To the Families and Friends of the St Paul's Community......

We begin this Lenten season with the School joining together in our Ash Wednesday Liturgy. The ceremony asked the students to reflect on their humanness, weakness and mortality. We spoke to them about the heart of the penitential season of Lent: a conversion of heart that comes from a renewed and revitalised relationship with our God who is gracious and merciful and who gives abundant life to all of us.

I found this story about the work of Caritas around the world. It is an inspiring story of hope and passion. It gives a real sense of the idea that out of very small things, amazing things grow. It is the story of a woman in Bangladesh,

In November 2000 during a visit to CAFOD partners in Bangladesh as a Millennium Awardee, I met a most astonishing woman who has lived in my memory since.

She was physically unprepossessing. Well short of five foot tall, with the teeth and hair of an Asian Ken Dodd, she beamed as she was introduced to us as the owner of a scraggy brown cow.

She was the marvel of her village. Several years previously she had been the stereotypical meek Bangladeshi woman. Married, subordinate, submissive, confined to the house and not consulted on the fate of her children, she had decided to ask CAFOD's partner, Caritas Bangladesh, for a loan. To qualify for a loan she needed a deposit but she had no money and no hope of ever having any.

Her response was to save ten grains of rice every time she cooked.

When she had a kilo of rice, she took it to Caritas Bangladesh and borrowed an amount of money equal to twice the value of the rice. With this small amount she bought a few chickens which she looked after until they laid eggs. Some of the eggs

she sold and some she allowed to hatch out so as to increase her flock. By the time our group met her, she had paid off her debt, made enough money to buy a cow and had become a respected person in the village. She had even been consulted by her husband on the future of her son.

One of the first things I did on returning home to England was to meticulously work out, ten grains at a time, how long it would take to reach a kilo.

The answer? 18 months! (Downloaded 28 Feb 2017 - http://www.liverpoolcatholic.org.uk/Justice_and_Peace)

This story of passion, hope and perseverance talks to our hearts. I hope that as we begin this Lenten Journey, that we look out to others and strive to be the best we can be.

'Perfecting our Practice' as a Community of Learners'

Dear St Paul's Community



Thank you to our Year 12 and their Parents who attended the HSC evening on Monday 20th February. I hope the information was of value to you and that you acquired a deeper understanding of the process.

On the 21st February, The Sydney Morning Herald's front page featured an article on 'Back to basics: Focus on Grammar.' The report focused its attention on the HSC and the significant changes that are coming into effect. Whilst reading through it, I reflected upon my nephew and him being a Year 7 student at Christian Brothers' in Lewisham. A talented sportsman and a very gifted artist, I pondered over the number of hours he trains per week to perfect his practice as a swimmer and a footballer. Swimming for Sydney University sees him training for ten hours per week, either a 5am start or straight after school. Coupled with this he spends his weekends competing in tournaments. Being a footballer with the Red Devil's Academy, means he trains for four hours per week, with a two-hour time slot for weekend matches. In total, he spends sixteen hours perfecting his practice as a sportsman. In his spare time, you'll see him sketching and re-sketching mythical creatures, dragons and gargoyles until his artwork is flawless.

Two weeks ago, I spent the weekend with my brother and on the Sunday morning, I played my role as the dutiful aunty and helped my nephew structure an essay for his Geography homework. During our conversation, I asked him how many hours he practices his writing skills. Contorting his face to resemble a hand held puppet, he asked me was I 'having a laugh?'

Writing, like painting, is an art form. A well written piece of writing can take you to undiscovered places; can generate all types of emotions, it can broaden the mind; excite the imagination and bring us into the world of the author.

I say all of this because we are seeing the re-emergence and appreciation of the written word. Changes to the HSC means students will have to show that they understand the techniques and features that make up a written response. The 'dumping', for want of a better word, of learnt content, without much attention being given to grammar, will now be perceived as inadequate.

Alexandra Smith the editor of this article, begins by informing us that 'All Year 12 students will have to study grammar and dramatically improve their writing skills as part of the most significant changes to the state's HSC in decades'. From now on we 'will see fewer topics being studied in favour of less breadth and more depth in all subjects'. For me, this is too late.

She then goes on to quote the President of BOSTES/NESA, Tom Alegounarias, he informs us that the change will see "depth and mastery" of learnt content. He goes on to explain that a new topic, "the Craft of Writing, would be mandatory for all English students."

What then does all of this mean for us? We live in the digital era; an era where we have devices that write for us; devices that shield us from making mistakes; devices that predict our text and correct our spelling, so if we have machines that do all this for us, is there a need to go back to basics? The answer is 'Yes'.

Mr Alegounarias argues that "being able to write well, and understanding the mechanics of good writing, including the correct use of grammar, [has] never been so important, [especially] with the demand for digital content increasing at a rapid rate."

I'm sure that you, like my brother, spend half of your week at sporting events, dancing festivals, music lessons and the like; hours spent supporting your child as they *perfect their practice*. We know that mastery takes time, but the starting line is in the younger years, therefore, my plea to you is to adopt the mantra of Tom Alegounarias by going back to basics. Where possible, I ask that you put time aside for your child to master the art of academic writing; be that a Geographical report; a Scientific procedure; a Religious or Legal discussion; an English narrative or an Historical explanation. It's through our constant practice that we become experts in our field.

P.S. I received a text message from my nephew yesterday asking if I was going to visit him next weekend. He informed me he has an RE and Geography assignment due. I haven't as yet responded; I'm waiting for him to end his sentence with a full stop.... one must be cruel to be kind!

The following is an article from the business journal - CEO Magazine and was written by Dr J Brockis regarding mental health and resilience. Although the audience is for business leaders, I think the principles of positive resilience are more than applicable for the families and students of St Paul's.

CREATING MENTAL TOUGHNESS WITH POSITIVE RESILIENCE

By Dr Jenny Brockis. Dr Jenny Brockis is a Medical Practitioner, healthy brain advocate and a renowned professional speaker.

Being mentally tough in the face of adversity starts with knowing how to create positive resilience

While predominantly talked about and developed in the armed forces and sports arenas, research suggests that mental toughness is also highly pertinent to workplace performance, psychological health and wellbeing. But what defines mental toughness? A good insight comes from the description of the selection course for the SAS:

"It is designed to break an individual down to see their character, revealing strengths and weaknesses in situations where they are at the absolute limits of human endurance, to come up with a solution to achieve the mission. Selection gives a good insight into the soul of the individual."

Essentially, it's the inner discipline needed for true resilience; the determination, endurance and self-belief necessary to successfully navigate all challenges and deal with the discomfiture of possible failure and negative emotion. The appearance of a shiny Teflon coating isn't enough.

Anyone wishing to building mental toughness must therefore start by identifying the components required for greater positive resilience.

Focus on what you can control

Determine what it is possible for you to influence and change, and let go of the rest. This conserves mental energy and reduces stress levels. Staying focused on the big picture reduces the tendency to get stuck in the minutiae that can otherwise lead us to get bogged down in a mire of "what-ifs".

Change the game to concentrate on the process

Sports psychologists know that a team that focuses on actions rather than results has a higher chance of winning. While winning makes us feel good and is immensely satisfying, concentration on the actions required to get you there alleviates the emotion (that's to say the fear and anxiety) associated with potential loss, and reduces risk aversion.

Show your passion

Your inner conviction, beliefs and values keep you working hard towards your goals. Checking in regularly with your thoughts and feelings about why you're doing something reassures and validates your purpose. This elevates mood, provides a greater sense of meaning, and determines the level of drive needed to keep going.

Embrace the possibility of failure

Positive resilience is about embracing a challenge as an opportunity for growth and success, while acknowledging the reality of potential failure. Mental toughness recognises that taking a calculated risk is always part of the process.

Building greater positive resilience requires acknowledgement of our human frailties and imperfections, characteristics we would often prefer to either ignore or downplay. It is through these that we learn how to manage thoughts, feelings and behaviours for both the present and the future.

Being mentally flexible enables different perspectives to be considered, promotes possibility-thinking, and creates a positive feedback loop where taking action further elevates confidence.

Adapt and respond

Our capacity for adaptability enables us to successfully manage changes in our environment and is far easier to achieve when the brain is in a relaxed and rested state. Getting sufficient sleep and taking time out to uncouple from focused work facilitates the mental work done at a subconscious level to consider all options and develop the best solution.

Being mentally tough is increasingly important in our complex and challenging world. Remembering to acknowledge and celebrate all success – and failure – and the contribution made by others creates a workplace where grit, tenacity and the willingness to see things through in the face of adversity are valued and appreciated.

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Year 7 News

It's hard to believe our Year 7 students have been at high school for a month already! We have packed in a lot in these first five weeks, with plenty more to come before the first break. Thank you to the many students and parents that attended last night's Information Night. At a rough estimate there were about 130 people – a great turnout. For those unable to make it, the night looked something like this:

Mrs Tracey Evans (Year 7 Coordinator) spoke about some general aspects of school, such as new friendships that have formed, the Peer Support Program that is now underway with our Year 10 students helping Year 7 students adjust to the many changes found at high school, using student diaries and tips for how to set out each day to record home learning (see example below) and uniform and attendance requirements.

An example of how to set out each day in the day is as follows:

Each period is listed so that students can clearly see if they have topics or assessments to follow up that evening.

Ms Roisin McVeigh, Assistant Principal: Teaching and Learning, discussed home learning (different to homework) the benefits of practising writing and how to exercise and develop our brains by continually asking questions.

Mr James Furey, Assistant Principal: Welfare, spoke about his role in overseeing transport and the pastoral care system at St Paul's. He spoke about the many levels of care at St Paul's and the number of people that are here to support students, including Tutor Group teachers, Student Coordinators, School Counsellors and our Pastoral Care Worker. Mr Furey also addressed the topic of bullying and how we work with everyone involved to resolve the problem.

Mr Graeme Selmes, Principal, spoke about our upcoming BYOD night. You should have received an email regarding this, including a link to a survey regarding the different information sessions that will be available on the night. Students should bring their devices on the night to get the maximum benefit from each session. Mr Selmes also read a reflection on the things an 18-year-old should know – an interesting piece from *Julie Lythcott-Haims*, author and former Dean of Freshmen at Stanford University.

Mrs Evans then concluded the night by reminding students and parents that at St Paul's we look to develop the whole person – academic, social, mental and spiritual – and realise the importance of each of these in helping students become the best person they can be. 



As you are aware, we are planning a cultural tour to France and Germany departing 11th April 2018 and returning on 28th April 2018, bringing the trip to a total of 18 days. Working with GET Tours we are currently finalising prices and have a meeting scheduled with our Tour Company representative for 8 March. Shortly after this there will be an information evening held at St Paul's where GET Tours will run us through the tour and provide a detailed summary of itinerary and costing. This will be a chance for parents to ask any questions they may have. Shortly after this, a deposit will be called for in order to secure a place on the trip. Details of this will be given at the meeting which will be held prior to the Term One School holidays.

The draft itinerary was made available to you last week and we trust that you have had time to discuss this with your son/daughter.
