To the Families and Friends of the St Paul's Community.....

It constantly amazes me how quickly time flies. Walking into the major shopping centres on the weekend and hearing Christmas music and seeing the parades through the shops of Santas and various elves clearly indicates that the year is rushing on! We are now halfway through week 6. The exam block is all but complete and Year 10 are entering their alternative program where they complete registration for senior studies and work on a variety of days to help their transition to senior work. Year 12 have completed the HSC and are getting ready for the Graduation Ball on Friday night. Year 11 are preparing for the first of their HSC assessment tasks and are well into their first units of work.

Our teaching staff are busy marking the assessments that have just been completed and are getting prepared to write the junior reports. The Office Staff are preparing the final stages of new enrolments for 2018 as well as completing the myriad of financial and governance tasks that need to be completed before the end of the year. Timetabling for 2018 began some 6 months ago and continues as we complete interviews for staff and we work out the jigsaw puzzle that a school of this size creates in this domain. So it is no surprise when the ads on the radio tell me that it's only 42 days until Christmas!

The building program resumes this week. We have had meetings with the new builder and the architects and it is programmed that it will be completed for the new school year. The plan is to have the landscaping done so that the new administration wing can be used from the outset of the year. If the classroom refurbishment and new Chapel are delayed then that will be a small impact but we have been assured that all that can be done to have the program completed will be done. Perhaps the only hold up will be because of weather. The long term forecast is a little concerning but with some divine intervention, all should be ready to go in the new year.

We have also purchased new electronic signs for the main road frontage and the main entrance of the school. These message boards will be an important vehicle for us to promote our school. It is hoped that these will be ready to begin "messaging" early in the new year. As well, the signage that will indicate that we are to be known as St Paul's Catholic College will be installed on the Hall as well as the new administration wing.

As mentioned previously, the uniform logo will remain the St Paul's High School design until the winter uniform comes on line in the middle of the year. Over the next 12 months, our uniform suppliers will be selling out of the older style logo and as they sell out, they will bring the new stock online. I ask that you continue to support the suppliers and continue to purchase the older stock until it is sold out. We have indicated that the old style logo will be viable and compliant for as long as the uniform item is in good condition. Let's face it, the good woollen jumpers last quite a few years unless the wearer decides to push their thumbs through the cuff!

On Monday 27th November, we are proud to be able to host Mr Steven Bradbury, Winter Olympic Gold medallist here at St Paul's. You would remember Steven as "the last man standing" in the famous skating race at the 2002 Salt Lake Winter Olympics where he won Gold in the 1000m event. Steven will do some work with our Year 10 students during the day and at 7.00pm in the School Hall, he will present to our parents and wider community. This "overnight" sensation says this about that idea – "He broke his neck, lost 4 litres of blood on the ice and trained 5 hours a day, 6 days a week for 12 years to become an overnight success". As a motivational speaker, Steven has a great reputation around the world. After representing Australia at four Olympics, he now feels that it is time to help the next generation of young men and women reach their potential and his work with schools around Australia is testament to this wonderful goal. 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On Wednesday 29th November, the P&F will hold their final meeting for the year. The meeting will take place in the Damascus Centre and the meeting will be followed by some Christmas cheer to thank our P&F for the work that they have done this year. 

It is with much delight that I am able to confirm that I will be continuing on with your children as their Year 11 Coordinator for 2018. I personally will also be returning to a full-time capacity next year. It has been an absolute privilege to share the last three years of your children's journey as their student coordinator commencing when they were in Year 8. I am looking forward to watching them continue to grow and mature into young adults and school leaders over the next two years.

Year 10 Alternative Timetable: Wednesday 15th – Friday 17th November

As you are all well aware by now, Year 10 commence their Alternate Program this week.

All students will participate in the Senior timetable. This will give students the opportunity to sample their subjects and have a clearer picture of the expectations of senior schooling. Students who are not returning to St Paul's are still expected to attend these three days and will have the opportunity to select subjects that they may be interested in attending. **Normal school uniform** is to be on Wednesday and Thursday, and **sports uniform** for Friday. Students will attend Friday afternoon sport for the last time ever!

HSC Minimum Literacy & Numeracy Standards Trial Online Test – Monday 20th November

On Monday, students were given a note by Miss McVeigh outlining the expectations and equipment required for the Minimum Standards Numeracy and Literacy online tests which will take place on **Monday 20th November**. By partaking in this day, we as a school are able to test our online capabilities and provide students a sample of online testing. The school and students will also be given feedback in regards to individual results which will assist with future programming whilst also identifying strengths and areas for development for the cohort. **All** students are expected to attend this day with their laptop fully charged and with their chargers also.

Road Safety Education (RYDA): Tuesday 21st November

On **Tuesday 21st November** students will be attending the RYDA program. This course will be held at the RTA Driving Range, Court Street, Adamstown. Students will need to be at school ready for an 8.45am departure, and the day will conclude at 2.15pm before students are again transported back to school for normal buses. The day is comprised of six presentations – five in a classroom environment with audio-visual presentations (one an emotional video showing the ripple effect of a fatal car crash) and one demonstration on the driving range. Some students will be given the opportunity to be a passenger in a vehicle driven by a licensed driving instructor. If students have a medical condition or injury that may be aggravated by sudden stopping of a car, they will not be permitted to participate in the practical demonstration.

Students are to bring their own lunch and drink as there is no food available for purchase on-site, and students will not be permitted to leave the site. **All** students are expected to attend and **School sports uniform** is to be worn on this day.

Career Pathways University Day: Wednesday 22nd November

Wednesday 22nd November students will be attending a Career's Day held at the University of Newcastle. Students will be transported to Newcastle University departing school at 9.30am and returning by 2.30pm. The time spent at the University will involve meeting with University staff, a tour of facilities, and talks in some of the Faculty areas eg Engineering, Maths, Humanities. Some students might not at this stage feel that Uni is relevant to them, but life has a funny way of opening opportunities for Uni study, for example after completing TAFE courses, or with mature age entry. Lunch is available at the University for purchase, or students are welcome to bring their own. This day will involve **All** students and **normal school uniform** is to be worn on this day. Thank you to the parents who have already paid and returned the note for these two days.

Senior Interviews: Thursday 23rd – Friday 24th November and Tuesday 28th – Wednesday 29th November

Students who are returning to St Paul's are required to attend a 30 minute interview to re-enrol at the College. A form with instructions on how to complete this process through the online booking service was sent home on Friday, additionally Mr Furey also sent an email. Students are to wear their **full-school uniform** and must be accompanied by a parent.

Guest Speaker Day: Monday 27th November

At St Paul's on **Monday the 27th November** we have a special guest, Mr Steven Bradbury who will be joining our Year 10 students for the day. He will focus on areas such as overcoming adversity, positive mindsets, goal setting, hard work (endurance), self belief, teamwork and leadership which are all critical to becoming a senior student at St Paul's. Steven presents his message through life experiences in a light hearted and engaging fashion. This day will involve **all** students.

There is also a parent and community evening with Steven Bradbury on the same night commencing at 7pm in the College Hall, which you are all invited to attend. It would be wonderful to see Year 10 parents attend the evening so that our students hear the same message and language surrounding these important skills from home and school. I will be continuing these themes which Steven introduces to the students next year in our form meetings and well-being programs throughout 2018.

Following these dates which I have outlined above, Year 10 students have the All my own work program, the Study Skills Day, Peer mediation and the Awards Ceremony. However, I will speak to you again in the next newsletter in two weeks time. I thank you for your continued support and encouragement of your children to finish well. 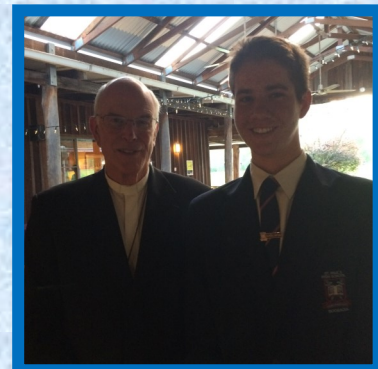

All payments, seating arrangements, and dietary requirements have now been completed and forwarded to NEX.

At the Graduation Ball there will be some formal award presentations and farewell addresses from the School Captains. All students will be presented on stage with their official school reference as part of their folio. Formalities at this function will be kept to a minimum to allow for dancing and celebrations amongst staff, students and their families.

NEX have **strict procedures about the sale of alcohol**. Only parents will be able to purchase alcohol from the bar. Students who are over 18 will be presented with a wrist-band upon entry and this will 'flag' to security their entitlement to drink, whereas students who are not yet 18 will have normal restrictions applying. NEX have asked the school to indicate for security, which tables have students who are under 18. A breach of their rules will result in security asking the parent and student to leave the premises.

Parking

In Newcastle can be a problem, but if your arrival is after 5pm then there will be parking available on the streets. NEX has installed paid parking with a barrier gate on the large carpark adjacent to the club. If a patron spends over \$20 in the downstairs bar then the parking will be validated as free, however any purchase made through the bars in the venue will NOT validate your parking. Cost of parking for the evening will be \$8.00

This event will be held on **Friday 15 December at 11.00am** in Holland Court for all Year 12 students. This informal gathering gives an opportunity to come together and celebrate HSC and ATAR results with staff and fellow students – regardless of the final mark or rank. This is the last opportunity students have to gather with one another as a group and with those staff members who have worked with them so tirelessly during their senior years. 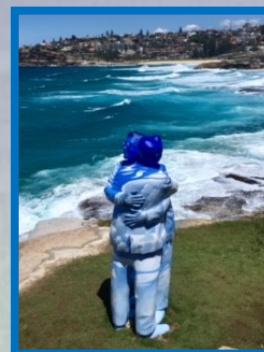

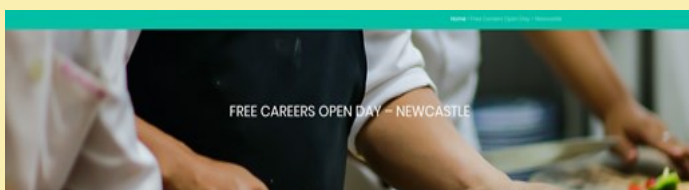

Thinking About Job Trends

Government Department of Employment gives a summary of employment trends in Australia. It has important messages about career and study planning for young Australians. The report describes the challenges faced by young people in getting a job. Even though youth unemployment fell marginally in 2016, the rate of 12.3% for January 2017, is well above the 8.8% of 2008.



Qualifications and Experience Matter

Study and training after Year 10 link to better employment prospects – the higher the level of study, the higher the chance of participation in employment across adult life:

- Bachelor Degree - 86.9% Year 12 or equivalent - 76.2%
- Diploma - 84.4% Year 11- 66.6%
- Certificate III or IV - 85.3% Year 10 - 55.7%

This means that there are real gains to be made from taking up study or training options after Year 10 – and highlights the value of VET qualifications alongside academic choices. The report also showed that workers with higher qualifications are likely to earn higher incomes.

Employers are increasingly looking for experienced workers – more than half of the employers were requiring some level of experience when advertising for positions. This may mean that young people’s part time work and volunteering choices could be an important aspect of their future career planning.

Where are the jobs?

The report listed the following as the largest employing industries: health care and social assistance; retail trade; construction; and professional, scientific and technical services. Industries which have created the largest numbers of new jobs were: health care and social services; professional, scientific and technical services; education and training; and accommodation and food services. Dear Parent/Carer

Each school year the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle reviews the fees for students in our diocesan schools for the coming year. By far the greater part of our schools' funding now comes from State and Commonwealth government funding, but it is noted with gratitude the commitment and continuing financial contribution of parents and parish communities that is so essential to fill the gap between the funds provided by government and the actual cost of running our schools.

This letter is to inform you of the fee arrangements for 2018 which represent a 2.25% increase of 2017 fees. The following rates and discounts have been reviewed by the Diocesan Finance Council (DFC) and the Catholic Schools Council. Upon the advice of the DFC and the Diocesan Executive, they have been approved by Bishop Wright.

The school fees are constituted by 3 components:

1. Diocesan Tuition Fees
2. Individual School Resource and Service Fees
3. Diocesan Family School Building Levy (DFSBL)

1. Diocesan Tuition Fees 2018

In 2018 the Diocesan Tuition Fees, full rate, will be:

Kinder to Year 6	\$ 1,233	(increase of \$27.00p.a. or \$0.65 per school week from 2017)
Years 7 to 10	\$ 1,698	(increase of \$36.00p.a. or \$0.88 per school week from 2017)
Years 11 to 12	\$ 2,559	(increase of \$57.00p.a. or \$1.39 per school week from 2017)

In 2018, the Family discount on Diocesan Tuition Fees, full rate, will be:

1 child family	0% - full rate to be applied
2 child family	10% - each child
3 child family	20% - each child
4 child family	40% - each child
5+ child family	50% - each child

2. Individual School Resource and Service Fees

These are fees set by individual schools and can cover a range of costs including the supply of resources such as texts, school supplies, exercise books, subject levies, technology, excursion costs etc. The cost and nature of the fees can vary between schools and they will be set out in the Parent Handbook provided by the school and itemised in the school fee account from the school.

3. Diocesan Family School Building Levy (DFSBL)

The DFSBL is charged to the oldest child for each family. The DFSBL is pooled to contribute towards past, present and future costs for building projects across all existing schools, and for the development of new catholic schools.

This DFSBL contribution from families is spent on major refurbishment and capital works in existing schools, including classroom replacement, toilet facilities, specialist rooms, and playground areas. In new schools the DFSBL provides

4. Diocesan Pastoral Contribution

The Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle consists of parishes, schools, CatholicCare Social Services, St Nicholas Early Education and the Curia offices. The Diocesan offices exist to support the work of Parishes and other pastoral ministries that are the responsibility of the Bishop and the diocesan community. There are approximately 160,000 Catholics residing in our diocese.

Since 2017 a voluntary contribution of \$150 per family (\$50 per term) has been sought as a diocesan pastoral contribution. Funds support the ongoing pastoral works of the diocese which include, amongst many initiatives:

- The diocesan pastoral ministries office and the activities of its many advisory councils - the Diocesan Pastoral Council, the Adult Faith Formation Council, the Liturgy Council, the Ecumenical and Interfaith Council, the Social Justice Council and the Diocesan Council of Ministry with Young People.
- The provision of chaplains ministering in the following areas - Newcastle University, Newcastle Port, Prisons, Hospitals and CatholicCare Social Services.
- Family Community Faith Coordinators who work to reach out to and connect families with their local parish and school.
- Pastoral Coordinators who work in those parishes without a resident Parish Priest.

Fee Reductions

To assist families with limited financial resources, Catholic schools in the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle offer a lower tuition fee to 'means tested' low income families such as Health Care and Pension Card holders. This rate is 50% of the Diocesan Tuition Fee full rate for each child. This discount applies only to the Diocesan Tuition Fee, not to the DFSBL or other resource and service fees charged by each individual school.

Please note, however, that it is our policy that financial hardship should not prevent a child from attending a Catholic School and no child will be denied a Catholic Education because of a family's genuine inability to pay the required school fees. This does not apply only to the eligible Health Care/Pension Card holders mentioned above. Any family experiencing financial difficulties is entitled to fee assistance. The Principal of the school can be contacted to discuss such situations.

Together with parents, clergy and school staff, we are committed to offering the children and young people in this diocese, schools in which their faith can be nurtured in outstanding learning environments. We seek to assist young people to realise their full human potential, spiritual, intellectual, physical and social. We value the opportunity to work in partnership with you to that end, and thank you for your continuing support of Catholic Education in this Diocese.

The funds support the Pastoral Ministries Office and the activities of the many advisory councils that make up this office - the Diocesan Pastoral Council, the Adult Faith Formation Council, the Liturgy Council, the Ecumenical and Interfaith Council, the Social Justice Council and the Diocesan Council of Ministry with Young People.

We have chaplains ministering in the following areas - Newcastle University, the Port, Prisons, Hospitals and CatholicCare, where those who seek pastoral and spiritual care are supported.

These funds also help to support the Refugee Hub at Mayfield which plays an integral role in the settlement of refugees in the Newcastle and Hunter region. By working collaboratively with other service providers, the Refugee Hub works with refugees to support and empower them on their journey to independence.

Some parishes without a resident priest are served by Parish Leaders and funds are allocated to these roles.

The Levy has enabled us to provide funds to these ministries. Each of us has a responsibility to see the need and respond. Thanks for your response to a need you may not have seen but to which you continue to give generously.
