Assistant Principal - Community & Wellbeing

In the holidays I had the privilege of travelling to Israel and Jordan with 42 other colleagues from across the diocese on the *Walking in the Footsteps of Jesus* pilgrimage. The fourteen days were filled with visiting religious, historical, cultural and social sites which told the story of Jesus and his context – including his birth, life, death and resurrection. The city of Jerusalem was explored, in particular the Old City of Jerusalem which is a holy city for Judaism, Christianity and Islam. The Dome of the Rock, the Wailing Wall and the Church of the Holy Sepulchre are three significant religious sites which are housed within the walls of the Od City along with a myriad of markets and food stalls. The many biblical places such as, Holy Manger, Bethlehem, the Garden of Gethsemane, Jericho, Mt Temptation, Nazareth, The Se of Galilee and the Dead Sea to name a few came alive throughout our journey.

In addition to the sites we visited, we also met many people living within Israel, including those living in the West Bank. It was the people and communities within this journey that had the most profound impact. The first group were children who were being educated in The Holy Child Program in a small school in Bethlehem. These children suffer from untreated complex mental health issues and exposure to intergeneration trauma, including psychological distress resulting from the ongoing conflict.

The second group, a group of university students from the University of Bethlehem spoke about their experiences as young people living in the West Bank and their dreams and ambitions for their futures. – no different to our young men and women at St Paul's.



The third significant conversation was with Rami Elhana, a seventh generation Jerusalemite and Bassam Aramin, a Palestinian from Hebron. The two men have forged a brother like bond which is based on their love for one another and their humanity. This friendship developed because both fathers have lost a daughter – one 14 and the other 10 – in the conflict, which continues to exist between the Israelis and Palestinians. Both men provided a deep insight into the conflict which exists and their belief that the conflict must end.

Within hours of the conflict beginning in Israel and the Gaza region, we had left Jordan and were unaware, until halfway home, that this country had once again been thrown into the midst of chaos and destruction. Since returning to Australia, it has been an emotional journey knowing that so many innocent civilian lives are being affected by the ongoing conflict. If only those in the position of influence can negotiate an agreement based on conciliation, understanding and peace.

Two novels which could shed light on the circumstances in Israel are; **Balcony Over Jerusalem** by John Lyons and **Apeirogon** by Colum McCann

Bring a gold coin donation, wear your loudest socks, and participate in our soccer shoot-out on the oval at lunctime.




