The Internet.... And the Law.

It is timely that I write to mums and dads (as well as our young people) about the internet and the Law. Given that we are now in a position where all of Year 7, 10, 11 and 12 bring their own device to school as part of our BYOD program, it is important that cyber safety and the implications of foolish behaviour are clear to all concerned. A case that recently finished involving a young man and a teacher from the Central West of NSW caught my eye.

A young man from the local high school tweeted a number of comments about a teacher from his school. The case revolved around the fact that he was upset about this teacher (whom he was never taught by) and her supposed role in his own father leaving teaching at the same school due to ill health. This young man vented his frustrations to his twitter followers who were mainly his friendship group. His tweets were therefore seen as defamatory because of the public nature of the internet even though he felt that he was only commenting to a private audience. "When defamatory publications are made on social media it is common knowledge that they spread," Justice Elkaim said in his judgment. The young man was ordered to pay \$110,000. He has since declared bankruptcy, something that will have an effect on his ability to gain a loan for a very long time. The teacher concerned claimed that her reputation had been seriously undermined making it difficult for her to secure permanent employment along with

the stress that the "devastating comments" had caused.

A local radio station I was listening to had been able to secure an interview with the young man concerned. He was clearly shocked by the judgment but had salient advice to other young people in terms of their internet usage particularly in relation to social networking. He said that no-one can assume that the comments that they make are private. Clearly, this case proved it to be so. I was rather frustrated with the young disc jockeys interviewing the student. They seemed to think that it was an overreaction, almost suggesting it was the teacher who was at fault.

I have been examining a number of useful sites for mums and dads to explore so that they can have appropriate conversations with their children in relation to cyber safety and social networking (Facebook, Twitter Instagram etc). *lawstuff.org.au* is a very useful site with some very easy to access material for young people to read up on their responsibilities when it comes to social networking. For example, in NSW it is a crime to stalk, assault, harass or intimidate someone while they are at school. This includes students, teachers and support staff. This law includes cyber-bullying. Many young people are shocked when they find out that cyber-bullying can carry a maximum prison term of seven years! Stalking included the internet. If a bully sends

many messages to intimidate or harass, it can be seen as stalking which can carry a 5 year prison term and a fine of \$5,500.

Rebekah has recently joined Belong – a parish-run group. She has also demonstrated her support in varied ways for those less privileged or vulnerable.



The impact of technology as an effective study tool:

As part of the School's StudySkills subscription, the site updates with topical ways of studying that may benefit students. Prue Salter writes about introduction of technology and how it affects a student's study habits. The following is an excerpt from her article. Students now spend a lot of time reading from a screen: computers, kindle, mobile devices. The research into the implications of this are still in the early stages, however current evidence indicates that at this point in time print may be slightly superior to the screen in relation to comprehension, learning, retention and ease of use. However, as screen technology continues to advance, interfaces become increasingly intuitive and personal preferences change from early exposure to reading on a screen, this may change – and may have already changed for some individuals. Technology is here to stay, so the key pieces of advice for students (and parents) are listed below. One of the best articles to read on this debate is by Jabr (2013) The Reading Brain in the Digital Age: The Science of Paper versus Screens <u>http://www.scientificamerican.com/</u> article.cfm?id=reading-paper-screens

Advice for Students and Parents:

Develop both paper and Literacy skills

Students need to develop their reading, comprehension and learning skills in both arenas. They need to develop one set of skills to build their competence in reading and learning from paper, however they also need to develop a completely different set of skills: digital literacy and navigation skills. Some parents are critical of the use of technology in schools and fearful that students' handwriting and learning will be affected (Salter, 2013), however in an increasingly digital world it would be irresponsible of schools to neglect developing students' digital literacy skills. Two of the units that are useful in this area on www.studyskillshandbook.com.au are the **Reading Skills** unit and **Technology Tools** unit.

Create Opportunities to create handwriting skills.

Finland has long been known as a leader in many educational aspects. Recently it was announced that Finland will no longer teach cursive handwriting in schools. They will continue to teach printing, however, when students would normally transition to 'running writing' instead they will learn keyboarding skills. This signals a change in the traditional approach. In Australia there is comprehensive testing being undertaken to look at holding both Naplan and final Year 12 examinations online. There are no indications as to when this will take place. At this point in time, as tests and examinations are still handwritten, students are advised that when it comes to exam time, they should handwrite their study notes or if typed then print them out when they are learning them. They should also actively create opportunities to maintain their handwriting skills, consciously choosing to handwrite at times when they might normally type. Visit the **Writing Skills** unit for tips on improving handwriting as well as some special pens that will assist.

Learn to touch type.

While we have had the ability to dictate into a device for some time, this is still not in common usage. Learning to touch type is a skill that definitely pays off in the senior years in terms of saving huge amounts of time. There are links to free learning to touch type websites in the **Technology Tools** unit.

Mrs Natalie Squires Student Coordinator Last Newsletter, I discussed some hints and tips about how to assist your child with Assessment Tasks. I would like to look at **daily homework** in this Newsletter.

Homework can be the "bug bear' of a household if it is allowed to be. At this stage in a student's educational career, homework should be part and parcel' of the school day. As I spoke about at the Yr 7 Study Skills evening last year, homework needs to part of a daily routine that fits into the family situation. I would suggest something like the following.

An hour or so free time when the child arrives home from school for eating, relaxing, walking the dog, hanging out with mates, etc. Then a set homework time eg 5 - 6pm. During this time, no TV/ipods/music/etc. Ideally the child would have their own homework space to work at which they helped in setting up.

Now, what to do in this time? Hopefully, the student is using their school homework diary properly and should have a list of what is required, but! It is advisable that the student organise their hour or so of homework time – make a list of Assessment Tasks and when they are due, list daily homework eg Maths, list areas that could do with further reading ahead eg science, English, geography.

Homework includes such things as completing work due the next day, working on Assessment Tasks, summarising topics to get ready for Exams, reading ahead, gluing in sheets, completing missed or incomplete work, reading newspapers and listening to the News, discussing topics learnt with the family to get their opinion and experience, etc.

An hour will fly by if the child approaches it as a task that needs to be practiced since they still have many years of education ahead of them. At times, this hour may need to be extended by 30 minutes to allow for multiple Assessment Tasks to be worked on, or studying for Exams. It is not a time for battles or stress.

The above hints are just a useful guide to assist your child to get into a routine to assist their own education and learning. Hopefully with a little guidance early in the year we may set up good practice for the future.

STEM and the future of work in Australia

Research indicates that Australia is massively short of people with STEM skills. The UK and USA have the same problem. In Australia 16% of university students graduate with a STEM subject degree. Compared to all other degrees STEM has flat lined since 2003 despite the many programs to encourage kids to take on these subjects. Australia has a shortage of people in a sector where 75% of the new jobs created will require a STEM qualification. This is compounded by the fact that many jobs will disappear to automation and disruptive technologies. Many new jobs will be created and it is these jobs that require a competence in technology.

It's hard to get students to engage in technology. They love to use it and will be the beneficiaries of its boundless opportunities but getting them to study these subjects is another matter.

Without a doubt all jobs old and new will require some knowledge of technology. Those in the work force or reentering understand this and are enrolling in technology courses to upskill to secure their future jobs.

So how do we get students interested in STEM and in particular technology courses? Much of the discussion is around teaching these subjects. Finding teachers who are passionate and who can inspire kids to tackle what are not easy subjects. It's also about integrating these subjects so when taught they link together and are not taught in isolation.

Kids are natural engineers. Anyone watching a child play with Lego can see that they've figured out to stack blocks to form bridges, houses, planes and cars. Introducing Lego electronics adds another layer of complexity. This creative innovative spirit however doesn't carry into teenage years for most students.

Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Academic), Professor Andrew Parfitt, said the University was

delighted to have made a total of 8,399 offers to date to students to commence studies in 2016, reflecting strong interest in our undergraduate academic programs.

"This year our total offers to date included the 4,136 UAC Main Round Offers, as well as 1,126 offers to enabling students and 808 offers to students transferring degree programs, both previously processed through UAC, and 2,329 offers made in a number of early rounds, including our High Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) Guaranteed Offer Scheme."

Demand for the University's programs increased to over 10,000 first preferences in 2016, and the total offers made to date are currently comparable to last year.

Professor Parfitt said that with more than 17,500 applications from students across Australia nominating at least one preference for an undergraduate degree at the University of Newcastle, interest in UON programs remains strong.

"Around 80 per cent of our offers to date are to students in the Hunter, Central Coast and Mid North Coast regions, cementing our place as the university of choice in our region."

"Importantly, the quality of students choosing to study at Newcastle continues to be high. A quarter of our offers are to applicants with an ATAR of 90.25 or above, and the median ATAR of applicants receiving an offer is 82.75," Professor Parfitt said.

However, Professor Parfitt cautioned that ATAR is not the only indicator of success in higher education, and the University was pleased to participate in the Schools Recommendation Scheme for the first time. "The University of Newcastle has a proud tradition of both excellence and equity, and many of our degree programs are accessible through a variety of proven pathways, including enabling education and TAFE."

Professor Parfitt said the University's commitment to STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) education was recognised by the calibre of applicants in these areas, with a strong increase in demand across several programs including engineering, surveying, architecture and industrial design.

Areas with the largest number of offers remain nursing, arts, teaching and business.
