

#### Dear Parents and Caregivers,

This time last year, we were farewelling the 2019 Year 12 cohort. The world we lived in was a very different place. We had never really heard of Zoom or Teams and online learning was the thing that you did through the *School of the Air* if you lived in remote Australia. We might have learnt about a pandemic as part of our history studies or perhaps in Biology and we certainly never thought that in 12 months' time we would be living in a country with closed borders and world-wide travel restrictions.

What a difference a year makes. This week we are celebrating with our current Year 12 students. Their young worlds, like all of us, has been thoroughly mixed up and thrown upside down. Way back in April they were just about to complete their mid-course exams and then suddenly, we were all engaged in on-line learning. They engaged in this so well and with so much calm resilience. 
#### A Message To Our Year 12 Students:

Good afternoon students, parents and teachers.

For me, it's also the relationship with parents that I cherish the most. I have had many email giggles with some parents and cried with many others. We have lamented over the idiocy of some things that the students have done and rejoiced in any of the small wins. Parents, I will miss our chats.

So Year 12, after thirteen long years, you have come to the end of your school education. There are mixed emotions around this day. To some relief that it is finally finished and looking forward to a time to rejuvenate. For others anxious of a world that isn't the thirteen-year routine of knowing what you were doing each day. Still others are numb, and it hasn't hit you yet. And still more might feel a little sad and mourn the loss of routine, peers, teachers, relationships, and normality. However you are feeling at the moment, it is to be respected for what school has been to you over the years and this in itself may have changed over the 6 years of high school.

I first met you in 2014 when I came to visit each class when you were in Year 6, and most of you were ready to leave the confines of primary school to stretch your wings at high school. I sat at my desk late one afternoon last week and looked over the Yr 7 photos – all 187 of you. You were actually cute then (well, most of you anyway)

We have lost a few along the way – we are at 119 graduating today. Some to other schools, some to jobs, others to TAFE courses, others still finding their way. But each one making the choice to do what they thought was the best option for them at the time – including yourselves who chose to finish what you started many years ago.

I have watched you go from the 'little fish' in a very new big pond to now trying to rule that pond. Your legacy will be one of how to handle situations with calmness and efficiency since you are the "COVID cohort" and can therefore handle any crisis that comes your way! A lot of you not only handled school and COVID, but your own personal crisis' this year. You are the epitome of the "E" in our CARE program – ENDURANCE and resilience. Keep up the good fight, all of you.

Our CARE program introduced us to four values. The values of compassion, appreciation, respect, and endurance. I hope you take these values with you into the next phase of your life.

Show *compassion* to everyone around you. As I've always told you, you don't know anyone else's story, and your compassion could make their day, their year or even save their life.

Appreciate every single day and what and who it holds. Be openly grateful and thankful. Look beyond yourselves and cherish your world and where you fit into it.

Respect yourself. Don't abuse yourselves or let others abuse you. God gave each of you a healthy strong beautiful mind and body. Use it, look after it, stand up for it. Respect those around you as you would expect others to respect you.

There will be times in your life when you will encounter sadness, disappointment, and loss. Some of you are dealing with those emotions now. It's ok to feel and experience emotions and 'react', in a safe manner, but eventually you need to embrace the challenge you have been presented. *Endurance* and resilience are skills that will develop when the time is right. Sometimes, though, we need to have the strength to ask for help, support and assistance to develop these skills.

My biggest regret, after watching you all grow for 6 years, is that I miss out on the best part. I miss out on you finally realising how great you are. Where you finally learn to be true to yourselves. Where you're not conforming to what others want you to be or what you think is expected of you. *You get to be you.* You now have the opportunity to reinvent yourselves and be true to you. Embrace it, cherish it, and make the most of it.

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# R U OK? Day

Wearing bright yellow and matching smiles, students at St Paul's Catholic College at Booragul supported the R U OK? Day this year by holding a recess picnic so that students could eat with their friends and enjoy chatting together.

The students spent a few minutes each day this week learning some of the skills needed to check in on someone's mental health.

On Monday, they learnt about the importance of initiating a conversation with a friend they might be worried about. A simple question like R U OK? Or How are things? Might lead to an important discussion.

On Tuesday, students learnt about listening with an open mind and offering suggestions to encourage a conversation now or later such as: "I'm here to listen if you want to talk more."

On Wednesday, students were taught skills on how to encourage action by suggesting helpful steps that a person could take like speaking to a health professional or asking them to consider a positive step that might help begin a healing process.

On Thursday, students learnt about a checking in a strategy to follow up on previous conversations. Questions like, "Just wanted to check in and see how you're doing?" or "Have things improved or changed since we last spoke?" might encourage further discussion.

To conclude this special week of learning about mental health, on Friday students enjoyed a picnic during recess. Yellow drinks and snacks were served to match the yellow dress theme and to remind students of the importance of reaching out to others when we are concerned about them.








Front Gate & Pedestrian Footpath.

## **Parent Information**

#### Setting a good example

Safety of students as they travel to and from school each day is important. It is expected that parents/carers, grandparents and family members will support the school through role modelling safe road use behaviours.

## **Arriving and Departing**

Parent/carers and family members are encouraged to walk with their child to school to reduce traffic congestion around the school, to promote physical activity and to teach children about correct road use behaviours.

There are two points of entry into St Paul's Catholic College for this Year 7 to 12 College site:

- 1 One **pedestrian** access gate on Primrose street.
  - Students will follow the designated path from Primrose Street, past the Oval into the College.
- 2 One pedestrian Turnstile gate on Haydenbrook Drive (for use 8.00am 9.30am and 2.30pm 4.00pm)
  - Students will walk on the grass path to the Turnstile gate into the College grounds.

Students are expected to use the above two access points to enter the College.

#### Arrival and Departure by car:

For those parents/carers that need to drive their children to school, there is adequate parking in surrounding streets. For those parents needing to come to the office, they can park in the **top visitor carpark** on immediate entry to the college.

There is also a **kiss and drop zone** on the school side of Primrose Street where parents can drop their child off. Drivers are expected to abide by these parking regulations.

Restricted parking signs are in place around the school site to increase Student's safety. Drivers must abide by these parking regulations.

The College is located in a 40km school zone where a 40 km speed limit applies for the hours of 8.00-9.30am and 2.30-4.00pm on school days. The speed limit is lowered to 40km during these hours to increase the safety of the students arriving and departing the school. Drivers **must** abide by these speed regulations.

No unauthorised cars can enter past the College front gates between 8.00—9.30 and 2.30—4.00.

Parents can NOT drop students at the bus drop zone at the College roundabout during this time.

There is no kiss and drop zone on the College grounds.

Wet weather days are particularly hazardous for children as traffic increases, visibility of children is decreased, and slippery roads make driving conditions more difficult. Reduce speed, park correctly abiding by parking regulations. Students are encouraged to use umbrellas and raincoats on these wet days.







# **Emerging Occupations**

The National Skills Commission (NSC) has developed a data-driven approach to identify emerging occupations within Australia.

By identifying emerging skills and looking at how these skills change existing jobs, we are able to identify emerging or new jobs in the labour market.

New occupations often emerge as a result of the need to adapt and learn new skills. The current COVID-19 crisis has seen situations such as manufacturers having to learn new techniques to make unfamiliar, in demand products, and restaurant owners having to quickly developed or enhanced their skills in e2commerce, for example. # **Career as a Dermatologist**

According to the <u>Good Universities Guide</u> a dermatologist specialises in the treatment of skin diseases such as eczema, acne, skin infections and psoriasis, using techniques such as ultraviolet light therapy, photodynamic therapy and laser treatment. Dermatologists also detect and treat skin cancers. Dermatologists fulfil activities such as performing skin examinations, informing



patients about the need for annual screenings, sun protection, skin cancer awareness and skin-based self-examinations. They also diagnose and treat a range of skin conditions, including acne, skin cancer and athlete's foot.

A dermatologist needs to have good communication skills, be able to exercise high ethical standards, be compassionate, and also have a high degree of motivation and self-discipline.

A dermatologist is a medical specialist which requires further study after completing a medical degree. To become a medical practitioner, students need to study medicine at university.

## Studying Surveying - Life without Limits

Interested in Geography, Math's, Science, IT and/or the outdoors? Looking for a job that will not tie you to a desk? Surveying is the measurement and mapping of our surrounding environment using mathematics and specialised technology. Land surveyors are involved with a diverse variety of projects from land subdivision to tunnel building and major construction.



Importantly though, there is much more to surveying than taking measurements outdoors and then analysing them back in the office. Surveyors are often the first people on site during any construction process; they are the guardians of property law, and the creators of land titles. They are also the ones who can sign off on the position of new title boundaries. In all, surveyors are an integral part of the process in a wide variety of scenarios.

Students who wish to find out what surveying is, what surveyors do, where to study, and what it takes, might like to browse A Life Without Limits



A USI - Unique Student Identifier is a reference number that creates an online record of your training and qualifications attained in Australia. Current Year 12 students are reminded that you will need a USI number when applying for Commonwealth financial assistance when you enrol at university next year.
