

"We are in the country of the Awabakal peoples. We respectfully acknowledge their elders, celebrating their continuing culture and the living memory of their ancestors."

The following excerpt taken from Luke's Gospel was proclaimed at mass last Sunday. These words have been translated over the years into the prayer we know today as the 'Our Father'.

Once Jesus was in a certain place praying, and when he had finished, one of his disciples said, 'Lord, teach us to pray, just as John taught his disciples.' He said to them, 'Say this when you pray:

"Father, may your name be held holy, your kingdom come; give us each day our daily bread, and forgive us our sins,

for we ourselves forgive each one who is in debt to us.

And do not put us to the test."'

In this passage, Jesus provides his disciples, and all Christians, with a model for prayer. In keeping with this modelling by Jesus, it is significant that the Lord's Prayer, or Our Father, is the common prayer of all Christians, regardless of denomination.

Student's Attending Mass

After discussions, with Fr James Odoh and the local parishioners at St Michael's Parish, students from St Paul's will be attending mass commencing on Tuesday morning at 9.00am. It is hoped that all students will be able to attend mass prior to the end of 2022. There will be two or three classes from each year group attending each week. The first group of students attending will be Year 7 students. Period 1 teachers will be attending mass with the students.

Students being able to participate in mass is further supporting and enabling them to engage in the spiritual life of the school.

Pupil Free Day

Families are reminded **Monday 8 August will be a Pupil Free Day**. Staff will be working collaborative to develop a Strategic Plan for the next three years for the College.

NAIDOC Day Celebrations

On the first Wednesday of the term, our community gathered for our NAIDOC celebrations. A smoking ceremony by Uncle Norm commenced proceedings. The College's Aboriginal Dance Group performed and the students listened to the history of NAIDOC week and challenges experienced by Aboriginal people over the years. These insights provided a background to the NAIDOC theme for the year *'Get Up, Stand Up and Show Up'*.

In the lead up to the celebrations, some Year 8 Visual Arts students created a mural which hung from the Damascus Centre as a reminder to community members of our cultural heritage.

Two boomerangs were presented to the school as a gift to acknowledge the celebrations.

Special thanks to Ms Stewart and Ms Blacklock for their organisation of the ceremony and for their mentorship of our Aboriginal students. Also, thanks to the members of the Reconciliation Action Plan Team who support Ms Blacklock and Ms Stewart with the organisation and for their involvement in the celebrations.



Open Afternoon

Wednesday afternoon of Week One saw interested families for 2023 visit the College for tours of our classrooms. These tours were led by our Year 11 Student Leaders. The families in attendance were glowing in their feedback of the way the Student Leaders provided insights into what it is like to be a student at St Paul's. Families also had the opportunity to ask questions of staff in attendance. Thank you to the student leaders and to the staff who attended to assist with the Open Afternoon.

COVID and Rapid Antigen Test (RAT) Kits

As Term Three commences, the school continues to respond to the challenges of COVID. To help with minimising the spread of the virus the following core principles are a reminder for all to help look after everyone as best as possible over the coming weeks:

Students are to remain at home if they are unwell or have COVID like symptoms

Practice good hygiene

Minimise gathering in large groups where possible

Whist there has been no direction for students to wear masks at school, students are welcomed to wear them if they wish. *Masks are still required to be worn to and from school when travelling by buses and trains.*

Communicated in the most recent advice received from Catholic Schools New South Wales was the following information:

"In line with the latest advice from NSW Health, masks are recommended for students and staff who have recovered from COVID-19, completed their 7-day isolation period and are no longer showing symptoms for an additional 3 days (from days 8 – 10 after receiving a positive COVID-19 result)."

For those students who are at home, an outline of the classwork for most lessons is being uploaded to Compass.

St Paul's currently has some RAT kits which were supplied to the school last term. The RAT kits are being provided to families on a needs basis.

RAT kits will be distributed from the Main Office at the school. Families can come to the Main Office to collect their RAT kit or if families wish for the RAT kit to be go home with their child an email can be sent to *admin@booragul.catholic.edu.au* with instructions on who will take the RAT kits home.

The Power of 'Yet'

On Tuesday we held the Semester One Awards ceremonies for students in Years 7-10. This is an important opportunity to recognise students who have achieved excellent results across a range of courses. Importantly, however, it is also an opportunity to recognise students who are striving for excellence in individual courses through the Excellence in Class Award and also to recognise students who are bringing a 'ready to learn attitude' towards their studies through the Diligence Award. It is acknowledging the achievements of others that we are encouraged to think about our own 'yet'.

Yet is a small but powerful word that holds so much possibility. Some people believe that basic qualities like talent and intelligence are fixed traits. This reasoning is called a fixed mindset and is limiting to what a person can achieve. This is where the power of 'yet' comes in. The 'power of yet' is about having a growth mindset and is the key to getting out of the learning pit. Consider the statement: 'I can't do this'. This is a statement which defines the present and has no steps forward. However, this statement changes when the word yet is added: 'I can't do this yet'. By adding the 'yet' the statement then holds possibilities for what the future will look like. This is called a growth mindset and is the exact opposite of a fixed mindset.

If a student has a *fixed mindset*, they believe they cannot change their character, creativity, or potential for success. But, in contrast, a *growth*

mindset has a more positive outlook, as a student believes they have control over their successes and failures. If a student possesses a growth mindset, they can look at challenges with a back-back attitude and an optimistic point of view. When they fail at something they understand that they can use that experience to learn new ways to achieve growth towards a goal. The prominent psychologist, Dr Carol Dwek is the champion of growth mindset thinking and you can hear about the power of yet in the TED Talk at this link: *Dr Carol Dwek: The Power of Yet*



The Semester One reports, which include a student self-reflection and the Student Conferences are an opportunity for students to think about and plan for their 'yet'. Teaching students the power of yet teaches them a life skill that will enable them to face challenges and to value the art of perseverance. It enables them to see that their efforts can pay off. A growth mindset is the belief that they are in control of their abilities and that they can learn and improve. That belief is what will lead to success because they believe that **they** (not their teacher, not their parent/carer, not their life circumstances) are in control of their learning and their future.

Year 9 2023 Additional Studies Information

On Monday week 3, Year 8 students will take part in the Additional Studies presentation. During this session, students will learn about the courses offered for electives in 2023. Students will select two Additional Studies courses.

Year 10 students have received their course selections for Year 11 2023. Year 12 Final Term

Year 12 students are now entering their final term of secondary school. Students are encouraged to use the Elevate Ace Your Exams resource to reflect on their recent trial examination results and to plan for successful learning and preparation leading to the HSC. Teachers have been working with students using the Exam Debrief and Mistakes Finder to guide students through identifying areas for growth and setting goals. Many students will be refining major projects and performances over the coming weeks and these students are encouraged to use their time wisely to ensure they are proud of the work they have produced.

Throughout Term 3 it is important students maintain a regular pattern of revision and homework to continually refine and practice their knowledge and skills. A key strategy students are expected to adopt is the regular submission of completed past paper questions for feedback from their teachers. By doing so, students are continually practising what they know and getting feedback on their next steps.

Respect

Respect will be the key value that will be the focus of the CARE program for this term. Year groups will begin looking at respectful language and the power that language can have when we communicate with one another. A simple 'please' and 'thank-you' can demonstrate gratitude and appreciation, a 'Can I help you with that?' can demonstrate support for a friend, parent or colleague and an encouraging word such as 'You can do this' can provide courage and confidence. Respect while engaged in online activity and across the various social media platforms will also be the focus of this term's CARE program. It will include how to safely navigate social media sites so that your own self-respect is not compromised.

Masks

Students are reminded to be respectful not only at school and home but also in all public spaces particularly when *travelling on public transport to and from school*. Currently there are confusing expectations around mask wearing on buses and trains. All students are to carry a mask with them, so that if they are asked to wear one on public transport, they have one available to adhere to the expectation.

Routines

As our students begin to re-establish their routines and reflect on their first semester the following tips by Dr Andrew Wicking are offered to parents.

12 tips for parents to build positive routines By Dr Andrew Wicking

1. Be clear about the routines of family life: bedtime, sleep time, mealtimes, lights out;

- 2. Eat at least one meal together as a family every day where you talk about the day;
- 3. Ensure you know where your child is most of the time;
- 4. Have agreed clear rules about the use of computers and mobiles at home and in the bedroom;

5. Instil hope in young people. Let them know that you think great things are on offer for them and that you love them and believe in them;

- 6. Encourage them to succeed at lots of things;
- 7. Allow your child to see they can improve with practice;
- 8. Encourage them to dream big about what their life can be;

9. Discuss and create memorandums of understanding about personal safety - and for teenagers: parties, drug and alcohol use, and sexual activity;

- 10. Develop a common set of understandings, write these up, and sign it;
- 11. Talk to your children about school. Are there clear rules and do teachers enforce rules fairly?
- 12. Have a zero-tolerance approach to violence, rudeness and intimidation.






NAIDOC Celebrations


Yr7 Technology students using the "MaKey MaKey" controller boards to emulate their keyboards in various games and apps
