The painting was completed by Steve Todd, a renowned religious artist, he titled the work 'St Paul the Apostle'. The artwork is a contemporary interpretation of St Paul showing the steely determination he exhibited as he moved around the Mediterrian Sea establishing the early Christian communities. In the narrative which Steve supplied with the artwork, he offers the following insights into the basis for the artwork:

This portrait of St Paul is of a radical figure emboldened by Damascus and passionately committed to his mission. There is nothing bland or meek about Paul. It is full on!! Total and an unswerving commitment to Christ's message and for being in community, despite the challenges and vagaries of the emerging Christian communities. There is and was a total commitment to community.



Student Support and Wellbeing Framework


This year the College is implementing a Student Support and Wellbeing Framework. This work is a result of the Strategic Planning process which commenced 2022. The intended outcomes of the framework are to

- Improve student engagement with the full life of the school.
- Develop coherent approaches to respond to the student's wellbeing, behaviour and attendance needs which will promote their self-regulation, self-awareness, and resilience.

Furthermore, these outcomes will support the work being undertaken in the Teaching and Learning domain to increase the academic rigor in classes to support students working to their potential.

The framework is researched based and has been developed around our established CARE values and covers the learning spaces (eg: classrooms), community spaces (eg: places used for excursions and sport) and social spaces (eg: playground and online) the students engage with on a daily basis with their learning and extra curricula activities.

I am appreciative of Mrs Shipman's work to lead a sub-committee to develop the details and strategies associated with the framework. Mrs Shipman has provided more comprehensive details in her section of the Newsletter.



Student Support and Wellbeing Framework

A Student Support Framework has been developed as a response to staff discussions around student achievement and behaviour. Post Covid it was observed that student wellbeing had become more of a focus and that as a community, support structures for our students were going to be instrumental in assisting students to achieve to their potential. Evidence based research has been considered and collectively a decision was made to use a Positive Behaviour for Learning Model which has been adopted and adapted to meet the context of St Paul's. The CARE values have been used to create the positive behaviours which will be reinforced to students throughout their daily interactions with one another in the Learning Spaces, Social Spaces and Community Spaces. These positive behaviours will continue build the connections our students have with their community and enable our students to create their own successful futures. Attached is a copy of the CARE program.

Along with this, a Multi-Tiered System of Support will be used to meet the individual needs of students. This multi-tiered system will include developing support



structures for students, so they are able to meet the College expectations. This tiered system will use interventions to provide the students with the opportunity to self-regulate. All students will begin in the green tier and if interventions are necessary move through to an amber or red tier if they are unable to meet College expectations. Students and families will be involved in this process and clear communication will outline, when necessary, if a student is moving into another tier which requires extra support. At times this may include removing students from college activities if they continue to be unsafe and/or unproductive. By providing supports and interventions students will then be able to have time to consider their unsafe and/or unproductive behaviours and can move back into the green tier. Students are always expected to be engaged in their own learning, allow others to learn and allow the teacher to teach.

The Student Support and Wellbeing Committee will continue to work on refining and developing the work already completed. I thank Mr Brownlee, Mr Connell, Mrs Melocco, Mr Baker, Mrs Lund for their professional input throughout 2023. In 2024 Mr Eccleston, Mrs Lucas and Mrs Pola-Kuras will join the committee.

Assessment

The 2024 Assessment Policies will be made available to students and parents/carers in the coming weeks. The dates of Assessment Tasks will be made available on the Compass school calendar at this time.

NAPLAN

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is a point in time assessment of literacy and numeracy skills. Each year students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 participate in tests for writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. In 2024, NAPLAN will take place in Weeks 7 & 8 (dates of tests to be confirmed). NAPLAN tests are just one part of our school learning assessment program and questions are primarily based on knowledge, understanding and skills gained from the prior year of schooling.

In preparation for NAPLAN 2024, students will complete Practice tests to become familiar with the format and functionality of the online tests.

Students and parents can access the <u>public demonstration site (https://www.nap.edu.au/online-assessment/</u> <u>public-demonstration-site</u>) to familiarise themselves with NAPLAN and the types of questions and tools available.

Students will need the required equipment to complete Practice Tests in Week 3:

- 1. Laptop- Charged (Ipads cannot be used to complete the tests)
- 2. Pen/pencil
- 3. Headphones- compatible with device

WHO IS IT FOR?

The ASPIRE Concert Band is a Diocesan ensemble for students in Years 5-12. It is suitable for students who can at least play at a 1st grade (AMEB) level as well students of a more advanced ability, 4th grade (AMEB) and above. The ensemble is not suitable for beginner students.

Instruments include: Flute, clarinet, oboe, bassoon, bass clarinet, saxophone, trumpet, trombone, french horn, euphonium, tuba, mallet/auxiliary percussion and drum kit. The band is not suitable for string or piano players.

Students must know how to read traditional music notation.

The concert band will be playing a variety of repertoire including traditional concert band music, music from television and film, rock and pop music and music specifically composed for concert bands. There will be performances and events the concert band will be part of.

WHEN ARE REHEARSALS?

There will be 3 rehearsal per term (total of 11 hours per term):

- 2 regional rehearsals (Central and Upper Hunter)
- 1 whole day rehearsal at St Pius X High School Adamstown

These rehears als will be after school hours, 4.00 $\rm pm$ - 6.00 $\rm pm$ and will only involve the students from that area.

Once entries close, shortlisted finalists will have the opportunity to workshop their song with professional musicians and ASPIRE Musical Director. The winner for each category will be decided at a live concert where a guest panel will judge the songs. This year there will be 4 winners, one for each category (Primary - Individual, Primary - Class, Years 7-9 and Years 10-12). The prize is a \$300 Musos Corner voucher and have their song professionally recorded.

Conditions: Music and lyrics must be created by the nominated students. Some students, particularly classes and younger students, may use backing tracks, or samples they have arranged themselves, but must create the lyrics themselves. Some students may seek feedback from their teachers or tutors, but the final product must be the student's own work. Submissions may be lyrics and music, or music only. Artificial Intelligence is not to be used in any aspect of the work submitted. The quality of the performance/recording will not impact selection.

CHOREOGRAPHIC Project MUSIC.DANCE.DRAMA

ASPIRE invites interested students to participate in the Create Choreographic Project which offers Stage 2 and 3 students the opportunity to participate in a 2 day intensive contemporary dance and collaborative choreographic program.

Students will be provided with a dance and performance art experience that is inclusive, non-competitive, creative and collaborative, and that reflects the working processes of the professional industry. 





2024 School Fee Information

School fees comprise of Resource, Tuition, Diocesan Family School Building Levy (DFSBL), Camps/Retreats and Electives and are the responsibility of parents/carers of students enrolled at the school.

Tuition Fees Year 7-10 \$2033, Year 11-12 \$3089

The Diocesan Tuition Fee is set each year by the Diocese.

Family discount on full rate diocesan tuition fees is available to parents who have more than one child attending a Catholic School in this Diocese.

- 1 child family 0% full rate
- 2 child family 15% each child
- 3 child family 25% each child
- 4 + child family 50% each child

Concessions on Tuition fees are also given to account holders of a current Health Care/Pension card. An application form must be completed along with providing a copy of original card.

Diocesan Family & School Building Levy (DFSBL) \$1638

The DFSBL is charged to the oldest child for each family. The levy is pooled to contribute towards past, present and future costs for building projects across all existing schools, and for the development of new Catholic schools within the Diocese.

Resource Fees Year 7-10 \$860, Year 11-12 \$810

The resource costs are set by each individual school. Fees are used to pay school resources, educational activities, student textbooks, various low cost excursions/incursions, photocopying, computer technology and amenities.

Elective Fees Year 9-12

Students who choose to undertake specific subjects, will be required to pay additional charges per year to cover specific expenses associated with the individual subject.

Retreats/ Camps

The Year 7 & 9 Camp and 10 & 12 Retreat are compulsory, and it is expected that all students attend as per conditions of enrolment in a Catholic school. Costings are calculated based on all students attending, venues and buses have to be paid when booking is first made. Your understanding of this would be very much appreciated.

Friday Sport Payment & Consent

For your convenience, you can now consent and pay for your child's Friday sport through Compass each Term. The account holder (name on your statement) is the only one who can access Compass to make these payments, if you would like joint access to Compass so both parents can make payments please complete and return the attached joint access form.

All fees are billed yearly in February, and it is recommended a regular weekly, fortnightly or monthly instalment is made from February to November to ensure your account is fully paid by 30 November, 2024. Our preferred method of payment is via Bpay (BPay detail are on your monthly statement) however fees may also be paid via EFT, Credit card, cheque and Centrepay.
