

Student Support and Wellbeing Framework

At our Assembly on Wednesday further information was provided to the students related to the implementation of the Student Support and Wellbeing Framework. This information was also presented at the Term One Parent / Carer Engagement Meeting.

The framework is supported by a Multi-Tier System of Support. This system of support is implemented when students have displayed a pattern of behaviour which is of concern or have not meet the expectations of the framework. Underpinning the framework are the qualities of self-regulation and self-awareness. It is the College aspiration that by the time the students graduate these qualities are well established in each student preparing them for life after school.

An overview of the Multi-Tiered System of Support is shown in the following graphic:



All students are in the Green Tier at the start of the academic year and these students are eligible to participate in all aspects of the College's life. If a student is placed in either, the Yellow, Orange, or Red Tiers they may forgo the opportunity to participate in activities outside of the classroom. For example, if a student's behaviour warrants a short suspension and they are placed in the Orange Tier, they will not be able to represent the school in a representative sport.

Mrs Shipman and the LOWE's will meet every two weeks to determine the students who will be under review, based on the evidence since the previous meeting. Parents, carers, and students will be advised if a student's tier changes.

The left-hand side of the graphic identifies the different support people to assist the student modify their behaviour as well as examples of strategies which can further support the student,

If a student's behaviour is of a serious nature, it is possible they could move from the Green Tier to the Orange Tier. When the student's behaviour has been reviewed and if their behaviour has improved, they may transition back to the Yellow Tier and continued improvement would see the student move back to the Green Tier. Alternatively, when the student's behaviour pattern is reviewed it may be deemed necessary for the child to remain in the Orange Tier for a further period of time until the behaviour improves. During this time the relevant support people will work with the child in conjunction with the appropriate strategies.

In addition to the Multi-Tier System of Support outlined above there will be a number of Focus Areas each Term which will be based on the elements of the Student Support and Wellbeing Framework. The first two Focus Areas will be:

- What am I capable of?
- Uniform = Belonging

The context for the focus area is also provided via the connection to the life outside of school.

The Focus Area, 'What am I capable of?' is challenging the students to take personal pride in their work and pushing themselves to work to their capacity. This message will be reinforced with the students at Form Meetings and classes at the start of Term 2.



All schools have uniform expectations to create a sense of belonging and personal pride in being a member of a community.



The College's uniform expectations are:

- Shoes need to be polishable leather lace up shoes.
- Runners / Joggers worn for sport and PDHPE lessons need to lace up and have a supportive sole and arch refer to information provided in Student Handbook.
- Socks are to be white and ankle length high.
- Ladies' skirts need to be worn at the knee (not rolled up).
- Ladies' sports shorts need to be at an acceptable length (not rolled up).

- Jewellery, the rule of one applies rings, necklaces and earrings.
- Sports uniform is only to be worn on Friday or when they have practical lessons for PDHPE and PASS.

Based on feedback from the students the Soft Shell jacket was introduced in 2023 for students in Years 7 – 10. The jacket provides a greater layer of warmth for students and can be worn with either the formal or sports uniform. The jackets can be purchased at both Verdun Hiles and Lowes. The Soft Shell jacket is not a compulsory item of the school uniform, but an option for students and families.

Students uniform will be checked during Care Group and there will be whole year group checks completed to ensure students are complying with the expectations of the College's Uniform Policy.



Students who are not complying with the expectations will be issued with a warning and on the third occurrence they will be issued with an Afternoon Detention.

The support of parents and carers is appreciated as the College works to ensure the uniform is worn correctly by the students.

Year 11 English

In Year 11 English Standard, students have been studying the Common Module: Reading to Write. Throughout the term students have been engaging with a variety of texts in order to inspire their own writing. For Nina Dean and Bryanna Stackhouse, they read Jamaica Kincaid's piece, 'Girl' (1978), which explores social and cultural influences on the development of identity through a mother's instructions to her daughter. They were then tasked with writing an adaptation using Kincaid's style as inspiration for their own set of instructions.

Nina decided to mirror Kincaid's writing style and themes highlighting the way gender stereotypes pervade time and the need to make space for these conversations. Nina's work is a clear call to action and I applaud her activism through imaginative writing.

Bryanna utilised Kincaid's writing style but chose to focus on a personal stress that leaves her in a fragmented state of mind. I'm sure many of her peers can resonate with the overwhelming demands of Stage 6 (or schoolwork in general) and would find solace in the sense of solidarity her work conjures.

2024 School Fee Information

School fees comprise of Resource, Tuition, Diocesan Family School Building Levy (DFSBL), Camps/Retreats and Electives and are the responsibility of parents/carers of students enrolled at the school.

Tuition Fees Year 7-10 \$2033, Year 11-12 \$3089

The Diocesan Tuition Fee is set each year by the Diocese.

Family discount on full rate diocesan tuition fees is available to parents who have more than one child attending a Catholic School in this Diocese.

- 1 child family 0% full rate
- 2 child family 15% each child
- 3 child family 25% each child
- 4 + child family 50% each child

Concessions on Tuition fees are also given to account holders of a current Health Care/Pension card. An application form must be completed along with providing a copy of original card.

Diocesan Family & School Building Levy (DFSBL) \$1638

The DFSBL is charged to the oldest child for each family. The levy is pooled to contribute towards past, present and future costs for building projects across all existing schools, and for the development of new Catholic schools within the Diocese.

Resource Fees Year 7-10 \$860, Year 11-12 \$810

The resource costs are set by each individual school. Fees are used to pay school resources, educational activities, student textbooks, various low cost excursions/incursions, photocopying, computer technology and amenities.

Elective Fees Year 9-12

Students who choose to undertake specific subjects, will be required to pay additional charges per year to cover specific expenses associated with the individual subject.

Retreats/ Camps

The Year 7 & 9 Camp and 10 & 12 Retreat are compulsory, and it is expected that all students attend as per conditions of enrolment in a Catholic school. Costings are calculated based on all students attending, venues and buses have to be paid when booking is first made. Your understanding of this would be very much appreciated.

Friday Sport Payment & Consent

For your convenience, you can now consent and pay for your child's Friday sport through Compass each Term. The account holder (name on your statement) is the only one who can access Compass to make these payments, if you would like joint access to Compass so both parents can make payments please complete and return the attached joint access form.

The collection of all school fees is to ensure the best possible learning environment for your child.

Account Statements

All fees are billed yearly in February, and it is recommended a regular weekly, fortnightly or monthly instalment is made from February to November to ensure your account is fully paid by 30 November, 2024. Our preferred method of payment is via Bpay (BPay detail are on your monthly statement) however fees may also be paid via EFT, Credit card, cheque and Centrepay. If you require assistance with calculating your weekly, fortnightly or monthly payment amount, please email finance@booragul.catholic.edu.au

2024 School fee account can be viewed at any time through Compass and updated statement are emailed at the beginning of each month. Families who have a nil balance will not receive a statement.


