

To the Families and Friends of the St Paul's Community......

Welcome back to Term 3.

At our first assembly of the term, I spoke to the students about engagement in their learning. In that address I talked about our students making the most of every learning opportunity in every lesson. I spoke about the need to have all their equipment including computers that are fully charged and ready to go every day. I spoke about ensuring that bags are packed the night before ensuring that any items that will be needed for the next day's lessons are included. I also spoke about the idea that homework is an old term and that today we speak about home study. It is a time where all students should be reading, looking over notes from previous lessons and even looking at work that is to come. This study obviously includes assignments and research that is needed to complete some of the complex tasks that students are engaged in every day in every lesson. It also includes any tasks that have been set from the previous lesson.



The other area that I spoke about was the concept that all students are responsible to ensure that the learning environment is one where each person can work consistently. I said that students who, for whatever reason decide to disrupt the learning environment for others need to seriously consider their actions. It is most unfair that students in class are put in situations where they struggle to learn because of the actions of others. Ironically, the students who disrupt lessons are usually doing that because they are not prepared themselves for the lesson. They are usually the ones who have not brought the correct equipment or who have not completed the set tasks that have been set to enable them to fully participate in the lesson.

I have challenged our students to ensure that they make every lesson the best learning opportunity for themselves and for others. Over the term, I will be visiting classes along with members of the College Leadership group to see what our students are doing in class and to perhaps challenge some approaches to learning along with congratulating students who are working well in their classes. Later in this newsletter, Mr Furey will be talking about the new Mobile Phone Policy that we have introduced. This policy is about teaching and learning and quality learning environments. I ask that you look closely at the policy and discuss the implications with your child in the coming days.

As I write this newsletter, we are about to host the Mid-Year Awards Ceremonies for years 7 to 10. After that we are hosting our main rounds of Parent Teacher Interviews. These interviews are an important tool in helping our students to continue their journey as learners. I hope as many of you are able to attend and be part of this time to discuss your child's progress with their teachers.

As well, we have many students involved in this year's Aspire production at the Civic Theatre. The performances are this week from 1—4 August and I commend you all to come along and see the wonderful talents from not only St Paul's but from schools across the Diocese.

This is the final term for Year 12. At the assembly, I wished them well as they receive feedback from their recent exams and as they complete their final tasks and major works. It is a busy time for these students and I know that our staff are working tirelessly to support them as they complete their formal studies for the HSC.

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The days are getting longer but it is clear that we need some solid rain across the region and across the state. I hope and pray that the drought that is affecting much of the state including the Hunter Region ends soon and that our friends and families in the farming community receive the support that they need so that they can survive this most difficult time.

Moving beyond cyber safety for happy, resilient digital kids

As digital devices becoming increasingly immersed into our lives, it is certainly clear they will continue to play a major role in the education, learning, entertainment and socialization of our children's lives.

This can be a scary prospect for a parent today as we are saturated with news about predators, pornography, cyber-bullying and sexting. And certainly these are real concerns, as is the safety of our children on these devices.

But these devices are not going anywhere and so we need to be smarter when it comes to helping our kids navigate this world. And for me, that means moving away from a fear based approach, toward one that helps our kids get the skills, behaviours and thinking to become not only safe, but happy and resilient users of digital technologies.

Our kids are getting pretty good at keeping their passwords safe, not sharing private information, and thinking about talking to strangers online. All important lessons we need to continue to teach.

But being immersed in this world requires skills and behaviours well beyond safety measures. It needs to be an ongoing lesson in critical thinking, resilience, self-esteem, empathy and the promotion of good habits that they can carry with them throughout life.

<u>Digital Resilience</u> The online world opens us up to comments, judgements and even abuse from people known and unknown, all coming from different backgrounds and situations, all with different beliefs, and all with a little extra keyboard courage or anonymity. Whilst we would like to be promoting kindness and respect online, this is not always the reality. We need our kids to be able to recognize and move on from the people whose opinions do not matter. The greater audience and the permanence of the online world also means the effects of mistakes are magnified. They need to be able to withstand the very permanent and public nature of this world. There may always be a party they are not invited to, or a sleepover they were excluded from, so how will they deal with the constant flow of images appearing in their social media feeds?

<u>Self esteem away from the screens</u> There will always be comparison online. With access to so much and so many, there will always be someone prettier, smarter, skinnier, with more friends, more likes or more followers. We need to be constantly working on the self esteem of our kids, both online and off. Conversations about our self worth, where that comes from, whose opinion matters, what success and happiness really looks like. These all need to form part of the equation, not just how many likes you get on your latest selfie.

<u>Digital skills</u> Our kids need skills to know how to handle different situations that arise online. Do they know how to abort a conversation that is going badly? How do they speak up in a group chat when someone is being excluded or spoken about in a nasty way? How do they deal with unwanted attention online? Do they have the words to respond to a nasty comment? Should they respond? As so much of their social life and connection to others will be based around online conversations, these are just some of the skills our kids need to have in order to keep those interactions positive.

<u>Good habits</u> The earlier we start with good habits, the greater chance we have of them becoming behaviours they adopt throughout adolescents and beyond. So start out with your own rules to ensure these habits are formed. Maybe it is no devices an hour before bed, no devices in the bedroom, no devices at the dinner table, asking permission before sharing pictures of others. Making sure there is plenty of time for friends, extra curricula activities, outside play, chores, homework and good sleep. These all help us be in charge of our time management and the control we have over our devices, so they don't end up controlling us.

<u>Critical thinking</u> There is so much content online, so our kids need to be really good at determining that which is real, fake, relevant, helpful and worthwhile. This can be a difficult task (even for adults), but a crucial skill. Critical thinking must be an ongoing

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process every time they watch a video, look at a photo, read an article or connect with someone. Why was this written or produced? Is the language bias? Are they trying to sell me something? Is there research to back up their claims? Would this video have a warning if it was on TV? Is this worth my time? These are just some of the critical thinking questions kids need to be asking of themselves every time they consume content online.

So whilst keeping our kids safe and giving them the skills to do this is of utmost importance, there is so much more to cyber safety than avoiding predators. The emotional and social well-being of our kids and the ability for them to be in the best position possible to learn, grow and thrive are imperative, and will help them become resilient and happy both online and off.



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Science News

In the first week of the July holidays I was privileged to attend, and present a Lab Workshop, at CONASTA 67 – the Conference of the Australian Science Teachers Association in conjunction with the International Conference of Chemistry Educators (ICCE) held at University of Sydney.

The conferences were attended by over 700 delegates from Australia and around the world and provided the opportunity for teachers, academics and Resource providers to showcase current ideas and materials for the present and future of Science teaching both at Secondary and Tertiary levels.

The keynote sessions showcased a variety Australian and international scientists and educational researchers including Prof. Lisa Harvey-Smith (Astrophysicist, CSIRO) who presented the Stanhope Oration on the Square Kilometre Array – a set of thousands of radio sensors deployed in the W.A. desert for making unprecedented images of the night sky.

Dr. Tanya Latty (Entomologist, USYD) - how 'simple' organisms such as moulds, ants and bees are able to solve complex problems by working together.

Dr. Jeanette Hurst (Science Communicator, USYD) - the chemistry behind Food Gastonomy

Prof. Richard Garrett (ANSTO) - examples of current "Big Science" projects, including CERN (home of the Large Hadron Collider) which is investigating the fundamental laws of nature and the first moments after the Big Bang; ITER, the world's largest fusion experiment which aims to demonstrate fusion as a low emission sustainable energy source for the world; and the

LIGO and Virgo Scientific Collaboration, which first observed gravitational waves in 2016.

Dr Alan Finkel (Aust Chief Scientist) spoke of his vision to boost student's science and mathematics skills & knowledge and Prof. Dietmar Muller (Geophysicist, USYD) helped us understand what stories rocks tell about the history of the planet.

Shannon Foster (D'harawal Saltwater Knowledge Keeper) - the science, culture and sustainability of the world's oldest surviving, continuous culture.

Prof. Peter Mahaffy (Chemist, Kings University, Canada) - how Chemistry must interact with other disciplines such as Ethics, Sustainability & impact on our environment.

Dr. Brad Tucker (Astrophysicist, ANU) closed the conference while exploring the future of space mining, travel and 'immigration'!

There was also the opportunity to hear from past winners of the Prime Minister's Science teaching prize in a forum session, hosted by Robyn Williams AM.

Over 125 workshops covered a broad range of topics catering for a diverse audience including lab technicians and early-childhood teachers.

I was honoured to present a workshop in the Sydney University Wet Lab on making gases (O_2 , CO_2 , H_2 , N_2O , NH_3 , CI_2 etc) in Syringes – a method I adopted from Prof Bruce Mattson at Creighton University in Nebraska USA. Many students at St Paul's would be familiar with the process which we have often used here to make gases which are then used in experiments such as small rocket explosions ($2H_2 + O_2$ à $2H_2O$) and demonstrating Equilibrium conditions (CO_2 (g) $\mathbb{Z}H_2CO_3$ (aq)).

The focus theme of the conference "Spotlight on our Future" was chosen in the belief that Science, and thus Science teachers, will continue to have a significant impact on many aspects of our daily lives.

Science & Engineering

On the 22nd of May, 24 year 8 students competed in the Newcastle of University's Science and Engineering "Build ME a Future" day. This is a competition with 5-6 schools competing each day for an entire week.

The challenges that the students faced included; constructing a Mars rover which could carry a block over an obstacle course, designing a plane to hit a target and fly the furthest distance and create a catapult which had to pass similar tests. Many of these challenges the students had not come across before, they were also limited on their time and materials. With many failed attempts our students managed to collaborative design innovating creations which, once tested, not only gave the students the highest points for schools that day, they were the highest point scorers for the week with scores much higher than the university team had seen before.

As a result, the school has been proudly awarded a Cuberider prize which is a program written by leading scientists and astrophysicists. This is a massive STEM opportunity for the school which will kick off next week as 13 of these students, who have decided to dedicate their Friday afternoons, will begin the two-term program resulting in the design of an experiment which is to be sent to and conducted on the International Space Station.

Both the challenge and the program give students the opportunity to engage with higher order problem solving and develop skills which are necessary in the modern-day workforce. All students involved should be as incredibly proud of themselves as everyone here at St Paul's is of them. Their continued achievements will be long remembered.

Are you good at Maths but feel related jobs are boring!?

You would be surprised at where maths can take you in a career!

The "Careers with Stem" website www.careerswithstem.com.au point out 6 areas that might surprise you.

1. Algebra in animation - Uni-level algebra, trigonometry, geometry, calculus I and II, linear algebra. Animators use applied maths to find unknowns from a simple set of equations. You need linear algebra for major actions, like rotating and shifting objects, as well as changing their size.

Jobs at - Disney and Pixar. Also, TV programming, game development, internet animation, advertising, research, educating training (across all sorts of fields).

2. Stats in forensic science - Uni-level algebra, trigonometry, geometry, calculus I and II, statistics.

Yes, just like on TV, bloodstain analysis can reveal important details about violent crimes. And its math's that enables forensic analysts to work out those details.

<u>Jobs at</u> - Too many places to list — but they include police, shops, government departments, legal firms and insurance agencies.

3. Geometry in fashion - A good grasp of high school algebra and geometry. Most courses in fashion design won't have specific requirements but being comfortable with the maths makes it a whole lot easier. Creating patterns from designs takes math's — and so does making a range of sizes, working fabric requirements and costing garments (how much they'll cost to make and how much you need to sell them for).

Jobs at - Fashion stores, designer studios, museum displays.

4. High-level math's in AI - Uni-level algebra, linear algebra, trigonometry, statistics and calculus. Machine learning is setting up computer systems to 'learn' (get better at things) by using data instead of having to be programmed for each task and much of math's is essential to the development of better AI (artificial intelligence).

Jobs at - Tech companies, car manufacturers, law offices, health, and anywhere else that would benefit from their systems being able to learn from data.

5. Social media and algorithms - complex network theory, graph structure, nodes, clusters, power-law, weakly-connected

component (WCC), degree distributions, scale-free network, eccentricity. You know how your favourite social media 'remembers' what you've liked before and 'suggests' stuff, or decides what you see when? Well, that's done with algorithms, which are all maths. **Jobs at** - Social media companies (big and small). Also, potentially anywhere that uses social media for brand and marketing purposes.

6. Data and doing good - Data analysis, statistics

International aid organisations rely on maths to work out how and where to do the most good. When there's a limited amount of money to share around, this is super important.

<u>Jobs at</u> - Aid agencies and government foreign affairs departments.

1. Rationale

With the increase in students carrying and using Personal Technology Devices, predominately mobile phones at school, it was deemed desirable and necessary for St Paul's Catholic College to have a specific policy that addressed the use of such devices in classrooms and during school operating hours. A survey was conducted of staff to gather information about whether personal technology devices, specifically mobile phone use, was an issue within classrooms, whether a clearer set of expectations and guidelines was necessary at St Paul's around student use of personal technology devices and whether a whole school approach that followed a "phone (personal technology device) in bag" policy during class time would be supported by staff. A whole school approach and commitment to this policy is required, whereby, staff, students and parents are clear on and agree to follow the policy and procedures outlined below.

2. AIM

- 2.1 To maximise student learning experiences in class.
- 2.2 To provide opportunities for students to experience and develop quality interpersonal relationship skills.
- 2.3 To address the concerns that students are developing addictions around the use of personal technology devices.
- 2.4 To develop an awareness in all students that respect for others in their learning environment is paramount.
- 2.4 To encourage responsible use of personal technology devices.
- 2.5 To avoid the classroom interruptions and behavioural issues that are caused by personal technology devices.
- 2.6 To set social etiquette standards around the use of personal technology devices.
- 2.7 To provide a consistency in policy and procedure across the school that is clearly understood, agreed upon and followed by staff, students and parents.

3. Rights and Responsibilities

Students, Staff and Parents are to adhere to the following expectations about and around the use of Personal Technology Devices

Students

- 3.1 Students have the right to own and carry Personal Technology Devices (PTD) to school.
- 3.2 Students must, at all times, during class time, transition between classes, whole school and sport assemblies, liturgies, study periods, going to the bathroom, have their personal technology devices turned off and securely held IN THEIR BAG.
- 3.3 Students, at times, will be allowed to use their PTD's for educational purpose only. These times will be at the invitation, discretion and supervision of the classroom teacher at the time. Educational purposes include activities such as: calculator use, searching for the definition of a word, taking a photo of work that cannot be completed, filming for classroom tasks, when computer devices are not operational, for engagement with APPS such as Kahoot for educational purposes.
- 3.4 If students are using their PTD's to collect information, record or film other students for educational projects or purposes, once the project has been completed and submitted, all data collected MUST be deleted. This data is NOT, under any circumstances, to be uploaded to any social media sites at any time or shared/forwarded to other students for reasons other than educational purposes. St Paul's Catholic College Cyber Agreement must be followed at all times.
- 3.5 Students are not to take photos/film or sound recordings of staff or students without the express permission of the staff member or student as outlined in the Cyber Agreement code of conduct.
- 3.6 Students have sole responsibility for their PTD's. The school will not accept any responsibility for the damage caused to individual PTD's.
- 3.7 Students are not permitted to carry their PTD's (this includes Apple Watches) into formal examinations. PTD's, during these times, must be turned off and either secured in the student's bag or left with the exam supervisor who will, in turn, take to the office for the duration of the exam. Devices can then be collected at the end of the examination from student administration or a designated teacher.
- 3.8 PTD's are not to be used in senior study lessons.
- 3.9 Students must not use their PTD's to directly contact parents if they are sick, injured or distressed. Students MUST notify a teacher, who will take the necessary care of the student. The student will be escorted to the office where contact will be made with the parent or guardian.
- 3.10 Students are not to make arrangements to leave school, via a phone call or message, without the direct knowledge of a member of staff or office administration.
- 3.11 On school-based field trips students are to adhere to the specific instructions from the supervising teachers on the day about the use of PTD's. Students are encouraged, however, to limit the use of their PTD's on such days and to socialise and develop their interpersonal relationships during these times.

3.12 If criminal activity is suspected around the misuse of PTD's, the matter will be referred to police.

Staff

- 3.13 Staff are to model the expectations St Paul's has for their students around the use of PTD's in particular mobile phone usage.
- 3.14 Staff have the right to teach and instruct in a classroom environment which is not interrupted by discipline issues caused by the use of PTD's.
- 3.15 Staff have the discretion to provide permission to their classes or individuals to use a PTD for educational purposes.
- 3.16 Staff who have been informed that a student is sick or distressed, are to allow students to go to the office area where parents will be notified. In the case of illness, the Office Administration Staff will provide the necessary first aid and call a parent/guardian to collect their child. In the case of a child being distressed, the necessary care of that child will take place, in consultation with the relevant Student Coordinator, Leader of Pedagogy, Assistant Principal (Community Wellbeing and/or Teaching and Learning) and/or the Principal. The parents will be notified by a staff member or an office administrator.
- 3.17 If a student is found to be in use of a PTD device during class time, the teacher is to instruct the student that the PTD will be confiscated for the rest of the day. The teacher is to place the PTD in an envelope and label it with the student's name, time/lesson it was confiscated and the name of the teacher who confiscated the PTD. The PDT is to be handed in at Student Administration for storage and collected at the end of the school day(3.10pm). A register of students, whose PTD's are confiscated, will be kept. Repeated misuse will be recorded on Sentral and addressed by LoP's/Student Coordinators/APCW. If a blatant disregard for this policy continues, the student will be banned from carrying any PTD device to school. Parents will be notified of this decision.
- 3.18 If students are belligerent or defiant in complying with the school's policy regarding PTD's the student will be banned from carrying that device to school and parents will be notified.
- 3.19 If criminal activity is suspected around the misuse of a PTD, the matter will be referred to police.

Parents

- 3.20 Are asked to support the college in its attempt to provide classroom environments conducive to maximum learning opportunities.
- 3.21 Are asked NOT to contact their children via any PTD's during class time. Parents are advised to ring the office if contact needs to be made with the child during class time.
- 3.22 If parents need to collect their child/children at any time during the school day, parents MUST contact the school's office so that students can be called from class and the classroom teacher informed of the student's whereabouts.
- 3.23 Are to be aware that if material found on a student's PTD is suspected to be related to criminal activity, the criminal investigation will be conducted by police over which the College will have no control.

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Evaluation

Evaluation of this policy needs to be ongoing. With the constant improvement and changes in PTD's and the constant changes in the educational environment staff, student and parent needs will be considered.

Definitions

Personal Technology Device (PTD): includes any Personal Mobile Phone/Personal Communication Device (including Apple Watches) belonging to a student of the College used for the purpose of voice, video, photo or text messages as well as music, gaming, social media and other applications.

The Assistant Principal Community Wellbeing and Teaching and Learning will become involved where a student persistently ignores the mobile phone policy. They will work with the relevant Coordinator and discuss the issue and relevant aggravating and mitigating factors of the student's actions.

The Student Coordinator/Leaders of Pedagogy will follow up instances of refusal to hand over a device or repeated misuse. They will investigate the issue and liaise with the relevant students and their families.

The College Executive (Principal, Assistant Principals, Ministry Coordinator, Administration Coordinator, Elected Staff Representatives) will advise the Principal where relevant on student matters and initiatives

The Principal is responsible for communicating, administering and managing this policy with staff, students and families. The Principal will review the information from the Assistant Principal (or College Executive where relevant) will promote initiatives that promote the pastoral care and wellbeing of students at St Paul's Catholic College.
