

"We are in the country of the Awabakal peoples. We respectfully acknowledge their elders, celebrating their continuing culture and the living memory of their ancestors."

The Church celebrates St Paul's Feast Day on Thursday 29 June. As a school community will celebrate this significant day on the last day of Term 2.

Originally known as Saul, St Paul was converted (on the road to Damascus) from a persecutor of Jesus to one of his great followers, travelling around the Mediterranean Sea continuing Jesus' work, building Christian communities. The following scripture passage is taken from the Acts of the Apostles, Chapter 26.

In the passage, St Paul is sharing his experiences since his conversion, as well as challenging those who were non-believers of God's work.

This passage was the First Reading proclaimed at our St Paul's Feast Day on Friday.

"After that, King Agrippa, I was not disobedient to the heavenly vision but declared first to those in Damascus, then in Jerusalem and throughout the countryside of Judea, and also to the gentiles, that they should repent and turn to God and do deeds consistent with repentance. For this reason, the Jews seized me in the temple and tried to kill me. To this day I have had help from God, and so I stand here, testifying to both small and great, saying nothing but what the prophets and Moses said would take place: that the Messiah must suffer and that, by being the first to rise from the dead, he would proclaim light both to our people and to the gentiles."

While he was making this defence, Festus exclaimed, "You are out of your mind, Paul! Too much learning is driving you insane!" But Paul said, "I am not out of my mind, most excellent Festus, but I am speaking the sober truth. Indeed, the king knows about these things,



and to him I speak freely, for I am certain that none of these things has escaped his notice, for this was not done in a corner. King Agrippa, do you believe the prophets? I know that you believe." Agrippa said to Paul, "Are you so quickly persuading me to become a Christian?" Paul replied, "Whether quickly or not, I pray to God that not only you but also all who are listening to me today might become such as I am—except for these chains."

Reports, Grading and Assessment

This week teachers and Leaders of Learning are finalising mid-course reports for students in Years 7-10. As these reports are prepared, it is worth reviewing what the purpose of assessment is in the learning process.

What is Assessment?

NESA defines assessment is the broad name for the collection and evaluation of evidence of a student's learning. For students in 7-10 we use a combination of formative (informal) and summative (formal, end of learning) assessment to make a judgment of student performance for the purpose of grading.

Another way to describe assessment is:

Assessment For Learning	Assessment for learning involves teachers using evidence about students' knowledge, understanding and skills to inform their teaching.
Assessment As Learning	Assessment as learning occurs when students are their own assessors. Students monitor their own learning, ask questions and use a range of strategies to decide what they know and can do, and how to use assessment information for new learning.
Assessment Of Learning	Sometimes referred to as 'summative assessment', it usually occurs at defined key points during a teaching work or at the end of a unit, term or semester



See: NESA Assessment For, Of, As Learning

In Year 11 we use summative assessment to make a determination of a student's grade, however, teachers can make an on-balanced judgment on student performance if the student has shown higher achievement through formative (informal) assessment.

For all our students, this means all learning presented to students can count toward the judgement of a student's grade. Even for Year 12 students, if a misadventure or illness has prevented a student from achieving to an expected standard, in extreme cases, classwork and formative assessment can be used to make an on-balanced judgment of the student's performance in that task.

Making a judgement on student performance

All judgements of students' performance are referenced against either the Common Grade Scale for Year 7 and 8 and Stage 5 electives (7-10 Common Grade Scale), the Course Performance Descriptors for mandatory Stage 5 courses which is available at the syllabus pages (K-10 Syllabuses), or the Common Grade Scale for Year 11 courses (Year 11 Common Grade Scale). Students will get the grade that best matches the standard of their achievement. Teachers at St Paul's consider all evidence gathered and are not limited to a set number of students allocated to each grade within their class or cohort.

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Students who have accessed provisions or adjusted tasks

The process of determining grades is collaborative between teachers and requires a wide range of evidence from student learning. If a student has been given adjustments or provisions to complete classwork and assessment, this should not limit their opportunity to achieve the full range of grades (NESA Assessment and Adjustments)

Stages and grading

Lower grades are not awarded to students in the lower year in a stage, for example, a student in Year 7 is not limited to a D or C purely because they are at the beginning of a stage. Decisions are made based on student achievement of the learning in which they have participated up to that point in time (NESA Awarding Grades).

Recording evidence

Teachers collect and record this evidence on Compass and this is in line with advice from NESA (NESA Recording Evidence). The Student Conferences are an important opportunity for students, families and teachers to discuss the evidence of student learning and to set goals for moving learning forward. Every student should have the opportunity to reflect on their learning and to have collaborative discussions with their teacher to set goals for future learning.

Reports and Student Conferences

The process of assessing student learning and reporting on grades and student approaches to learning leads us to the Student Conferences. In Week 2 Term 3, students and families will have the opportunity to engage in conversations with teachers about the learning strengths students have demonstrated and steps students can take to improve their learning. The Student Conferences will take place on Tuesday Week 2 after the Mid Course Award

Ceremonies and further details will be forwarded to families about this event. We believe it is important for students and families to have some background information about how the grades on reports are linked to learning to assist this conversation and to improve outcomes for students.

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Year 12 HSC Trial Examination Timetable

The Trial Examinations will take place in Week 3 and 4 of Term 3. The most successful HSC students are able to consistently review their study notes and practice examination style questions which are submitted to teachers for feedback. Students are encouraged to continue to revise and practice as they prepare for the Trial examinations and the HSC examinations. Examination Preparation Workshops

Another opportunity for students to prepare for examinations is being offered by Newcastle Libraries in partnership with Headspace Newcastle Libraries. 

NAPLAN

The initial NAPLAN school results have been received and an analysis has been undertaken to identify student achievement in the new Proficiency Level Standards. Student results are reported against are 4 proficiency levels:

Exceeding: the student's result exceeds expectations at the time of testing.

Strong: the student's result meets challenging but reasonable expectations at the time of testing.

Developing: the student's result indicates that they are working towards expectations at the time of testing.

Needs additional support: the student's result indicates that they are not achieving the learning outcomes that are expected at the time of testing. They are likely to need additional support to progress satisfactorily.

Further detail on the descriptors for each test domain for Year 7 and Year 9 can be found at the following link: https://www.nap.edu.au/naplan/results-and-reports/proficiency-level-descriptions
The standard for proficiency is set at a challenging but reasonable level. If a student is in the Strong or Exceeding category, it means they have demonstrated proficiency and that their literacy or numeracy skills are where they should be at this stage of their schooling. If a student has not yet achieved proficiency, then they will either be in the Developing category or the Needs additional support category and further planning and interventions will be available to support that student in meeting the standard for their level of schooling.

Pleasingly, the analysis has shown the majority of students are achieving to a Strong or Exceeding proficiency standard. Individual student reports will be made available early next term and a more detailed analysis will be presented at the Term 3 Community Engagement Meeting.


