Dear Parents and Caregivers,

Welcome to the Spring Term.

The days are getting longer and the weather seems untimely warm at the moment. I suspect that we will receive a final blast of winter weather just to remind us to keep our warm clothes close and handy!

On the students return to school last week, I was impressed by the standard of uniform. The vast majority of students were wearing the correct shoes and jumpers in particular. I did have cause to speak with a few students in Years 9 and 10 who were out of uniform. Thankfully most had notes and had done the right thing with a comment on the note from parents that the situation was to be rectified quickly. One or two students did not have notes. I ask that if there is an issue with uniform that a note is provided so that we can account for out of uniform issues appropriately.

You would have received a letter last week from Gerard Mowbray, our Director of Schools for the Maitland Newcastle Diocese. In this letter, he indicated that I would be on leave later in the term. The purpose of this leave is to have a hip replacement. Sins of the past (years of cricket) have finally caught up with me and it is time to have this surgery. I will be away from the middle of week 4 to the end of the term. I will be back for the wonderful Year 12 Graduation ceremonies in the final week. While I am away, Mr Colin Mulhearn will be Acting Principal. Colin is well known to our community having worked here for many years before moving to St Francis Xavier in 2018. I know that you will make Colin most welcome.

This week we are hosting our Parent Teacher interviews. This important event is part of the feedback and feed forward

process that includes Formal Reports, Interim Reports, Assessment Task feedback and other conversations. Our mid-year main report includes comments from staff about your child's progress as well as the mandated A-E grading. At the interviews, you may wish to enquire about marks that your child has received for the major assessment tasks that have been completed and where they are performing in comparison to the cohort. I have encouraged the students to attend these interviews with you so that they also hear this valuable feedback. I have also encouraged all students to look at their reports carefully and to celebrate the successes as well as identify areas where some extra effort would be of benefit.

The annual Aspire Production is on later this week at the Newcastle Civic Theatre. We congratulate all the performers, musicians and production people as they present this exciting show. The title of the production this year is "365 Questions, Issues and Good Deeds". On ABC Radio last Friday was an interview and performance that included Jordan Snowden and Zac Forsyth. It was a wonderful advertisement that showcased the amazing talents of the young people in Catholic Schools. There is an ad later in this newsletter that will direct you to ticket sales but it was clear from the report last week that tickets are selling fast!

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We hosted the 2019 House Athletics Carnival last Friday at the Glendale Athletics Centre. It was a beautiful day weather-wise and it was clear from the attendance and the way that the students conducted themselves during the day that it was one of those special events that will be remembered by students. We are truly blessed to be able to access such a quality venue for our carnival. For most schools and colleges around the state, the athletics carnival is usually held at school on a grass track set up by the grounds staff. To be able to perform at a facility that is world class is a real gift. The students appreciated this and there were many "Personal Bests" completed. It reminded me of a school that I taught at many years ago that did have the dedicated grounds staff prepare the tracks for the Athletics on the main oval. A certain religious brother, an older Irish gentleman with a fairly short temper decided that the weather was too cold to put too much effort into the preparing of the tracks. We were not aware of the shortcuts taken until some extraordinary records for the 100 metres were being posted (Olympic Qualifying times) when we discovered that the track was about 15 metres too short! As well, Lanes 7 and 8 merged into one at the back of the track, also not discovered until the first of the 400 metre heats where being conducted and the students in those lanes had to finish the race in lane 6! Poor old Brother Don retired not long after that!

Year 11 are preparing to take over the leadership of the College this term. We have had initial discussions with them about Student Leadership and the Servant nature of this important role. Over the coming weeks we will be taking nominations and then beginning the process of discerning our new student leaders for 2020. We hope and pray that our young men and women are able to look into their hearts to see if they might be able to continue a wonderful legacy of quality student leadership that is a hallmark of the College. We wish them well as they begin this process and look forward to supporting them on this journey.

Finally, our Year 12 cohort is busily completing their final assessments and major works for the HSC. At the assembly last week, I spoke to them again about the beautiful, yet sad time of the year that they are now in. This year, as it is for all Year 12 groups is a time of "lasts." I suspect that their last assessment tasks will not be sad occasions but rather a time of great relief. I reminded them of the need to continue to work closely with their teachers, asking for valuable feedback on their efforts and to continue to prepare well for the final exams next term. It is a time of celebration but it is also a great time to make a difference to the final outcomes. Much is still to do and if they remain focussed and on task, they will move into the HSC with confidence and clarity.

Semester One Diligence Awards

On Tuesday 30^{th} July we gathered as a community in our College Assembly to celebrate the achievements of students in Years 7 – 10 for Semester One. This year we made some changes to our College awards, choosing to recognise DILIGENCE as reported by classroom teachers, across ALL subjects in Years 7 – 10.

Students receiving a Diligence Award have achieved A MINIMUM of 5 ratings of EXCELLENT in the category of DILIGENCE in their Reports for Semester One.

Why the change to our process? We are focussing at this point of the year, on effort and application, rather than overall results or numbers. We wanted to keep a very sharp focus on EFFORT – rather than numbers hence the assembly held on Tuesday was very much about recognition of diligence.

So, what does this mean? Diligence?

Diligence is a quality – it describes the way students approach their class work and study. Diligence means to be conscientious, attentive, careful and using a lot of effort. In our assembly we chose to celebrate this quality in our students – it does not necessarily mean that the best result received the award, or First in the class – The assembly was very much about EFFORT and approaches to learning.

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We chose to give this recognition at a whole school assembly so that as a community we could celebrate this achievement. Thank you to our seniors, Student Coordinators and Support staff in making the morning such a success and, once again, congratulate all those receiving a Diligence Award.

Year 11 2020

As we move into the next stage of our 2020 timetabling process students in Year 10 will now have an opportunity to select their subjects from the Lines that have been established (based on initial choice). We will send a link to Edval Webchoice (as previously done) and students are asked to make a selection from the Lines available. These Lines have been formed based on Student Choice, staffing availability and sustainability within the curriculum. Students are encouraged to talk to their teachers and Careers Advisor as part of the process. Students will be advised regarding the process on Monday 5 August.

ALL Year 8 students and their families are invited to attend the Additional Studies Evening being held **NEXT Monday 5 August commencing at 6.30pm in the Hall**. Students will receive their Subject Handbooks in an assembly on Friday where they will have an opportunity to discuss and ask questions of teachers in relation to subject choices.

International Children's Games

Five students from St Paul's have recently competed in the International Children's Games for Team Lake Macquarie in Ufa Russia. Ella competed in the 200 & 100 Breast, 200IM and 50 Free, Chloe competed in the 200, 100 & 50 Breast and 200 Back and Caleb competed in the 200 Free and IM, 100 Back and 50 Breast. All students also competed in the 4 x 100 IM and Freestyle Relays. With over 83 cities and 30 countries competing Ella's best result was in the 200 Breast where she finished 10th in the B Final, while Chloe competed in the 200 Breast Final and Caleb was 13th overall in the 100M Backstroke.

This has been an amazing experience for these students who spent three days touring around Moscow with the team before the Games. They created many memories, made new friends and traded equipment and items of clothing with people from other countries. An update on Rylie and Jasmin's results will be given when they return to school from their extended holiday after these games.

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World Championships

Two students Lachlan Moore (9) and Sabine Bowdidge (12) have also had amazing experiences competing at World Championship level over the last six weeks. Sabine qualified for the Open Irish Dance Championships last year and travelled to Killarney Ireland in June. While Lachlan travelled to Belgium in July for the World BMX Titles. A tremendous amount of time, effort and dedication is required for students to reach the pinnacle of their chosen passion and these students are to be congratulated for reaching such heights.



Welcome to the **last term of Year 11**. In only 11 short weeks, the students will be entering their HSC and final year of school.

Last week, the **School Leadership process** was launched to the students. We spent the Form Assembly outlining the process and completion dates, heard from the current College Leaders and from our Principal. The dates and process are outlined below.

This was followed up last Monday with a **Reflection Day** also centred around leadership as all our students in senior school are considered the leaders of our College. I thank Mrs Polo-Kuras for her organisation of the day and for inviting Graham from *Youth Specialists Australia* to address the students. He cleverly and casually clarified a few home truths to the students – they already know how to get to wherever they choose to go, it's a matter of getting out of their own way and doing it. I really hope that many of his messages, which are reflective of the same I have been telling them for 5 years, sink in so that each student can reach his or her potential in whatever field or area that they choose.

The **timeline** for the selection of the 2020 College Leaders, during Term 3 2019, is as follows:

- **Week 1**: Process of student leadership is formally explained to students and nominations called for from Year 11 cohort. This to occur at the Form Assembly. Cohort to be addressed by current College Leaders.
- **Week 2:** Student Nomination Forms to be completed and emailed to Mrs Pryor by 3.00pm, Friday 2nd August. The completed Nomination Forms will be available to staff and students to read.
- **Week 3:** Staff objections to be given to Principal in writing by Wednesday 7th August and nominated students can also withdraw from the process by Wednesday 7th August. Short listing of nominations may need to occur if there are more than eight boys or girls nominated. Students will be informed of decisions by Friday 9th August.
- **Week 4:** Nominated students will present speeches to staff and all students at a School Assembly in the Hall on Friday 16th August.
- **Week 5:** Staff and Years 10, 11 and 12 students will vote online, which closes by 8pm Tuesday 20th August. Students will be informed of the four shortlisted males and females by Wednesday 21st August.
- Week 6: The four shortlisted males and females will be interviewed by a panel consisting of the Principal, Assistant Principals, Student Coordinator, Parent Representative and two of the current College Leaders on Thursday 29th August. Principal to inform all students who are interviewed of the panel's final decision on Thursday 29th August, after which an announcement of the 2020 College Leaders is made to the staff and then to the school community.
- Week 7: Assessment Free
- Week 8: Examinations






Cheap Thrills



Teacher Training Scholarships CSO 2020

The Catholic Schools Office, with the support of Federal Government funding from the National Partnerships Teacher Quality initiative intends to offer up to FIVE (5) **Scholarships** to current **Yr. 12 students** in our Catholic schools, who intend to commence undergraduate courses in teacher training in 2020. Under the program each student will receive a total benefit of up to \$7000 over four years. This is an effort to develop a targeting of scholarships recipients for potential employment in Catholic schools.

Steps to an Australian Apprenticeship

Australian Apprenticeships, which include both apprenticeships and traineeships, involve training in a formal qualification and paid employment. It can be difficult knowing what types of apprenticeships and traineeships are out there, and how to find them.

The Australian Apprenticeships and Traineeships Information Service has developed the *Steps to an Australian Apprenticeship*, which breaks up the process of finding an apprenticeship or traineeship into 4 easy steps: Research, Preparation, Job Hunting and Sign Up.

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Research

Researching your options is an important step to take before you start making career and training decisions. This will help you make up your mind about what industries and occupations you are interested in working in.



Preparation

Now that you've done your research and know which apprenticeship or traineeship you want to do, the next step is to prepare yourself for the job! Consider things like doing a pre-apprenticeship, having a look at wage information, and familiarising yourself with working conditions.



Job Hunting

There are many ways to find an apprenticeship or traineeship job. Think about contacting employers you already know, using job search sites or registering with a Group Training Organisation. Don't stick to just one method, try them all!



Sign Up

Every Australian Apprentice must be signed up into a formal training contract shortly after they are employed. To organise a sign up, the employer will need to contact an Australian Apprenticeship Support Network provider, who are funded by the Australian Government. These steps, when followed, can make the task of getting an apprenticeship or traineeship less daunting, and more achievable. 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Literacy and Numeracy Skills for Australian Apprenticeships & Traineeships

When starting an apprenticeship or traineeship, you won't be expected to have specific skills and experience in the industry – you learn this on the job and through your training. However, this doesn't mean you don't need any skills at all before starting!

Literacy and numeracy skills are important for everyone, but they are sometimes underrated by people looking at apprenticeships and traineeships. The training for Australian Apprenticeships requires both literacy and numeracy, but in ways that are specific to your job.

For example, someone starting a traineeship in retail will need to be able to deal with money, but in carpentry you will need to understand lengths and angles. Different occupations might require different types of literacy numeracy skills. Across all areas, reading, writing and verbal communication will be important as you learn your job.

The Australian Apprenticeships and Traineeships Information Service have developed short online quizzes to help you self-assess your literacy and numeracy skills. The questions are related to an industry you might be looking to do an apprenticeship or traineeship in. For example, you will get different questions depending on whether you do the Animal Care and Management quiz, compared to the Electrotechnology quiz.

These quizzes will help you understand the types of literacy and numeracy skills you might need when starting an apprenticeship or traineeship in the industry you choose. Once you finish the quiz you will see what questions you got right and wrong, and your score. You will also get information about what your next steps might be. This could include focusing on your literacy and numeracy skills or starting job hunting.

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
Attention Yr. 12 -UAC 2019 Seminars



All The World's A Stage!


