



To the Families and Friends of the St Paul's Community.....

As I write this newsletter, our Year 12 group have just completed their first HSC Exam – *English*. I was with them as they got themselves ready to enter the exam centre and it was wonderful to see the overall calm and focus that they had. As well, it was clear that they were ready to begin this process and were in a good place to attack the exams. When they came out, they were pleased with the style of the paper and felt that there were no tricks or demons in it! The HSC will continue for the next four weeks. I am sure that the group will do well and will finish the exams with confidence in the knowledge that they have done their best.



I would like to publically recognise the staff for the wonderful work that they did for the final farewells for our Year 12 cohort. The *Graduation Mass*, the *Academic Awards* and the *final assembly* and *clap-out* were beautiful events that showed the high esteem that this group are held by St Paul's. Thank you to our parent community who supports this journey with us. The Newcastle Herald article truly showed what a beautiful community we have. Well done to all.

Many in our community have been asking about the building project. Unfortunately, the company who had won the contract to build the new Administration wing and class room block have gone into receivership. It was a shock to us all as we had built strong relationships with this company, particularly after the build of the Damascus Centre. The Catholic Schools Office has been supporting us in the next steps that need to happen. The finalisation of the project has gone back to a tender process and from there the final completion of the Chapel, classroom area and the landscaping will be realised. We have begun the process of office fit-out of the administration offices and have ordered signage both for the new wing and the school in general. I have ordered electronic notice boards for the front of the school and the main road frontage which will have the new name as part of the design. Our new name will adorn the school hall and an updated school map at the carpark will reflect the new school footprint. We have also received quotes for the new technology that will be in all the new classrooms as well as other meeting spaces. I am hesitant to put a timeline on full occupation of the new wing but it is planned to be operational from the beginning of the new year.

Staff are busy finalising the Year 11 end of course reports. These will be available online at the end of the week. Soon after, the online booking system for Parent Teacher interviews will open so that families can organise interviews with Year 11 staff on Monday 30th of October. The End of Course Academic Awards Ceremony is during Period 6 on that same day.

As we move into the warmer months, I would like to remind parents of the need for students to have hats for lunch and recess times if they intend to be on the courts and the oval. As well, I noticed that quite a number of students were hatless during Friday sport last week. It is a requirement for students to have a hat for sport. I would not like to have a situation where students are removed from sport on Friday if they do not have a hat, but I will be forced to do that to protect them from possible sun damage. We do have supplies of sunscreen for students in the main office but students are encouraged to supply their own as well as have appropriate hats.

Enjoy the beautiful spring and the warm weather.

Sun Protection Policy:



As part of the School's Sun Protection Policy, we require students doing outdoor activities to be in hats for Terms 1 and 4 – where the UV radiation is at its strongest. The wearing of hats applies to students who use the courts/oval during breaks, for PDHPE practical lessons and also, relevant Friday Sport activities. Students will need to bring a hat in any School colours, to wear at recess/lunch when using the oval and courts. These colours include hats that are predominantly/or a mix of the school red, white, light and dark blue.

How Independence-Building is the Pathway to your Child's Resilience (16th October by Michael Grose)

Parents and teachers often ask me how to build resilience in kids. My response is always the same. *"Start by building independence and resilience will follow."*

Children are hard-wired for independence

Sometime around the age of fifteen months (give or take three months) most children will make a strong case for self-sufficiency. They demand to do things their own way. This demand is soon backed by a strong voice – "NOOOO!" and the more articulate cries of *"I can do it!"* as their third birthday approaches.

This is the time to harness their push for independence and self-sufficiency. Their push for independence will see most children take incredible physical risks in the form of play, the exploration of their immediate environment and their wish to gain mastery over their environment. Concerned parents will naturally minimise risks by moving furniture around; keep doors closed and hiding sharp implements at home, to name a few protective measures. But parents can't eradicate all risks. They recognise that kids will fall and hurt themselves but they'll also get up and go again. In time, they'll learn to assess situations, stare down their fears and test themselves out in new situations. Falling down, brushing yourself off and trying again is part of the natural learning experience for most young children. Parents don't have to do much more than assess a situation for real danger, stand back and allow kids to explore their environments and pull them up when their play and explorations transgress the rights and peace of others.

So what's this got to do with resilience?

Well, everything really. Independence is the pursuit of mastery over one's self and one's environment and it rarely happens without mishaps and mistakes. It nearly always involves hurt, hardship, frustration and fear. That's where resilience comes in. Resilience is the art of bouncing forward after experiencing aforesaid hurts, hardships, frustrations and fears. Resilience is what comes from seeking out self-sufficiency and independence.

The language of Independence

The fact that there's a whole genre of language devoted to resilience (and it's mostly cloaked in cliché) is no accident. Terms such as *"get back on the bike/horse when you fall off"*; *"come on, brush yourself off and get on with it"*; *"what doesn't kill you makes you stronger"* are built into the psyche of past generations. Many parents today will cringe at these terms as they appear a little callous and out of touch. Conversely, the current relationship with risk and adventure (both required for independence-building), that many parents have is very tenuous at best, non-existent at worst.

Therein lies the challenge. I haven't met a parent, carer or teacher who doesn't want the children in their care to develop resilience that will last a lifetime. Yet, many of those same adults will block the pathway to children's resilience by over-indulging, solving their problems and not giving them real responsibility. In doing so they deny kids the sense of mastery that comes from sorting out their own problems, getting themselves out of jams and getting up after a fall.

You can never love your children too much; but you can love them helplessly. That's what happens when we deny kids the opportunity to become truly independent and self-sufficient. Deny self-sufficiency and you block a child's resilience. Develop real independence and you open the pathway to resilience that will last a lifetime.

Bishop's Award


Applications are now called for the 2017 Bishop's Award.

Parents are asked to consider these dates if planning any Leave and are reminded of our Assessment Policies - available in Student Assessment Booklets on the Student Portal.



Last Monday’s pupil free day provided us with the opportunity to engage with the Australian Professional Standards for Teachers (APST). Without doubt, no other profession impacts, influences and shapes another human’s life quite like a teacher! Teaching, as a profession, helps prepare young adults to live a successful, productive and full life. The APST enables and supports teachers in their role as educators. It affirms what a highly effective teacher looks like and helps improve the quality of learning within schools.

At St Paul’s, we are not only devoted to the education of young people in the Lake Macquarie area, but are fully committed to excellence in teaching and learning. Traditionally, we are renowned for the spiritual and academic contribution we make to the lives of our students. In line with the APST, our objective is to personalise the learning for each student; to use data to inform our practice; to create and maintain a supportive, safe and stimulating environment and to create a culture of professional learning.

The day began with us reflecting upon our own school experience and our “unforgettable teacher”.



Teachers then had the opportunity to explain to their colleagues why they became a teacher and share memorable events during their career. These activities allowed teachers to reflect upon their schooling and consider the innate qualities that their favourite teacher possessed.

We then watched a 1952 cartoon ‘**Teachers are people**’, which pinpointed the everyday demands, trials and tribulations of the classroom teacher. Sixty five years


on, educators still experience much of the same as Goofy did (except for the obsession with Facebook!) From here we investigated the characteristics and attributes of a highly effective teacher through the eyes of academics, researchers and students. This lent itself to us creating a summary of what we, as a community of learners, believe a successful educator looks like.

Later in the day we worked in pairs to deconstruct the Standards and map out what this means for us as individual teachers.

After lunch, we moved into faculties. This section of the day allowed teams to use the Standards to conduct a review of their current practices and generated a professional discussion around what the Standards mean for them as a faculty.

They were provided with the opportunity to highlight areas of strengths and development and create a way forward to plan to be used in our Strategic Plan for 2018. On regrouping, faculties fed back to the cohort on where they are, where they would like to be and how they aim to get there.


For those of you who are familiar with the standards authority in English called OFSTED, you will know that it inspects schools to ensure quality teaching and learning takes place; this can be either a positive or negative experience for the whole school community. In my first year of teaching, I was employed at a secondary school that was placed in special measures by OFSTED inspectors. I remember the atmosphere amongst staff, their determination to ensure the school would not be closed, the appeal they made to the wider community, parents and students to work together towards addressing their areas of need. This community had a purpose, a moral purpose and a shared responsibility to each other. It was their unwavering resoluteness that helped change the culture, the educational landscape and academic achievement of its students and has since gone from strength to strength. The reason why I wanted to share this story with you is because I was reminded of their efforts whilst reading an educational article a couple of years ago. HRM Chief OFSTED Inspector, Sir Michael Wilshaw made comment that “**it is people, not structures that are the most**



significant drivers of improvement and change in our schools.” We can house state of the art buildings, have unlimited resources and materials but it is teachers, support and administration staff that make the biggest impact on a child’s emotional, spiritual and academic outcomes. As a community, St Paul’s is committed to engaging with the APST. As a community, we strive to maintain these standards by seeking ways to get to know our students better; by using data to inform our practice; creating supportive environments and by engaging in meaningful professional learning.

I therefore would like to acknowledge the spirit in which the staff entered the day; I would like to express my gratitude for the way they engaged with the activities and with each other and show my appreciation for their willingness to embark upon this new stage in our school’s journey.





Welcome to the last Term of Year 9 – closer to Year 10! I hope that each student endeavours to make it a successful term, and a great end to Year 9.

As you are aware, St Paul's is a **BYO device** (BYOD) school. At present, Year 9 are the only cohort that do not have computers with them each day. In keeping with practice, Year 10, 2018 (current Year 9) will be expected to have a computer device with them each school day and thus each lesson.

Semester Two Exams are from 8 November to the 14 November. As for all absences, written notification of any impending absence is expected please. This allows teachers to cater for and fully assist the student.

As can be seen, Year 9 have a lot to get on top of regarding school work, but probably also have outside commitments – work, training, etc. It is advisable for students to take up my advice from last Term's Newsletters and Assemblies so that they can be organised with study planners, skills on how to study and hints on how to summarise. **Organisation** is the key to decreasing stress and increasing success.

Year 10 have the opportunity to be **Peer Support** Leaders. This leadership role begins its training in Year 9. The training occurs on Wednesday 25 October. Students were given permission notes to join this event last term, and all money and notes are due by Friday 20 October. **It is expected all students attend the day**, as all students will be leaders of the junior school next year when they enter Year 10. As always, please contact me if there are any issues.

Just a reminder that **uniform** is just as important now as it was from the start of the year. Students are expected to wear the correct uniform each school day. A dated note from parents is required if there is a brief deviation from the correct uniform, otherwise a uniform deficiency will be noted by the teacher each time.

On Monday students received a note outlining the **end of year arrangements for Year 10** students once their formal assessments have finished in **Week 6** of this term. At St Paul's, we have created a program that includes preparation for senior years and other activities that will hopefully engage and inform the students. A calendar has been included as a simple reference, but some of these days require more specific explanation.

Year 10 Exams Weeks 5/6: Wednesday 8th November – Tuesday 14th November

All students will attend school on each of these days. When not in exams, students will be in lessons. **Students are expected to participate in sport as usual.** These exams are the final component of Grades that will be sent to the BOS and will be the first inclusion on the ROSA statement for students. These **grades will be available on-line** to students via the password that they have received from the BOS.

Year 10 Alternative Timetable: Wednesday 15th – Friday 17th November

Year 10 students will attend normal school days and experience a range of timetabled lessons which will expose them to Senior School subjects in line with their selected subjects. **ALL** students are expected to attend these days in **normal school uniform**. More information will follow.

HSC Minimum Literacy & Numeracy Standards Trial Online Test – Monday 20th November

Students will complete online tests as part of a trial. **ALL** students are expected to attend school in their **normal school uniform** and bring their laptop charged and ready for the day.

Road Safety Education (RYDA): Tuesday 21st November

This course will be held at the RTA Driving Range, Court Street, Adamstown. Students will need to be at school ready for an 8.45am departure, and the day will conclude at 2.15pm before students are again transported back to school for normal buses. There is a cost to participate in this program (see back page) but it is heavily subsidised by Rotary Clubs and other corporate partners. The day is comprised of six presentations – five in a classroom environment with audio-visual presentations (one an emotional video showing the ripple effect of a fatal car crash) and one demonstration on the driving range. Some students will be given the opportunity to be a passenger in a vehicle driven by a licensed driving instructor. If students have a medical condition or injury that may be aggravated by sudden stopping of a car, they will not be permitted to participate in the practical demonstration.

Students are to bring their own lunch and drink as there is no food available for purchase on-site, and students will not be permitted to leave the site. **ALL** students are expected to attend and **School sports uniform** is to be worn on this day.

Career Pathways University Day: Wednesday 22nd November

Students will be transported to Newcastle University departing school at 9.30am and returning by 2.30pm. The time spent at the University will involve meeting with University staff, a tour of facilities, and talks in some of the Faculty areas eg *Engineering, Maths, Humanities*. Some students might not at this stage feel that Uni is relevant to them, but life has a funny way of opening opportunities for Uni study, for example after completing TAFE courses, or with mature age entry. Lunch is available at the University for purchase, or students are welcome to bring their own. This day will involve **ALL** students and **normal school uniform** is to be worn on this day.

Senior Interviews: Thursday 23rd – Friday 24th November and Tuesday 28th – Wednesday 29th November

All students intending to remain at St Paul's in 2018 are required to seek re-enrolment. Letters will be sent to parents in the next few weeks asking them to make an appointment (through Admin. office) with senior staff in order to discuss the requirements of senior schooling at St Paul's. **Interviews will require students to be in full school uniform and to have a parent present.** Interviews will generally be of 30 minutes duration. In the interview the student's subject choice is reviewed in line with ATAR or non-ATAR selection, expenses are explained in regard to practical subjects, policy documents and student agreements are signed, and the Resource Fee will need to be paid. Further details of the interview process will be provided in the afore-mentioned letter.

When students are not in attendance at these interviews, **they may remain at home.**

Guest Speaker Day: Monday 27th November

We will have a guest speaker, Mr Steven Bradbury, attend the school for a day with our Year 10 students. He will focus on areas such as overcoming adversity, positive mindsets, goal setting, hard work (endurance), self belief, teamwork and leadership which are all critical to becoming a senior student at St Paul's. There will also be a parent and community evening with Steven Bradbury on the same night. More information to follow.

This day will involve **ALL** students who will wear their **normal school uniform**.

Study Skills Day – Thursday 30th November

ALL students will be attending an online studies skill course directed by Mr Furey. **Normal school uniform** is to be worn and students are to bring their laptop for the day.

HSC: 'All My Own Work' Program: Friday 1st – Tuesday 5th December

The *HSC All My Own Work Program* is designed to help Higher School Certificate students follow the principles and practices of good scholarship. This includes understanding the ethical practices when locating and using information as part of their HSC studies. Completion of this course and the associated workbook **is a compulsory prerequisite to HSC study**.

These days will involve ALL students including those who have indicated that they might be changing schools - their new schools will expect that this has been completed. The exception will be those students who have submitted paperwork to the Principal Mr Selmes, indicating that they have secured full-time employment in 2018.

Each student is required to bring **his/her own laptop** for on-line completion of the All My Own Module as well as pens for the completion of the associated workbook. Students will need to be in **full school uniform**.

Upon completion of the course requirements students will be allowed to leave school if they have parent permission (**note required**) and sign out at the front office.

Hand back exams / Presentation of Awards / Christmas Liturgy: Wednesday 6th December

Students will attend sessions with our Leaders of Pedagogy to return exams and discuss requirements for 2018 during periods 1-4. This will be followed by the Year 10 second semester Presentation of Awards in Period 5 which parents are invited to attend. All students 7-10 will conclude the academic year with a Christmas Liturgy and farewell to departing staff. Students are to be in **full school uniform**.

End of Year Activities: Thursday 7th December – Wednesday 13th December

Year 10 are invited to participate in the End of Year Activities Program. There is a range of activities available from passive to outdoor adventure. The booklet detailing what is being run this year was distributed by Ms Flood early in Term 4. To participate, students need to select one or more activities and to submit the appropriate payment and permission note. These activities are always out-of-uniform but clothing must be suitable to the activity being undertaken. If students are unavailable to attend End of Year Activities due to commencement of employment or family holiday, a note needs to be directed to Mrs Brownlee/Ms Guest. These absences would then appear as explained absences on our records.

To simplify the collection of money for the excursions (21st & 22nd November) we ask that **ONE payment of \$40 be made to the Finance Officer before Friday 10th November.** An excursion note was handed out yesterday.

Payment can also be made via our QKR App.

I thank you for your cooperation and support throughout this year and I trust your son / daughter will participate fully in the End of School Program. Should any problems arise, please do not hesitate to contact the school on 4958 6711.

So you have an Interview - what now?



Finally, after sending off what seems to be hundreds of resumes and letters, you receive a call and have a job interview – how do you prepare? Do well?

What should I wear?

As a general guide, dress neatly in the type of dress employees would usually wear in that workplace. Make sure that clothes are ironed, shoes polished, jewelry is conservative and hair is tidy.

What should I take to the interview?

Take a folder with the letter and resume you sent through for the application, original and copy of certificates, references, work samples etc.

How do I prepare for the interview?

Research the company – look at the website, learn about their products/services. Write down the names of key people in the business from the website.

Prepare answers to possible questions the interviewer may ask, and have a couple of questions of your own ready. [Youth Central](#) have some good ideas on this.

Know how to get to the interview.

Find out the name of the person/people who will be interviewing you. If you forget to ask this when you are contacted about the interview, it is fine to ring and ask.

Top Interview tips ...

- ◆ Plan to be there about 10 minutes early.
- ◆ Go in to the interview by yourself – don’t have your parent with you.
- ◆ First impressions count – practice saying hello, and shaking hands.
- ◆ Practice before-hand with a friend or family member.
- ◆ Aim to speak clearly, take a breath before answering, and look at the interviewer.
- ◆ Always be positive – don’t make negative comments about a previous employer.
