

"We are in the country of the Awabakal peoples. We respectfully acknowledge their elders, celebrating their continuing culture and the living memory of their ancestors."

The passage from Matthew's Gospel below will be proclaimed at Mass on Easter Saturday evening.

After the Sabbath, as the first day of the week was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to

see the tomb. And suddenly there was a great earthquake, for an angel of the Lord, descending from heaven, came and rolled back the stone and sat on it. His appearance was like lightning and his clothing white as snow. For fear of him the guards shook and became like dead men. But the angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. He is not here, for he has been raised, as he said. Come, see the place where he lay. Then go quickly and tell his disciples, 'He has been raised from the dead, and indeed he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him.' This is my message for you." So they left the tomb quickly with fear and great joy and ran to tell his disciples.



Suddenly Jesus met them and said, "Greetings!" And they came to him, took hold of his feet, and worshiped him. Then Jesus said to them, "Do not be afraid; go and tell my brothers and sisters to go to Galilee; there they will see me."

At the Easter Vigil mass the liturgy commences in darkness, and it remains this way until the Church comes alive with light just prior to the Gospel being proclaimed. This transition from dark to light signifies the darkness that came over the community with Jesus' death and the light representing His resurrection which brough hope for all followers for the centuries which would follow.

This reassurance and hope is evident in Matthew's Gospel where the phrase do not be afraid is used a number of times, thus implying Jesus will be present in our lives, providing us with guidance and care.

Pupil Free Day

St Paul's Uniform Expectations

St Paul's has clear expectations regarding the wearing of the College uniform. These expectations were clearly outlined to the students at the Assembly last week. In summary, the expectations are:

- Shoes need to be polishable leather lace up shoes.
- Runners / Joggers worn for sport and PDHPE lessons need to lace up and have a supportive sole and arch refer to information provided in Student Handbook.
- Socks are to be white and ankle length high.
- Ladies' skirts need to be worn at the knee (not rolled up).
- Ladies' sports shorts need to be at an acceptable length (not rolled up).
- Jewellery, the rule of one applies rings, necklaces and earrings.
- Sports uniform is only to be worn on Friday or when they have practical lessons for PDHPE and PASS.

Lowes at Glendale have advised the College the new Soft Shell jacket is now in stock and can be purchased for \$89.95. Verdun Hiles have advised they will have stock of the jacket during Term 2. These jackets can be worn by students in Years 7 – 10. The Soft Shell jacket is not a compulsory item of the school uniform, but an option for students and families.



The Soft Shell jacket has been introduced after feedback from students and families who indicated the current parts of the uniform were not warm enough during the cooler months.

With the introduction of the Soft Shell jackets students are *not to wear undershirts or hoodies to school from the start of Term 2.*

Students uniform will be checked during Care Group and there will be whole year group checks completed to ensure students are complying with the expectations of the College's Uniform Policy.

Students who are not complying with the expectations will be issued with a warning and on the third occurrence they will be issued with an Afternoon Detention.

The support of parents and carers is appreciated as the College works to ensure the uniform is worn correctly by the students.

St Paul's Open Afternoon and Information Evening

In recent weeks, the College has hosted an Open Afternoon and Information Evening. There was great interest and attendance at these events from many families. It was pleasing to be able to meet with those students and families who were wanting to learn more about the educational opportunities at St Paul's.



12 Engineering Studies


Students in year 12 Engineering Studies were challenged as part of their assessment task to construct a bridge from different types of pasta. Students had to experiment with types to be used to see which combination would give the best result. Testing involved ensuring that the bridge could hold a 10kg weight with less than 2 mm of deflection in the middle. All bridges tested on the day met this requirement and then were tested to destruction to see which students built the most successful bridge. Bridge success was determined not just by weight held, but a weight held to weight of bridge ratio. The most successful bridge tested on the day had a ratio of 60 g of weight held per 1 g of bridge weight, holding 42kgs of weight – a significant value in the pasta bridge building world. Congratulations to all students who had bridges tested on the day.


