GOAL SETTING

Goal setting is a skill that serves us well in many aspects of everyday life and is fundamental to achieving long-term success. It is difficult to get to a desired destination if you do not clearly define the ultimate destination and how you will get there. At St Paul's we encourage the development of the skill of setting long and short-term goals to assist students to focus and create a set of achievements they can aim for. Through goal setting, we learn to focus our time and resources more efficiently. From an educational perspective, academic goals improve student performance by ensuring students remain accountable for their own decisions, habits, and successes.

Towards the end of this term, students will be asked to reflect on their learning through a self-reflection which forms part of the **interim report published to parents/carers in week 9 this term**. The **Student Conferences which follow in Week 10**, provide students an opportunity to dialogue with their teachers and parents/carers to set goals for the coming term and year.



We would all be familiar with the SMART goal acronym. SMART describes goals which should be specific, measurable, achievable, realistic and timely. An effective way to phrase a goal is: **By** ... (timely), **I will** (action) **so that** (relevance and outcome).

As teachers, we also set professional goals to ensure our teaching practices are providing students with rich and meaningful learning experiences. Much of the work teachers

and Leaders of Learning have undertaken during the start of the year is to analyse our HSC data, along with other data such as internal assessment and Tell Them From Me survey data, to create school, faculty and then professional goals. It has been wonderful to hear from teachers as they have shared their goals over the past weeks. Importantly, at the heart of all these conversations, has been the students and teachers' pursuit in creating conditions in their classrooms each day so our students can reach their potential.

NAPLAN

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is a point in time assessment of literacy and numeracy skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life. Each year students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 participate in tests for writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. From 2023, NAPLAN is moving to Term 1 and will take place from Wednesday 15 March to Monday 27 March 2023. The reason for this change is so that results can be returned to schools earlier in the year which will support teachers to understand the learning needs of their students and plan accordingly. A schedule will be emailed to students and parents/carers in week 7. Students in Year 7 and Year 9 will also take part in two familiarisation activities in week 7. The purpose of these activities is to allow students to practise using the online platform.

These activities are not assessed and responses are not recorded. Students will be informed of the timing of the familiarisation activities early next week. It is expected that students have ear buds/ headphones (not Bluetooth) and their charged device each day.

This year the reporting of NAPLAN has changed. New proficiency standards with 4 levels of achievement for each year level will replace the previous 10-band structure that covered all 4 levels tested and the old national minimum standard set in 2008 when tests were on paper. The new proficiency standards include a baseline benchmark to identify students who are likely to need additional support. 
We acknowledge that NAPLAN is not a measure of what a student is capable of. It does not measure characteristics and capabilities such as creativity and engagement in learning – we know that our students are far more capable than a narrow measure of literacy and numeracy. What NAPLAN does provide us with, however, is an indication of how our students are tracking and provides direction and opportunity for adjustment as we work to ensure students have the basic skills to access the curriculum. NAPLAN can not be used as a single source of data and is always used with other data points to develop a more complete picture of the quality of education at the College. 


Translating and Interpreting Service (TIS National)


