To the Families and Friends of the St Paul's Community......

This week we had a visit from Gemma Sisia and Winrose Andason Mollel from The School of St Jude in Arusha, Tanzania. The School of St Jude began some 15 years ago with 1 teacher and 3 students. It now has almost 1800 students and offers high quality free education for the people of this region.

Winrose is a graduate of the school and Gemma is the founder of this wonderful enterprise. They are travelling throughout Australia to speak about St Jude's and to hopefully raise much needed funds to continue this great work. We are most grateful that we were able to hear their stories and in some small way, support this vital work, particularly in this Lenten season.

What's in a Name?

Earlier in the year, St Paul's asked a number of questions about the nature of our name and its link to our primary reason for being – to provide high quality Catholic Education to our young men and women. We conducted some surveys of the wider community and the staff.

The results of that survey are as follows:

Community and Staff:

Do you feel that the current official name "St Paul's High School, Booragul" adequately illustrates that we are a Catholic School?

Community: (135 responses) Yes- 37% No - 63% Staff: (70 responses) Yes - 38% No - 62%

Which of the following suggested names do you feel better reflect St Paul's status as a Catholic, faith based community?

Community: St Paul's Catholic College Booragul – 70%

St Paul's High School Booragul – 30%

Staff: St Paul's Catholic College Booragul – 80%

St Paul's High School Booragul - 20%

So where to next?

I will be meeting with Larry Keating, Principal of St Mary's Catholic College, Gateshead to discuss the process he went through in the rebranding of that school last year. Given that St Mary's is moving towards a 7-12 environment with new uniforms and a new crest, it is clear that the work done there will be much more detailed than that which will need to happen here. In saying that, I hope that the meeting will help us avoid any pitfalls as we continue our own journey. After that meeting, The School Leadership team will meet with representatives from the Catholic Schools Office to ascertain the way forward.

Year 12 Retreat:

Year 12 students leave next Wednesday for their Retreat experience at Elanora on the

Northern Beaches of Sydney. The Retreat is probably one of the absolute highlights of the student's time at St Paul's. It is an opportunity for them to reflect on where they have come from, the supports that they have in their own journeys and a real chance to pause their busy and sometimes stressful lives. It comes just after mid-term assessments and allows them to leave

the hustle and bustle of their lives behind in an environment that is very conducive to rest and regeneration.

One of the real temptations is to resist the beauty of withdrawing from the busyness of their lives. We know that connectedness for adolescents is something that appears to be crucial for their perceived wellbeing. I encourage the Year 12 students to leave their mobile devices at home. To retreat is to step away from the norm; an opportunity to be with their own spirit and their own God.

A huge thank you must go to Mr Michael Doyle and the team of teachers and support staff who willingly give up their own time to make this event happen.

Last week we hosted 2 major events. The first was an Information Night for Year 7 students and their parents and caregivers based around the BYOD program. This night coincided with the P&F AGM and meeting. The genesis of the event was a wish by the P&F to have other ways where parents can engage in partnership with the school. It was a most successful event with over 80 people attending. Thank you to Mr Furey, Mr Newell, Mr Moroney, Mrs Beezley, Mr Harbourn and Mr Hancock for making the night such as success.

The second event was our annual Parents in the Classroom that coincides with Catholic Schools Week. This too, was a most successful event with parents joining their Year 7 children in the class environment. Thank you to Mrs Furey and Mrs Evans the year 7 coordinators for organizing the event. A thank you must also go to the staff who hosted the parents in their rooms. It can be a little daunting teaching with adults in the room but from all reports, the mums and dads behaved themselves and not one detention was issued! Thank you also to Michelle Anderson, Alice Grant, Janine Turton and the team in Hospitality who catered for the beautiful morning tea.

We have engaged Mr Steve Zolezzi to lead the staff in a vital program of Professional Development based on Wellbeing. Steve is a practicing psychologist who most recently was Head of Student Wellbeing with our own CSO. Before that Steve has been a consultant in many Sydney schools and has presented at many conferences Australia-wide on Adolescent Wellbeing.

As a result, the first day of next term Monday 24th April will be a Pupil Free Day. As the next day is ANZAC Day, Students will return on Wednesday 26th April.


Greg Piper, the State local member for Lake Macquarie has asked if we could get names and addresses to his office so that he could see if such a bus service might be possible.

BUILDING CONCENTRATION SKILLS

Many students find it difficult to concentrate and stay focused when they are doing their schoolwork at home. So what can we do to improve concentration levels? Try these top tips:

- 1. **IMPROVE THE ENVIRONMENT**: Have a good hard look at the environment you are trying to concentrate in. Is it noisy? Are there more exciting things happening around you? Is it too hot? Too cold? Are you uncomfortable? Too comfortable? What can you do to make the space more conducive to concentration?
- 2. **BLOCKS OF TIME:** If you are someone who finds it difficult to concentrate at home don't try and study for too long at a time. Instead tell yourself you will work for 20-30 minutes then you can have a break. If you know it is only 20 -30 minutes it is much easier to concentrate than if it was for an indefinite period of time.
- 3. ANCHOR TO THE PRESENT: Create a focus word that brings you back on task. We all daydream. The key is to start to pay more attention to when you are doing it and then immediately take action. If your key word for example was 'orange' when you notice you are day-dreaming say 'orange orange orange' to refocus your attention to your work.
- **RESET THE BRAIN:** Sometimes you just need a time-out from what you are doing in order to be able to concentrate again. If your attention is constantly wandering, then get up and have a drink, walk outside, kick a ball just take 5 to 10 minutes to clear your head so you can come back fresh to your work.
- WORK OUT PEAK TIMES: Start to pay attention to what time of the day you are most focused. That's when you need to do the harder work or the work that requires greatest concentration. If you know you get tired after dinner don't leave the difficult work until then.
- 6 **CARROT AND STICK:** Some people are motivated by working towards rewards, others by avoiding punishment. Give yourself a target time to focus with a little reward at the end if you achieve it or maybe a little punishment if you don't!

Interim Reports

The benefit of the Interim Reports is to both reinforce the excellence in a student's approaches to learning, whilst also identifying any early areas of concern.

In addition, we have decided to upload all academic reports on the parent portal, preferring not to post them home. However, if you are unable to access the portal, please contact the office and we will be more than happy to print one for you.

As always, parents wishing further clarification about any aspect of the report is encouraged to contact us; as always we are always seeking to work collaboratively with you for the benefit of your child.

Curriculum Information

Curriculum Matters

Next week Year 12 students will have two days of exams – Monday 20th & Tuesday 21st March. The following points are worth noting:

Students need only be at school when examinations are on.

Misreading of the exam timetable will not be an acceptable excuse for being late or missing an exam.

Students should ensure that they arrive at least 15 minutes before the commencement time for their scheduled exam, and remain until the exam's conclusion. They should also ensure that they have all necessary equipment required for the exams.

Students attending school outside of exam times are expected to use the Library facility for private study where the Library is available.

Students missing an examination for any reason must ensure that the *Assessment Task Anomaly Procedure* is carried out. Notification to the school at the time of the exam, and subsequent completion of the appropriate Absence/Illness/Misadventure forms are mandatory requirements of this procedure.

Normal school uniform is to be respected and worn to examinations.

Finally, normal classes will resume on Monday March 27 following the Year 12 Retreat.

Welcome to Week 8 and how quickly the Term has flown. There is only 3 weeks left until the next holidays! Unfortunately, there are a number of **Assessment Tasks** for the students to complete and submit before then.

Interim Reports will be going home to parents in the next few weeks. This is a very brief indication of how your child is settling into school so far this year. I hope that they might trigger some conversations around expectations and that theme of "success" that I have asked students to strive for this year.

At the Year 9 Assembly on Wednesday, I reminded the girls about checking the **length of their skirts** to ensure self-respect and modesty. I ask parents to assist me in this area please. I also reminded the students that shoes are still to be black leather polishable lace-up style **school shoes** – not boots or canvas etc. I would like to thank parents for your support with making sure your child wears the **correct uniform** to school each day by referring to the information I sent you all earlier in the year. We have only had to send out three uniform letters so far this term.

Along with day-to-day reminders, I spoke to the students about each other. I reminded them that they do **not know anyone else's full story**, and therefore teasing and hassling may be the last straw for that person. I also reminded them that a smile or a simple RUOK question might just make their day. I told them that I and other adults in their lives might be able to help them if we know about the issue or concern and that sharing that worry or concern will ultimately relieve them of anxiety and stress. **Asking for help is a sign of strength, maturity and wisdom**. As parents, it is important to continue to build our relationships with our children, even when they are frustrating/ignorant/yelling/quiet/on their phone/in their room all the time. This reminds me of a reflection I once read to those of you who came to 'Parents in the Classroom' two years ago:

After creating Heaven and Earth, God created Adam and Eve, and the first thing He said was "Don't"

"Don't what", said Adam

"Don't eat the forbidden fruit", God said.

"Forbidden fruit? We have forbidden fruit? Hey, Eve, we have forbidden fruit!"

"No, way!" "Yes, way!"

"Do NOT eat the fruit!" God said.

"Why??"

"Because I am your Father and I told you so!" replied God wondering why he didn't stop at sheep.

A few minutes later, God saw His children having an apple and He wasn't happy.

"Didn't I tell you two not to eat the fruit?!"fumed God

"Uh huh" mumbled Adam

"Then why did you do it?"

"I dunno" said Eve

"She started it!" exclaimed Adam knowing there might be trouble

"Did not" "Did to" "Did not!"

Having had it with the two of them, God's punishment was that Adam and Eve should have children of their own. Thus the pattern was set and it has never changed, but there is some reassurance in this story. If you have persistently and lovingly tried to give your children wisdom and they have not taken it, don't be too hard on yourself. If God had trouble raising children, what makes us think it would be a piece of cake?!




English News

Education Perfect in Years 7&8

This year our Year 8 students have spent 374 hours online improving their literacy skills.

That's 145,215 questions answered.





Last week we trialled our first assessment task online with Year 8. It was a great success with students being able to see their results immediately. A similar Year 7 task will happen at the end of the term.

We all know the power of literacy and the impact that having a good grasp of spelling, punctuation and grammar has on your ability to communicate effectively. The government has now linked students' NAPLAN results with their HSC so you may see it as more important than ever. These are the reasons we have introduced this project into St Paul's. Each week students are assigned approximately 20 minutes' worth of learning and practice on different literacy skills. It is a great initiative that you can get behind at home with students being able to access any of the thousands of activities to personalise their learning.

Our kids are reporting great feedback on our literacy site with comments like:
