transported to Newcastle University departing school at 9.30am and returning by 2.30pm. The time spent at the University will involve meeting with University staff, a tour of facilities, and talks in some of the Faculty areas eg *Engineering, Maths, Humanities*. Some students might not at this stage feel that Uni is relevant to them, but life has a funny way of opening opportunities for Uni study, for example after completing TAFE courses, or with mature age entry. Lunch is available at the University for purchase, or students are welcome to bring their own. This day will involve **ALL** students and **normal school uniform** is to be worn on this day.

Senior Interviews: Thursday 23rd – Friday 24th November and Tuesday 28th – Wednesday 29th November

All students intending to remain at St Paul's in 2018 are required to seek re-enrolment. Letters will be sent to parents in the next few weeks asking them to make an appointment (through Admin. office) with senior staff in order to discuss the requirements of senior schooling at St Paul's. **Interviews will require students to be in full school uniform and to have a parent present.** Interviews will generally be of 30 minutes duration. In the interview the student's subject choice is reviewed in line with ATAR or non-ATAR selection, expenses are explained in regard to practical subjects, policy documents and student agreements are signed, and the Resource Fee will need to be paid. Further details of the interview process will be provided in the afore-mentioned letter.

When students are not in attendance at these interviews, they may remain at home.

Guest Speaker Day: Monday 27th November

We will have a guest speaker, Mr Steven Bradbury, attend the school for a day with our Year 10 students. He will focus on areas such as overcoming adversity, positive mindsets, goal setting, hard work (endurance), self belief, teamwork and leadership which are all critical to becoming a senior student at St Paul's. There will also be a parent and community evening with Steven Bradbury on the same night. Please see invitation on page 6.

This day will involve **ALL** students who will wear their **normal school uniform**.

Study Skills Day - Thursday 30th November

ALL students will be attending an online studies skill course directed by Mr Furey. **Normal school uniform** is to be worn and students are to bring their laptop for the day.

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HSC: 'All My Own Work' Program: Friday 1st - Tuesday 5th December
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The HSC All My Own Work Program is designed to help Higher School Certificate students follow the principles and practices of good scholarship. This includes understanding the ethical practices when locating and using information as part of their HSC studies. Completion of this course and the associated workbook is a compulsory prerequisite to HSC study.

These days will involve ALL students including those who have indicated that they might be changing schools - their new schools will expect that this has been completed. The exception will be those students who have submitted paperwork to the Principal Mr Selmes, indicating that they have secured full-time employment in 2018.

Each student is required to bring **his/her own laptop** for on-line completion of the All My Own Module as well as pens for the completion of the associated workbook. Students will need to be in **full school uniform**.

Peer mediation trainees to attend **9-11am** on **Friday 1**st **December**Students with surnames **A - L** to attend **9-11am** on **Monday 4**th **December**Students with surnames **M - Z** to attend **9-11am** on **Tuesday 5**th **December**

Upon completion of the course requirements students will be allowed to leave school if they have parent permission (note required) and sign out at the front office.

Hand back exams / Presentation of Awards / Christmas Liturgy: Wednesday 6th December

Students will attend sessions with our Leaders of Pedagogy to return exams and discuss requirements for 2018 during periods 1-4. This will be followed by the Year 10 second semester Presentation of Awards in Period 5 which parents are invited to attend. All students 7-10 will conclude the academic year with a Christmas Liturgy and farewell to departing staff. Students are to be in **full school uniform**.

End of Year Activities: Thursday 7th December - Wednesday 13th December

Year 10 are invited to participate in the End of Year Activities Program. There is a range of activities available from passive to outdoor adventure. The booklet detailing what is being run this year was distributed by Ms Flood early in Term 4. To participate, students need to select one or more activities and to submit the appropriate payment and permission note. These activities are always out-of-uniform but clothing must be suitable to the activity being undertaken. If students are unavailable to attend End of Year Activities due to commencement of employment or family holiday, a note needs to be directed to Mrs Brownlee/Ms Guest. These absences would then appear as explained absences on our records.

To simplify the collection of money for the excursions (21st & 22nd November) we ask that **ONE payment of \$40 be made to the Finance Officer before Friday 10th November.** An excursion note was handed out yesterday. **Payment can also be made via our QKR App.**

I thank you for your cooperation and support throughout this year and I trust your son / daughter will participate fully in the End of School Program. Should any problems arise, please do not hesitate to contact the school on 4958 6711.

A9 Fish Tank

As part of the year 8 ecology unit a 150L (3 foot) fish tank was set up in A09. The tank contains 14 fish (2 bristle nose cat fish, 2 otocinclus, 5 cardinal tetra, and 5 spotted zebra fish. The fish tank contains various plants, algae and small snails. The algae eating fish are surviving solely on the algae growing naturally in the tank and have been for over 6 weeks, while the other fish are being feed twice daily by students. Students are monitoring the tank's pH level and will also be looking at some of their home grown algae with microscopes.



Astronomy Night

On the 14th of September, 14 students, 2 staff (Ms Brunton and Ms Daniels) hosted 7 astronomers on the school oval to do some serious star gazing. The astronomers from both the NSW Astronomical Society and the Newcastle Astronomical Society brought over \$30,000 of equipment to observe the

HSC MINIMUM STANDARD

PARENT INFORMATION ON THE TRIAL ONLINE TESTS

October 2017

Schools are trialling the online tests that will be used by students to demonstrate they have met the HSC minimum standard.



Current Year 9 students are the first cohort that need to demonstrate a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy in order to receive their HSC.

Most students will show they've met the standard through new online tests that can be taken during Years 10, 11 or 12. Students who achieved NAPLAN Band 8 in Year 9 have met the standard early and don't need to take the tests.

HOW THE TRIAL TESTS HELP NESA


To prepare for the tests in 2018, NESA needs to check the suitability of the questions. To do this, they have invited all current Year 9 students to trial the online tests in 2017.

Although Year 10 students do not need to demonstrate the HSC minimum standard to receive their HSC, NESA has also asked Year 10 students to help with the trial, in order to test the questions with a wider number of students.

HOW THE TRIAL TESTS BENEFIT YOUR CHILD



The trial assessments will take place at school and will:



Provide Year 10 students with experience of online test environments

As the 2017 tests are a trial, the results do not contribute towards your child's HSC minimum standard. However, schools will receive feedback on students' performance.

THE ONLINE TESTS FROM 2018



To meet the HSC minimum standard, current Year 9 students will have two opportunities a year from Year 10 to pass each online test.

Starting in 2018, these 45 minute tests will include:

- multiple choice reading test
- multiple choice numeracy test
- 500 word writing test

The online test dates (school days only) for 2018 are:

- Term 1: 19 February to 23 March 2018
- Term 2: 21 May to 22 June 2018
