

To the Families and Friends of the St Paul's Community......

I was talking to our Year 12 cohort at their mid-course Awards ceremony. It was at the beginning of Week 3. I talked about how quick time seems to fly the older we get. The reality is that for our Year 12 cohort, they are now well past the mid-term point in their HSC preparation. Term 3 will be upon them soon and all of a sudden, they will be engaged in their final celebrations. I spoke to them about the need to stay focused and make the most of every learning opportunity. For our Year 12's, time will fly over the next two terms





On Friday this week, I will be sending an email to families that will have a link to a **survey**. This survey is designed to give us quality feedback that will help form our strategic plan. The survey will take about 10 to 15 minutes to complete and I ask that you take the time to complete it over the next week or so. The survey looks at all aspects of school life from teaching and learning to our facilities. If you do not have the ability to do the survey on line, a paper version will be available at the School Office. I thank you in advance.

Numeracy Planning

Last week, Years 7 and 9 completed the annual **NAPLAN** tests. I would like to publically congratulate all of our students in the way that they approached these exams. As you can imagine, the planning and execution of such an event is massive. At any given time we

had 170 students sitting the exams being supervised by upwards of 15 staff. The students were attentive and very cooperative at all times. They made it easy for all of us. At the end of the tests, I asked a number of the students how the

exams were. They all said it was good! We look forward to getting the results that we will then analyse and use to inform our teaching and learning in literacy and numeracy across the school.

Year 10 recently attended their **Challenge Camp**. It was a new venue and due to the fact that it was on an island in the middle of the Hawkesbury River, I was unable to visit. The staff in attendance reported that the Year 10 students were absolutely wonderful. They engaged in the program beautifully and it was clear that they had gained a great deal from the adventure.

I recently came across this advice on Cyber Safety and I thought it was timely to share it with you and to have a chat with your children about the importance of being mindful about their online presence.

Staying Safe online:



1. Keep your identity to yourself

Don't tell anyone your real name and address or what neighbourhood you live in. Here's the general rule: Don't give out any information that a predator could possibly use to find you. Even small clues like what

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school you attend or the name of your sports team is enough for a predator to figure out your identity. You wouldn't tell some 40-year-old man or woman you met at the mall your name and where you live, would you? So why would you tell CoolGuy985 or HotChick16 from the chat room?

2. Your Username and Password Belong to You ... And Only You

Don't give your username or password to anyone. It's just that simple. What if a friend logs on and pretends to be you, and then says something really awful and gets you in trouble? Sure, it might seem funny to the "former" friend, but it's serious and it happens every day. With your username and password, someone can post language that gets you expelled from school, in trouble with your parents, or even in trouble with the law. Keep your name and password private.

3. The Internet has a Great Memory ... So Keep Its Memory of You Clean

Just because the Internet is so massive does not mean that embarrassing or risqué pictures, rude or mean comments, or illegal activities will disappear forever. Watch what you post about yourself or others -- or allow your friends to post about you -- because you may have to live with it for a long, long time.

4. Be Good Online ... Just Like You Are Offline

Writing "hate" emails, hacking into other people's computers, illegally downloading music or movies and making online threats are just as illegal on the Internet as they are in the real world. You cannot hide behind a screen name and get away with it. Watch what you write -- because someone else is watching what you write!

5. Be Extremely Careful about Meeting Someone in Person

A very simple rule: "Never meet anyone in person that you meet online." That said, many teens do make good friends online. You just have to be super-cautious and make sure other people you know and trust also know this "new" online person.

If you do decide to meet the new person, bring your parents with you. All of you meet together in a public area like a mall where there are tons of people around. Ask that the person's parents come, too. If the situation feels creepy, it probably is creepy! Just like in the real world, trust your gut instincts -- and walk away.

6. Your Parents Are Ultimately Responsible for Minors Online

Even if your parents don't know much about the Internet, tell them what types of web sites you go to. They will probably be interested and impressed with your Internet skills. They may also help you avoid potential problems if a web site or new "friend" looks sketchy.

Some Extra Words of Caution

Almost Everything on the Internet Is Traceable !!!!!!!!!

Every search, web site visit, online posting and email is registered or recorded somewhere on the Internet. Once you send something out on the Internet, it's almost impossible to take it back. You have to be careful -- not impulsive -- when you write emails or go to chat rooms.

People Live in "Fantasyland" Online

Even though someone writes, "Hi, I'm a really cool 15-year-old guy from Sydney, in reality that guy may be a 60 year old man or even your next-door neighbor. Use scrutiny and caution.

Your Information Can Be Sold to Others

Every web site has this thing called a "privacy policy." It will tell you how that web site uses all the personal information about you, like your name. In some cases, though, when you're not looking, some web sites ignore their privacy policy and sell your email address to other companies. When you open your email one day, you might have 150 spam emails in your inbox as a result. If a web site is asking for too much information about you, take control and leave the site. (Again, would you give this information to some older stranger at the mall? Probably not.)

Dear Parents

Much has been reported in the last week about the impact of funding for Catholic systemic schools and links with fee increases for families over the next ten years. As the Diocese of Maitland Newcastle is one of two NSW dioceses experiencing strong enrolment growth, I wish to thank you for choosing Catholic education and therefore respond to the parents of our 19,331 students to assure them that the funding reforms will not adversely affect our schools.

Whilst we have not yet received the exact figures from the government's revised Gonski reforms, it is important that you are not alarmed or concerned at the statements in print and visual media. We will examine the figures in detail and inform parents of the impact within Maitland Newcastle Catholic schools.

Firstly we are disappointed the Minister has failed to consult with the Catholic school sector prior to setting the education budget. One in five children educated in NSW is in a Catholic school. Although it is true to say there will be an average increase of 3.83% over the next three years, in an attempt to simplify a very complex method of allocation of funding beyond 2020, the National Liberal Government decision has impacted on some Catholic school education systems in NSW. We do not yet have the data to state categorically the impact on Maitland Newcastle Catholic schools, but we do need more discussion with government for the period beyond 2020.

In the Diocese of Maitland Newcastle we will continue to receive an increase over the next three years, and beyond 2020 we expect increases will be based on the indexation rate used by Treasury. I expect this will not eventuate in substantial school fee increases for Maitland Newcastle Catholic schools. Apart from the normal adjustments which affect school fees each year, parents should not be alarmed by some of the reports that are inferring major increases in fees.

In coming days parents will observe a government website that lists the government funding for each school. As the funds are allocated on socio economic status parents will note substantial differences between suburbs within our diocese. Regardless, our system will continue to pool all of the funds and allocate them equitably across all of our 58 schools. This is the nature of our Catholic school system and ensures the smaller regional and other disadvantaged schools are sustainable through the support of the system of Catholic schools.

We will be actively seeking formal communication with the current Liberal Government Minister to reassess the budget allocations beyond 2020 and expect that it will become an issue for Catholic school parents in the next federal election.

When the figures are released and analysed I will endeavour to communicate with all parents the likely impact for 2018 and beyond.

Thank you for your continued support for catholic education.

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From the Assistant Principal - Welfare

Student Absences:

I would like to remind families of the process for student absences and mention our CSO requirements for habitual nonattendance by students.

If a student is absent from School without prior notification, I would encourage parents to call the School on the morning of the absence (if possible), to alert Administration of the pending absence. The School must receive notification by either phone, email or written note. This is a legal requirement to justify absences and amend our student attendance records. Absences are recorded as either an 'explained' or 'unexplained' absence based on whether the School receives communication from home.

A student who is absent will be marked absent on our electronic rolls and then parents will receive an SMS indicating this by mid-morning.

For most students and families this is a simple communication process and the School records all this information against the student for each Semester.

For students who have longer absences and are unexplained or unjustified, the CSO requires us to administer the following process:

- ◆ 1-3 days absence a phone call home to check on the student and offer any support;
- ♦ 5-10 days absence a phone call and written communication to discuss any issues;
- ♦ 11-20 days absence continued communication home and written correspondence to request a meeting with the School;
- ♦ 21-30 days absent continued communication, written correspondence and consultation with CSO's Assistant Director
- ♦ Above 30 days absent involvement of the CSO's Assistant Director and Child Protection Unit as well as reporting the absences to Family and Community Services (previously DOCS).

This is a supportive process but families need to be aware that all students need to be at School and always communicate with the School any ongoing welfare issues that may affect student attendance.

Although this is not a regular issue at St Paul's, I think it is important that all families are aware of our obligations and consequences for students missing unjustified extended periods of school. Therefore, I would encourage families to speak with their respective Student Coordinators to access appropriate support.

Winter Uniform:

A reminder to all students, that they should consult their School Diaries/Website as to the School's winter uniform requirements. The expectation is that any student who is out of uniform needs a signed note from home explaining this temporary situation. Students who receive three uniform deficiencies without such a note will have a letter sent home explaining that another deficiency will result in an Afternoon Detention.

I would encourage families who have any concerns here to contact their Student Coordinator to discuss the issues and seek support where needed.

I'd also like to wish good luck to Year 11 in your upcoming half-yearly's, and to the junior school commencing exams in a couple of weeks – remember to work hard and try your best so you can be proud of the results you achieve.

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On another note, I'd just like to mention how it's been really great the last few months to see our community spirit become so apparent through each year group's involvement in fundraising activities, and I hope we can continue and build on this throughout this term to make it an enjoyable one.

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Curriculum Administration

Weeks 5 and 6 of this term see a number of formal examinations occurring for students in Years 7 – 11 and I take this opportunity to remind students that it is important to plan for the coming weeks. Checking dates of assessment tasks, reading exam timetables carefully, asking questions of teachers and planning study time across these weeks will allow students to prepare confidently. Time management and planning for study means taking an honest and realistic look at how time is spent both at school and at home. I encourage students to talk to their teachers and to seek assistance in preparing well for both the upcoming exams and other assessment tasks.

The Year 11 Exam Block commences on 22 May and runs until Friday 26 May.

Normal classes will resume on Monday 29 May 2017

Students have already received a copy of the Exam Timetable and Procedures. The timetable is also available on the *School Portal under Student Documents – Assessment Notifications 2017.*

May I remind Year 11 students and families of the following:

- ⇒ **Year 11 students need only be at school when examinations are on**. Misreading of the exam timetable will not be an acceptable excuse for being late or missing an exam.
- ⇒ Students attending school outside of exam times are expected to use the Library facility for private study where the Library is available.
- ⇒ Students missing an examination for any reason must ensure that the Absence, Illness, Misadventure Procedures are carried out. Notification to the school at the time of the exam, and subsequent completion of the appropriate Absence, Illness, Misadventure forms are mandatory requirements of this procedure.
- ⇒ Wherever possible "catch-up" examinations should take place during the examination block, when the individual student concerned does not have a scheduled examination. These exams are to be organised with Leaders of Pedagogy (Studies Coordinators) on the submission of the Absence, Illness, Misadventure Form to the relevant Subject Leader of Pedagogy.
- ⇒ Normal school uniform is to be respected and worn to examinations.



If a student is absent for an exam, please follow the correct procedure of notifying the school of this absence. Firstly contact the school the morning of the exam, informing the relevant Leaders of Pedagogy and Student Coordinator. A Doctor's certificate is also required to be attached to an *Absence*, *Illness and Misadventure* (*AIM*) form and the student will be expected to complete the missed exam on their first day back after the absence or on the day/time agreed to by the Leader of Pedagogy for that subject.

In Terms 2 and 3, as the colder weather begins to set in, students are expected to wear their school blazers. Boys are to be in long trousers and ties and girls, if wearing stockings, they are to be navy in colour. Senior girls are also reminded to **adjust the length of their skirts** so that an acceptable level of modesty is adhered to. Uniform, for some, has been very poorly worn, with incorrect jumpers, shoes and socks. Students are reminded that if they are out of uniform a uniform deficiency will be issued

which could result in an afternoon detention.



Shakespeare at St Paul's!

During Week 3, Years 8 and 9 were visited by the esteemed 'Bell Shakespeare Company', a Sydney based theatre group dedicated to producing and performing the plays of William Shakespeare in a relevant and exciting way.

Year 8 were the captive audience of a production called 'Shakespeare is Dead' – an entertaining hour long skit which asked us 'why are we still performing Shakespeare's plays?' and 'why are these plays still relevant?' During the performance we explored classic characters such as Hamlet and Petruchio, and were presented with key information regarding the world of Elizabethan Theatre. This evocative performance was an excellent introduction to Shakespeare for Year 8, as they will study the playwright in detail next year.

Not "Just" a Part-Time Job

Do young Australians have jobs?

Young people in Australia are hard workers. Approximately one third of secondary students have part-time jobs while they are at school – and this proportion is increasing.

Employers are looking for keen, hard workers who can be flexible about hours of work in the evenings and weekends – and young people are taking up this challenge. They are predominantly working in retail and hospitality roles. Some young people also work in school-based traineeships or apprenticeships, and divide their time between school and employment.

Is it a good thing to have a part-time job while you are at school?

Part-time jobs give young people the opportunity to develop their communication, teamwork, organisation and problem-solving skills. We often think of the jobs as menial or "low level" – but in fact, many of the young people work as supervisors, manage customer complaints, train other staff and manage multiple tasks. Later, when the students have finished their school and post-school study and seek full-time work, they have already proven to potential employers that they are reliable and skilled. With graduate unemployment on the rise, the part-time jobs students have while they are at school or university have taken on a new significance (Australian Jobs, 2016).

Sometimes part-time jobs at school have a direct link to later graduate employment – consider the student who starts working on the checkouts for a retail firm, completes a business degree and later moves to a management role in the retail sector. Consider a young hospitality worker, interacting with customers, working under pressure – and later looking towards teaching, management - all career areas where positive communication is essential.

What do you need to watch out for?

The messages from Australian researchers are clear – the number of hours young people spend in a part-time job affects school results. Working may actually be linked to strengthened student school results for young people who work only a few hours per week; however, once the hours climb over 10 hours per week, school results will tend to fall. It is important to keep the right balance.

Preparing students for career expo visits

Career Expo success for students lies in effective preparation. Here are 10 Career Expo visit success tips for students:

- 1. List the priority exhibitors with the 'must visit' at the top of list
- If they are busy make a time to come back and see them. Don't leave the expo without visiting the "must see" exhibitors
- Allocate time to spend with each of your priority exhibitors
- Non priority exhibitors can be visited if you have time
- Prepare an introduction. Keep it short. Introduce yourself and say why you're interested in this career or a particular study area
- Have a list of questions to ask. Don't leave it to memory.
- Take notes and gather information
- Ask for their business card or get their name and email to follow up
- Before moving on make sure you've got the contact details of the person you spoke to so you can follow up. Don't expect them to contact you. When you get home, send them a "thank you" email and if they were going to email you information, remind them.
- Take the visit seriously. It's about your future so it's important you focus and don't get distracted.



The aim of the QILT website is to assist students in making informed choices about their university options by bringing together survey data from all Australian universities, allowing students to compare student experience and job outcomes.

Students are able to compare the student experience, whether domestic or international, between universities, and also learn more about employment outcomes of the different institutions.

Data was also collected to identify how many students gained full-time employment four months after completing their course, and what the median salary was for those graduates in full-time employment.

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

Matthew Cameron – Ex-Student Success!



Last term we were fortunate to have ex-student Matthew Cameron address the assembly and present the school with his **World Cup 2017** playing shirt.

Matthew graduated from St Paul's in 2015, completing his HSC. Since leaving school Matthew moved to Sydney to complete post school study but also to continue with what has been a very successful sporting career.

Matthew started playing **Blind Cricket** in 2015 and represented NSW in 2015-2017, holding position of Vice Captain in a game against New Zealand. In 2016 he debuted in the Australian V England series as Australian Opening Batsman. He was named Deputy Vice Captain for the first time for the Australian Blind Cricket Team in India, during 2017 World Cup Series. The team was successful, placing 5th out of 9 teams.

During Matthew's Cricket career he has scored a total run amount of 828 with 419 being international runs (222 in India). To add to this success Matthew has had 5 catches and 2 run outs Internationally. His highest state score has been 99* not out and internationally 84* not out. Matthew's aim is to get top 4 in WC 2018 in (proposed UAE), achieve 100 runs in a match and long term goal is to fulfil permanent position of Vice Captain, paving the way for Captain.

Matthew has left the following message,

"Cricket is now my life, and I love it. The social aspect of being able to freely talk and interact with people with a vision impairment. Being able to play for the Green and Gold has always been a passion of mine, and I am very privileged to play for my country. St Paul's was a school that helped me become who I am today, they push and pushed for me to achieve (the what I called) impossible, and I cannot thank them enough!!

Learning Support, specifically Katie Philpott and Jennifer Hayden were the two amazing ladies that should be commemorated for their work in the faculty. I felt honoured and pleased to donate my World Cup playing shirt and hope it is an item that current and future students will see and encourage themselves to strive to be the best in something they love! I will be able to coach them".

schools of fish put on a great show for the students.




They learned to fill and clear their mask, remove and replace masks and air supplies, rescue their buddy when they ran out of air and descend and ascend safely from 18m depth.
