Next week, I will be speaking to the Year 12 group about their final weeks at St Paul's. It is a wonderful time for our young men and women and a time of celebration for the staff as they finish courses, complete revision and enjoy the last formal lessons that will mark the end of each course.

For our students, it is also a time of reflection and for some, a time of trepidation. Thirteen years of formal, school based education is a significant time in their young lives. As they finish the year, they will reflect on the good times and the not so good times that schooling has brought. Some might be able to remember their first day at school. The tears from mum as they donned that little uniform and marched into kinder, no longer completely joined to the family unit but now exploring the big world. Others will remember significant events such as successes in sports carnivals, debating competitions, eisteddfods and concerts. Still others will remember fondly friends who have gone to other places.

For staff, it is also a time of reflection. It is a time where we remember the fun events, the retreats, the amazing lessons, the "light-bulb" moments in class, the surprising essay answer and the great relationships that have been formed in the years that Year 12 have been at St Paul's.

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I discussed some of the areas where our young men and women will need to be mindful, particularly as they finish their time at the campus. We want all of them to finish well, to celebrate their time openly, honestly and with dignity. However, it would be neglectful of me if I didn't point out some of the pitfalls that can happen when young people get together and make foolish choices.

Earlier in the term, we sent out a letter to all Year 12 families outlining expectations we have at the end of the term. As well it listed the events that will mark the successful end to Year 12, beautiful events that will showcase our students.

In that letter, it was made clear that we do not have "Muck-Up Days" I intend to explain to the students exactly what we mean by that statement. As well, I will speak about such matters as parties, police, drugs and alcohol, uniform, school attendance, work ethic and study vacation.

At this time of the year, it is obvious to us adults that there will be more than the usual number of young people on the roads going to and from social events. This is certainly known to the Police. I will say to our students to be very mindful of that reality. At this time of the year, there is always a heightened police presence on the roads, particularly around schools. They will be there to protect other road users and our young drivers from making foolish decisions. In my experience, there will be one or two students booked near the school in the mornings or afternoons particularly around this time. I ask our students to be mindful of this and to make sure that they make good decisions as they drive to and from school.

End of year parties are a real issue for mums and dads as well as the Police. If you, as a parent, intend to host such a gathering, I strongly suggest that you visit the following website:

One of the main things that I will convey to Year 12 is the hope that they are all able to finish their time at St Paul's with dignity. The work being done by staff to help prepare them for their HSC as well as the massive work done to prepare and host the beautiful Graduation Ceremonies and events should give the students a real indication of the esteem that they are held in by the staff. In saying that, it is possible that some of our young people for whatever reason might think it a good idea to do something that will, in the short term, make a "mark" in their name. I have, in the past had a situation where a young person, who had been a model student throughout the time he was at school, decided to do something very foolish on the last day. As a result, he was unable to attend Graduation and the Final Dinner. As well, the significant award that he was to receive was not presented to him publicly. I will never forget the tears from mum and the boy as we sat in the Principal's office.

We want all our students to end the year well, to celebrate appropriately and to leave this wonderful place with dignity and pride. We want them to stay safe, to look after each other and to celebrate with family and friends in a gentle, special way. My final message to the students will be to look after one another; making sure that each and every one of them help with good decision making and guide one another through the last few weeks of formal schooling and continue to work hard up to the final exam period.

We look forward to the final week where we will celebrate with you all in the St Paul's Hall with the final Mass on Wednesday 25th September and the Graduation Ceremony the following morning.

Thank you again to all in the way the community has allowed me to begin my short time with the college as we move to celebrate the great successes of the year 12 Group.

Assistant Principal - Teaching & Learning

These past few weeks have seen a number of activities taking place in the area of Gifted Education as we prepare for 2020 and our role as a Gifted Education Lead school in the Lakes Region. In Week 5 our Middle Leaders met with Mrs Lauren McCafferty, our Gifted Education Mentor, and undertook some professional learning in relation to giftedness, assessment and identification of gifted children in our school. Following this, all students in Years 7 & 8 were assessed using the ACER COGAT tool, with results expected to be in at school over the coming weeks. This was the first step of the process in identifying our gifted students.

On Tuesday 27 August the teaching staff were involved in a professional learning meeting where Lauren again worked with staff on developing an understanding about the nature of giftedness and how this can be assessed. In future weeks our focus will shift towards pedagogy and differentiation in the classroom to cater for those students requiring our support and extension within our classrooms. This is an exciting time for St Paul's and we are looking forward to continuing our journey in this area.

Other areas of focus for us currently are the finalisation of subject selections for Years 8 & 10 students, the preparation of exams for Year 11 (commencing 9 September) and completion of Year 12 assessment and marks for HSC completion. In relation to subject selections and timetabling, students will receive a letter confirming their 2020 subjects once we can ensure staffing and viability of all subjects. Year 10 students and families will receive communication early in Term 4 regarding the final part of the Senior Enrolment process and the final weeks of Year 10.

Finally, to Year 11 students, I wish them every success in their upcoming exams and remind them of the expectations for Weeks 8 & 9, as outlined below.

Student Instructions for Stage 6 Examinations

- Students need only be at school when examinations are on. Misreading of the exam timetable will not be an acceptable excuse for being late or missing an exam.
- Students should ensure that they arrive at least 15 minutes before the commencement time for their scheduled exam, and remain until the exam's conclusion.
- Students attending school outside of exam times are expected to use the Library facility for private study
 where the Library is available. Students must SIGN IN at the library when on campus and are NOT
 permitted to be on any other part of the school grounds.
- Students are NOT Permitted to leave the school grounds after an exam finishes and then return again.
- Ensure that you have all necessary equipment required for each of your exams.
- Malpractice or cheating will result in serious consequences including the awarding of a zero mark.
 Behaviour in an exam is based on complete cooperation with supervising staff and respect for rights of other students in the room.
- Students missing an examination for any reason must ensure that the Absence, Illness, Misadventure Procedures are carried out. Notification to the school at the time of the exam, and subsequent completion of the appropriate Absence, Illness, Misadventure forms are mandatory requirements of this procedure.
- Wherever possible "catch-up" examinations should take place during the examination block, when the individual student concerned does not have a scheduled examination. These exams are to be organised with Leaders of Pedagogy or APT&L at the time of submitting the relevant Absence, Illness, Misadventure Procedures Form.
- Normal school uniform is to be respected and worn to examinations.
- ◆ The examination block commences on **Monday 9 September 2019** and concludes on **Thursday 19 September 2019.**

Uniform

Over the last few weeks several students have been issued with afternoon detentions as a result of not wearing the correct items of uniform. It is the College expectation that the correct uniform is always to be worn appropriately. If a student is unable to wear correct uniform on any day, they must bring a note of explanation from their parent or carer. This note needs to be signed by the Tutor Group teacher. This must only be temporary (a day or two.)

If a student receives three uniform infringements, a warning letter will be sent to parents explaining that the fourth uniform infringement will result in the child being issued with an afternoon detention. It is hoped that after three warnings, any or all, uniform issues will be corrected. If assistance is required to meet the uniform expectations, please contact Mrs Shipman.

At times, students have blatantly and intentionally ignored the uniform expectations of the College. It is expected that by agreeing to choose St Paul's as a place of learning that the uniform is always worn correctly and with pride.

Areas of concern have been incorrect shoes, socks and on the cooler days, incorrect jackets.

Additional Uniform Items

There has recently been an addition to junior and senior girls' uniform. Junior girls may now wear grey shorts and senior girls may wear navy shorts as part of the standard uniform. Lowes at Glendale and Verdon Hiles at Toronto are stocking the approved short options for \$39.95-\$49.95. Please note, these approved shorts are the only shorts that are to be worn with the school shirt.

These additional options will give the girls an alternative to the school skirt. It is hoped that by introducing this option, the girls will be encouraged to be more active during break times and allow them to be more comfortable during situations like assemblies. The wonderful models below show that the shorts maintain a high standard of dress for the school. The skirt will remain the primary option however, the short will also enable an alternative to the skirt.

- Draw your own line about what you do and don't like and how you want to be treated.
- What one person thinks is teasing or 'mucking around' and acceptable is not necessarily what another person thinks is ok and students need to reflect on this and how they treat others.
- You WILL get rejected/fail many times in your life (e.g. miss out on a job, relationship break up, get turned down by someone, etc.). How will you deal with it? How will you respond when things don't go your way?
- ◆ There are a range of supports available for students from people at school, including the Year 7 Coordinator (me!), our Pastoral Care Worker and School Counsellors; to online and phone supports such as Kids Helpline (1800 55 1800), www.reachout.com, Apps, such as Headspace, Smiling Minds and Stop, Breathe & Think. There are many more resources available please see me if you would like to know more.
- I finished with two words for Year 7 students to reflect upon. These words were used in the Brainstorm presentation and also by Mr Mulhearn, our College Principal, when addressing the junior students the previous day. These words are Empathy and Respect.

Parents may wish to talk to their child/ren about the performance and what they gained from it.

Today's quote is not from an athlete, but from the Brainstorm Production. It is in reference to the advice given to a character who thought physical conflict or 'mouthing off' were the only responses when he got upset or angry or when things didn't go his way.

The rain pelted little crystal water droplets against my window, the house unusually peaceful. The front door clicked open and someone stumbled into the house, trailed closely by another figure. Yelling ensued, and the harsh noise of my parents fighting reverberated through the house. Suddenly, the noise halted and the silence that followed almost eerie.

I crept towards the stairs and investigated what had happened. Standing at the top I watched the scene unravel before my very eyes. The dastardly noise rang across the room, echoing off the walls. One person was left standing with the other now lying limp on the hard floor. He had snapped and I didn't want to be his next victim. I shuffled back

down the hall. I cautiously looked into all the rooms, looking for places to hide in the enclosed darkness. The shadow cast by the moon in one room caught my eye and caused me to abruptly stop. My mother's orange kimono hung from a coat hanger. It was in pristine condition, embraced by the shadows. My head flooded with painful memories of a better time. I dashed down the hall and back into the security of my room. I crawled under the covers, holding my head in my hands in disbelief.

I cried an ocean that night. My father must have assumed I was asleep and I struggled alone with th tragedy. My brain couldn't comprehend this situation, but I knew that I would have to do something. An idea struck me like lightning, and a plan quietly unfolded from there.

I slipped down the stairs and out the front door, hearing the gentle click as I slipped on my coat almost in a trance. I prayed that my aunt would believe me as my future hinged on this.

Stratford Street is where my aunt lived at the time, located only a block away from my house. Sprinting through the rain as it bombarded my body, I banged on my aunt's front door frantically calling for her help. She answered groggily but when her eyes fell on me, they widened in a mixture of shock and understanding. She quickly ushered me inside. I hastily explained to her my problem. She hurried me into her bedroom and returned with shoes and a jacket.

We arrived at my home swiftly. She swung open the front door of my house and gasped at the crimson pool of blood on the carpet. A shrill scream came as she ventured further into the house.

Sirens blared from outside and my father was escorted out of the house with handcuffs tightened around his wrists. He looked back at me from the police car with sorrow in his eyes. I shook my head and snuggled into my aunt's coat. I asked myself if it was strange to feel no empathy towards him but concluded that it was not.

I had been distracted on one night and my whole life had slipped right through my hands like water. I only returned to that house for my mother's orange kimono, a cherished symbol of her light and love. This memory I would hold onto tightly, that house I would try to forget.






Aspire Holiday Workshops - Year 7 and 8!


The students will continue working on their group and individual performance until the HSC examiners visit St Paul's on 4th September.





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Kenya Experience—Kesheni 2019

Kesheni 2019, an experience that has changed me, for the better! Kesheni means 'stay awake', I did not understand what this really meant until after I came home and reflected on my journey.

We had met as a group prior to leaving for Kenya and we had read Ann Cerreto's book 'I Am Because We Are, Stories of Kibera's Youth, we listened to others who had already experienced Kesheni but still I was unaware of the impact this journey would have on me.

All my family, friends and colleagues wished me a great holiday, but this was far from a holiday, I have never had an experience quite like this and I hope to one day return to Nairobi and the wonderful people I met.

We spent our first few days visiting and learning about The Ruben Centre, which is like a sanctuary in the middle of Mukuru slum. It contains a Health Clinic, HIV clinic, a birthing centre, a day care for infants, the Kurt Fearnley centre for disabled students, a primary school, a counseling service for the students. They also have their own sustainable garden, charcoal making facility, vocational education centre with weaving and sewing classes, a shop (where we purchased many beautiful hand made things to bring home) and a radio station, Ruben FM. After visiting Ruben, I thought, 'what else could we be doing, we have done so much and seen so much wonderful work'. How wrong was I!

The days that followed saw us visiting other wonderful agencies such as Wings of Hope Home (a place for young girls who find themselves pregnant through no fault of their own), Mary Rice Centre for disabled children in Kibera, Women for Women centre and Mother Teresa Home for the Destitute. All these places were so confronting and for some of us, overwhelming.

For me, one of the most powerful and enlightening experiences I had was walking through Kibera slum with my Karibu Youth Leader, Marell, and visiting her home with her. It is impossible to describe this experience, all your senses are assaulted and it is difficult to breathe.

Every corner you turn through this maze of rusty tin you are confronted with more alleyways, more rubbish, more poverty. The slum is the largest in the world, home to more than 2 million people. The homes are simple, some in better condition than others. There is no bathroom in the houses, therefore no toilet, no kitchen, just a small living space and a curtain to separate the sleeping area. I will forever remember this not because of how confronting it was but for the love, sense of community and pride these people have.

The Karibu Youth Camp was a highlight of the trip, seeing the young leaders that have grown up in Kibera, giving up their time to be with the children of Kibera, to give them a day away from the slum, a day of play, to run in the open, play games, work in teams and forget their everyday life. It was amazing.

Of course we got to have some downtime and visited the African markets, Bomas Cultural Centre, a day in Nairobi National Park, a drive to see Rift Valley, Sheldrick's Elephant Orphanage and the Giraffe Manor. Then each night we came home to the Little Daughters of St Joseph's convent where we were staying for a debrief and a wonderful African meal prepared by the nuns.

Now I know what Kesheni really means... 'Stay awake' to what is going on around you, what you see on the surface is so little of what is really out there. Stay connected with your community, work together; for alone you can do little but together you can make a difference. Don't think of yourself as one, but as part of a bigger picture. For the world to be a better place, we need to look after each other and love each other, support those with little and help those with nothing and always remember that love and forgiveness is key to happiness.






















Return and Earn

St Paul's Catholic College launched the Return and Earn program this term with the energetic Mr Davidson introducing our new blue Return and Earn bins and educating our students on what type of containers are able to be collected . By collecting drink containers for Return and Earn we can receive 10c for every eligible container. Our students have been fantastic in depositing their containers and now we need your help. Parents are encouraged to collect eligible containers at home and return them to the Front Office. Funds raised from the Return and Earn program will go back to support purchasing resources for our students.



Which containers can be returned for a refund?

Which containers aren't eligible for a refund?





Most 150ml to three litre drink containers will be eligible for a 10 cent refund at an approved NSW collection point. Container materials that may be eligible for a refund include:

- Glass
- Plastic
- Aluminium
- Steel
- Liquid paperboard (cartons)

Containers should be empty, uncrushed, unbroken and have the original label attached. Wine, spirits, cordial and plain milk containers are generally not

If a container isn't eligible for a refund, please use a recycling bin.


Containers that can't be deposited for a refund include:

- Plain milk (or milk substitute) containers
- Flavoured milk containers of one litre or
- Pure fruit or vegetable juice containers of one litre or more
- Glass containers for wine and spirits
- Casks (plastic bladders in boxes) for wine or water of one litre or more
- Sachets for wine of 250ml or more
- Containers for cordials and concentrated fruit/vegetable juices
- Registered health tonics

The RSA and RCG will be run at school on Tuesday 12th & Wednesday 13th November 2019 from 8am until 2.30pm both days.

Students will also need to bring a valid photo ID on the first day and have their USI number. Registration is to be completed online for both courses and payment made to BARMAX training.



An Interim Statement of Attainment is issued to all students successfully completing each course and theory exam. Students then can obtain their Photo ID Card from Services NSW (Old RTA) at the completion of the course.

The cost to complete the RSA and RCG courses is \$225.00. Monies are payable to the School Finance Officer (cheques made out to St Paul's High School) this is substantially lower that other institutions can offer.

For the courses to 'run' there must be a minimum of 20 and a maximum of 30 students per trainer. Therefore, it will run on a first in best dressed basis. 





Outdoor gym study aiming to give the masses more strength

In partnership with Lake Macquarie City Council and Newcastle City Council, University of Newcastle researchers are recruiting for a new, nationally-funded trial that blends smartphone technology with park-based fitness facilities to encourage community exercise in the great outdo

The study, called ecofit, involves aerobic and resistance (weight-bearing) training for a full-body workout that's fast, fun and free for anyone aged 18-80 who isn't meeting physical activity

A purpose-built app will guide participants through correct usage of outdoor gym equipment located in seven public parks and trails across Newcastle and Lake Macquarie, including the Fernleigh Track at Adamstown, Lambton, Warrabrook, Speers Point, Pasterfield Sports Complex in Cameron Park, Warners Bay and Wangi Wangi. As the study progresses, additional parks will be added to the

GPS tracking enables the app to know which exercise station is being used, and when, along any of the three-kilometre circuits or trails.

Participants must be willing to complete at least two self-guided sessions per week during the 12-week program, taking an estimated 30 minutes each. There are beginner, intermediate and advanced workouts, depending upon fitness level and prior exercise experience.

Professor Ron Plotnikoff, Director of the UON's Priority Research Centre for Physical Activity and Nutrition and co-leader of the HMRI Cardiovascular Research Program, says that ecofit is design more for the average person than those with rippling muscles. earch Program, says that ecofit is designed

'Health guidelines recommend adults get 150 to 300 minutes of moderate exercise each week, including at least two days of resistance training,' Professor Plotnikoff said. 'But a lot of people are deterred by the cost of gym memberships, concerned about injury, or just feel intimidated and embarrassed valking into a gym.

"Outdoor activity, however, has lots of advantages, including being free and highly social. Studies also show that it improves mental health and mood, perhaps even more than indoor exercise sessions."

The study will assess participants' physical activity levels, weight, aerobic and muscular fitness, and mental health at the start of the study and again at three and nine months later. Those randomised to the study's control group will receive the app at the nine-month stage.

"Our pilot study targeted people with type 2 diabetes or pre-diabetes with great improvement in physical and mental health, but this trial is targeting the whole adult population in the community, Professor Plotnikoff added. "We want to see how the program performs in the real world with the general population, so we'll host a group training session at the park then let them loose."

Groups of up to four people can enrol, or it can be done individually with access to a closed Facebook group for social support. Numbers will be capped at around 300 participants.
