To the Families and Friends of the St Paul's Community.....

This Sunday will be the final Remembrance Ceremony for the 100th Anniversary of the Great War. Some 4 years ago, Australia began this significant journey with the remembrance of the outbreak of the First World War on August 3rd. The next year we commemorated the centenary of the ANZAC Landings on Gallipoli. 12 months later it was the horror of the Battle of the Somme and Australian soldiers' first experience of the infamous Western Front at Fromelles. 2017 continued the commemoration of the horrors of Passchendaele, Zonnebeke and The Menin Road. This year, we have commemorated the liberation of Villers-Bretonneaux, the final battles of Mont St Quentin and Peronne.



At the 11th hour of the 11th day of November, the guns on the Western Front went silent. The Armistice was signed in a non-descript railway carriage in a forest to the north of Paris. The war to end all wars was over but the impact of 4 years of bloodshed were to change the face of the world forever. It caused the downfall of four monarchies: Germany, Turkey, Austria-Hungary and Russia. The war made people more open to other ideologies, such as the Bolsheviks that came to power in Russia and fascism that triumphed in Italy and even later in Germany. The war changed the economical balance of the world, leaving European countries deep in debt and making the U.S. the leading industrial power and creditor in the world. It had a direct link to the Great Depression that rocked the world economy in the early 30's. With troops travelling all over the world, influenza was spread easily and an epidemic started which killed more than 25 million people across the world. With all the new weapons that were used, WW1 changed the face of modern warfare forever. Social life also changed: women had to run businesses while the men were at war and labor laws started to be enforced due to mass production and mechanization. People all wanted better living standards. WW1 boosted research in technology, because better transport and means of communication gave countries an advantage over their enemies. The harsh conditions of the Treaty of Versailles caused a lot of dissent in Europe, especially on the side of the Central Powers who had to pay a lot for financial reparations. Most historians believe that the Treaty of Versailles signed in 1921 was one of the direct causes of World War Two. Of the 60 million European military personnel who were mobilised from 1914 to 1918, 8 million were killed, 7 million were permanently disabled, and 15 million were seriously injured.

For Australia, the effects were long lasting. Per capita, we lost the most number of men killed. The First World War remains the costliest conflict in terms of deaths and casualties. From a population of fewer than **five million, 416,809** men enlisted, of whom more than **60,000** were killed and **156,000** wounded, gassed, or taken prisoner.

This Sunday is an important time for all Australians. We need to remember the sacrifices that so many young men and women have made in the name of this country over so many years. It is a time to reflect and give thanks for their sacrifice. It is a time to thank the serving men and women who continue the role of service for all of us in an ever changing world. It is also a time to pray that we have elected leaders who value every life of every person in our armed forces. That if and when decisions are made that will inevitably effect the lives of these people that everything possible has been done to ensure there is peace for all.

Next Friday we have our final celebration for the Leaving class of 2018. Their Graduation Ball will be held at NEX in Newcastle. This final night is a beautiful event where families gather together to celebrate the end of their child's formal schooling. For some of our families, it is the last of their children through St Paul's. I congratulate all of our parents and caregivers and thank them for entrusting their children to us.

On a similar note, the final HSC exam is on Friday with Drama being the last exam. The 4 weeks of exams have gone very quickly and it only seems like yesterday that we were ushering the students for their first exam. I congratulate each and every one of them for their resilience and perseverance over the HSC journey and wish them all the best for the future. In a month's time, they will receive their results. Regardless of the outcome, each and every one of them can be proud of what they have achieved.

The term is unfolding very quickly and it won't be long until exams are happening and reports are being compiled. In my last conversation with the students I said to them that they had time to make a real difference to their final grades. I encouraged them to ask questions in class, to concentrate and make the most of every learning opportunity and to revise their work consistently and effectively.

I also said that we will continue to work up to the end of the year. There is much learning to happen and the danger of thinking that because exams are completed then the work that is being done "doesn't matter" is a flawed way of thinking. John Hattie, the world renowned Educational Research expert says that the summer break has a negative 0.02 effect on student learning. He says the longer the break is, the bigger the effect size. For some private schools, they finish in early December. They have 2 months leave. We finish much later in the year but if students "shoulder arms" to use a military phrase, it would be the same negative effect. In *Hattie Speak*, an effect size of 0.1 to 0.4 will have no real effect. Above 0.4 will have a positive effect on learning outcomes. As you can see, negative 0.02 is not the most desirable outcome. So it makes sense that we continue to expect our kids to work right up to the end of the year! (And then enjoy a well-deserved holiday!)

Enjoy the warmer weather and the lovely long evenings.

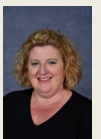

Vietnam Immersion

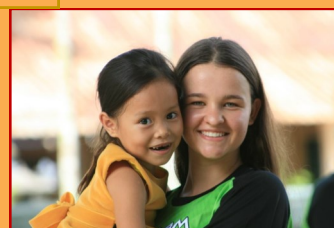
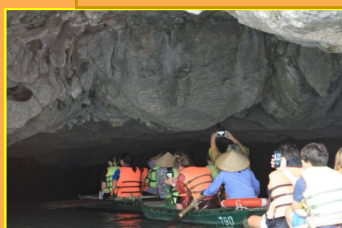
