Dear Parents and Caregivers,

This newsletter article will be somewhat shorter than the usual ones that I write. You would be aware from the two recent letters that I have written to you in the last few weeks (one of them to parents of Year 9 and Year 7) that we have been facing a number of challenging issues. I will not be directly commenting on one of them in this forum but be assured that we are working tirelessly to address them for the betterment of all.

NAPLAN has continued to be problematic. We hope to complete the testing cycle this week. Sources have indicated that the issues we faced (like so many schools across the nation) have been resolved for the better. We will continue to monitor the situation and we will keep you informed (Year 7 and Year 9 families) as to the outcomes of the issues once we have been informed by NESA and ACARA. Our frustration is shared by schools and families across Australia. We have reported our issues to the appropriate authorities as well as professional organisations that support schools, teachers and principals both nationally and within NSW. These professional bodies work with NESA, ACARA and the state and federal governments on all matters concerning education. I was particularly pleased that a number of state Education ministers are now calling for a proper review of NAPLAN so hopefully out of the chaos, some good will come. I would particularly like to pay credit to Mr Mark Newell and Mrs Anne-Maree Shipman for the amazing work done on NAPLAN this year. It is an organisational jigsaw puzzle when it goes well – when is goes pear shaped, it was their work with a large number of teachers and support staff who worked tirelessly to keep things on a semi-level keel!

The Year 10 Challenge Camp concluded last week. The feedback we have received from a number of families was very positive and it is clear that a great deal of our students gained much from their time away. Sadly a few of our young men and women struggled to engage appropriately and were less than positive ambassadors for the college. It seems that despite warnings, conversations and discussions, sometimes adolescents still believe that they have the right to be selfish and inappropriate. They fail to realise that so

much extra is provided to them by willing staff who go above and beyond for their development. In saying that, it is clear that the vast majority get it and they are the ones that will continue to grow and be successful as they mature into adulthood. Thank you to Ms Guest and her staff who did an amazing job in preparing, organising and conducting the Challenge Camp.

Next week we will be visited by Christine Anu who will be performing for the College and will be engaging with our students about her amazing life and her journey as an indigenous woman in Australia. This event has been organised by Astro Stewart our Aboriginal Liaison Officer and Sarah Adams our Leader of Learning – CAPA. These events are seldom held in the busyness of school life and we are so fortunate that we are able to host one of Australia's most celebrated performers. I know that our young men and women will gain much from this special event.

NAPLAN

As you are aware, last week during NAPLAN Testing there were a significant number of issues experienced by not only our students but throughout all Australian schools. We, as a College, made a decision to postpone the testing until connectivity issues were resolved. This decision was supported by the Maitland Newcastle Catholic Schools Office and NESA – the NSW Education Standards Authority - who conduct the NAPLAN Testing for ACARA.

We are now in a position to recommence our testing and have rescheduled NAPLAN tests to the following dates:

Wednesday 22 May

Year 7 Periods 1-2 Rooms A1-5, A11-12 in their English class groupings

Year 9 Periods 4-5 Rooms D1-6, D9 in their HSIE class groupings

Thursday 23 May - Numeracy tests

Year 7 Periods 1-2 Rooms A1-5 Rooms A1-5, A11-12 in their English class groupings

"This rigorously academic course is consistently challenging, however, very rewarding." Sara, Eloise, Georgia, and Keasha.



Year 12 Advanced English studies of "The Craft of Writing"

As part of our Year 12 Advanced English studies of "The Craft of Writing", we were asked to write a poem or creative piece based on this picture of a wave. These poems were composed primarily of quotes/sentences taken from our other writings as a class in various forms (imaginative, informative, discursive & persuasive) based on this same picture. We were then asked to choose someone else's creative piece and write about why we thought it belonged in an anthology of work titled 'Making Waves'. Some of our responses to both tasks are featured here.

"Beneath the Waves"

The water rushes over my head, a writhing, tumbling mass of white and blue that crashes to shore and drags away sand in its tens and thousands.

I do not feel the full force of the wave, the softer underwater current sends me spinning and dancing through the patchy, disjointed sunlight.

Specks of sand, dust and fish hang suspended in the fading light, drifting downwards in the momentary peace.

The warm sun heats my cold face as I stretch upwards toward it. There are others beside me. They too reach for the sun, though they know that only the strongest will make it.

The sea draws back, gathering strength for its next assault and I watch impassively as it crashes against the shore, fruitless and tedious.

Something larger travels through the frigid depths, fins spiralling with savage grace.

The fish scatter, hiding behind me as if they had not already been spotted.

Perhaps if they stay together some may survive the deadly game of cat and mouse.

I do not care if they live or die, their lives are fleeting as is mine.

And what would seaweed care about the affairs of fish?

"Oceanus Procellarum"

Uncompromising and unknown,
The punishing waves curdle upwards.

Cascading continuously,
Thriving in their enormity.

The wrath of the current sends me spinning,

Thrown overboard and left for dead.

We should let the ocean consume us,

Reattach broken memories.

"Stranded"

Cascading continuously,

Punishing waves curdle upwards.

There's no grace, but only wrath and tempest.

It's uncompromising and unknownalthough others thrive on its enormity.

Like a salty assailant playing them, they are tumultuous with anger.

Ready to consume us, they will leave us stranded and left for dead.

The choice is easy as far as I can see. You have to pick "Oceanus Procellarum" for your anthology. This short, yet impactful piece appeals to the stark reality that is the enormity of our ocean – a mysterious, natural phenomenon that to many is "uncompromising and unknown". The resonating realism impacts responders through the poem's ability to seamlessly present the inherent, impermanent reality of humanity. The ocean, which "cascades continuously" thrives in its "enormity" therefore undermines humanity and its elitist prejudice – an assumed existence that transcends above all other forms of the natural world. The poem repositions and challenges this view in its subtle development of a belittlement of humanity compared to the wrath of the ocean; indisputably the ruler over earth. Further appeal comes from the mysterious, yet brutal portrayal of the ocean in its ability to "consume us" and "throw overboard". Finally, the poem indirectly encourages contemporary responders to of a higher level of thought, rethinking their view on Mother Nature and her plan for humanity.

The choice is undoubtedly obvious as far as I can see. "Beneath the Waves" is a fantastic descriptive piece written about the ocean and needs to be a part of your anthology. The author has written from a perspective beneath the waves, as seaweed. They describe the ocean's uncompromising power. The final line of the poem, "and what would seaweed care about the affairs of fish", is a rhetorical question that allows the audience to encompass a clearer understanding of the earlier, "I do not care if they live or die, their lives are fleeting as mine." Here the author clearly explains nature's fragility regardless of humanity's environmental impacts.

You have to pick "Stranded" for your anthology, 'Making Waves'!

The description of the power and purity of nature is shown throughout the poem and the choice of adjectives are perfect!

The personification as they 'tumult with anger' describes how environmentalists feel when the ocean is used as a rubbish dump. These emotions highlight how some readers feel and open the minds of others. 'Ready to consume us' creates a fear in the reader which is needed as the ocean is scared because of how it is being treated by humans.

Using this poem in your anthology would not only highlight the issue of climate change but also put issues of the ocean's wildlife and purity in the forefront of the reader's mind.

The choice is easy as far as I can see. You have to pick "Beneath the Waves" for your anthology 'Making Waves'! The key ideas explored juxtapose the 'tumbling mass' and enormity of the sea to the 'softer underwater current' the author experiences while immersed in the ocean. The text begins with the immediate feeling the water brings to the author followed by the brutality of its reality; 'the water rushes over my head ... that crashes to shore and drags away sand in its tens and thousands'. By concluding the text with a rhetorical question 'what would seaweed care about the affair of fish?' the author aims to engage and connect the reader with their own personal philosophies of the ocean.

The choice is easy as far as I can see. You must pick 'Beneath the Waves', for your anthology! The descriptive exploration of the "tumbling mass of white and blue" that "drags away sand in its tens and thousands" provokes such beautiful vivid imagery, that contradicts the reader's preconceived idea of the ocean's strength being dangerous. In addition, the simplistic way in which the persona is written to ponder upon whether the fish may "survive the deadly game of cat and mouse" is thought-provoking and influential too in the way that the contents of the ocean may be viewed by the reader. The piece conveys a message of calmness and mystery, and I believe its addition to 'Making Waves' would most definitely be of benefit

"Beneath the Waves" would be your best choice for your anthology, "Making Waves". I like the how the poem is told from a piece of seaweed's perspective. The juxtaposition of "the warm sun heats my cold face as I stretch upwards toward it" highlights and mirrors the ups and downs that the seaweed faces within the poem during its time within the ocean. This idea is also suggested in the rhetorical question "and what would seaweed care about the affairs of fish?" which implies that the seaweed only sees itself as an object.

I do advise you to select "Oceanus Procellarum" as a part of your anthology. The message of the piece is obviously that the ocean is stronger than the will of man, and that the strength and force of the waves is enough to destroy us if we're not careful.

This is similar to Greta Thunburg and Bill and Melinda Gates' messages of climate change and pollution and how this will destroy our future as we are so far. "Oceanus Procellarum" can be used to further explore and express the strong environmentalist view of our treatment of the earth and would fit alongside a factual piece highlighting how desperately we need to change our future.

The poet paints the image of an enormous swell, enough to kill a man, by throwing him overboard, "left for dead". The power of this piece is delivered through the description of the waves as "uncompromising" and "unknown". This piece would emphasise the true forces of nature, therefore making it a strong contender due to the strong resonance of the destruction can be easily connected to the theme. Overall, the piece is incredibly moving and emotive, as it has the power to take a reader to the ocean, to recall forgotten and fragmented memories, to destroy precious lives. I believe this death of men is a reflection of the destruction of the ocean and its creatures, showing how we should be fearful and urgent in our response.



Christine Anu – In Conversation and Song








France Germany 2020 Update!!

France Germany Tour 2020 Information Evening, Thursday, 30th of May at 6pm

- The tour is open to students who will be in Yr 9, 10, 11 or 12 in 2020
- Parents are invited to attend with their children
- The tour is designed to cater to Language and Creative Arts students but all are welcome to come along
- The price cannot be finalised until we have final numbers
- The price does not include travel insurance
- You will not miss any school days as it falls in the holidays
- We visit galleries, historical sites, theme parks, go on river cruises and open bus tours, and yes, you will be given a chance to shop.
- We can no longer fly into Berlin due to the dramatic increase in costing, so we will fly into Frankfurt as originally planned

In this initial stage of planning, the Tour is proposed to depart in **April 2020 and will be for a total of 18 days.** We are currently working with GET Tours to finalise the prices, however, at this stage we believe the trip will cost approximately \$6300 to \$6500 (excluding spending money, some meals and travel insurance). The more students, the cheaper the cost MAY be.

As mentioned we will be holding an **Information Evening on the 30**th **of May,** this will be a chance for parents to ask any questions they may have. A representative from GET Tours will be at the Information Evening to run us through the tour, provide a detailed summary of our tailored itinerary for 2020 (including the addition of Disneyland!) and to discuss near final costing. If you are considering attending, it is important that you attend this meeting to submit **an Expression of Interest** so that we can gauge numbers and the determine validity of continuing to plan the tour. The Expression of Interest Form is attached below, this can be returned to Student Services if you wish to submit it early. We need a minimum of 18 people for the Tour to run. Shortly after this, a deposit will be called for in order to secure a place on the trip.




