

To the Families and Friends of the St Paul's Community......

It is amazing to consider that this is the final newsletter for this term. It was once suggested that time flies when you are having fun.

This term has been packed with so much. The modern Secondary College is a much busier place than was the case even 10 years ago. We have added to usual busyness with the launch of our Strategic Plan, the use of our new administration wing and class facility and continued building renovations in the student services area. We have survived major weather events and had the front of the college submersed in a deluge of water from a burst water main. We have a new website, installed new signs at the front of the College and on the main road. In the coming week, we will take control of the signs from the supplier and begin to use them to full capacity.



Along with the physical changes to the college over the past 10 weeks, the students have all been engaged in so much. Swimming carnivals, Opening Mass, Easter Liturgies, PAT testing, Minimum Standards Testing, HSC assessment, assessment in all other years and KLA's, quality teaching and learning, sporting achievements, public speaking, drama and music, the list goes on. I was speaking with the Year 12 students at their recent Retreat and I suggested that these students who are busy preparing for their HSC exams at the end of the year are the most examined young people for generations. When I did my HSC, the only other formal external exam done prior to that was the Year 10 Moderator exams which only included Maths, English and Science. Today, students begin exams in Kindergarten with "Best Start" followed by NAPLAN in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9, PAT testing in a variety of years, Diocesan RE exams in Years 5, 8 and 10 and now for quite a number, the follow-up Minimum Standards testing. I sometimes wonder when we actually get the time to teach!

Speaking of the Year 12 Retreat, I would like to publically congratulate the students on the most beautiful way that they engaged in

the retreat process. It was clear that they were keen to make the most of this special time to still their hearts and to make time for themselves and their God. I would like to also thank the staff who gave up their time to be with the students and particularly Mr Doyle and Mrs Lucas who planned and conducted the retreat for our year 12 group. I am sure that the young men and women will remember the retreat as a real highlight of their final year at St Paul's.

Interim Reports have been issued for Years 7 to 11. These reports are a snapshot of the student's engagement in the learning process this term and is an important item of feedback to parents and students alike. I encourage students to have a good look at the reports so that they have a real sense of their progress so far. I suspect that for the vast majority, the grades reflected in the reports will not be a surprise. For some, there will be gradings that indicate that some more quality effort is needed. On Wednesday evening, we will be hosting the first of our Parent/ Student Teacher Interviews. I encourage students to attend with their parents so that they can be part of the quality feedback that it so important in the learning process. I also encourage students to speak with their teachers during the school day to ask about their progress and particularly, steps that they can make to continue their learning growth.

The recent Open Evening has certainly made a significant impact on our footprint as a quality Education facility on the shores of Lake Macquarie. We have had a number of new enrolments for next term and a large number who have decided

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that St Paul's is their choice of school for Year 7 in 2019. Enrolments are still open for all years. If you have any friends who are still wondering about Year 7 for next year, please encourage them to make contact. We are more than happy to have a chat and take them on a tour of the College.

We have been having a blitz on the wearing of our uniform over the past few weeks. Students are being challenged when they are out of uniform or when they are wearing items that contravene our uniform code. We understand that there are times when a non-standard item of clothing has to be worn but we must insist that a note explaining the reason why is given to your child when there is an issue. The Uniform Expectation will be uploaded to our website in the next week or so. I ask that you familiarise yourself with that information so that together we can ensure that all our students wear our uniform with pride.

Finally, Term 2 for students begins on Tuesday 1st of May. Monday 30th of April is a Pupil Free Day. Staff at St Paul's will be taking part in their annual Spiritualty Day. We will be working with Greg Sunter, further exploring the Charism of St Paul and how this beautiful charism speaks to a school setting in the 21st Century. This day includes all staff at the College and as a result, the College Office will be closed on Monday the 30th of April.

Study Skills

Should you listen to music when studying? In an ideal world we would probably say no music while doing schoolwork except classical baroque / instrumental music which actually can help your memory by getting the brain into a relaxed state.

But a good compromise is as follows. If the work is not very difficult, and fairly routine, then you can have whatever music you like on. It will make you feel relaxed, it will make you feel like the time is going faster and help you stick to completing the work you need to do. But if the work requires higher order thinking skills, i.e. studying for a test, trying to understand something difficult, doing an essay plan, trying to learn or remember anything – then switch the music off. Otherwise it will end up taking you much longer to complete the task and to retain what you are learning (even though you are convinced it is not affecting you!).

Just get in the habit of stopping and asking yourself each time before you start work whether it is the type of work that requires you to really focus and concentrate and if it is — switch the music off for awhile. The same approach goes for doing work in front of the TV

Dear Parent/Carer

Welcome to the NAPLAN season again!



Over the past couple of years there has been a shift away from the panic and cynicism that was synonymous with the NAPLAN test and I have to admit, I am thankful that it is being viewed in a much better light. NAPLAN is only one form of assessment and like every other one, it provides schools, parents and the child with a snapshot of their literacy and numeracy levels. It is also a diagnostic tool used by parents and schools to help support each child in these two domains. Unlike other forms of testing, it does not assess subject specific content; does not test for signs of gifted or talented, nor critical thinking or complex problem solving. What it does test for is the basic literacy and numeracy skills of students in Year 3, 5, 7 and 9.

NAPLAN EQUATING TEST

St Paul's has been nominated by ACARA in 2018 to be part of the NAPLAN Equating Test Program – testing that is run prior to NAPLAN in Week 2 Term 2 every year. This equating test is part of a process of setting benchmarks for the NAPLAN tests that will follow in Week 3. This year a small group of students from Years 7 & 9 has been nominated by ACARA to sit the reading test (75 minutes) and students **involved will be notified by email this week.** The testing is purely for equating purposes and has no bearing on NAPLAN results for students sitting the test.



Biennale of Sydney and Art Express

On Tuesday the 20th of March our Senior Visual Arts Students had the privilege of travelling to Sydney to view this year's Biennale and Art Express Exhibitions. As usual, the Art Gallery of New South Wales did not disappoint. Tokyo based curator, Mami Kataoka has done a phenomenal job at presenting the 45th year of the Biennale of Sydney in a beautifully textured presentation of the exhibition. This year's Biennale of Sydney has a softer, more sensitive touch. It is not surprising when you look at Kataoka's theme, which largely rests on the concept of *Wuxing*. According to Chinese philosophy, everything in this world is made up of *Wuxing* – the five elements of wood, fire, earth, metal and water – each evolving to the formation of the next. Students particularly enjoyed the interactives.

Art Express gave students the opportunity to view Body of Works that achieved the highest marks for 2017. The standard, as usual, was impressive. It was exciting to see works by two Newcastle Students featured in the exclusive exhibition. Students were impressed by the range of themes, but tended to appreciate the more traditional drawings above other forms.

As a pleasant surprise, Students were also given a very rare opportunity to delve behind the scenes of the Art Gallery of New South Wales as we were invited to 'Meet the Curators'. Students were able to view works being preserved, curators delving into never seen before archives and the unwrapping of Mike Parrs works that had not been viewed for over 15 years! The Curators and Museum Preservation staff were incredibly welcoming, explaining what they were doing, how their role has changed given advances in technology and taking time to answer our questions. It was a very rewarding experience!

The Biennale of Sydney is on until the 11th of June across multiple venues in Sydney. I would highly recommend visiting the Cockatoo Island instalment during the School Holidays, in particular, keep an eye out for Ai Wei Wei's work 'Law of the Journey':

Kiss myAsthma App for young people

Launched on World Asthma Day, Kiss My Asthma is an app for young people with asthma developed by medical experts at the University of Sydney with input from focus groups of young people throughout the process. The app helps young people with medication reminders, tracking symptoms and attacks to inform their doctor and setting goals (with help from the app's monsters).

Kiss My Asthma is free from the App Store and Google Play.

What does the app include?

The app features:

- access to your Asthma Action Plan
- the ability to track your asthma symptoms, severity and attacks, making it easy to inform your doctor or specialist accurately about your asthma
- mood tracker
- setting goals and receive support from one of the app's monster assistants
- reminders to take your asthma preventer medications
- Asthma First Aid instructions and emergency contacts
- finding out more about asthma, asthma medications and devices, and managing anxiety.

As the cooler months arrive so does colds and flu. At St Paul's we encourage students to carry their reliever medication with them at all times and ensure the school is supplied with a current **Asthma Action Plan.** (*Please see link below*) We have disposable spacers and reliever medication available for students in the main office at any time they require it.

 used as these contact details will be used to send updates. If you cannot find
 St Paul's, type in Booragul under school name drop down box and it should
 appear.

You will now need to check your email account for the password and the login. You will receive a computer generated text and email with your password (you may need to check your Junk Mail if you don't receive an email)

If you wish to change your password, go to my account and Edit my Details. Here you can change your password and add other children. Please note that your child will stay in the system and will go up an age group each year. The only time a parent will need to edit their child's details is if your child changes schools. Each year the system should roll over to progress them to their next school year. Always remember to click 'Save your details' button on the bottom of the page.



Mega-Mural for Youth Week

Local youth and budding street artists will have a water reservoir as a canvas to paint a 120m² mega-mural upon as a Youth Week activity on Tuesday 17th April.

"We're super excited about the mural, it's going to be a fantastic creation showcasing the local Street-Art talent and the local flora and fauna" said Coal Point Progress Association President Suzanne Pritchard.

"Over the past five years we've surveyed the plants and animals that live in our local bushland reserves and found threatened species such as Squirrel Gliders, Powerful Owls and Tetratheca juncea. The mural is a way to celebrate the awesomeness of our bushland backyard" said Suzanne Pritchard.

"The mega-mural will provide the experience of working on a street art mural. Having all the painting materials and the personal protective gear to do street art safely provided is real bonus. We're hoping for the community to get behind it and respect the effort" said Graffiti Dan mural street artist and mentor.

Hunter Water has been fully supportive of the project which will transform the graffitied water reservoir at Coal Point to a Street-Art showcase of local talent.

Origin has contributed \$6000 towards materials and mentoring to support the local youth artists to develop their skills and provide a positive outlet for showcasing their talents.

A \$1500 grant from Hunter Local Land Services is making the youth week event possible along with donations from the Toronto Lioness and Toronto Area Sustainable Neighbourhood Group.

The mural is an activity of the Threatened Species Last Stand (TSLS) on the Coal Point Peninsula project, a six-year Environmental Trust funded project which finishes in June.
