

Dear Parents and Caregivers,

On Sunday night, the Southern Hemisphere experienced the longest night of the year. I'm not entirely sure that I noticed that Monday night was any shorter! What I did notice is that Winter is certainly here and the weather, although sunny at the time of writing this, is very wintery. When I moved up to the lake some 8 years ago from the Southern Highlands, I often said that one of the reasons for the move was because I was sick of chopping firewood. We would start the fire on ANZAC Day and it would stay alight until October! It isn't quite as cold here but I think that I have acclimatised and am feeling the cold a little more than usual! And before anyone comments, it isn't my advancing years!

In the last newsletter, I asked for support with the uniform. I would like to thank our community for working with us to ensure that students are wearing the correct uniform. The hoody culture that was creeping in seems to have abated and I am pleased to report that students are doing the right thing by and large. The one student I saw yesterday in the yard had a note from mum. It was an easy conversation and it was good to see that the right uniform was worn the next day.

Next week, we enter Week 10. Traditionally we would be looking forward to our day of celebration – St Paul's Day which happens on the last day of the term. Year 12 would normally be sitting their trial HSC exams. COVID – 19 has certainly shaken up most of what we do. We will be having a modified St Paul's Day celebration. Students will attend the College in appropriate Mufti dress (Mrs Shipman has sent a letter to all parents and caregivers via COMPASS with our expectations.) Period 1 and 2 will be normal timetabled lessons followed by the celebration. Unfortunately this year, we are unable to have the traditional rides because of the COVID Restrictions. We will be having a virtual liturgy conducted in CARE group classes as well as our annual St Paul's Got Talent performances. There will be a multitude of lunch options for the students as well as fundraising events for the SVDP Winter Blanket Appeal. It will be a different celebration and it is hoped that all our community gets involved. There has been a huge amount of work done behind the scenes and the best way of saying thanks to our team of organisers is to be here, participating.

COVID restrictions have also impacted our annual Year 11 Ski Trip. Sadly we will not be able to host the trip this year. There are significant restrictions to accommodation venues, lift access and ski lessons that make any such trip unfeasible. I understand that this decision will be disappointing for some of our community but until we have a vaccine or the virus is completely eliminated from our shores, these type of events will be problematic into the future. At the time of writing this article, DET guidelines still prohibit camps and excursions.

Earlier in the term, you received information from the Catholic Schools Office outlining the academic reporting protocols for Stages 4 and 5 that would be used at the conclusion of the semester. Teachers are currently completing reports based on these guidelines and these will be published at the beginning of Term 3. We are also investigating our options for Parent/Teacher Interviews given that there are still restrictions on adults coming onto school premises. Many schools are looking at using Zoom and other online platforms to facilitate these meetings. We are looking at the same possibility. At this stage, Parent/Teacher interviews are scheduled for Tuesday 28th July (afternoon session) and Wednesday 29th July (all day session – Pupil Free Day). We will inform you as to our plans early in week one of next term.

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On Monday 20th July (first day back next term) we have a scheduled Staff Development Day (Pupil Free Day). We will continue with that day as we have booked in training for staff on WHS Compliance, Quality Teaching and Learning and planning for our CARE program. On Wednesday 22nd July was to be our annual Athletics Carnival. Unfortunately, this too has been cancelled due to COVID restrictions. All students will return to Term 3 on Tuesday 23rd July.

School Friday Sport in Term 3 will still have a multitude of restrictions. Our Sports Coordinators are working through these restrictions with a view to have a viable and sustainable program for our Year 7-10 students from the start of the term. We will be able to have some off-site venues as long as we have sole access. Some other outside venues are also able to be used based on the projected lifting of some restrictions. More information will be sent to you as soon as we are able.

This virus continues to define what we can and can't do. The mixed messages from Governments do not help our decision making. The increase in cases in Victoria show how quickly things can change. On ABC radio this morning, it was stated that we have not had any positive cases in the Hunter/New England area since mid-April. We will continue to be vigilant here at St Paul's so that our community remains safe and well. The upside to all this precaution seems to be that Flu cases this year are remarkably low! Perhaps there is a silver lining in all things if we look hard enough.

Enjoy the Winter break with your children. If you are lucky enough to be able to get away for a short break, I hope that the weather is kind to you and that you are safe in your travels. For those of us that don't have that opportunity, stay safe and enjoy the cold nights and cool days.

Finally, from St Paul:

'Joy, peace, faith, hope — these spiritual blessings are ours if Christ lives in us. These spiritual qualities are indestructible because they have their source in Christ, who is always with us. Because we cannot lose Christ, our spiritual blessings are secure.' -Ephesians 1:3

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Assistant Principal—Teaching and Learning

I have enjoyed visiting classrooms over the past few weeks and discussing with students their attitudes about their learning and how they approach their learning. It has struck me how quickly students will often describe their



perception of intelligence as something that is fixed and can't be changed. This is an aspect of learning that I believe teachers and families can help our young people change their awareness of. As I have often explained to students, no matter where you think you are now with your learning, your ability to master knowledge and skills is an area of untapped potential! Teachers and parents can assist our young people in developing their self-efficacy — the belief they have of their ability to achieve an outcome or reaching a goal.

Self-efficacy shapes the behaviours and strategies that help students pursue goals. High self-efficacy reflects confidence in the ability to exert control over their motivation, behaviour, and environment, and allows students to become advocates for their own needs and supports. Research suggests that self-efficacy can boost student achievement, foster emotional health and well-being, and serve as a valid predictor of motivation and learning. Studies also have shown that students with high levels of self-efficacy participate more in class, persist longer, and are able to effectively solve problems when encountering difficulties than students with lower self-efficacy. One way in which we are supporting students to cultivate higher levels of self-efficacy is through the inclusion of self-reflection on reports. Students can use this information to help them set goals for their learning. Using the SMART goal strategy is a good way to start setting goals and students are encouraged to write these down and share them at home.




Last week our Year 11 students were issued with their reports which included a student self-reflection, focusing on learning, with the purpose of encouraging students to set goals in consultation with their teachers and their families in order to achieve their next steps in learning. Year 7-10 students are also completing a self-reflection for their semester reports and, like Year 11 students, are encouraged to use this as an opportunity to set goals for their next steps. We will have Student Conferences (Parent Teacher Interviews) early in Term 3 after reports are released, and it is important that students are active participants in these conversations.

This week, Year 10 students received their subject offerings for Year 11 2021. We have been able to offer an increased number of courses for Year 11 next year which has provided students with greater choice. It is an exciting time for Year 10 and marks the start of the transition into senior studies and a journey we look forward to embarking on with our students. I firmly believe that one of the core goals of education is to know each child we educate and I have enjoyed hearing student's aspirations for their future, the subjects they enjoy and the types of learning they want to engage in. At St Paul's we are able to know and work with each student to help them achieve these goals and aspirations. Students are able to make changes to their pattern of study by collecting a Change of Course form from Student Services.

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Vaccination Information



NSW Health is ensuring that students are safely vaccinated at school during COVID-19

- Information for parents/guardians

NSW Health has been working with education authorities to implement additional measures to ensure that students in Year 7 and 10 can be safely vaccinated during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Program background

In 2020 NSW Health is offering the following vaccines:

YEAR	VACCINE	NUMBER OF DOSES	
Year 7	Human papillomavirus (HPV)	2 doses at least 6 months apart	
	Diphtheria, Tetanus and Pertussis (dTpa)	1 dose	
Year 10	Meningococcal ACWY	1 dose	

While the school vaccination program has been disrupted due to low student attendance, students are progressively returning to school over the coming months.

Additional measures

NSW Health has implemented additional measures based on expert clinical advice to reduce the likelihood of COVID-19 transmission in school clinics, including:

- · health screening of nurses before clinics
- pre-vaccination screening of students
- physical distancing restrictions at the clinic entrance & observation area
- ensuring the number of students and nurses at the clinic does not exceed the maximum allowed
- enhanced hand hygiene by nurses and students
- enhanced environmental cleaning of all surfaces

What parents/guardians should do

Parents/guardians should ensure that students with influenza-like symptoms do not attend school and are tested as soon as possible (www.nsw.qov.au/covid-19/symptoms-and-testing). There is no need for parents/guardians who have given consent for their child to receive vaccinations at school to take any action. Parents/guardians who have not provided consent can contact their local public health unit on 1300 066 055 or their school for advice on how to provide consent for vaccination.

When students will be vaccinated

Public health units are arranging clinics with schools so that vaccinations can be given to students as soon as possible.

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SENIOR THEATRE MAKERS 2020

ASPIRE's Senior Theatre Makers program will be taking a slightly different approach to creating a new work in 2020. ASPIRE has put out a call for written submissions from students all around the diocese on the topic of isolation. Our Senior Theatre Makers will use these pieces to create a verbatim piece of theatre that will be performed at the Civic Playhouse at the end of Term 3 (in the event the playhouse has not reopened by this point the work will be filmed or an alternate date agreed on with the students)

Students will work with ASPIRE Artistic Director Anna Kerrigan and ASPIRE intern Ollie Crawford to produce the piece of theatre. They will be involved in the creation of the work using text from students and their own experiences. They will then collaborate with the directors and ensemble to put the piece onstage developing skills in blocking and workshopping ideas as well as developing performance skills in voice and movement.

Our process will alter from the usual weekly workshop format to three online sessions for Term 2, where the group will come together virtually to look at the material we have been sent and start to put together our piece of theatre. It is hoped that we will be able to hold face to face rehearsals in Term 3, however if that is not possible we will rehearse virtually.

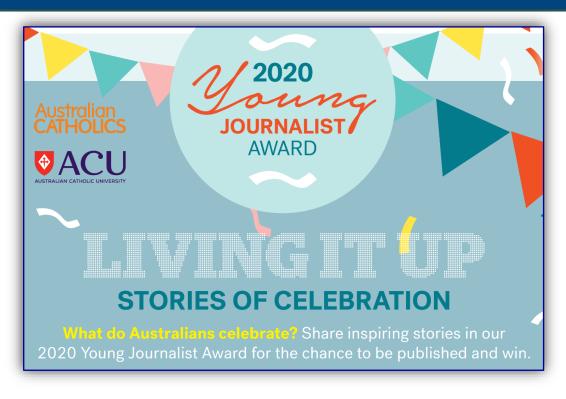
