To the Families and Friends of the St Paul's Community.....

This is the last newsletter of the term. It seems that the years go past so quickly the older we get! For Year 12, they are formally half way through their HSC Studies. This midpoint is the ideal time for them to reassess their work and plan for how they will complete their courses for the best possible outcomes. For students with major works, this next term break will be the ideal opportunity to get well ahead of the game. By doing this, students will be able to focus clearly during Term 2 particularly in the lead-up to the HSC Trials.

Year 11 are now a third of the way through their course of study. Year 11 is about setting good foundations with study, work ethic and goal setting. It is an opportunity to take educational risk with their work, trying different approaches and seeing what works best for their own learning style. It is about ensuring that they set good habits that will make the HSC study much more reasonable and achievable. As the old Army Drill Sergeant said.... "It is about the 6 'P's', *Prior Planning and Preparation Prevents Poor Performance.*"

In the news recently there was an item about the role of the eSafety Commissioner in regard to the online world. I have included a short article from the website that might prove useful when you are discussing the online world with your children. The website is: <https://www.esafety.gov.au/>

Teenagers (13 to 17)

Teenagers can spend a lot of time online — instant messaging, sharing photos and videos, playing online games and using online chat and voice chat through social media services can be a big part of their social identity.

It can be a great experience but there are risks. You can help equip them with the skills to manage these risks and deal with negative situations.

For teenagers, it is important to:

- *Keep things open. Have an 'open door' policy when devices are used in bedrooms, and check in with them regularly to see what they are viewing.*
- *Stay engaged. Ask about their online experiences, who they are talking to online and whether they are having any issues.*
- *Reinforce the importance of protecting their personal information and privacy. Remind them to create screen names or IDs that do not indicate gender, age, name or location and are not sexually suggestive.*
- *Equip them to use social media responsibly. Terms of use for each service cover the rules for using the site, the type of content that can be posted and any age requirements. Go through these with your child to make sure they understand what is expected of them.*
- *Explain that linking social media accounts can make it easier for strangers to learn about them, so it is best to keep accounts separate.*
- *Encourage them to think before they post. They should ask questions like: Who might see this? Could it be misread by others? Am I creating the right image for myself socially and for school and work opportunities?*
- *Remind them that they could expose themselves to risk by sharing sexually suggestive or intimate images of themselves or others. Check out our advice (eSafety Commissioner web site) on **sending nudes and sexting.***
- *Keep building self-respect, empathy and resilience. In particular, be aware of the impact of social media on self-esteem.*

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Continue to review your rules as your child grows older:

- Be clear about where and when devices can be used — not at mealtimes, for example, or not until after chores or homework are done.
- Agree on a plan that fits into family routines — perhaps more screen time on the weekend when they have less schoolwork.
- Refer to our advice ([eSafety Commissioner web site](#)) about **time online** and **online gaming** if these are of concern.

Technology tips for parents of teenagers:

- Use parental controls appropriately for the age and experience of your child.
- As they grow more independent and resilient, good open communication becomes more important than blocking or filtering content — realistically your teenager will become increasingly adept at getting around such parental controls anyway.

I have spoken to the students at a recent assembly about the need to continue to work hard right up to the end of the term. Many students have Assessment Tasks in the next week and a half and we are conducting PAT testing for Year 7 to 10 in the final week. We will also be conducting our Easter Lenten Liturgy on Wednesday 10 April.

Over the holidays, the College will be present at the Teralba Dawn Service for ANZAC Day and the Main Service at Toronto. It is hoped that we get as many students as possible at these events (in full school uniform). ANZAC Day is a very important day for all Australians and New Zealanders. Last year, I was able to attend the Centenary ANZAC Dawn Service at Villers Bretonneux in Northern France. This year, by chance, my wife and I will be in Christchurch NZ for the ANZAC Ceremony. Given the awful events in Christchurch last month, I hope that I am able to pay my respects to the people of Christchurch, particularly to the Muslim community who we would have been in conflict with at Gallipoli all those years ago. I would like to end with the beautiful words of Mustafa Kemal Atatürk, leader of the Ottoman Empire in a message to the mothers of the ANZAC soldiers killed, that he gave in an address in 1934.

“Those heroes that shed their blood and lost their lives ... You are now lying in the soil of a friendly country. Therefore rest in peace. There is no difference between the Johnnies and the Mehmets to us where they lie side by side here in this country of ours ... You, the mothers who sent their sons from faraway countries, wipe away your tears; your sons are now lying in our bosom and are in peace. After having lost their lives on this land they have become our sons as well.”

Testing - Why do we do it?

This was the question I addressed with staff and students at our recent assembly and below are some of the answers I put forward:

- 1 The government and our system requires us to complete tests such as NAPLAN and National Minimum Standard. This helps governments and systems to plan budgets, to set programs and interventions in place, to gain a picture of Australia's standing in terms of literacy and numeracy amongst other nations. These tests are also tools for individual schools to assess what they are doing well and areas that need addressing.
- 2 Secondly, as teachers we gain a great deal of information about students in our classes – literacy skills such as writing, reading, spelling, punctuation and comprehension – and we can use this information to add support and to enrich the learning experiences of our students. It is vital that we pick up those students who are struggling and those who need extension so that all students can achieve their best.
- 3 It allows us to know if we are doing a good job as teachers – we can see where we have had successes or failures – if we need to re-teach or move forward in our delivery of the curriculum. An example of this would be in the 2018 NAPLAN data which showed significant improvement and growth in literacy skills in our Year 9 students (now Year 10)– with writing in particular, showing extensive growth. This encourages us to continue with our strategic planning for the teaching of writing.

In the second part of my address to the assembly I outlined a few testing windows that are coming up over the next two months:

NAPLAN – Online Trials have just been completed – thanks to Year 7 & 9 students for their patience and effort in the NAPLAN Online exams. We will sit the actual NAPLAN tests across Weeks 3&4 of Term 2. We will also be taking some time to look at these tests in class and work together on some preparation.

PAT TESTING –

Another set of tests is coming up in Week 11 for all students in Year 7-10. These are called PAT assessments.

During **Week 11 Monday 8th & Tuesday 9th April** all students from Years 7-10 will be completing two online PAT (Progressive Achievement Test) Assessments – in Reading and Mathematics. Each assessment will take approx. 40 mins to complete and will take place within the classroom. Students will complete in their own class time.

As students from both Primary and Secondary schools (to Year 10) across the Maitland Newcastle Diocese now participate in annual PAT Assessments, we are able to collect informative, ongoing data to inform on student progress. We can build up a picture of each student across both primary and high school years.

The data collected from the assessment will provide the school with comprehensive reports detailing the current Reading and Mathematical skills that individual students/year groups have consolidated and will guide future teaching and learning practice. The tests are tailored to students and it is important that students just do their best – these tests are for diagnostic purposes and they are not reported on in any way.

NESA National Minimum Standards Tests (NMS)

These tests were introduced in 2018 by NESA based on the belief that all future citizens need reading, writing and maths skills to be successful in everyday life after school. All students are required to show a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy to receive the Higher School Certificate (HSC) from 2020. To check students have the basics skills, students need to sit short online tests of reading, writing and maths for everyday life. Students get two chances a year to pass each of the tests from Year 10 until a few years after the HSC.

The NMS tests are being held for Year 10 (and some Year 11 students) in Week 3 Term 2 at St Paul's. As a school we will support all students through this process. Once all students pass the online tests of basic reading, writing and numeracy skills they will have met the HSC minimum standard.

I am urging **ALL Year 10 students to attend NEXT Monday's Information Evening** where the **Year 11 Subject Selection Process** will be explained. We will also address the **National Minimum Standards testing** and take a look at the **Record of School Achievement (or ROSA)**.

So, why am I telling you about these tests? I am doing so because I want to encourage all students & families/carers to check emails regularly and to read all newsletters and letters sent home. I also ask that students remember that at St Paul's we just want students to **do their best and to be respectful of the process** and the right of every student to have the best opportunity for success. Quiet, polite and cooperative behaviour will allow this to occur – working with teachers, supporting peers and letting us know of any worries or questions you may have.

Finally, I remind all students of the need to communicate with teachers regarding absences, non-submissions and extensions for assignments. Please keep talking to teachers, LoPs and Student Coordinators – we are here to support you and help you navigate your way through the testing and assessment periods.

Parents Role in the career development of young people?



Evidence indicates that parents are the single greatest influence on their child's education and career decisions. The *Face-to-Face* report produced in 2016 by the National Youth Agency in England identified parents and carers as the most common first point of call for career development information, advice and

guidance for young people. Other research similarly points to the important role of parents in the career development of their children, especially in the early stages rather than in the later stages of their education (Watson and McMahon, 2003).



Generally, parental engagement in career development occurs around subject and course selections and at crunch times in the later years of education, with a focus on information provision. Given the rapid changes in the world of work through globalisation and technology and the subsequent paradigm shift in career development, this is no longer sufficient. There is also mounting evidence that links improved student motivation, retention, achievement and career outcomes with parental involvement in young people's learning. Career development now needs to focus not on job acquisition, but on the acquisition of skills, knowledge, attitudes, behaviours and competencies for continuous learning and improvement. The role of parents cannot be underestimated and is vital in supporting the career development of young people.



Work Ready Certificate Year 10 2019

It has been decided that Work Ready Day will not be run over one full day this year, but delivered over a 3 week Period within existing Careers Classes for Yr.10. This will mean that nobody in Year 10 will miss out on being Work Ready this year. Also it means it can be delivered in a more meaningful context with minimal disruptions to normal lessons. The course will cover the following:

- ◆ What Employers are looking for?
- ◆ That Job Interview
- ◆ OHS in the Workplace
- ◆ Employer Expectations
- ◆ Harassment in the Workplace

This day is essentially for Year 10 students who may be interested in work experience this year or for students thinking of choosing VET subject or A TAFE EVET COURSE in Yr. 11- 2020. The Work Ready Program also enables insurance cover to be validated.

A Career in Forensic Science



The [Australian and New Zealand Policing Advisory Agency \(ANZPAA\)](#) states that *forensic science (or forensics)* is the use or application of a broad spectrum of sciences in court or during legal proceedings. *Forensic science is not a discipline or branch of science but is a catch-all for many distinct disciplines that may be used to help in the determination of a court case, either civil or criminal.*

While forensic science is often seen as focusing exclusively on law enforcement, forensic science can be applied in many areas of the community and industry where the skills of a scientist need to be applied to a problem and the outcome may be presented in a court of law. However, forensic or investigative scientists are also used by private laboratories and insurance companies.

There are various [forensic science disciplines](#) –

- ◆ **Field Science** – where crime scene investigation is priority
- ◆ **Laboratory Services** – activities include chemistry, biology, toxicology, illicit drug, document, marks, impressions analysis and computer crime
- ◆ **Forensic Medicine** – includes pathology, psychiatry, psychology, forensic medicine, mortuary services, odontology, anthropology, and entomology
- ◆ **Digital Evidence** – includes computer forensics, audio video analysis, speaker, and face comparison.

Forensic science is a fascinating and rewarding career where the love of science can be applied to the good of society, public health, and public safety.

To become a Forensic Scientist, a good degree in science or medicine is essential. There are a number of specific undergraduate and post-graduate programs in forensic science available in Australia.

The National Forensic Science Technology Centre (USA) provides an excellent overview of many of the topics associated with forensic science, and students are encouraged to browse - [A Simple Guide to Forensic Science](#).



Course Cost: \$250 (scholarships are available for those in financial need)




