COVID 19

Study and Homework



As the term progresses and students are engaging with a variety of learning experiences in class, it is a good time to discuss the difference between homework and study and what role each of these play in developing students' learning potential. In Years 7, 8 and 9, homework plays an important role in guiding students to self-regulate their learning and in developing the

skills in organisation and communication. As students progress through to Year 10, 11 and 12, the importance of distinguishing between homework and study becomes a core focus as they enter into the ROSA and HSC courses. To assist students in developing an understanding of the role homework and study plays in succeeding in learning, we have partnered with Elevate who will deliver a series of workshops targeted at key stages for students from Year 10 through to Year 12. We will be holding the first Elevate session with Year 11 in the coming weeks which will draw on the sessions they participated in at the end of Year 10. More details will be provided towards the date.

What is homework?

Homework is learning set for outside class time which provides students with the opportunity to consolidate, extend and/or enrich the academic program at St Paul's. Research has found that in the latter years of schooling, students who complete homework generally outperform students who do not.

The appropriate type and amount of homework improves students' study skills and their attitudes toward school and helps learning take place outside the classroom. Homework is designed to engage the student in effective learning. The type and nature of homework varies depending on the subject, the student's level of learning and the stage in the academic program. There are three main purposes of homework:

Practise of skills and knowledge to assist in consolidating surface learning.

Preparatory work which provides opportunities for students to gain background information on a unit of study so that they are better prepared for future lessons.

Extension Assignments—students are encouraged to pursue knowledge individually and imaginatively and to transfer knowledge and skills to new situations.

What is study?

Study is the reinforcement of work that students have been expected to learn. Studying is, of course, different according to what subject is being learned, but in general it involves reviewing and deepening understanding of in-class learning. As soon after class as possible, the student should review what took place in class – their class notes, activities, videos, etc. and then, with these resources, review, clarify, edit and deepen their understanding of the material covered that day. Teachers communicate learning intentions and success criteria for learning to students and this forms the basis of what should be studied.

The following table is a summary of the difference between homework and study:

Studying	Homework
Student-driven	Teacher directed
Independently giving time and attention to acquiring meaningful understanding of course material	Completing work set by the teacher.
Does not contribute to a grade or rank.	Can be used by the teacher to make determinations on what the student knows and can do.
There is always study that can be done!	If homework is not set the student can complete study activities.

Study Less but with Greater Intensity!

In this era of digital distractions, many students do a lot of multitasking. But there is no such thing as successful multitasking because much of the time spent is wasted on context switching, where the brain has to restart and refocus.

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Consider the formula "work accomplished = intensity of focus x time spent." A student who is studying for Biology but also checks their texts and scrolls through social media has a low intensity of focus of, say 3. Though they have spent 3 hours "studying," the work accomplished is only a 9.

On the other hand, a student who takes steps to focus solely on Biology has a high-intensity of focus of 10. Though they have spent only an hour studying, they have accomplished more than the distracted classmate did in 3 hours.

Highly successful students have generally learned to avoid multitasking. Instead of spending a lot of time doing low-intensity work with numerous distractions, these students work for shorter periods at higher intensity, without any distractions from email, social media, etc. Their studying is more effective and leads to greater achievement gains.

6 High Intensity Study Habits

Researchers have found that the following techniques increase sustainable learning and retention when incorporated in students' daily study habits. These techniques are difficult and require effort, and they slow down learning. Initially the learning gains seem to be smaller than with some ineffective practices. However, these techniques lead to long-term mastery.

- **Pre-test:** When students practise answering questions, even incorrectly, before learning the content, their future learning is enhanced. Research has shown that pre-testing improves post-test results more than spending the same amount of time studying.
- **Spaced practice:** Spacing out study sessions which means focusing on a topic for a short period on different days, has been shown to improve retention and recall more than massed practice. Spaced practice can feel difficult due to an initial forgetting of knowledge and reacquiring that knowledge takes effort.
- **Flash Cards:** Students should create different piles when reviewing the flash cards. The cards they're able to answer immediately should be placed in a pile to review three days later; those answered with some difficulty should be reviewed two days later; and those that they answered incorrectly should be reviewed the next day.
- **Self-quizzing:** Testing has a negative connotation in this era of standardised testing, but it is a form of active retrieval practice. An effective strategy to apply is to make test questions as new concepts are learnt and to think about the types of questions that might be asked on a quiz or test. Students should incorporate these quizzes into their study sessions, answering every question, even those they believe they know well.
- **Interleaving practice:** Students may rely on blocked practice, studying a set of problems, such as multiplication problems, as a group until they feel mastery. A more effective method of studying is to work on a set of problems that are related but not all of the same kind, for example, a set of mathematics word problems that call for addition, subtraction, multiplication, or division. The consecutive problems cannot be solved with the same strategy. This is more effective than doing one multiplication problem after another.
- Paraphrasing and reflecting: Many of us have read a few paragraphs in a textbook only to realize that we didn't retain a single concept or key point presented in those paragraphs. To combat this, students can utilise intentional learning strategies which include relating what is being learned to prior knowledge, thinking about how they would explain the content to a younger student, and reflecting on and asking questions about the content.

Work and Study

Students are more likely to combine study and work as they progress in their schooling years and at St Paul's, we see many senior students taking up part-time work. Year 11 and Year 12 are the period of time where students are preparing for life after school and we want our students to establish positive patterns for their learning so they can be successful in their chosen post-school pathway. To achieve success in their HSC, students need to consider how the juggle of school and part time work might be impacting on that success. As a guide, we suggest students do not engage in any more than 10 hours per week of part time work so they are able to establish positive habits of homework and study.

Tax File Numbers 2022

Any student will need a tax file number if he/she starts work (part-time and full-time) and all students planning on a tertiary education require one when they start. Importantly, current Year 12 students are reminded that they will be requested to provide their Tax File Number (TFN) on enrolment to TAFE or university next year, so it is worthwhile getting an application submitted early! Students must now apply for a TFN online and have their identity verified through an interview at a participating Australia Post office. The Defence Industry-Virtual Work Experience

The 'defence industry' is the thousands of Australian businesses, men and women across the country who aren't in the Defence Force but use their expertise, experience and trade skills to supply and support it - they are The Workforce Behind The Defence Force. A new government initiative to help build the defence industry is the virtual work experience program. The Defence Industry Virtual Work Experience Program will provide opportunities for students who may face geographic or other barriers to participating in traditional work experience. Students will undertake collaborative, science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM) projects, linked to real-world research and industry challenges. The Defence Industry Virtual Work Experience Program will commence in Term 2, 2022 with a pilot of approximately 30 students. Please email: workexperience@csiro.au to register for more information.

Eligibility To be eligible to participate in Virtual Work Experience, students must be:

- in Years 10 or 11, and aged 15-17 years for the duration of the work experience
- · enrolled in a school in Australia
- able to commit to the designated days as specified by the supervisor (with students seeking approval from their school) and be supported by a teacher, parent or other approved adult in their physical location throughout their work experience project.

Virtual work experience will be run by the Department of Defence in conjunction with Australia's National Science Agency, CSIRO.





Entry to Medicine/Dentistry 2023

UCAT Quick Facts

The UCAT (University Clinical Aptitude Test) is a 2-hour computer-based test. The UCAT will be offered on a choice of dates throughout the month of July 2022, rather than on one single date. Some pathways to medicine/dentistry/clinical sciences will not require the UCAT and some courses may require another test.

Students are encouraged to browse University Clinical Aptitude Test (UCAT) and it is recommended to watch the UCAT FAQs which addresses general questions about the UCAT.

UCAT practice tests assist students in familiarising themselves with the type of questions they can expect to see in the test. I have sent all Yr. 12 students a link to access these.





School Travel Passes

Students who need a School Opal card or travel pass but have not yet applied need to apply or update their details as soon as possible.

In the Opal network, students should travel with a Child/Youth Opal card until they receive their valid School Opal card. If outside Greater Sydney, parents should contact their <u>local</u> bus operator to discuss their travel needs.

New Student Opal cards (including new Term Bus Passes) will be sent to the student's nominated postal address within two weeks of their application being approved.

Students living in rural and regional (R&R) areas will receive their travel pass from their nominated transport operator. It may be issued via their school or be sent directly to them at home. Note: some R&R operators do not issue travel passes. Students/parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

Terms of Use

Students using Opal cards must tap on and tap off in line with the Opal terms of use.

All students are required to comply with the <u>Student code of conduct</u>. The code of conduct aims to ensure the safety and well-being of school children and other passengers. It is important that parents ensure their child is aware of this, as failure to comply with the code of conduct can result in a suspension from travel.
