

To the Families and Friends of the St Paul's Community......

Today, I write the newsletter from Brisbane where I am attending the EduTECH Conference with 10 other teachers and IT support staff from St Paul's. EduTECH is an annual conference that explores the digital world and its impact on teaching and learning in the 21st Century.

Susan Greenfield was the keynote speaker at the morning session. She is a world renowned neuroscientist from England. The brain science stuff has fascinated me for years and to listen to her observations and research into the human brain was wonderful. She suggested that adolescents are connected to the internet in one form or another for 18 hours a day! Given that most have smart phones and that they check them from the moment they wake up to the moment they go to bed the statistic is quite reasonable. She also suggested that kids who love video games have similar brain chemistry and wiring to those who end up addicted to gambling. It all has to do with the release of dopamine into the frontal cortex of the brain, an area that is not fully developed until we reach our mid-twenties. This is certainly a worrying thought.

Dr Greenfield also spoke about the need for young people to have human, face to face interaction constantly through-out our lives but particularly as we grow and develop. Given that the medium that many of our young communicate is via facebook, sms messaging and the like, it is clear that they are only experiencing 10% of communication. The rest includes body language, tone and facial expression as well as environment. She argued that kids need to read, to play with one another, to play games of imagination and to get dirty! The strongest message was to use stories in their play. To read and to tell stories is key to a balanced, well rounded young person because they have a conceptual framework that allows their imagination to run wild. She likened the brain to be like a muscle – use it, stretch it, build it through real and positive interactions and stories and it will become stronger and more flexible.

EduTECH is a powerful conference for all educators. It is hoped that the team who are with me will bring back new ideas and new thinking to their roles at St Paul's, making it an even better school.

We have been doing a lot of work over the past few months on our excursion policies and procedures. One area that I would like to bring your attention to is the timely payment of excursion fees and charges along with the permission notes that are needed for your child to attend. It is vital that payments are made on or before the due date and that permission notes are signed and returned. Recently we had a situation where a note was brought in on the day of the excursion and unfortunately the child was unable to attend. He had missed the due date by over a week but

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thought it would be okay to come on the day and be expected to go. We book buses based on the numbers attending and for this excursion, the bus was full. If he had brought the note in on time, the appropriate sized bus would have been booked. As you can see, it is important to get the notes and the payments in on time to avoid disappointment. We are also using a new payment system, QKR which also impacts on the excursion planning timelines. For this and other planning reasons, we ask that payments for excursions are made by the due date.

Our P&F have funded the purchase of new water coolers/ bottle refill stations. We have ordered 5 of them and will organise their installation in the coming months. The P&F do a wonderful job supporting the school. Last year, the group funded the big fans in the hall. These fans have made a huge difference to the comfort levels in that facility. The new water coolers which have a counting feature that shows how many water bottles are saved from land fill will be a great addition to our school. I thank them for their work in supporting the school in such a practical way.

YEAR 10 -11 INFORMATION EVENING

YEAR 11 REPORTS

With the completion of the Year 11 Assessment block last week, staff are busily marking papers to provide feedback to Year 11 students. This feedback phase is vitally important to learning and I would encourage all students to use this time wisely to ensure that you consolidate your understanding by engaging in dialogue with your teachers. In a few weeks time, Year 11 reports will be finalised and sent home, before Parent -Teacher Interviews will be held for this group on Monday June 27 after their Semester Award ceremony.

YEARS 7-10 ASSESSMENTS AND REPORTS

As a trial this year, we have removed a solid week of junior assessments this term to allow for greater variety in the type of assessments used as well as to spread the density of assessments. We have also anticipated that this will provide students with more face-to-face learning time.

As a result of this structural change, students will finish their assessments later in the term than usual, which means that junior reports will now be issued early in the first week of Term 3. Parent-Teacher Interviews will occur as usual in Week 2 of Term 3.

The event included a speech by the respected author Fr Denis Edwards and a presentation from Jacqui Remond, the National Director of <u>Catholic Earthcare</u>.

Pope Francis message is that human beings need to recognise that: "Nature cannot be regarded as something separate from ourselves or as a mere setting in which we live. We are part of nature, included in it and thus in constant interaction with it."

His message for Christians is: "Living our vocation to be protectors of God's handiwork is essential to a life of virtue; it is not an optional or a secondary aspect of our Christian experience."








A Midwinter Night's Dream

What is Tournament of the Minds?

Tournament of Minds is a problem solving program for teams of students from both primary and secondary years. They are required to solve demanding, open-ended challenges from one of the following disciplines:

Science -Technology - Engineering Mathematics - Social Sciences - Language Literature

It is an opportunity for students with a passion for learning and problem solving to demonstrate their skills and talents in an exciting, vibrant, and public way.

Our Aim...

Tournament's aim is to enhance the potential of our students by developing diverse skills, enterprise, time management, and



the discipline to work collaboratively within a challenging and competitive environment.

The Tournament Objectives

- To provide the stimulation of real, open-ended challenges
- To develop creative problem solving approaches and techniques
- To foster cooperative learning and teamwork
- To promote knowledge and appreciation of self and others
- To encourage experimentation and risk taking
- To expand and reward creative and divergent thinking
- To stimulate a spirit of inquiry and a love of learning
- To develop enterprise
- To celebrate excellence

The Challenge...

Teams are required to work together on a **Long Term Challenge** for six weeks without assistance from teachers, parents or peers. They are encouraged to explore possibilities and experiment with ideas as they endeavour to produce their best possible solution. They develop a creative and original way to communicate this solution to others, working within predefined parameters such as limited materials, complex challenge criteria and the deadline of Tournament Day.

Students present the product of their ideas - their challenge solution - to a panel of judges and an audience on Tournament Day. They have ten minutes in which to present and must do so within a 3 metre by 3 metre performance area.

The teams must also participate in an unseen **Spontaneous Challenge** on Tournament Day. This challenge requires rapid interchange of ideas, the ability to think creatively and well developed group cooperation skills.

How do I apply?

Positions are strictly limited, as such, there will be a selection process involved. To be considered for this prestigious opportunity you must see me for an application form before **Friday**, **17**th **of June**. 

THE NEW BASICS:

Big data reveals the skills young people need for the New Work Order

In this issue we focus on the newly released report from Foundation for Young Australians www.fya.org.au about the skills young people will need for the New Work Order. The link to this important report is in the feature article below title "The New Basics Report".



Youth unemployment is high, and youth underemployment is even higher, with hundreds of thousands of young Australians struggling to find full time work.

Australian employers are hungry for talent but report that they are finding difficulties finding young people with essential workplace skills. These essential workplace skills are 'enterprise skills' and this report reveals that employers are placing a premium on these skills at a time of significant change in our workforce.

The high demand for enterprise skills underscores the importance of general capabilities being retained and elevated in the school curriculum. What's more, the jobs of the future demand enterprising skills 70% more than jobs that are at risk of automation.

Enterprise skills are transferable skills required in many jobs.



What are "enterprise skills"?

Enterprise skills are transferable skills that enable young people to engage with a complex world and navigate the challenges they will inherit. Enterprise skills are not just for entrepreneurs; they are skills that are required in many jobs. They have been found to be a powerful predictor of long term job success. The terms used to describe these skills vary across different contexts: sometimes called generic, soft, or 21st century skills. However, the meaning is clear: a set of skills and characteristics that enable young people to confront the challenges of change and navigate a complex future.

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What are "technical skills"?

By contrast, technical skills are often specific to a particular task, role or industry. Technical skills include qualifications such as licences, certificates or degrees but also include skills acquired on-the-job that are specific to a role or industry. Such skills may include surgical

procedures if you are a veterinarian, hair styling techniques if you are a hairdresser, or Java script if you are a computer programmer.







