The students at St Paul's over the past week have been engaged in End of Year Activities. I would like to publically thank the organisers, Mrs Flood, Miss Chapman and Mr Burke for the huge amount of work they have done since the middle of the year to get this massive undertaking organised. I would also like to thank our staff who have been working so well with the students on these events that are greatly valued by the community. Well done to all.

I would like to end with this message from Pope Francis.

Dear brothers and sisters, Happy Christmas!

Christ is born for us, let us rejoice in the day of our salvation!

Let us open our hearts to receive the grace of this day, which is Christ himself. Jesus is the radiant "day" which has dawned on the horizon of humanity. A day of mercy, in which God our Father has revealed his great tenderness to the entire world. A day of light, which dispels the darkness of fear and anxiety. A day of peace, which makes for encounter, dialogue and, above all, reconciliation. A day of joy: a "great joy" for the poor, the lowly and for all the people (cf. Lk 2:10).



Thank you, St Paul's Community for your love, patience and support during 2017. I hope and pray that this Christmas season is one of friendship, love and family. Enjoy the warm summer holidays with your beautiful children and we look forward to seeing you all in 2018.

Christmas Message

As we begin our wind down for the academic year with awards ceremonies and EOYA it is important to recognize the importance of Advent for Catholic Schools around Australia. An important message I read this time last year still had some significance for 2017 and no doubt beyond in terms of social justice.

The following extract is from the Jesuit Refugee Service who aim to support and highlight the issues in Australia with our stance on those defined as refugees. The parallel with the Christmas story should be familiar but it also asks the question of what we need to consider as a society .

What the world is facing is a crisis of solidarity: an inability or an unwillingness to share the home that we have been given, and to risk the largesse of the hospitality that we enjoy.

The Christmas story is steeped in irony. The shepherds who work on the edges of the city move to the centre of the world when they become the recipients of the angelic message. The Magi seeking a King are sent to see a newborn baby. The vulnerable child is in fact the Lord of the universe.

In the familiar words of Christina Georgina Rossetti's

In the Bleak Midwinter,

Our God, Heaven cannot hold Him

Nor earth sustain;

Heaven and earth shall flee away

When He comes to reign.

In the bleak mid-winter

A stable-place sufficed

The Lord God Almighty,

Jesus Christ.

That notion of welcome is one of the greatest ironies of the Christmas story. The child born at Christmas receives hospitality from the world, and finds a home in it; but in fact it is that child who offers the world hospitality, and who welcomes all of us into his eternal home. The guest is in reality the true host, the One who has made all things, and will gather all things to Himself.

We have forgotten this central fact: that we all share, in the words of Pope Francis, a common home, one that is given to us as pure gift, not ours by ownership or by right. The great irony about the so-called migration and refugee crisis is that it is not about that at all. What the world is facing is a crisis of solidarity: an inability or an unwillingness to share the home that we have been given, and to risk the largesse of the hospitality that we enjoy.

It is ironic that at the end of the year of Mercy proclaimed by Pope Francis, Australia has demonstrated by its treatment of people seeking asylum what it means to lack mercy. Instead of celebrating the Prince of Peace, we have allowed ourselves to be ensnared by the Prince of Lies, and all his works, and all his empty promises: border security, resettlement as our only obligation, stopping illegal arrivals, and so on.

Scrooge was haunted in *A Christmas Carol* by the Ghosts of Christmas Past, Present, and Future. This Christmas I pray that we also will all be haunted: by every child whom we have turned away from Australia; by every family that we sent to Nauru; by every young man who has seen hope and life seep slowly away while confined to Manus Island.

The Prologue to John's Gospel tells us that the Word was in the world, and the world was made by him, and the world knew him not. He came unto his own, and his own received him not. That does not make for a comforting Christmas message, but perhaps there is little this Christmas for us to be comfortable about. *Aloysious Mowe SJ*

Hopefully some thought provoking works in this advent season.

To this end, each person here tonight has contributed one dollar towards St. Paul KAASO School for Orphans in Uganda, a charity funded primary school whose motto is "Invest in Education". St Paul KAASO is a unique community project in Uganda that provides education and mentorship to orphans and disadvantaged children in one of the areas hardest-hit by the HIV/AIDS crisis. An ex-student of St Paul's Booragul and Olympic Sailing champion Nathan Outteridge, has an association with the school through the charity efforts of his wife Emma. KAASO was founded in 1999 by two Ugandan teachers, Dominic and Rose Mukwaya, who set out to provide free, high-quality education to children who — due to poverty and social pressures would otherwise be unlikely to complete their schooling.'







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The New Way

There will be changes in route services which may affect students

Newcastle Transport announced the new network last week, with more than a thousand extra bus and ferry services to be delivered when the new network is implemented on 14 January 2018.

The new network will improve bus connections between major hubs and the Newcastle CBD offering services every 15 minutes during the day, and will also strengthen links between suburbs and town centers.

Most of the bus routes have been revised and new bus routes have been added to the network to better meet customer needs. To match the new network, we have simplified the route numbers to double digits.

There are no changes to dedicated school services.

School students who use regular routes will need to check their route to and from school. Our Travel Concierge can be contacted at newcastletransport.info to provide assistance to parents and students in understanding the changes and planning their new trip.

There are a number of ways customers and the community can access information, including:

- At newcastletransport.info where you can view an interactive map of the network, download the new map and read about key timetable and route changes by area.
- Our Travel Concierge will provide assistance to customers to understand the changes and plan their new trip.
- The Newcastle Transport Hub at 152 Hunter Street, Newcastle, where the community can talk to the Newcastle Transport team face to face and provide feedback. The Hub is open Monday to Friday, between 8am and 5pm and between Saturdays 9am and 5pm.
- The Newcastle Transport Facebook page.
- Our customer service team will be out and about on the network and in local shopping centres. A calendar of locations will be available on the Newcastle Transport website.
