# Assistant Principal—Teaching & Learning

## The Hidden Curriculum

Most of the learning which happens at school is directly observable as students work towards grasping tangible concepts which have real world applications. Students are also provided with information about their learning through feedback from teachers and peers as well as self-reflection. These are all important elements of learning and the curriculum as stipulated by NESA. There is another aspect to education which is not always directly seen as learning and is sometimes called the 'hidden curriculum'. When students are asked to present their work using digital technologies, engage in multimodal texts, collaborate with peers and meet deadlines, we are engaging students in this hidden curriculum. The knowledge and skills students are developing through the hidden curriculum are the employability skills which is not specific to a particular job or career but are the personal qualities and attributes that students can transfer to many different contexts. Over time, there has been a shift in the economy towards jobs that are people-focused, such as in health and social care, retail, hospitality, tourism and education. As such, it is no surprise that employers need their staff to have good people and communication skills¹. Other skills include:

At St Paul's we recognise the importance of ensuring our students are future ready by being adaptable in our approach to learning. A contemporary education transcends the walls of a classroom with students sitting in rows as passive participants in the learning process. This approach marks a significant push against the industrial model of education which does not meet the individual needs of students. The teachers at St Paul's strive to engage students in learning so that students come to realise their own learning power and have agency over their learning. This means students are provided with opportunities to collaborate with peers, learn in spaces which are contemporary and provide flexibility, have choice over how they demonstrate their learning and use a variety of technologies which prepare them to flourish in a VUCA<sup>2</sup> (Volatile, Uncertain, Complex, Ambiguous) world.



Also, teachers know your capacities, and can help you discern whether you will be able to manage subjects.



# THE NEW BASICS: Big data reveals the skills young people need for the New Work Order

In this issue we focus on the newly released report from Foundation for Young Australians www.fya.org.au about the skills young people will need for the New Work Order. The link to this important report is in the feature article below title "The New Basics Report".

Youth unemployment is high, and youth underemployment is even higher, with hundreds of thousands of young Australians struggling to find full time work. Australian employers are hungry for talent but report that they are finding difficulties finding young people with essential workplace skills. These essential workplace skills are 'enterprise skills' and this report reveals that employers are placing a premium on these skills at a time of significant change in our workforce.

The high demand for enterprise skills underscores the importance of general capabilities being retained and elevated in the school curriculum. A number of countries around the world have taken steps to redesign their curriculum and explicitly embed 21st Century competencies and enterprise skills like problem solving, collaboration, digital skills and communication skills into the curriculum.



## **Enterprise Skills are in Demand**

The New Basics Report reveals that employers are placing a premium on enterprise skills at a time of significant change in our workforce. Jobs ads that ask for these enterprising skills are offering significantly higher pay than those jobs not requiring these skills, and employers of younger workers are asking for enterprise skills just as often as role-specific technical skills. What's more, the jobs of the future demand enterprising skills 70% more than jobs that are at risk of automation.

#### Enterprise skills are transferable skills required in many jobs.

#### They include:

- Problem solving
- Creativity
- Financial literacy
- Digital literacy
- Critical thinking
- Presentation skills
- Communications
- Teamwork

# What are "enterprise Skills"?

Enterprise skills are transferable skills that enable young people to engage with a complex world and navigate the challenges they will inherit. Enterprise skills are not just for entrepreneurs; they are skills that are required in many jobs. They have been found to be a powerful predictor of long-term job success.

The terms used to describe these skills vary across different contexts: sometimes called generic, soft, or 21st century skills. However, the meaning is clear: a set of skills and characteristics that enable young people to confront the challenges of change and navigate a complex future.

## What are "technical skills"?

By contrast, technical skills are often specific to a particular task, role or industry. Technical skills include qualifications such as licences, certificates or degrees but also include skills acquired on-the-job that are specific to a role or industry. Such skills may include surgical procedures if you are a veterinarian, hair styling techniques if you are a hairdresser, or Java script if you are a computer programmer.

#### 70% of Jobs of the future demand enterprise skills more than jobs of the past.

- Demand for enterprise skills has been rising over time
- Employers pay a premium for many enterprise skills
- Jobs of the future demand more enterprise skills
- Employers now ask for enterprise skills as often as technical skills
- Many enterprise skills are demanded across all occupations and industries

**PLEASE NOTE:** "On Time" applications close on **Friday 30th September,** so you do not need to panic and rush in to get your UAC application done. Use your time wisely to research your options before completing your application. UAC books will arrive in schools shortly – spend time looking through this book to find out more about specific institutions and courses they offer.

*Tip:* UAC PINs should have been sent to your email address. Keep an eye out for this and make sure you do not lose it. Make a copy of your pin and save it in another place. You will need it to access the UAC website to complete your application when the time comes.
