To the Families and Friends of the St Paul's Community.....

Last week we hosted our second Open Evening. The purpose of the evening is to showcase the College to prospective families who are considering the choices for secondary education for their children. As I said in previous newsletter articles, the College is in significant competition for student enrolments. The competition comes from well-resourced state schools, private schools that are faith based and smaller parent controlled colleges that have begun in the last few years. Competition is a good thing and it ensures that all the schools are able to offer quality education for the young people in our feeder areas.

The Open Evening was a great success. We had more families through this year than we did last year. In fact, we have already had an enrolment enquiry for the current Year seven cohort based on the event. Our staff did a wonderful job at showcasing their various key learning areas and the wonderful facilities that we have at St Paul's. However, it was the student volunteers that stole the show. We asked for students to help in a myriad of ways on the evening. From tour guides to performers, cooking demonstrators to barbeque chefs, it was clear that it was the work of these young men and women that made the difference on the night. The feedback that we received spoke about the passion of the teachers and the quality of the facilities, but the standout was the commentary around the young men and women and their obvious love and passion for their school. Well done and congratulations to our students for what they have given back to their place.

In the next week or so, we will be releasing the Term One Interim Reports. These reports are designed to give a quick snapshot as to the work that your children have done thus far. It will give you an indication of their work ethic and effort in their subjects for the first 8 weeks of the year. On the evening of 2 April, we will be hosting Parent Teacher Interviews for Years 7 to 10. This will be an ideal opportunity to speak with your child's teacher to discuss their progress based on the report. I always recommend that you bring your child to the interviews. It is vital that they are able to engage in the conversation about their learning. Likewise it is vital that your children have a good look at their reports so that they can see first-hand the areas that they can celebrate as well as the areas that they need to reflect upon. Year 11 and 12 will have a Parent Teacher meeting early in Term 2.

Congratulations to Michael Pockran, Jordan Snowden and Zack Forsythe who have made it through to the Finals of the Aspire Song Writing Competition. Along with seven other competitors from other diocesan schools, Michael, Jordan and Zack will perform their song at the Finals to be held at St Pius X High School on Wednesday 3 April. We wish them all the best on this wonderful achievement.

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The news out of Christchurch last week was beyond tragic. To have so many innocent lives destroyed by the act of a mad man is almost something that is too difficult to comprehend. The fact that the event was live streamed through social media is also a sad indictment of the modern world that we live in. A good friend of mine said that it was almost like the perpetrator was living out a live version of one of the disgusting online games that seem to have become part of the current norms these days.

Catholic Archbishop of Brisbane Mark Coleridge attended a prayer service at the Islamic College of Brisbane on Sunday, 17 March, which he described on his Facebook page as “a hugely heartening gathering”.

Coleridge continued: “Faith communities, political and civic leaders, police and many ordinary citizens of many different backgrounds were united in mourning the victims of the Christchurch atrocity, praying for their families and the wounded, and pledging solidarity beyond the evil of hatred and violence. As the young Muslim woman who was the MC said at the end, ‘Don’t go home with a heavy heart but with a heart full of hope’ ... we did.”

We pray for the victims of this tragedy and we also pray that the real message of Christ - to love one another - rings across the globe for all, but in particular, to our elected leaders and those that influence our young people via this new multi-media space.

International Women's Day

International Women's Day means different things to different people, but the global focus on equality and celebration is clear. St Paul's Catholic College celebrated IWD on Friday 8 March by holding a breakfast for Year 12 female students and all staff.



Gathering at 7.30am in the staff area/lawns, the day commenced with an Acknowledgment of Country by Astro Stewart followed by an opening address by Cathy O’Gorman, Assistant Principal T&L. Sharing some thoughts around IWD Cathy spoke about how throughout ancient and modern history, women have collaborated and led purposeful action to redress inequality in the hope of a better future for their communities, children and themselves. This powerful process of collaboration between women throughout history has resulted in a celebration of hope and action – in the form of International Women’s Day.

“In closing, equality means ensuring all people have equal opportunities to make the most of their lives and talents, and that no one has poorer life chances due to their background or status - the very core of International Women's Day. Equality can only be achieved if the diversity, differences and qualities of all peoples, regardless of gender, race or creed, are truly valued.”

Following the Welcome Address, the Keynote Speaker, Leah Gabolinscy presented her address to the gathering. Leah, the CEO of Lake Macquarie Private Hospital shared her journey from school through to her current position, highlighting the qualities of tenacity, courage, being kind to yourself and challenging students to “be kind to each other”. Leah faced significant challenges on her journey from childhood to her current position but shared with all her belief in the power of hard work, focus and surrounding oneself with positive people. The powerful presentation had a significant impact and all present and the community was deeply grateful to Leah for sharing her inspirational story.

Following Leah’s speech the Year 12 Community & Family Studies class gave a short presentation on the nominated charity for the day – *Share The Dignity* - and highlighted the need for awareness of the position some women find themselves in – with little or no money for personal hygiene items, sometimes keeping young women out of school due to what is known as “period poverty”. 

Moving to NAPLAN Online



The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is an annual national assessment for students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. Planning has begun to move NAPLAN from a pen and paper assessment to an online assessment.

Secondary School Practice Test and NAPLAN Online Test 2019

All schools in the Maitland Newcastle Diocese will transition to NAPLAN Online this year. Students will need to complete a short Omnibus test in March to gain experience in using the online platform and for ACARA to test its functionality. The Online Tests will be held in May as in previous years.

St. Paul's Catholic College will hold the practice tests on Thursday 28th March. ALL Year 7 & 9 will participate in these tests. Please ensure your child has their laptop device with them on this day and that it is fully charged.

The Readiness Test will ensure schools are ready to undertake NAPLAN Online in May 2019. It also allows students and teachers to familiarise themselves with the online system and experience the test delivery method.

The practice test is a 'dress rehearsal' for schools to prepare for NAPLAN Online. The practice test is NOT an assessment of student ability. The practice test allows schools to:

- become familiar with the NAPLAN Online test format and processes
- check whether they have the technical capacity, rooms and devices to administer NAPLAN Online
- provide students in NAPLAN Years 7 and 9 with the opportunity to experience the online test question types and format by completing a practice NAPLAN online test.

What are the benefits of NAPLAN Online?

Results will be faster and more precise

- Your child's individual results will be returned to you within just a few weeks of the NAPLAN testing.
- Online assessment will reduce the time it takes to mark and provide feedback to schools, teachers and parents.
- Improved precision and timing of results will help teachers to tailor their teaching more specifically to address students' learning needs.

Tailored tests will provide better assessment

- The online format allows for 'tailored testing', where the test adapts to a student's performance and asks questions that match their achievement level.
- Students in each year level start with the same set of questions which can then branch into a different set of questions based on their responses to the first set of questions.
- This means that students will be directed to questions that may be easier or more challenging depending on their responses.
- This test design will allow students to better demonstrate their literacy and numeracy skills.
- Students find online assessment is more engaging, which means they are encouraged to persist longer and try harder.

Research by the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) into online assessment has shown that students have engaged well with electronic tests.

Frequently asked questions

Which students will participate in the NAPLAN Online School Readiness Test in MN schools?

All students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 will participate.

How should I prepare my child for the NAPLAN Online School Readiness Test?

Your child will not need any academic preparation for the school readiness test. This is not a test of their literacy and numeracy skills, but an opportunity for them to experience the online test format and for their school to assess its online testing capability.

How long is the school readiness test?

The school readiness test is only one omnibus test- a combined numeracy/literacy assessment. The duration of each assessment will be approximately 40 minutes.

How will students be prevented from using the internet or spell-checkers when completing the test?

The NAPLAN Online assessment platform will have state-of-the-art security protections. The assessment is delivered inside a locked-down browser. This ensures students cannot access the internet or spell-checkers while completing the test.

Will schools and parents be provided with information on the results of the readiness test?

There will be feedback to schools about the technical information gained from the readiness testing. There will be no reporting of student test results from the readiness test.

Employment studies have shown that personality is a contributing factor for career success and the closer the behavioural match between you and the job requirements, the happier, more successful you will be.



Our Personality Style



We also learned that flippers were key to manoeuvrability in a choppy harbour.

There were plenty of large fish fit for your dinner plate such as snapper, bream and flathead but the highlight was the chance to encounter some more unique marine species. We swam with jellyfish, stingrays and an octopus as well as lue grouper and leather jackets. Some students were lucky enough to swim with a wobbegong shark in among the kelp and even come face to face (literally) with cuttlefish. We encountered marine species previously unknown to us such as the cornet fish and saw amazing fluorescent blue and purple underwater plant life.





- Catholic education is one of the largest non-government employers in NSW with more than 23,000 staff including 17,500 teachers
- Catholic schools are committed to supporting families no matter their economic or social circumstances. Our schools are open to all students – Catholic, non-Catholic, poor, wealthy, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders and those with a disability
- Enrolments of students with a disability and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students have been the fastest growing segments in NSW Catholic schools for the past 20 years
- Catholic schools teach the curriculum set by the NSW Education Standards Authority and operate under a range of government legislation and regulations. Our schools are highly accountable to governments, parents, Church authorities and the Australian public

School funding

- Catholic schools receive funding from three sources



- In 2016, NSW Catholic school families contributed almost \$1.2 billion in fees to their children's schools
- The primary funder of Catholic schools is the Federal Government. The primary funder of government schools is the NSW Government



- Catholic schools strive to keep fees affordable for families so that a Catholic education remains accessible to all. Without government funding, families would need to pay around \$13,000 per year, per student for a Catholic education

Capital funding

WHAT DOES AN EXCHANGE COST?

Actual costs will vary depending on the country of exchange, and the student's personal spending habits.

Student and family provide:

- An administration fee.
- Return overseas airfare, as arranged by Rotary to the country of exchange.
- Insurance under the Australian Rotary Youth Exchange policy.
- Initial hotel in overseas country, including Rotary organised student fees.
- Day-to-day personal expenses, postage, phone calls, internet, clothing, footwear etc.
- A small emergency fund (redeemable at the end of the exchange, if unused).

Host Rotary Club provides:

- Board and lodging with host families.
- Some schooling expenses.
- A modest monthly allowance.
- A Club Counsellor to monitor the student's personal welfare.
- Training and briefing sessions.

Sponsor Rotary Club provides:

- Student Rotary Isser
- Some Rotary Clubs provide bursars for exchanging

WHAT IS IT?

The Rotary International Youth Exchange Program is arranged by Rotary Clubs for young people to experience a year of education, overseas, in a wide choice of countries. It also offers many other opportunities, both during and after the exchange is completed.

The Rotary program is highly respected internationally by schools, parents and students themselves because of its sound infrastructure.

Students stay with host families who are arranged by the hosting Club. In the majority of exchanges there is more than one host family, the preferred number being three or four. Host families may or may not be members of Rotary, but are all Rotary approved.

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS?

The benefits of the exchange are many and varied. Students gain considerable self-confidence, tolerance and self-reliance through having to accept greater responsibility for themselves and their actions. Students have to adapt to unfamiliar and different surroundings and ways of life which are different from that of Australia. For some, it will be the first extended period of separation from their own family. The experience provides the opportunity to develop many useful social 'survival' skills. The exchange provides a unique opportunity for young Australians to experience of first hand the many cultural aspects of a different country, a new way of life, and in many instances, another language. The friendship students make will be life long and important in achieving the aims of the exchange - the building of goodwill and understanding between countries.

WHO CAN APPLY?

Any male or female secondary school student. The children of Rotarians are welcome, but of course gain no preference in selection.

Applicants must be in year **S10 or 11** in the year they make application to be eligible for the program. The preferred age of applicants is between 15-17 years.

Applicants should be making sound progress at school and have a general interest in people and places. They should possess a good general knowledge of Australia - its political system, socio-economic policies and its involvement in international affairs.

Applicants must have displayed high standards of personal conduct and attitudes which are widely accepted in our community. They should have an outgoing personality and be interested in cultural and outdoor pursuits.

Rotary is looking for young people who can act as personal ambassadors.

HOW ARE STUDENTS SELECTED?

Students are selected by Rotary Clubs on the basis of their application and a personal interview. Applications close with the District Youth Exchange Chairman on 1st April. Clubs will receive their allocated application form by mid-April and will interview students by late April.

The successful applicant from the Rotary Club is then nominated to the District Youth Exchange Program Committee. This Committee then interview nominated applicants in May before arranging exchanges with overseas Districts. Students have the opportunity to nominate any preferred countries of exchange from those available. However, there are limited places available in any one country and a commitment to accept an exchange in any of the available countries is necessary.

ROTARY PROVIDES TRAINING

Rotary Clubs have an important role in the exchange, both the hosting and sponsor Clubs will provide one of their members to act as a Counsellor. The Counsellor's role is to maintain close contact with the student. This is expected to continue throughout the exchange period, not only with the student, but also with the student's family, keeping everyone informed on the progress of the exchange.

The District Committee provides a briefing program for a wide range of subjects including personal development and public speaking. This aims to prepare the student for the exchange. Parents of students are also required to be involved in the briefing program.

HOSTING AN INBOUND STUDENT

While it is not obligatory, parents will be encouraged to host or organise hosting for an inbound Exchange student for a period of three months. This hosting is to be approved by the Host Rotary Club of the inbound student.

ARE THERE OTHER OBLIGATIONS?

Students are required to adhere to the rules of the program, as applied in the country of exchange. These relate to personal behaviour and the expectations of being an ambassador for themselves, their family, their country and Rotary. During the exchange year only, students are required to attend and complete a year of secondary level schooling.

EDUCATION CONSIDERATIONS

All inbound students will be required to return to secondary education in Australia; there may be credits available for study undertaken while abroad. However, this needs to be checked with the Board of Studies before departure. The question of broking school before the HEC year is a matter of personal choice between the student and their families. The best bonus for education is the cultural experience that students gain from the exchange itself.

The awards from the Trust are confidential to the Trust Board and are subject to a Means Test. Application forms for the award are obtainable from the District Chairman.
