To the Families and Friends of the St Paul's Community.....

As St Paul's Catholic College progresses through Pentecost, it is worth considering the foundations of the Catholic Church and a modern perspective of how we treat others in our society from an Jesuit perspective. **Fr Andrew Hamilton SJ** writes 'Seasons of the Spirit' for the Australian Jesuits website.

Through late May to the end of June, Australia marks a number of important faith and justice events on the calendar. This year, Jesuit Communications has put together a new resource, titled 'Season of the Spirit', to provide prayers and social justice thoughts throughout this season. These events include:

- ◆ Pentecost (20 May)
- ◆ Reconciliation week (27 May – 3 June)
- ◆ World Environment Day (3 June)
- ◆ Care for the homeless (10 June)
- ◆ Refugee Week (17 – 23 June)



'Communities across the country will be marking Reconciliation Week, World Environment Day and Refugee Week. We want to help Catholic communities become moved into action through prayer and conversation.'

What are we doing with the HOLY SPIRIT to bring RECONCILIATION to our COMMUNITY?

Most people know that at Pentecost the Holy Spirit came down on the twelve chosen disciples and they began to preach. It is the beginning of the Church when the disciples spoke boldly about Jesus' gathered followers whose prayer and life was focused on gratitude for what God had done through Jesus' death and rising. But there is more to the feast than that. Pentecost is in fact the season of the Spirit in which we live, a season in which our lives are changed.

In the story, Luke tells the coming of the Spirit introduces a season of reconciliation. The breach between people was symbolised in the story of the Tower of Babel and the division of people by language. That division is healed at Pentecost when people who had travelled from many different parts to celebrate the feast, each hear the disciples' words in their own language. It follows that Jesus' followers are to overcome divisions by forming a Church united by the Spirit of Christ in discovering God's love.

For us the feast of Pentecost is a time to celebrate the way in which we have been gathered into a community by the Spirit. It is also a time to let go of our fear and shame in speaking of Christ and living together. It is a time to commit ourselves by prayer, conversation and small commitments to reconciling the huge differences and hostilities in our world. It is a season long enough to last a lifetime.

When Leaving School Early

Leaving school without Parent/Guardian:

If students are leaving school early they must bring a note from their parent/guardian to leave class early. The note should be shown to the class teacher to be dismissed from the class. The student must then go to Student Reception to hand in the note and swipe out.

Leaving school early with Parent/Guardian:

If students are leaving school early during class time with their Parent/Guardian, they must bring a note from the parent/guardian (as Students may not be contactable e.g on PE Prac or in a class room without a phone) The note should be shown to the class teacher to be dismissed from the class. The student must then go to Student Reception, to meet their Parent/Guardian. A note is not necessary if leaving with a Parent/Guardian at recess or lunch.

What is an Engineer?



With 25% of the world's top CEOs having a degree in engineering it clearly delivers outstanding leadership and problem-solving skills.

There are four traditional engineering pathways: Mechanical, Chemical, Civil and Electrical.

Four Pathways

As 21st Century problems emerge these four pathways are now diversifying and mixing with other specialities to create dynamic new pathways. All engineering degrees require strong maths and science skills and the development adaptive problem-solving expertise.

Mechanical Engineering is concerned with bridging the gap between mathematics, statistics, physics, chemistry and computing on the one hand, and the design and development of useful mechanical devices and processes on the other.

Students undertaking mechanical engineering become involved with industrial design so that they can generate solutions to a broad range of real problems across industries like transport, health, mining, defence and manufacturing. A Mechanical Engineering degree will provide a sound, adaptable foundation for solving 21st Century problems as they emerge.

Civil Engineers design and develop infrastructure like buildings, railways, roads and bridges. Students are encouraged to explore creative solutions to engineering and social problems including sustainable design that has low environmental impact while being purpose built to meet the demands of the future.

Civil Engineers need to develop strong communication skills to negotiate the best, innovative design solution that meets the needs of diverse communities while addressing practical resolutions, economic restrictions and environmental impacts.

Chemical Engineers are essential to the operations of most manufacturing, processing, minerals and other industries. They traditionally work in industrial laboratories to find the best sequence of physical, chemical and biological processing steps to convert raw materials into higher value products safely, economically and on a large scale.

They are involved with pharmaceuticals, petroleum, water purification and food with an emerging emphasis on chemically reengineering plastics to cope with environmental waste.

Electrical Engineering involves the study of energy. The sustainable generation and the use of energy has already emerged as a 21st Century Problem. Electrical Engineers are solving problems in renewable energy generation, computer system design, instrumentation and control engineering and increasingly diverse technology solutions.
