The day, organised by Mrs Belinda Flood and the HSIE team was wonderfully received by our students who engaged with the beautiful people of this dynamic part of Western Sydney so respectfully and personably. The students gained so much from this rich event.

As well, last week, Year 10 students attended the University of Newcastle Open Day. This gives the students an opportunity to gain an understanding of tertiary education and university life. For a large number of our students, university pathways is their goal. For others, it may not be the case. In saying that, it is important that we give all of our students the opportunity to explore possibilities so that when they make decisions about their own future pathways, these decisions are informed ones that they have made after looking at as many possibilities as they can. Thank you to Mr McLoughlin for the organisation of this day.

Our teaching staff are busily completing the marking of assessment tasks and exams. In the next week or so, they will be finalising the Reports for Years 7 to 10. We ask that you look at them carefully and discuss them with your child. In fact, the report, although written to the parent is really about the student's learning. Over many years, I have asked my students if they had read their reports. Many replied yes but a sizable minority replied no! It is vital that all students look carefully at their reports at reporting time and reflect on their own efforts and learning so that they can set goals for their future endeavours.

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As this is the final newsletter for the year, I would like to share this reflection with you.

In the hustle and bustle that leads up to our celebration of Christmas, many of us find ourselves asking, "What's it all about?" We sometimes wonder in the rush, the stress and the hurry, whether we have somehow missed the real meaning of it all. I have been pondering that question myself as I prepare for Christmas, and I hope that some of my reflections might help you to enter more fully into this celebration of the birth of Christ, the Prince of Peace.

Christmas is, first and foremost, about Love, God's Love. How much does God love us? God loves us so much that God gave us the most precious gift imaginable, Jesus, God's own Son. That's the heart of Christmas. This great and wonderful love calls us to love one another. We share love in and through our human relationships. Love isn't always a warm and cozy feeling; love is a commitment and a decision to stick by others, come what may, through thick and thin, when the going is easy and when the going gets more challenging. The love that we share in our human relationships is a reflection of the love of God, calling us to give of ourselves for others.

At Christmas, we remember that Jesus was born in poverty, in a stable among the poorest people and the farm animals. What does this mean for us today? You and I are called to look for the face of Christ in the poor, those at our own door and in places far from here. Love can look like a cup of coffee offered, a hand held, a smile shared, and a story heard. I firmly believe that, in the end, we will be judged by how we care for the poor. And Christmas is also about repentance and forgiveness. Love takes commitment and work, and sometimes we don't get it right. We're not perfect. But with God there is mercy and forgiveness, and second chances. And so must we offer those gifts to others. Christmas is a time of renewal, of fresh starts and coming together.

We often hear the phrase "Keep Christ in Christmas" and we wonder how to do that. I think that Jesus himself gave us the best insight; if you want to keep Christ in Christmas, look around you, and look for Him. He is here. Feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, forgive the guilty, welcome the stranger, care for the sick, visit the imprisoned, and love your enemies. "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me."



Earlier in the year, after much professional development and deliberation, we decided to construct our Semester 2 Reports around reporting against Standards/Grade Descriptors.

You will notice a few key differences in how the report looks. They will include for EACH SUBJECT:


- A Course Overview this will give a clear outline of the content of the course including the <u>knowledge</u> developed, the <u>skills</u> students aimed to acquire and the assessment strategies used to assess the <u>application of this knowledge and skills</u>.
- Approaches to Learning Engagement, Diligence & Behaviour (as per interim Reports in Term One)
- The Course Profiles (The syllabus outcomes assessed by the tasks)
- The Position within the Cohort achieved relative to the rest of the cohort
- The Overall Grade A E for the Subject

The Overall Grade indicates the level of achievement that the student has reached by the end of the semester, specific to the subject. These Grade Descriptors have been developed by teaching staff, based on NESA's Grade A – E Reporting Scheme. Students are reported against the descriptors – based on their *informal and formal assessment & teacher judgement* against the Standards/ Descriptors. These Descriptors appear on the second page for each subject in the report.


# **Sport News**



### State Basketball Report

For the first time in a few years a team from St Paul's qualified to play in the state finals by finishing first or second at the diocesan tournament held in August. Our year 9/10 girls team qualified by being runners up at this carnival and headed to Windsor last week to compete. We were fortunate to be able to add a year 7 girl who has great basketball talent to a team that had lost a few members due to other commitments – I would like to thank those girls who helped the team make the diocesan final, but were unable to make the trip for state finals. Some enthusiastic training sessions leading up to the carnival gave the team hope that we could do well at the finals. We were not expecting to win, but were more focused on the experience of playing at this level, particularly the 8 out of 10 team members who are not basketballers, but play a number of other sports outside school. We travelled to Windsor on the Sunday night as we started our first game at 10am on Monday. Our first game saw us play a very tight game with the lead switching between the two teams a number of times. We lead the game by 4 points with 4 minutes to go, but couldn't sustain the momentum and ended up losing the game by 2 points. Our second game of the day followed a similar pattern with the lead changing a number of times throughout the first half, before we took control early in the second half to run out 8 point winners. Our final game of the pool was against a traditionally strong basketball school in Leeton, and they proved too strong for us, running out winners by 15 points. These results saw us finish 3<sup>rd</sup> in our pool, a great achievement considering we weren't expecting to win any games. Unfortunately for us, McCarthy featured 4 representative players from the Tamworth area and they proved too strong for us, the final difference being 8 points. I am proud of the way the girls played throughout the 2 days, especially those that are not basketballers, and enjoyed nearly every minute of the 2 days (the music at night – not so much).

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# Vietnam Immersion 2019 – SAVE THE DATE!

I am pleased to announce that the Vietnam Immersion will be held again in the Term 3 holidays, 2019. This is a change from the originally scheduled departure of 2020. The decision to bring the experience forward was based upon the need to rectify the clash with the Europe Trip. Both trips will now run on alternating years which provides financial relief to parents and guardians wishing their child to attend both experiences. The Immersion will be open to applicants from Year 10 and 11, Class of 2019. Our current Year 10 Students who attended the recent trip will be allowed to apply for the next immersion as the Itinerary will be different. Application forms will be distributed in Term 1, 2019, however, we are announcing the trip now so that you may plan your budgets for the coming year. The cost of the Immersion is usually around \$4250, this includes multiple international and domestic flights, accommodation, all meals (except at airports), private coach, our in country guides and assistants, airport transfers, tour shirts, gratuities and group tours. The exact cost will be finalised early 2019.

The Vietnam Immersion is more than a holiday, it is an adventure of a lifetime, an opportunity for students to step out of their comfort zones and challenge themselves. It is an opportunity for students to explore a different culture while providing meaningful service to others. Students will climb mountains, ride buffalos, trek to remote villages, experience homestays with ethnic minorities and kayak the most pristine environments in the world. Students will also be given the invaluable opportunity to engage in at least four different Community Service Opportunities, including a major project that they must work as a team to fundraise for, in the lead up to the trip. Major projects in the past have included building playgrounds, classrooms and other like facilities for significantly disadvantaged catholic communities.

The Vietnam Immersion is one of the most challenging but rewarding experiences that our students will undertake in their school lives. If you require any further information, please feel free to contact me at the school.


